Idaho's Sales Tax Opposition Voted By Farm Bureau

BOISE, Nov. 28 (UP)—The Idaho Farm Bureau Federation today resolved upon a final position to a state sales tax and proposed a county income tax to help equalize the burden. In other resolutions relating to tax matters, the delegates to the bureau's annual convention here recommended elimination of the ad valorem tax, elimination of the tax on the minimum school property, and elimination of a tax on the minimum school property and use of a more equitable form of taxation, "preferably income tax," to make up amounts eliminated. The farmers also urged a tax on timber products to "equalize" the tax load.

Hungarian Puppet Chief Offers Amnesty for Escaped Refugees

VIENNA, Nov. 28 (UP)—Hungary's puppet government offered an amnesty today to the 92,000 Hungarian refugees from communist terror if they return to their homeland by the end of this year. The offer was broadcast over Budapest radio to a nation still crippled by a bitter general strike. The thousands of refugees jammed into emergency camps in Austria received the offer cynically, with no thought of accepting it. Radio Budapest, citing the government minister organ Nep Szabadsag, said the amnesty law had been approved by the government.

U.S. May Back High Pleasant Valley Dam

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—Secretary of Interior Stewart confirmed yesterday the administration may support a proposal for construction of a high dam at Pleasant Valley, Idaho. Exams Given For Business Classes Here

Full term examinations at Twin Falls Business college are being given this week with the term ending Monday.

Registration for the new quarter is now in progress. Students who wish to enroll for the winter term are urged to register early. Out-of-town students are helped by the college to find suitable homes or apartments in Twin Falls. Homes are available where students may work for board and room.

A full curriculum of classes is available for the winter term in all subjects pertaining to business education. Beginning, intermediate and advanced classes in typing, bookkeeping and accounting; secretarial practice; intermediate and advanced classes in Speedwriting; shorthand; spelling; business English; business math; secretarial practice; intermediate accounting; office practice; economics; public relations and office procedures; and office machines instruction.

The college operates on a year-around basis. Four quarters of instruction are given each year. The winter term will end in March.

Increased Leaves OK'd for Recruits

Increased leave for marine recruits following basic and individual combat training is announced by Sgt. Robert DeMahn, local marine recruiter.

Boyle Finds Jazz Is Enjoying New Wave Despite 'Madness'

By IRL BOYLE
NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (AP)—Night at the peak of rock 'n' roll madness, an older and less barbarous form of music is enjoying a new renaissance. They used to call it jazz—and they still do.

If anybody thought the rowdy strains of rock 'n' roll would doom jazz to the musical grave yard, they low-rated the vitality of the Dixieland school of horn toasts and their robust melodies.

By the sacred legendary Dixie Belvedere ("the just put that hat on to his lips, man, and blew himself straight up to heaven"), jazz is entering a new golden age.

Just 30 years ago jazz was regarded as the juvenile delinquent of the musical world. Today it is the darling of the intellectuals: it is accepted as an art form; it is taught in colleges.

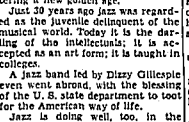
A jazz band led by Dizzy Gillespie even went abroad, with the blessing of the U. S. state department to tour for the American way of life.

Jazz is doing well, too, in the realm of the big dollar. Its practitioners are in top demand: Old jazz records are high-priced collectors' items, and some 85 companies turn out a total of more than 1,000 new plaques each year.

A leading historian of the field, Leonard Feather, has just compiled "The Encyclopedia Yearbook of Jazz," which is a fine prose pudding full of rich plums for fans who like to argue the merits of Count Basie versus Duke Ellington.

Personally, like many other toncetered music illustrators, I thought that rock 'n' roll music was a form of jazz—a sort of retarded stepchild.

Females Said

Not Quite so Red-Blooded

SEATTLE, Nov. 28 (U) — Women naturally less red-blooded than doctors suppose them to be and it is a waste of time to attempt to give the normal healthy female for "anemia," a woman physician reported yesterday.

Dr. Harriet Emish Judy, of Spokane, Wash., who reached this city after a study of 600 "normal" women, told the American Medical Association she had given up the idea of trying to increase the red blood cells and hemoglobin. Hemoglobin is the oxygen-carrying part of the red cell.

Several medical authorities, Dr. Judy reported, made studies which led to the general acceptance of a normal level of 4,000,000 red cells per cubic centimeter and a content of 14 grams of hemoglobin per 100 cubic centimeters in the blood of women.

Average from the carefully screened 600 women in her study, she added, show a level of 4,200,000 red cells and 12.8 grams of hemoglobin.

The trouble with the previously accepted level, Dr. Judy said, is that they came from studies of groups which were not representative of the entire healthy female population.

Dr. Judy said her attempts to better the blood counts and hemoglobin levels were so frustrating that she finally began to question the former standard figures representing the normal.

She found, she added, that only 100 years ago from tests on the only four persons. Since then, other groups have been tested and none of them constituted a good cross-section of normal healthy women, the Spokane physician said.

Innocent Men Killed by Mob In Java Riots

SURABAYA, Indonesia, Nov. 28 (U) — Angry mob have beaten and killed to death nine men and women suspected of juggling money. The children with needles in a rumored wave of sex terror in this east Java city, police reported today.

The mobs, headed into fury by rumors and press reports that sex predators had attacked victims with needles or other sharp objects, also seriously injured seven men they believed were guilty.

Police headquarters indicated that the mob victims were innocent. Police said that examination of the dead and of the injured had not proven a single person guilty.

Police arrested "several" mob leaders and doubled their city patrols warning the population not to take the law into their hands.

Press reports here for the past few days carried accounts of young girls and children being jabbed in the thighs and legs with "sharp objects" by unidentified assailants.

Most of the "victims" were children and young girls although a few older women and men also claimed to have been attacked. Some 70 persons have reported to hospitals for treatment.

One news report said girls screamed in movie theaters and mobs quickly formed and turned on men who were standing near the girls.

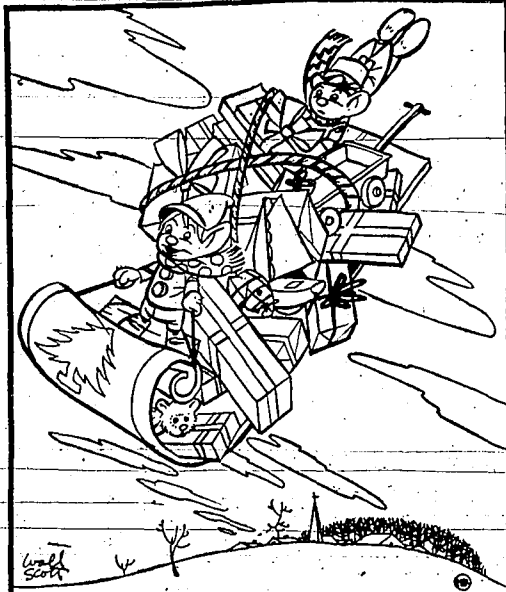

Story Told of Nazi Plot to Kill FDR and Eisenhower in 1944

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (U)—Hitler's Germany plotted to assassinate Dwight D. Eisenhower and Franklin D. Roosevelt during the closing months of World War II.

The desperate Nazis planned to kill Mr. Eisenhower by dropping a bomb on the allied forces in Europe, by dropping parachutists behind allied lines in London and Paris in late 1944 when Hitler's crumbling regime was in its last days.

The attempt on the late President Roosevelt's life was to have been set up by a mass breakout of 40,000 and prisoners interned in this country.

Both plots failed—partly through the efforts of the federal bureau of investigation.

The heading of these and other enemy intrigues is told in a new book, "The FBI Story," by Pulitzer prize-winning reporter Tom Whitely, chief of the New York Herald Tribune's Washington bureau.

Whitely, who had access to closely guarded FBI secrets, also tells of the agency's relentless war on two domestic evils—communism, subversives and gangsters.

F. Edgar Hoover, FBI director since 1924 under five presidents and 11 attorneys general, began the attack on home-grown Reds in 1930. He did so at the direction of President Roosevelt who had become disturbed by the extensive travels of a Soviet spy official.

But before the investigation could begin it was necessary to obtain the approval of Secretary of State Cordell Hull. Roosevelt threw back his head and laughed when the dignified secretary snapped to Hoover, "Go ahead and investigate the ..."

Whitely traces Hoover's battles to keep the FBI free of politics. But despite these efforts, Hoover and his agency were brought close to political controversy in the case of the late Harry Dexter White, former treasury official accused of being a Soviet spy.

In November, 1935, Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Jr., charged in a speech that former President Truman had promoted White from his post as assistant secretary of treasury to the international monetary fund despite FBI reports to the contrary.

The plane was carrying 18 passengers and a crew of seven on a flight from New York.

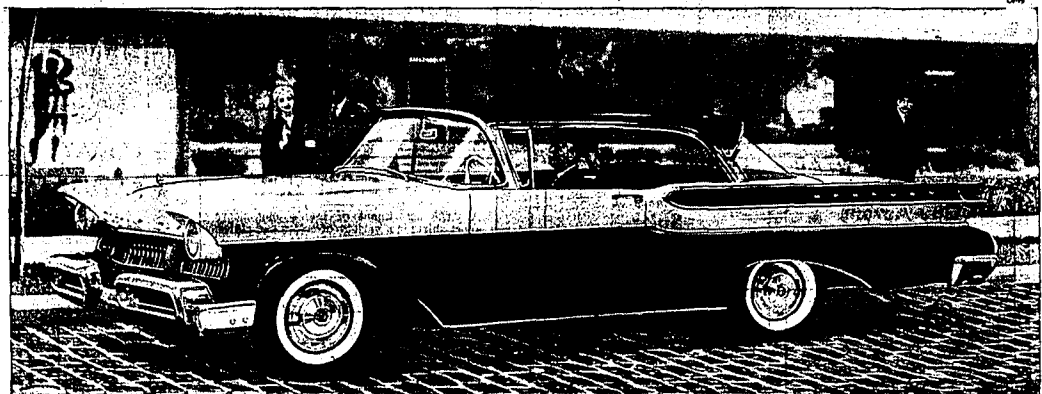

Buildup of Surpluses Believed Halted But U.S. Still Stores Huge Quantities

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—Agriculture department experts believe the record buildup of farm surpluses has been checked. But Uncle Sam still owns more than \$3 billion dollars worth of food, feed and fiber.

The government is willing to sell, donate and barter the surplus commodities. The taxpayers stand to lose a whopping \$100 million dollars on the stocks now on hand.

The huge stock of agricultural commodities was built up through increased production and price support operations of the commodity support corporation, an agency of the agricultural department. The 13 billion dollar inventory as of Sept. 30 does not include more than 28 billion dollars in outstanding loans on farm commodities still in farmers' hands.

The big items in the government inventory include 900 million bushels of wheat worth about 2.4 billion dollars; 748 million bushels of corn worth about 1.3 billion dollars; and 2 million bales of cotton worth about 610 million dollars. The government also owns 199 million dollars worth of rice, 171 million dollars in dairy products and lesser amounts of peanuts, tobacco, honey, tung oil, wool, barley, dry edible beans, cottonseed products, cotton linters, all grain, turpentine, oats, soy field seeds, soybeans, and a few other perishables.

Based on past performance, Uncle Sam may have to let the surplus go for slightly more than \$3 billion dollars and assume a loss of more than 13 billion dollars. This represents the net book value of the surplus less the reserve for losses which the CCC carried in its books on Sept. 30.

1924 million dollars, or 12 per cent of the total. The loss on sales was about 1.6 billion dollars, or 20 per cent. 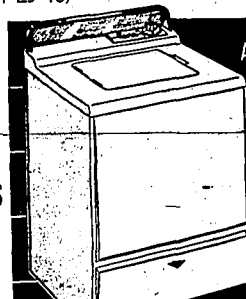

U.S. Studying Trio's Report In Unity Plan

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—The United States is studying a secret report which calls for increased economic and cultural cooperation among the 15 members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The initial American reaction to the report, which was prepared by the British, French, Italian, Dutch and Norwegian, was said to be highly favorable. Other NATO members also are studying it.

U. S. officials favor increased cooperation among NATO members in the military sphere. They see this as an important way of overcoming the unity-obtaining effects of the recent British-French action in Egypt. This attack was made without consultation in NATO.

President Eisenhower yesterday moved to head the NATO ally, growing out of the Egyptian action by declaring that differences between the United States, Britain and France over the Middle East should not be regarded as a "disruption" of the western alliance. A White House spokesman said at Augusta, Ga., that Mr. Eisenhower regards NATO as a "basic indispensable element of American foreign policy." He said the "containing" Soviet communist threat to "the peace and security of the world."

President Eisenhower's move to fall in NATO followed receipt of data over the week-end of secret reports by the so-called "three wise men"—Foreign Ministers Lester B. Pearson of Canada, Italian Foreign Minister Gaetano Martino, and Norwegian Foreign Minister Halvard Lange. The three were selected by NATO last year to advise "on ways and means to improve and extend NATO cooperation in military fields" and to improve NATO unity.

Production Costs of Farmer Continue To Increase in Nation, Survey Shows

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—(Special)—Farmers' production costs are continuing to rise, according to agricultural department surveys.

Since 1947-49 the overall index of farmers' production cost rates has risen nearly 15 per cent. And prices paid by the farmer for items of industrial origin, interest, taxes, and depreciation have advanced more than 30 per cent.

Prices paid for farm produce, however, have declined about 15 per cent since 1947-49.

These figures are found in a recent report of the agricultural research service.

Cost rates changed from 1947-49 to 1956 about as follows: Farm real estate taxes per acre, up 58 per cent; farm real estate prices, up 40 per cent; farm machinery prices, up 40 per cent; motor vehicle prices, up 21 per cent; farm base rates, up 20 per cent; building and fencing material prices, up 20 per cent; motor supply prices, up 20 per cent; farm supplies, up 17 per cent; farm motor vehicle interest rates, up 10 per cent; fertilizer prices up 8 per cent; seed prices, down 10 per cent; feed prices, down 11 per cent; feeder livestock prices, down 22 per cent.

The report says the relationship between farm cost rates and prices received by farmers is about the same as it was a year ago and about the same as in 1955-56 though somewhat less favorable to farmers.

Cost-price relationships can be expected to continue at about current levels during the next three to five years, the report says. But, there is always the hope of individual farmers lowering their unit costs of production, thus reducing the cost-price squeeze.

Prices for farm machinery and motor vehicles were about 5 per cent higher in mid-September than a year earlier. They are expected to be higher in 1957 than they were for the greater part of 1956.

Faith Healer Has Polio, Is Gravely Sick

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 28.—A 39-year-old starbuck who preaches faith healing was critically ill with bulbar poliomyelitis in a hospital here. His sister is so critically ill that she doubts he needs to be in the hospital.

Mrs. Lucille Gaddy, Dallas, said her brother, Rev. Jack Coe, believes the spirit of God can heal any sickness of the body.

Faith Told
"We have absolutely no doubt that God will cure him," she said. "In fact, I do not think he needs to be in the hospital. He is there against his wishes and if he knew where he was, he wouldn't want to be there."

Coe is gravely ill. Besides bulbar polio, he has pneumonia and lung abscess. A doctor said he should have come to the hospital sooner. In Miami, Fla., Coe once pronounced a 3-year-old polio victim cured and ordered him to take the braces off his wasted legs. This landed him in court when the child's parents charged that their son suffered much pain as a result. Coe has asked a federal court to dismiss the suit.

Arrested
Coe was arrested in Miami during a revival for practicing medicine without a license. A justice of the peace dismissed the charge.

Coe is a "hell-fire" type preacher who attracts thousands to his sermons. He operates the Dallas Revival center, at which he preached almost every night, and a center called the "Heavenly Healers" at Waxahatchie, Tex., south of Dallas.

Farm Income On Increase, Says Bureau

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—The agriculture department said today farm income was turned upward this year after four consecutive years of decline and present prospects are for some further increase in 1935.

Farmers realized net income during the first nine months of 1934 of over four per cent over 1933, the department said in its publication "The Farm Income Situation."

It gave no official forecast of the expected increase for 1935. However, Frederick V. Waugh, director of the department's economics division, has predicted the increase for 1935 would be five per cent.

The department said payments under the new soil bank program are an important contributing factor to this year's increase as they are expected to be again next year.

Farmers' realized net income was at an annual rate of \$11,700,000,000 in the first nine months of 1934 compared with \$11,200,000,000 for the whole year of 1933.

The department said cash receipts from farm marketings totaled \$22,900,000,000 through October of this year, up more than two per cent from the corresponding 10 months of 1933.

Volumes of farm marketings is about three per cent larger than last year's volume, more than offsetting slightly lower average prices.

U. S. Sets Record In Wheat Exports

ROME, Nov. 28.—World wheat exports for 1934 were 23 million metric tons over the previous year with the United States making the biggest shipments, the U. N. food and agriculture organization (FAO) reported today.

FAO said global exports of wheat and wheat flour topped 20.6 million metric tons for the 1933-34 season with the U. S. shipping a third of the amount.

U. S. shipping of all parts of the world increased with largest increases to Africa, the Far East and South America. The total U. S. shipment was 8.3 million metric tons for this year compared with 7.5 million metric tons for 1933-34. Nearly a quarter of the 1933-34 season's 24 million tons was made under special surplus-disposal arrangements.
