Experts Think Costs of Living Can Go Higher

NEW YORK, Nov. 29 (AP)—The cost of living is up again with predictions for more of the same. Government figures also put factory average take home pay of factory workers at a new high. This is all but more than half of the nation's bread earners don't work. For those whose incomes haven't increased in line with the government's consumer price index, the slow rise in the cost of goods and services is scarcely a cheerful prospect.

Pay Goes Up

When the government announced the cost of living index had advanced over 100 points, the pay of some 2 million workers went up automatically. Each year more labor contracts include this escalator device.

The index rise in the cost of living index was credited in large part to the surge given by the higher price tags on the new model cars. The rise in the index gave a million extra and farm equipment. Industry has cut prices on new cars and trucks. Higher price tags on new cars sent the index up, and the government credited the cost of making cars and trucks.

Much of the most recent rise in prices throughout industry has been credited to the hike in the price of steel that followed the wage boost at the end of last summer's strike.

Boost Assured

The index also all but assures that steel workers will get a three-percent raise in the first of the year. And even before this latest prospect many steel mill owners were insisting that still higher steel prices are needed.

The rise in prices has been slow but it is a runaway affair. But it has been steady and is now centering on its built-in features.

Iron Ore Imports Boosted

NEW YORK, Nov. 29 (AP)—The U. S. will be importing 40 per cent of the iron ore needs by 1937, the editor-in-chief of Iron Age magazine said today.

Tom C. Campbell said in a copy-righted article in the magazine's latest issue that the nation will need a minimum of 100 million gross tons of iron ore by 1937 to support its annual steel production of 167 million net tons.

He pointed out that 20 years from now only 50 per cent of the nation's iron ore will be produced domestically, against 77 per cent this year.

Campbell said 18.5 per cent will come from South America, 17.5 per cent from Canada and 14 per cent from other foreign nations in 1937, compared with percentages of 10, 10 and 23 respectively this year.

A spokesman for a British oil company said the additional cost of making the long trip around the Cape was about two pounds (\$5.60) a ton.

Sir Winston Churchill, Almost 82, Is Strangely Silent on U.S., British Split

LONDON, Nov. 29 (AP)—Winston Churchill is 82 tomorrow.

It seems strange that his eloquent voice is silent in these days of Britain's travail and the rift in the Atlantic alliance he was so instrumental in shaping.

But the fact is that Churchill has had a special speech in the House of Commons in months. He sent a letter to his constituents Nov. 3 backing Sir Anthony Eden's intervention in Egypt, but he has not defended it against attacks from the Socialists.

It is not that Sir Winston is not keeping busy. He works constantly and in great haste to complete the massive "History of the English Speaking People." Tomorrow he will take a rare day off from those labors to observe the birthday with his youngest wife and his children and grandchildren.

Two explanations are advanced why Churchill has so kept aloof from the Egyptian controversy. One is the familiar theme that he does not wish to overburden Eden with his great prestige and record. He

backbencher" and does not like to speak standing in the rear rows. When he was prime minister, he always leaned heavily in his later years on the old dispatch box which bears the "government" trademark.

But as step James Roosevelt—son of FDR—paid after visiting him last week, Sir Winston is very chipper, very alert. He is in excellent spirits.

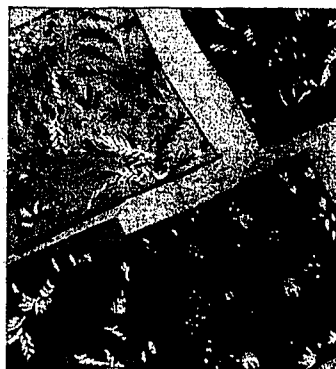

Egypt Use of 'Nazi Tactics' Is Protested

JEERUSALEM, Israel Section, Nov. 29 (AP)—Premier Ben-Gurion today declared a reign of terror in the Holy Land to hold fast to their faith. He appealed to the world to "stop Nazism."

"We must warn the world now, not of what is being done here, but of what is likely to happen if the effective measures are not taken immediately to put an end to these things," he said.

Ben-Gurion told the Knesset (parliament) speakers were discovered in various Egyptian vehicles and "variable" translations of "Mein Kampf" in the baggage of many Egyptian officers captured in the recent campaign. He declared this implies "appalling possibilities for the future of the Egyptian Jewry."

For the present, he said, Egyptian authorities are expelling all other officers of Egyptian citizenship with methods that, clearly, recall Nazi practices.

Further, he said, Egypt has refused to permit the British to become the protector of captured Israeli troops under the Geneva Convention for the protection of prisoners of war.

He said that the U. N. assembly will bear responsibility for the fate of these prisoners. Ben-Gurion said he had written to the U. N. so that the Egyptian dictator should comply with international law and the Geneva convention.

Foreign Minister Golda Meir had already asked general assembly in Geneva to take action against the Egyptian government.

Egypt has denied plans for a mass evacuation of Jewish sources say the Jews, as well as the British and French officials, are leaving of their own accord.

At Port Said, totaling about 3,000, have reported Egyptian police took away one member of each of the British and French contingents days before the British-French landing in the canal zone and none has been heard from since.

Youth Admits Starting New Fire in Forest

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Nov. 29 (AP)—A 16-year-old Indian boy has confessed to setting a 45,000-acre forest fire.

"I just got a crazy idea to throw a match in the grass to see if it would burn," Gilbert Palpa, a high school student, told Elwood U. S. forest service fire investigator.

The boy was arrested yesterday at the Fire Hills fire camp where he had been employed as a fire-fighter two days ago. The forest service said he confessed to lighting a match last Saturday in grass near a cabin on the Inaja Indian reservation where his family has lived for two generations.

Palpa was turned over to authorities here. He said a felony complaint was being sought from Deputy District Attorney Claude Brown.

Eleven firefighters were burned to death last Sunday when a wind-shift turned a ravine into an inferno. Six other members of the fire-fighting crew and several others in the area ran to safety.

The wind-whipped fire was brought under control last night. Nearly 2,000 firefighters had battled the blaze which raged out of control for four days in the Cleveland national forest.

Diphtheria Is Being Battled In City Attack

DETROIT, Nov. 29 (AP)—A new outbreak of diphtheria today spurred Detroit health officials to call for immunization shots for 100,000 school children.

Dr. Joseph G. Molner, city health commissioner, said his department hoped to complete the inoculation program before the start of the Christmas holidays.

Molner said he ordered the program after 12 new cases of diphtheria were reported in the city yesterday. He said the shots would be administered to children on the city's lower east and west sides.

He said all of the cases were reported from these areas and called them "critical sections."

"They were the most to be discovered in the city on a single day. They raised the number of the cases reported in the city thus far this year to 105. Five children have died. The new cases included nine school children, one adult and three children of pre-school age."

"We plan to accelerate our program to take in between 80,000 and 100,000 school children as fast as we can get the materials and personnel," Molner said.

"We will try to get a step ahead of the spread of diphtheria."

He said priority would be given to children who have not received diphtheria booster shots within the last two years.

Idahoans Warned Of Plate Deadline

BOISE, Nov. 29 (AP)—State Law Enforcement Commissioner Zette Koehler today reminded Idaho motorists that they must have 1937 license plates on their automobiles by Jan. 1.

He said the motor carrier and registration divisions of the department of law enforcement at Boise would be on the job every day on Saturdays to assist the public in obtaining current titles and registration of motor vehicles.

Koehler added that "no extension of time is anticipated this year as was necessary last year due to the new protraction registration arrangements."

Anti-American Feeling Might Support Eden

By United Press
The rising tide of anti-American feeling in Britain may save Prime Minister Anthony Eden's job if anything can.

Eden, a great many Britons were blaming Eden for the British-French invasion of the Suez Canal which caused an open breach in relations with the United States.

When Eden left London last Friday for a three-week vacation in Jamaica there was almost certain to be a vote-out of office.

He will not be. But now there is a strong tendency in Britain in the Conservative party, in the House of Commons and in the newspapers to blame the United States for the entire Suez situation. At the moment at least, this British feeling is more likely to strengthen Eden's own gravely weakened position.

Whether it will strengthen him sufficiently to insure his continuance in office remains to be seen. But there seems to be a strong possibility that, if his cabinet colleagues support him, Eden will be able to ride out the storm.

Polio Vaccine Use Is Sought By President

AUGUSTA, Ga., Nov. 29 (AP)—President Eisenhower last night urged swift and widest possible use of Salk polio vaccine after being notified about 17 million doses "which would prevent paralysis or even death" are now lying unused.

The report on the big stockpile of the vaccine—once an extremely scarce serum—was sent to the President at his vacation headquarters in Warm Springs, Ga., where he is recovering from a recent illness.

Folsom told Eisenhower that at present "the means are largely at hand" to prevent the dread crippling disease—to avert the suffering and disability it inflicts most often upon children, and the anguish caused to their parents.

Cash for Falls Given Indians

PORTLAND, Nov. 29 (AP)—A federal agency has mailed final payments totaling nearly 25 million dollars to four Northwest Indian tribes for relinquishing their treaty fishing rights at Celilo Falls on the Columbia river.

Earlier, the tribes had received an initial payment totaling \$120,000.

The army corps of engineers here said the payments were divided as follows: Umatilla, \$4,847,800; Umatilla, \$3,992,000; Nez Perce, \$2,600,000.

The money was calculated to equal the tribes' return on their average annual fish catch, estimated at \$100,000. Completion of the \$60-million-dollar The Dalles dam will flood out the historic Celilo fishing grounds.

Romance Blooms

LONDON, Nov. 29 (AP)—The present chilly state of Anglo-American political relations has had little effect on Anglo-American romance, U. S. third air force Chaplain Leslie F. Zimmerman said today.

He said British girls are falling for American GIs practically as fast as ever. British-American romances so far this month total 245—close to the 250 monthly average.

New Disease

Is Noticed in Alaskan City

SEATTLE, Nov. 29 (AP)—A strange polio-like disease which hits women rather than men, inflames the joints, tempers and causes tears, frustration and even mental symptoms for months or years after it was described yesterday by an Alaskan physician.

It probably is a distinct new ailment and has been dubbed "Icelandic disease" because it was first detected there in 1918. Dr. J. B. DeLor, Seaward, Alaska, told a clinical session of the American Medical Association.

Seaward Hill Seaward in the summer of 1954 with explosive violence. In the town of 3,000 population there were 173 cases diagnosed as this new ailment, a rate of occurrence two to three times as high as in the average polio epidemic. Probably others in Seaward also got it, but in a form not severe enough to call it a polio.

At first it looked like polio and since it began to resemble the milder bulbar type of that disease, the physician reported. But many patients began to lose weight, nervousness, tension and a few were near hysteria. Muscle weakness appeared gradually, was rare and usually temporary. Some patients complained of feeling "bubbles under the skin."

Many who did not call a doctor came later with wild and unexplained troubles. It hit hardest among women in the 15 to 45-year age group. One 35-year-old woman became intolerant for some women, Dr. DeLor reported.

Some of these women reported they could not control their tempers, except relatives of employees of this newspaper.

Months afterward, Dr. DeLor reported, some of the patients were struggling with a loss of memory in varying degrees. They said it reminded them of the effects of alcohol to initiate thinking. Similar effects were noted in outbreaks of the disease elsewhere in the world.

Outbreaks of the strange new disease have occurred so far in Iceland, Australia, Great Britain and Germany.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (AP)—The navy announced a major forward step today in developing a ship-based, long-range missile.

It said an experimental ship, a converted merchant ship, has been completed to do the navigational research necessary for accurate ship-to-ship missile firing.

The navy conceded that at present the accuracy of the missile is insufficiently accurate for long-range surface-to-surface missile launching.

The experimental vessel, called the USS *Albatross*, will be commissioned at the New York naval shipyard on Dec. 3. The ship is a converted merchant ship and has been equipped with advanced navigational and stabilization gear.

The conference will study proposals for improving highway safety in the West by increased uniformity in state laws governing the operation of vehicles.

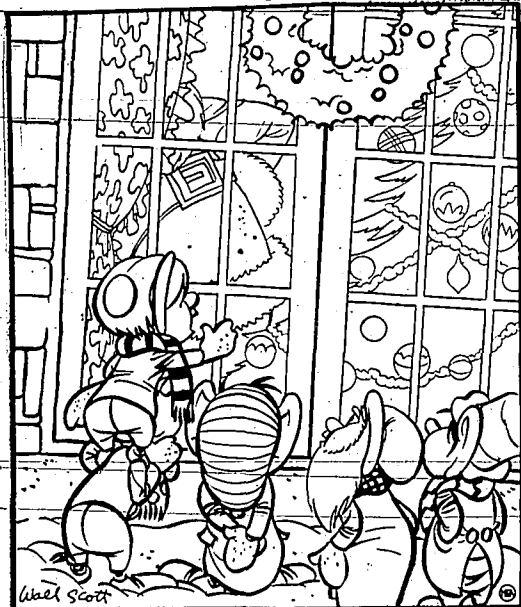

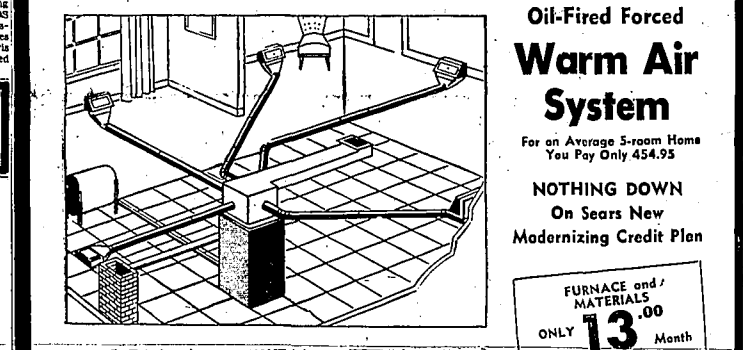

Greeting Card Outfit Is Irked At New Order

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22 (U.S.)—The greeting card people, who like to spread good cheer around, just about wrote Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor off their list yesterday. General Taylor, the army chief of staff, has announced—there considerably in advance—that he will not accept Christmas cards.

He signed a regulation saying that "the exchange of cards will be discontinued this Christmas and post Christmas, too, among civilians and military personnel working in army offices in and around Washington. There are about 19,000 of them."

The regulation said that since these people see each other almost every day, it is "unnecessary" to swap cards. Otherwise, there was no elaboration as to why Taylor decided to issue the ruling. An unofficial explanation was that the flood of cards overcrowded mailing facilities at the Pentagon and elsewhere.

Army officials said they thought the regulation would be picked up by field and area commanders for use in places outside Washington, too. The reaction from the greeting card sellers was prompt and strong.

Council Hails Reductions in Traffic's Toll

CHICAGO, Nov. 22 (U.S.)—Motorists rejoiced to see the national traffic accident emergency, with an "amazing" 13 per cent reduction in deaths during October, the National Safety Council reported today.

The council said the sharp drop had 19 consecutive months of rising death tolls and completely reversed the normal seasonal trend.

Deaths totaled 3,450 for October, 12 per cent below the corresponding period of last year. It was the lowest death toll for any October since 1949.

The council said the October total was the lowest since June.

Ordinarily, the council said, deaths are higher in October than in any preceding month of the year. It said the October toll was about 800 fewer than expected.

For the 10-month period, traffic deaths totaled 32,420, still five per cent more than in the corresponding period of 1955. But the total for the first nine months this year was eight per cent above last year's.

Soldiers Spend

WIEDEBADEN, Germany, Nov. 22 (U.S.)—U. S. air force personnel spent nearly double the amount spent by U. S. tourists in Europe and North Africa during the past fiscal year, U. S. government statistics showed today.

A financial report by the U. S. air force in Europe said servicemen spent \$78 million dollars between July, 1955, and July, 1956. Tourists, according to U. S. department of commerce figures, spent 47 million dollars.

Bakery Opens

BOISE, Nov. 22 (U.S.)—New baking equipment to supply bread and pastry for more than 600 inmates at the Idaho state prison started operating yesterday. Warden L. E. Clapp reported.

Clapp said the \$23,000 equipment turned out some 240 loaves of bread the first day. The warden said he estimated savings to the prison at about \$20 a day since the prison will no longer need to purchase baked goods.

Ship's Logbook Strengthens Yankee Claim to Polar Area

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 22 (U.S.)—A 19th century sea captain's logbook has strengthened the claim that American sailors were the first to set foot on Antarctica.

Alexander C. Vandergrift, curator of maps in the Yale library, came across the logbook quite by accident in a New Haven bookstore. He said the document advances U. S. claims to the long-disputed section of Antarctica known in America as the Palmer Islands and by the British as Graham Land.

Besides the United States, first-landing claims have been made by Great Britain, Argentina, Chile and France.

The logbook was kept by Capt. John Davis, New Haven, master of the 80-foot sealing schooner, the ship sailed from here in March, 1820, and joined other sealing vessels in the South Shetland islands off the tip of South America, in the fall of that year.

On Feb. 7, 1821, Davis recorded the Cecilia, a sloop, or light open boat, serving as a tender for the Huron, approached a "large body of land" and he sent a boat ashore to hunt seals.

"I think this southern land to be continent," skipper Davis entered in the logbook after the Cecilia's boat returned.

Victor passed along his find to the late Samuel W. Hogg, geographer to the U. S. state department. Together with the navy, Hogg checked the Huron logbook and also examined a newly-discovered logbook of the vessel Huntress, out of Nantucket, Mass.

"Mr. Hogg later made a formal recommendation to President Lincoln that the United States should press additional claims to the Palmer peninsula area on the basis of this new evidence," Hogg said.

Victor purchased the Huron logbook in 1923 but kept the contents secret until this year because of the state department's interest in his discovery. Victor presented it as a gift to the Yale library.

Three May Be Magic Number For Humans in Space Travel

NEW YORK, Nov. 22 (U.S.)—Three may be the magic human number for space travel and colonization of distant planets, an air force expert said.

Three persons—or even three well-adjusted married couples—might best get along with each other and withstand the boredom and fractions of long months or years of flying through space aboard rocket ships.

Col. William O. Davis of the office of scientific research, air research and development command, Bolling field, explained the reason at the opening of American Rocket society's 11th annual meeting.

War-time experiments indicated two persons cooped up together will get on each other's nerves and eventually begin to bicker, he said. Four persons are likely to divide into two opposing groups.

But three persons are likely to remain excessively polite and not gang up two against one. Or two do gang up, the alliances don't last long or they switch to involve different persons.

If space ships need large crews, they might be manned by three groups of three persons each, Colonel Davis said. The groups could be partially isolated, and exchange members from time to time.

Or three married couples, each self-adjusted, could be the crew. When all of colors are set up on distant planets, it might be wise to establish three elements separated some distance from each other, but retaining personnel, Colonel Davis added.

"Ration pills" and drugs that relieve boredom or avoid explosive outbreaks of temper might be all-important to these future astronauts, he said.

Humans may be sooting into space and beginning explorations within 10 to 15 years, and it is time to begin research into the psychology and personality and other aspects that would make for successful crews, he said.

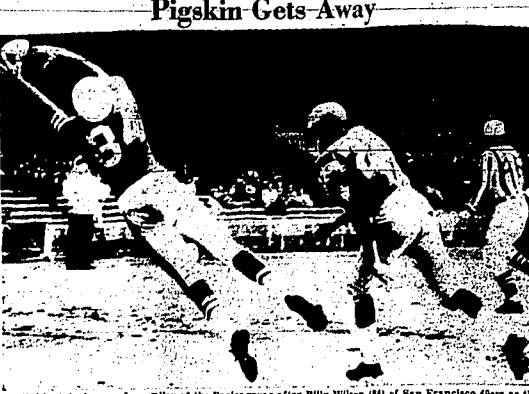

John W. Watson, district highway superintendent, said the National Bird Control Laboratory at Skokie, Ill., have sent him many testimonials from officials in other cities saying birds roost no more where "Toot No More" has been sprayed.

He said the preparation's manufacturer claims it gives trees a year-long undetectable aroma that only birds can detect.

Watson said all other methods tried so far to rid capital parade routes and public buildings of birds have failed.

He said he has tried using balloons, firecrackers, bells, high-pitched whistles and electricity.

I know, among other things, that the Rhine is the busiest river in the world, shippingwise, and on its banks sometimes narrow, sometimes broad waters as much as 56 million tons of cargo have passed through the Dutch-German customs stops of Lo-

SEATTLE, Nov. 29 (AP)—Are the tranquilizing drugs robbing Americans of the tension, alertness, worry and fear which traditionally sharpened their ability to defend themselves in danger and shaped the country's progress?

There are signs that such a possibility lurks in the unscientific use of the "tranquilizing pills" by two psychiatrists who have observed 8,000 people taking tranquilizers.

Evidence Cited

Although the pills themselves are not at fault and are potentially of great use in medicine, there is evidence they can cause undesirable effects which constitute danger to both the individual and to society. Dr. Herman Dickel and Dr. Henry H. Dixon told the American Medical Association.

U.S. Value of Dollar Below Canada Mark

NEW YORK, Nov. 29 (AP)—The Canadian dollar is worth about four cents more in today's market than the American dollar.

This doesn't mean the American dollar is losing any of its prestige in other lands, still the most important factor in the world today.

It does mean Canada's vast post-war expansion is catching its second breath—that American dollars are flowing northward.

Flow is Large

The flow has been particularly large in recent days because Canadianians have been borrowing in the U. S. capital market—interest rates are even higher north of the border.

As these borrowed American dollars are exchanged for Canadian dollars to pay for the exchange rates reflect this large supply and the Canadian dollar rose to \$1.04, its highest point since January, 1934, when U. S. gold devaluation sent the Canadian dollar to a premium of more than five cents.

Some American businessmen scan this rise nervously. They wonder if the more-expensive Canadian dollar may put any pressure for still higher prices on the things we buy from Canada, such as newsprint, wood pulp, metals, oil and chemicals.

Caution

Some Canadians also watch this rush of American dollars northward with concern. They know that to develop Canada's vast natural resources, but they fret because the money from this development may flow southward in future years.

Investors aren't the only ones envying in Canada—these days there has been a flight of capital from Europe. Investors there feel the money will be safer in Canada than in troubled Europe.

Nephew Named to Administrate Will

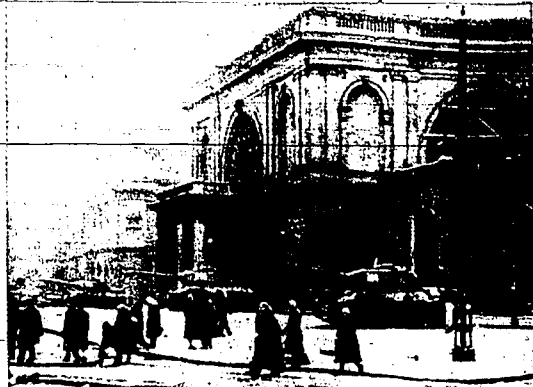

Total Value of Farm Assets in U.S. Is Placed at 176 Billion Dollars for 1937

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (AP)—The agriculture department said today the total value of farm assets next Jan. 1 will reach an all-time high of 176 billion dollars—an increase of 5.8 billion dollars in a year.

The department said the proprietors' equity—what's left after debts are subtracted—on next Jan. 1 will be a record 153.3 billion dollars—an increase of 3.9 billion dollars.

The balance sheet of the nation's agriculture was worked out in the department's publication, "The 1937 Agricultural Finance Outlook."

Department economists predicted "little change" in the financial situation of farmers as a group during the next year. They said farm debts probably will continue to rise, and values of farm assets also may rise, although a slowing down may occur in the rate at which farm real estate values are rising.

In another publication, "The Farm Income Situation," the department said farm income has turned upward this year after four consecutive years of decline, and predicted "some further increase" in 1937. Frederick V. Waugh, head of the department's agricultural

division, has said the 1937 rise will be about five per cent over 1936.

The agriculture department bulletin for the first nine months of 1936 was up four per cent over 1935. It was at an annual rate of 13.7 billion dollars in the first nine months of 1936, up 2.7 billion dollars, or 2.6
