Barbecued Chicken

How to make chicken taste like quail (This recipe is for one chicken to serve two.) One Spring Chicken split down the back. Do not wash in water. To clean, rub with cloth soaked in wine or wine vinegar. If coals break into flames throw a small amount of water on fire. It will take about 8 minutes to thoroughly cook the chicken in this manner, and you will retain all the delectable juices of the bird.
- To test the chicken, cut with the tip end of a sharp knife. If it falls easily your chicken is done. When done, put chicken on plate, flesh side down and pour your seasoning sauce (which has been kept warm) in the shell side of chicken and serve immediately.
- This is an easy operation and if carefully timed you will have superb results.
- You may broil chicken in your oven rather as well, keeping broiler pan other meats. Basting and turning essential. It will take from 10 minutes. Test in same manner as above.

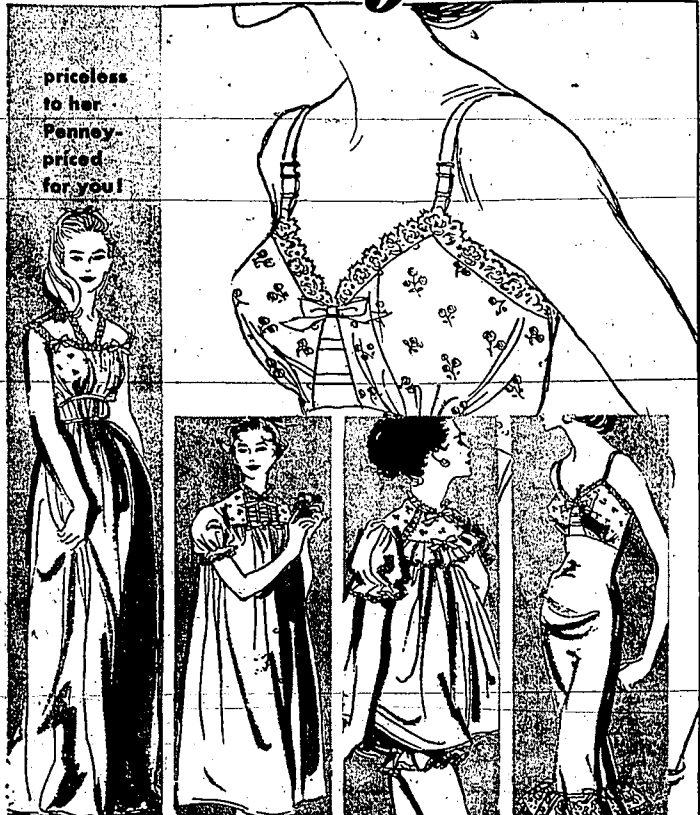

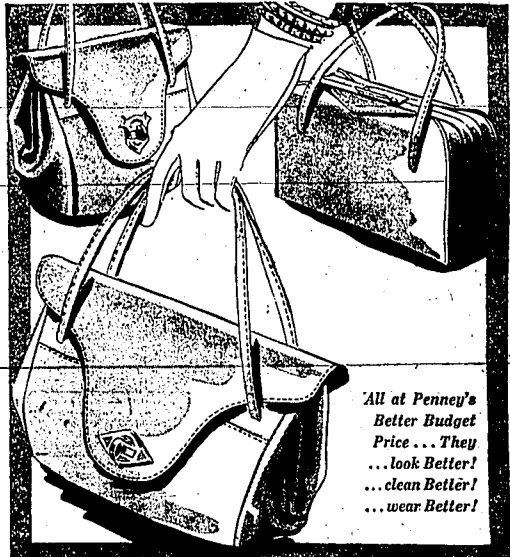

40 Western Men to Meet, Endeavor To Reach Pact on Water Resources

BOISE, Dec. 1 (AP)—Fifty men from seven western states will meet in Spokane Monday and Tuesday in the expectation of signing an agreement setting up an advisory body for the future development of water resources in the Columbia river basin.

For many of them, it will be the climax of four years of effort as well as the fruition of an idea which has been in the air in the Pacific Northwest since 1952. It will also be the second time they have given their "final" approval to the document.

The main idea has been for the Pacific Northwest to act as a unit, Idaho Reclamation Engineer Mark R. Kulp recalled today. Kulp is secretary-treasurer of the Columbia river basin compact commission.

It was in 1952 that the Idaho legislature first appropriated funds to investigate whether to enter into a compact with other states concerning the use of water in the Columbia river basin. After investigation, the lawmakers decided against it.

In 1953, Gov. C. A. Bolten organized a committee of the governors of Oregon, Washington, Montana, Idaho and Wyoming. After the committee met in Boise and elected Frank Banks, Coulee Dam, Wash., as chairman, he who was the engineer in charge of construction of Grand Coulee dam, is the federal representative on the commission.

Early in 1955, after more than two years of deliberation and discussion by committees and the group as a whole, the commission met in Portland to ratify the compact. All members but one signed. The dissenter was Democratic State Sen. Robert Holmes of Oregon. Holmes, now Oregon's governor-elect, contended the proposed compact didn't go far enough. Holmes is no longer a member of the commission.

During deliberations on the compact, former U.S. Rep. Charles Savage of Washington took a similar position. He maintained the compact commission, the permanent body to be formed by the agreement, should have power to issue bonds to finance construction of dams.

As approved in 1955, and as proposed again with certain changes, the compact calls for a body whose powers would be advisory. The commission would study proposed public and private development projects and make recommendations regarding them. It would send proposals to legislative hearings of the federal government, congressional committees and other bodies.

The compact was approved in 1955 by state legislatures in Idaho, Nevada and Utah. Legislators in Montana, Oregon and Wyoming said they would meet in formation before voting on it. It did not reach the floor of the legislature in Washington.

In both Washington and Oregon, state delegations on the commission held public hearings on the final draft as approved. Objections were raised to the proposed "distribution" of voting strength: Two votes for Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana and one from each of the other states with eight votes needed for approval of any action.

Witnesses contended this gave too much authority to states with relatively little interest in the compact. Because of these and other objections, which were carried over weight with the state legislatures, revisions were undertaken.

The present proposed draft calls for three votes each from the four major states and one from each of the others. It is contemplated that Washington would have one member from each of the Cascades and one member at large; Idaho one from the Panhandle, one from the southern farming region and one member at large, etc. Twelve votes would be needed for approval of any action.

Another change has been made at the request of Montana members who wanted a certain amount of power guaranteed to Montana. If needed, from reservoir built in the state.

Throughout the deliberations, members from areas upstream from the Columbia river gave no indication on guarantees that irrigation rights would not be disturbed.

The commission will review the proposed draft Monday. If it is approved, it will be printed overnight and signed Tuesday. It must have

Hunter Preference for Other Hunters Over Game Is Studied

Why do some hunters—regardless of what they're hunting for—shoot other hunters? The answer to that and can figure out why to bottle up the rest of your life on the royalties.

For the reason why is perhaps the most night's safety secret of this era of modern firearms. So far officials and sportsmen fighting the gun accident casualty rate are like men throwing rocks over a wall at a black cat at midnight.

If you can't turn up with a lump on the head in the morning, no one knows who hit it, or with what, or where all the workers in the field of hunting safety can do is everything that occurs to them and hope something works.

Analysis of gun accident reports turns up some preposterous pseudo-patterns. For instance: If you are going to be shot by another hunter, it's odds on that he will be either a close friend or a total stranger. Casual acquaintances seldom mistake one another for a deer.

And this doesn't have much to do with time or place. A Texas shot his wife in the dark for "a big game animal." Three Wisconsin hunters killed a wayfaring hunter under the same circumstances.

Another item: Many hunting accidents are unrelated due to similarity of man and the game hunted.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (AP)—The Federal Housing Administration raised its interest rates on home mortgages today and the Veterans Administration said it may do the same.

The FHA authorized a one-half percent increase in interest on its mortgages effective Dec. 1. That will raise the basic rate on FHA home loans from 4 1/2 to five percent. T. F. Entomologist Speaks at Seed School Confab in Boise

BOISE, Dec. 1 — Meteorologists and control of the western bean cutworm were described by J. B. Douglas, entomologist of Twin Falls, in a meeting of the Vegetable Seed School in Boise Friday.

Douglas said the insect was first recorded in 1887 in Arizona and is found in all western states. Differ-

ing from the common garden cutworm that cut off the plants under the soil, the western bean cutworm feeds on foliage, stems, buds, seed and fruit.

First identity of the species in the Magic Valley area was made in 1916 near Rupert. Dealers reported the damage to beans had been noted for about four years previous to that time, Douglas said.

Explaining the life cycle of the worm, Douglas said the adult winters in the soil at an average depth of eight and one-half inches. In the spring the pupae appear during the first of July, reach the peak about July 23 and taper off until Aug. 1.

Douglas said the first emergence of the worm is found with black light. This type light attracts the worm and allows the farmer or researcher to follow the population to its peak and end.

Damage is done by the larvae which feed on the undersides of the leaf. During the day, insects hide in buds, flowers and leaves. As they grow larger they attack the pods.

The only recommended chemical for control of the pest is DDT. Exposing the worms to the elements does not seem to be the answer, he said.

He urged inspection of pods every two days and when worms are discovered, application of a five per cent DDT dust at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds per acre for ground dusts and 25 to 30 pounds for airplane dusting. Spider mites could be eliminated at the same time with a DDT-sulphur dust of at least 40 per cent sulphur.

Ground dusters should be equipped with at least one nozzle per row, set to direct flow at about 45 degrees angle down. A canvas trailer or about 20 feet long also is recommended.

Dusting by plane should be done at a height of four feet and swaths should be no wider than the wing span of the plane, Douglas said.

He added this should be done in the entire community as they move from field to field.

Pickett reported adequate sanitation facilities are a "growing problem" in the area especially in the heavily used parts. Another problem is lack of camping facilities and porches for pack animals. He said present facilities were erected this year with every indication of better use in 1937.

Also discussed was blazing of new "loop" trails. These are trails which end in the same locality they originate. The new trails would open up new scenery and trails. The group favored pushing this plan and recommended immediate study. Work would then begin when funds are made available.

Idaho's Atomic Test Station Is Used as 'Troubleshooter'

IDAHO FALLS, Dec. 1 (AP)—Eastern Idaho's national reactor testing station is proving to be the "troubleshooter" for atomic research everywhere in the nation.

The atomic energy commission Idaho installation is equipped to send reactors to their limits in order to test new equipment and methods. The testing determines whether the new procedure is good and can be incorporated in atomic technology or whether it is bad and should be discarded.

The Idaho station particularly concerns itself with three main atomic fields:

1. Testing various type reactors for atomic power and atomic fuel-breeding purposes.
2. Testing reactors and atomic propulsion systems for ships and aircraft.
3. Testing equipment under severe conditions to determine its effectiveness in atomic technology, and determining how low power radiation sources can be used in medicine, agriculture and industry.

Much of the work at the station is done by private industry under contract to the government. Phillips

Of the \$1,000,000 cost of the project, Atomium International is providing \$750,000. It is intended to develop newer techniques in reactors in developing power.

During December permanent employees connected with the atomic project are expected to total 2,800 with temporary or construction workers numbering 1,150. These figures represent a gain of about 100 permanent personnel and a reduction of 70 in construction personnel.

By next June AEC officials estimate the number of permanent personnel will reach 3,200 and construction workers will number 1,700. A year from now the role of permanent workers is expected to reach 3,800.

Chou also told reporters that Americans in Chinese jails can be released before the end of their sentences if they have good behavior. Ten Americans, including five Catholic priests, are still imprisoned in Red China.

Informed sources said Chou told Nehru to relay to President Eisenhower the message that Red China is willing to release the detained Americans. The source said Chou pointed out he did not want to be repaid.

But Chou told reporters this morning: "I want to point out that there are still Chinese in American jails who have not been released and sent back to China."

Sources said Chou told Nehru he had "no objection" to meeting with Mr. Eisenhower to discuss or "clearly misunderstandings between the United States and Red China."

Nehru is scheduled to visit Washington later this month.

Farm Debt Has Doubled in 9 Years; Number Has Declined

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—Farm debt has doubled since 1934 although the number of farmers who are delinquent about 20 per cent, the federal reserve bulletin said today.

The study of farm debt in June was published in the bulletin, a publication of the staff of the federal reserve board. It said the debt in June was about \$6.5 billion dollars, six per cent greater than a year ago.

The bulletin said that about half of the debt was owed to insurance commercial banks, 77 billion dollars to individuals and merchants and another \$7 billion dollars to non-bank financing institutions.

Although farm debt is about twice what it was in 1934—the year of the last survey—the debt in June was less and the investment in land is up 75 per cent the bulletin said.

Of the debt, the bulletin said, is attributable to "smaller farm incomes," forcing farmers to depend upon bank credits to "an increasing extent."

Other highlights of the report: The average size of outstanding notes at mid-year was \$1,400, about 60 per cent higher than in 1934.

Of the \$5,500,000 loans outstanding in 1934, \$1,000 were for current expenses, such as feed livestock operations and current operating and living expenses, and the balance was for repaying of debt, real estate purchases and other similar longer term debts.

The average size of outstanding bank loans per borrower was \$2,227, about a year and a half ago on those not so secured. This was about one-half of one per centage point higher in 1934.

Interest rates on loans secured by real estate averaged about 10 per cent a year and 12 per cent on those not so secured. This was about one-half of one per centage point higher in 1934.

The agriculture department reported earlier that this year, after four straight years of declining income, farmers had a 10 per cent increase. Their income is running at a rate of some 117 billion dollars a year, from \$100 million dollars in 1933. Agriculture department experts expect farm income to rise about five per cent in 1935.

CHICAGO, Dec. 1 (AP)—Floyd Patterson, the youngest world heavyweight champion in history, perched Saturday on the wreckage of a pathetic Archie Moore to a golden future against a mixed-up crowd of contenders. But soon he was a laughing stock as the 21-year-old Patterson may not defend his new title until June.

Patterson punched a ring legend to oblivion in two nights. He knocked out ancient light heavyweight champion Moore in 27 of the fifth round and retired him. Marlonna's vacated heavyweight crown was not a fight. It was a quick slaughter.

Patterson entered the ring as a 5-5 favorite, respondent in a black velvet robe trimmed in gold. That was only time he hazed a crowd of 14,000.

Moore pined hopefully for four rounds but he had no defense for the quick-punching, relentless former Olympic middleweight champion. Hoping to become the oldest heavyweight winner ever, Moore was on the verge of retirement in the third round. It was the first time Moore, a veteran of 157 fights over 20 years and been cut out in the fifth round.

Patterson slipped to the floor in what appeared to be a tear-swipe at Moore. Slipping Floyd quickly smashed a left hook to the jaw, Moore was staggered, his eyes glared in an unbecoming stare.

Old Arch struggled to his feet at once, but he never saw his opponent. He should have, Patterson moved in like a butcher.

Patterson "knocked up" Moore. The Patterson whinned across a right and downed Archie again. This time, Patterson strangled his foe as Moore counted nine or ten — it wasn't clear which to ringside observers. Moore's eyes were shut, Patterson won the fight in the fifth round.

Pointers Are Given on Ways Of Getting Yule Mailing Done

Postmaster W. W. Franke said today that while the post office still has a tremendous job ahead of it, efforts are being redoubled to deliver all mail on time and in good condition by Christmas eve. He points out that by taking a little extra care with your Christmas mailings now, you'll avoid disappointing friends and loved ones at Christmas-time.

He asks for your special cooperation to be sure that your return address and the recipients address is plainly typed or written on all letters and Christmas cards.

Use zone numbers, and it's a good idea to include an extra label inside your packages. Parcel post size and weight limitations vary according to destination. Ask about them when you go to the post office to buy stamps.

Showing about stamps, the postmaster said, "Use three-cent postage on all your Christmas cards. This way they will be delivered promptly, and forwarded or returned, if necessary, providing you include your name and address on

your Christmas card envelopes."

First-class postage on your Christmas cards enables you to include handwritten messages, thus making your Christmas greetings more personal. By including your name and address on each Christmas card envelope, both you and your friends can keep your mailing lists up-to-date.

"The postmaster is not that far from being right when he says that mail all of your out-of-town Christmas cards and packages immediately, and certainly not later than Dec. 15. Christmas mail for local addresses should be started on its way at least a week before Christmas. You can do both yourself and the post office a real favor by securing free labels at the post office which read "All For Out of Town Delivery" and "All for Local Delivery." Franke said. Place these labels on bundles of cards for local addresses and on those for out-of-town destinations.

Try to mail your out-of-town Christmas cards several days in advance of those for local delivery, and those for nearby points should

all be mailed by at least a week before Christmas.

The cooperation of all business firms in postponing the mailing of circulars and catalogs until after Dec. 25 is requested.

The postmaster expressed his thanks for the excellent response to his "Mail Early" appeals to date, but warns that only by strenuous effort on all mailings of Christmas packages and cards immediately, will the record mail load be processed and delivered on time.

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Although Wednesday is something of an anniversary, not only for this year but for the entire United States, it is doubtful if the event will be commemorated—Wednesday was the day in 1901 when the first automobile was driven on the streets of Twin Falls. The holiday took place on Dec. 5, 1916, one-half mile this side of Jarbove. For a time it was held in the town of Jarbove, but it was killed and one man, Ben Kuhl, was sentenced to life imprisonment for the crime. Between \$3,000 and \$7,000 was reported stolen.

Occasionally the highway from Twin Falls arrives in Jarbove between 6 and 6 p.m. Since Dec. 6, 1916, was payday at Long Hike mine, it was pretty common knowledge that the highway was closed for considerable money.

The highway was not arrived by 10 p.m. a party of men from Jarbove went to look for it. At Jarbove they were told by a Mrs. Deser, who lived nearby, she had heard a shot between 5 and 6 p.m. and that shortly afterwards the stage was shot. She said there were two men on it, one supporting the other.

The men continued their search and located a pool of blood and the driver's hat. Further investigation of the tracks, the dead driver and the mail sacks, which had been broken open, led to the discovery of the stage.

In reconstructing the crime, the men decided the holdup man had been shot in the back of the head. He then had climbed onto the stage and had fired the shot. The mail sacks had not been opened, but the driver had been shot.

The holdup man then apparently had climbed the body of the stage, had hanged over the side. He had driven the stage past Jarbove and was further located before being killed in the willow.

When discovered by the searching party, the body and stage were covered with approximately three inches of snow. One of the men in the party was a hunter and tracker.

AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

"The Life That Can Pray"

Almost everyone, at one time or another in his life, has come to the point of realizing that he has a great need of some help beyond himself.

Perhaps in time of sorrow or mourning difficulties, he has realized that he is insufficient and he has called on God.

Sometimes this prayer for help has been answered and the person has questioned the value of prayer.

He has even doubted the justice of God. Such reasoning is all too common and shows a lack of understanding of the circumstances which must surround a request for help.

Christ told his disciples, "If you ask in my name and my words abide in you, ask whatever you will, and it shall be done for you."

The trouble with too many people is that they emphasize the asking and minimize the asking or remaining in Christ. They think of prayer as a sort of wish-fulfiller by which they are able to have any need supplied by God regardless of their own relationship to God. The secret of having answered prayer lies in a person living according to the word of Christ and continually seeking to please Christ by his actions.

George Muller, a great man of prayer, whose life was a life of faith and prayer, once said that he had founded orphanages which he had founded out of funds and had no food for the children's breakfast. Undaunted, Mr. Muller had the children sit at the tables in the dining hall and they prayed that their needs would be supplied.

Presently a knock came at the door and a milkman stood there with the offer of a wagon load of milk. It was revealed that the wagon had broken an axle in front of the orphanage and since he could not deliver the milk, he wanted to give it to the children.

The milkman left the milkman left and a baker appeared at the door. He said that something had caused him to get out of bed in the middle of the night and take a number of loaves of bread which he now wanted to give to the children.

While we may not see such spectacular answers to our prayers as this example still the same principle which caused that prayer to be answered is applicable to the situations in which we find ourselves. Even as Mr. Muller made a practice of living in a proper relationship with God, so we must expect his prayers to be answered. If we will fulfill the same requirement we, too, can experience answers to our prayers.
