

Divorces Are Being Sought In Twin Falls

Three persons, charging cruel and inhuman treatment, seek divorces in complaints filed in Twin Falls district court Monday.

Dolores Jean Ingram charges that Boris McVey Ingram has treated her in a cruel and inhuman manner since their marriage in Ojai, Calif., in Dec. 9, 1951.

She seeks custody of their two minor children, plus \$50 a month support for each child and \$50 a month alimony. She has been taken to court to award her \$125 attorney fee. She is represented by attorney James Cunningham.

Irene M. Halouka alleges that Raymond R. Halouka on April 18, 1950, married her in North Platte, Neb., he has treated her in a cruel and inhuman manner causing great anguish and mental suffering.

She states there are no minor children. Community property consists of real estate in Twin Falls, a 1949 Packard automobile, household furnishings and a contract for infirmarium in a service station and used car business located at 464 Main avenue north in Twin Falls.

The complaint avers that all property rights have been settled and adjusted between the parties by a written agreement dated Dec. 1, 1955. Mrs. Halouka asks that the court grant her the agreement and that Halouka be required, pursuant to the terms of the agreement, to pay her the sum of \$1,500 by January, 1957.

She is represented by the law firm of Bennett and Bennett, Twin Falls.

Verie Eugene Jacobson complains that she wife, Marjorie Marilyn Jacobson, has treated him with extreme cruelty and has openly disapproved her love for him.

He claims she left home on Oct. 25, 1954, and took up residence in an apartment house in Buhl, thus abandoning him without provision and refuses to return to live with him.

He asks to be awarded all community property which consists of a refrigerator, television set and a 1956 Ford.

They were married July 14, 1956. He is represented by John C. Hopworth, Buhl attorney.

Prevailing Teen-Aged Anti-Scientific Prejudices Endanger Future of Nation

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4—Do you think there's something wrong about scientists?

Not well. Some of our kids are more than one high school and out of 10, in fact.

Do you think scientists should throw your lot with the "red" in their own self-interests?

More than one out of four high school students seems to think so.

And then we wonder why Russia turns out more scientists each year than we do.

This is a problem that has been getting attention from the top levels of government lately. Since according to the best available figures, the Soviet Union produced 120,000 scientific workers and engineers from its universities this year. The United States turned out 70,000.

All told, Russia has some 800,000 scientists in this field today. This country has 700,000 more or less.

Who's winning the long-term race? Just look at the figures.

And you might recall that this is the age when wars, if there have to be wars, are won on drafting boards rather than on battlefields.

So: The Russians coax or coax their kids into knowing how to design new weapons.

A trade organization called the Aircraft Industries of America soon will make public a survey suggesting—if you will permit a note of erudition— that our youngsters are growing up with more interest in this slide trombone than in the slide rule.

This survey, conducted by Purdue university, covered 15,000 high schoolers. Its main conclusions:

Forty-five per cent believe their school background is too poor to permit them to choose science as a career.

Thirty-five per cent believe that one cannot raise a normal family and be a scientist at the same time.

Twenty-eight per cent do not believe scientists have time to enjoy life.

Twenty-five per cent think scientists as a group are more than a little "odd."

Forteen per cent think there is something "evil" about scientists.

Nine per cent believe that you cannot be a scientist and be honest.

Makes you wonder, almost, whether we haven't slid back into the dark ages.

Can we agree—those of us who survived high school in an earlier generation—that scientists are no different from anybody else except that they have more curiosity and more know-how?

And that, if we're going to survive the second half of the 20th century, we had better have more and better scientists?

Official Avers School Funds Not Adequate

Additional general education funds proposed by the interim tax structure committee is wholly inadequate to take care of the needs of elementary, secondary and higher education and at the same time provide for other governmental needs, the associate executive secretary of the Idaho Education Association said Monday night here.

Elmer S. Crowley told Twin Falls education association members that the salaries of Idaho teachers are to be made comparable to those of neighboring states, as suggested by the governor's conference on education, public school appropriations must be adequate.

This, he added, would require an appropriation of 285 million dollars for the 1957-58 biennium.

"The IEA believes that a nationally recognized authority on school finance should be brought to Idaho to give expert opinion on the school equalization formula proposed by the minimum program evaluation interim committee," Crowley said.

He added that IEA would be glad to cooperate with state agencies in securing the services of such an expert.

The interim committee report does not explore the possibility of incorporating an equalization assessment ratio factor into the present minimum program," he continued. "The proposed new formula and the present minimum program cannot be fairly compared unless this factor is either included or omitted in both."

Fuel Injection System Slated At \$485 More

DETROIT, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Enthusiasm about fuel injection systems for conventional engines has been quickly put to a halt when Chevrolet disclosed the unit will cost the car owner \$485 more.

The price tag is about double what trade sources expected. Whether it will set back conventional injection systems is a matter of speculation.

Chevrolet was the first of the auto makers to announce availability of the fuel injector which places the conventional carburetor. But Chevrolet's over-all market is in the lower price range and its fans look a lot bigger to the car buyer than they do in the high price field.

Most engineering innovations as significant as fuel injection have involved great research and also high productive costs. In most instances high volume production has brought sharply reduced prices. That was done with power steering and power brakes. It also was done to some extent with automatic transmissions, although continuing refinement has kept production costs high in many instances.

But there is some question whether demand for a \$485 optional accessory in the low price field will be great enough to permit a profitable manufacturing program of fuel injection systems.

Probably too, will be steadily retreating during the next several years. Coincident with announcements that Chevrolet will use fuel injection mechanically operated unit, Bendix brought out an "electronically" actuated injector. No price tag was announced for it, but the cost undoubtedly would be even higher than the mechanical unit.

Relatively few of either unit will be produced, Chevrolet dealers have said. The tentative price for it on a "when available" basis Chevrolet has not set. The company has written before the price was announced. Neither was it said whether the price tag discouraged buyers who wanted fuel injection in their 1937 model cars.

Permit Given For Banks to Hike Interest

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The government has authorized federally insured commercial banks as of Jan. 1 to raise the interest rates they pay on savings accounts from 2 1/2 to three per cent a year.

An informed source said the step was taken to "encourage savings" and hence build up the amount of money banks have on hand to lend for investment purposes.

The source noted that the demand for investment funds in today's "tight money market" is "greatly in excess of savings."

The interest rate increase was authorized by the federal reserve board and the federal deposit insurance corporation. The increase is not mandatory, however, and officials would make no estimate on how many of the nation's 13,208 federally insured banks will raise their rates.

It is estimated that less than half of the affected banks now pay the present maximum 2 1/2 per cent interest rate authorized by the government. That maximum was set by the regulating agencies in 1933 and had not been changed until yesterday's order.
