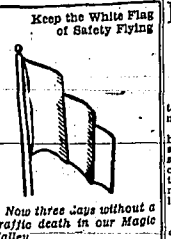

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—Political apologetics are flying now, says our newspaper reporter of operations contributions to the Republican party. The apologetics are in the form of editorially based thereupon were inspired by a study of the contributions which investigated political money.

The purpose of this exhibit is to disclose what contributions, if any, have been made to the Gore campaign by individuals or groups. In some instances (which are named), very large donations were detected, whereas in other groups, none were found. On the following pages the names of the 14 groups appear, and opposite each will be found a list of their contributions.

EMPHASIS ON GROUPS—It is true that the vast majority of the contributions as have been made by individuals. But throughout the report the major emphasis is on groups. The report lists 14 groups, many of which are corporations who give \$100,000 to the GOP and \$40,000 to the Democrats. It does not stress that these are individual offerings.

The heading reads: "Contributions of eight selected groups of the Democratic group."

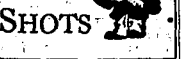

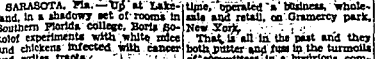

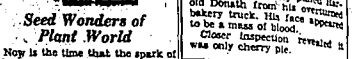

Co-Ops Lose Count in Gas Legal Battles

BOISE, Dec. 5 (AP)—Natural gas cooperatives in Idaho lost another, and undoubtedly the final, legal battle in their fight to be declared "public utilities" under Idaho law.

The state supreme court yesterday refused to order from a previous ruling in which it said the co-ops aren't legal in Idaho.

On Oct. 24, in an unanimous opinion, the court called a franchise between the city of Idaho Falls and the Idaho Falls Cooperative association "illegal, void and of no effect."

It further called the franchise "all part of a plan and design to enable the city of Idaho Falls to evade and circumvent the state's laws and constitution."

The case was the first of several which had been filed to test legality of the co-ops to reach the high court.

Taxpayer Siata Sull was instituted by W. J. O'Brien, district attorney, to sue the city of Idaho Falls where it first was filed. Judge Henry B. Martin, Idaho Falls, ruled in favor of the city and the co-ops.

O'Brien with Intermountain Gas company and a group of nine Weiser business men joining as friends of the court, took the case to the supreme court. The court reversed Martin's decision and sent the case back to him.

Since then several communities which had planned to sign up with local cooperatives have changed plans. They either have or are in the process of negotiating franchises with Intermountain Gas company.

Intermountain, after a series of hearings and legal battles, was awarded the state permit to distribute the gas in southern Idaho. It has already started laying distribution lines in several Idaho cities, including Boise.

Backers of the co-ops have said they will naturally abide by the decision of the high court.

But several of them have indicated they'll carry their fight into the 1957 legislature in the hope of getting laws passed allowing natural gas co-ops to operate in Idaho.

It is reported that a large part of the Romanian army is being disbanded as a safeguard against its possible participation in a popular uprising. A Moscow communiqué announced on Monday that Soviet troops sent to Romania during the Hungarian revolt will remain there temporarily.

Strong forces of Soviet troops have been moved into Bulgaria. Dispatches say a number of Bulgarian army officers have been dismissed as untrustworthy. There is a split in the Bulgarian communist leadership.

In all of the chief satellite countries, red leaders are watching anxiously. The revolts in Poland and Hungary started with student demonstrations.

Alaska Plans New Bids for Its Statehood

JUNEAU, Alaska, Dec. 5.—Alaska is making its big bid next week for admission as a state in the union. It is ready, willing—and waiting.

The governing northern territory has drafted a state constitution. It has named two "senators" and a "representative" who will go to Washington and press the next course for action.

Alaska—along with Hawaii—wants to become the first new state since 1912. New Mexico joined the union earlier that year.

Alaska already elects its own legislature and territorial officers below the rank of governor, who is appointed by the President. It has no representation in congress.

A "state constitution" was adopted in 1912 in Fairbanks. Tacked on was an ordinance providing for the Alaska-Territory plan. It was approved by the senators and a representative. That was the strategy followed by the state.

The plan worked so well that it was used later by six other states which had failed previously to win congressional approval. In each case, the state got admission within a year.

Alaska's two "senators" are former Gov. Ernest Gruening and William Egan, a lifelong Alaskan and a member of the territorial legislature. The "representative" is Haldo Rivers, a Republican. All are Democrats.

That has been one of the sticking points to Alaska's admission. Republicans have not been eager to increase Democratic membership in the congress. Democrats have, on the other hand, taken a strong stand toward Hawaii because it is traditionally Republican.

Other opposition to Alaskan admission has tied in with its closeness to the Soviet Union and the question of the federal government retaining some authority over strategic military areas there. Also, with increasing responsibility for Alaska, it would have difficulty financing such normal state operations as road building, education and health.

Alaska was purchased from Russia in 1867 for \$7.2 million dollars and received official status as a territory in 1912. It has one non-voting delegate to congress, elected biennially.

Slash for U.S. Income Taxes To Be Sought

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—The U. S. Chamber of Commerce yesterday asked congress to reduce federal income taxes in all brackets.

The chamber, in a formal study, said the progressive income tax rates are "excessively unfair."

It submitted its report to a house ways and means subcommittee which has been studying federal tax proposals and inequities. The subcommittee is headed by Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D. Ark.

The chamber also recommended elimination of "double taxation" on business dividends and more liberal depreciation allowances.

The organization said income taxes could be cut without reducing the government's tax revenues. It would be "very probable," it said, that the government would get a larger revenue by stimulating investments and thus the nation's economic growth.

Building Rush On Businesses Will Continue

NEW YORK, Dec. 8 (AP)—The office building boom—brushing aside the question "how can they ever fill all that space?"—is taking a fresh spurt.

New York chiefs—but also in many other cities across the land—new skyscrapers are rising and plans for still higher ones are being announced.

And they are being filled as fast as built. The older buildings—some of them being modernized and air conditioned—are nearly filled too.

Vacancy rates in New York are put at 1.2 per cent.

The nation's chair-borne population grows steadily. And there is a continuous trek to New York by giant and medium-sized corporations, setting up either headquarters or branch offices on Manhattan to handle their customers or employees or bankers.

Counting in buildings being finished this year, the National Association of Building Owners and Managers estimated the nation's total office space at 410 million square feet. And 60 million square feet of that has gone up since the end of World War II.

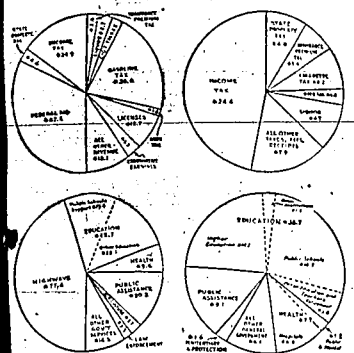

State Expenditures for Next Two Years Set at 171 Million

BOISE, Dec. 5.—The proposed expenditures for Idaho are estimated to total 171 million dollars by the legislative budget committee for the two years from July 1, 1957, through June 30, 1959.

The largest portion projected is for highways. Of every dollar spent, 5 cents will go for highway construction, maintenance and administration.

According to these pre-legislative estimates total income will be 109.9 million dollars. This includes more than 47 million dollars of federal

posts submitted by the agencies and departments of 66.3 million dollars.

The recommended total of 60.2 million dollars is an increase of 10.9 million dollars over the appropriations by the 1955 legislature. Education, which is the budget covers services ranging from the University of Idaho to the Deaf and Blind School, accounts for 23 million dollars of the increase. It includes the money collected at the state level and returned to the local school districts for public school support.

Health, including the hospitals and the state colony, is budgeted at 11 million dollars. Public assistance dropped 0.3 million dollars due to a decreasing load. Benefits have been increased recently and the proposed budget will maintain such increased benefits. All other general government services, such as agriculture, judiciary, business regulation, increased 1.2 million dollars.

Initial requests of more than 6.9 million dollars for new building construction at various state institutions were passed, without specific recommendation, for the legislature to consider.

Under the terms of the 1955 legislation, the governor will make this fiscal recommendations, which may differ from the present proposals, within five days after the 1957 legislature meets in January.

Polar Routes For Airlines Being Asked

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—A civil aviation board examiner has recommended that Pan American Airways and Trans World Airlines be authorized to fly between the American west coast and Europe over the top of the world.

Examiner William J. Madden recommended permanent authorization for both airlines to operate polar flights from Los Angeles and San Francisco and temporary authorization for Pan American to operate a similar service from Seattle. Wash. aviation officials are studying the subject to appeal.

The only over-the-pole air service now available is provided by Soviet airlines.

Madden said there probably will be much traffic within the next two years to justify polar flights by two American flag lines to cities in Europe.

Both Pan American and TWA had sought authority to operate polar flights from Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle, Tacoma and Portland, Ore.

Madden said it is uncertain how much business would originate in the West Coast for such flights, therefore he limited his recommendation to air routes operating out of Seattle.

Madden said he chose Pan American because it is already established in the Northwest and because of its operations in the Atlantic. He said he chose Seattle rather than Portland because he felt it would produce the most traffic between the West Coast and Europe.

A polar route between the west coast and Europe is 1,000 miles shorter than routes across the United States and the Atlantic. TWA started a service over the longer route more than a year ago, but dropped it this fall.

Question Still Burns on Who Was to Blame for 1941 Pearl Harbor Attack

To us Dec. 7, 1941, is now considered Pearl Harbor Day. It is the day that the United States entered the war with Japan.

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Who didn't I get all of the intercepted Japanese messages?

"Why did the lieutenant ignore my radar sighting?"

"Why was the final war warning sent by Warden Union instead of the signal corps?"

"And why has no one ever been punished for the shocking neglect at Pearl Harbor which costed more than 3,000 deaths and virtual obliteration of a fleet and air force?"

Prison years later such questions still burn in the minds of the men to whom fate gave key roles on the black day in American history.

Millions of words of congressional testimony and scores of books and articles—even now being written—still have some of the vital questions unanswered.

Interviews with those key figures who are still alive, scattered all over the U. S., reveal a dimming of some memories, dizziness at being reminded of the mistakes they made, outright irritation at questions which open old wounds—and some new information.

Each one, however, has a question or two which still gnaws at his conscience and which, if answered, might relieve a tortured memory.

Of the nine men accused of negligence or blame for Pearl Harbor in a congressional report only four are alive. They are Gen. George C. Marshall, who was army chief of staff; Adm. Harold R. Stark, who was chief of naval operations; Gen. Leonard T. Gerow, who was army assistant chief of staff; and Adm. Husband E. Kimmel, then head of the Pacific fleet.

All but Gen. Marshall granted interviews for this review of the event.

Those dead include Franklin D. Roosevelt; Henry L. Gilman, his secretary of war; Frank Knox, his secretary of the navy; Cordell Hull, his secretary of state; and Gen. Walter C. Short, commander of Hawaiian troops.

At 73 Adm. Kimmel is alert and spry—retired with his wife in a handsome modern home on the edge of a golf course in Grafton, Conn.

"I don't carry Pearl Harbor around on my back any more," he says succinctly, "but they keep reminding me of it." Much of his small still concerns that day. He has written a book blaming lack of information from Washington for his having the fleet bottled up in the harbor, making it an ideal target.

"For example," he recalls, "on Nov. 18, 1941, Washington decoded a message from Tokyo ordering a Japanese agent to report details of vessels anchored in Pearl Harbor. Why wasn't I told of this?"

He adds:

"As late as Dec. 6, if I had all of the information that the navy in Washington had, I could have sent the fleet to sea. Even on the morning of Dec. 7 the navy had time to warn me so that I could have moved the fleet forces out of the harbor and prepared for the attack."

The man responsible for not supplying Adm. Kimmel with this information is Adm. Stark, retired on a farm in Pennsylvania, and also in good health and spirits.

"I have chosen never to answer or comment on the charges in Adm. Kimmel's book," he says somewhat sadly and then adds with some heat: "I can only say that it's hindsight—second guessing, of which there has been too much about Pearl Harbor."

Joe Lockard, the soldier who spotted the attacking Jap planes on his radar that fatal morning, only to have the information ignored by the only officer on duty in the warning center, is now a draftsman in an electronics plant in Williamsport, Pa. He's quiet-spoken and a little reluctant to recall the whole thing.

"It's all sort of hazy today," he says, "but there's no counting the times I've wondered how many lives might have been saved and ships left on top of the water if the information before my eyes on that morning had been used properly."

Joe was at a radar station called Opena. He called to report a "large plane" on his scope which was not accounted for by flights of U. S. planes. On duty in the warning center several miles away was Lieut. Kermit A. Tyler.

"It's all right, there's nothing further you can do," Tyler told Lockard, who was then a private.

Tyler and Lockard have never met face-to-face to this day. Tyler is a lieutenant colonel in the air force at Fort Air Force Base, Colorado Springs, Colo. It's the head-

"It's doubtful now that the public will ever find out all about Pearl Harbor."

One of the key unanswered questions Ferguson poses is why General Marshall's final warning to Gen. Short at Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7 was sent by Western Union instead of through military channels.

Among all the persons interviewed only General Gerow, retired from the army and a banker in Petersburg, Va., and Adm. Stark believe that there are no unanswered questions left today.

"It's all done and I think the public knows all there is to know about it," General Gerow says.

U.S. Intelligence Gives Objective Look At Modern Russian Army, Air Forces

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—A newly declassified army-navy document today credited Russia's military forces with potential "maturity, balance and an excellence of quality."

But it said "source of potential weakness" in the Soviet military organization is the relationship between the army and the Communist party.

"When the fate of the Communist regime rested squarely on military success, the party forced a close relationship with the army," the document said. "Recently the army has been short of some of its glory and prestige," said several of its most popular leaders "shabbily treated."

The document also said that the Russian army "tends to be infatuated with its wartime successes" so that when it trains it usually does so against a rigid, immobile defense similar to that which Hitler forced on his commanders.

The analysis of Russian military forces is contained in a 307-page pamphlet, entitled "Handbook on Aggressor Military Forces."

The booklet was only recently declassified and made available to the press.

The booklet, which is detailed enough to be found in a Russian military library, is used by the army and navy as a guide for the "aggressor forces" in U. S. military exercises.

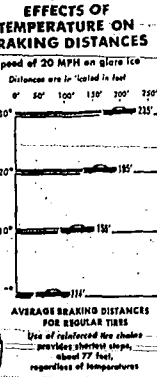
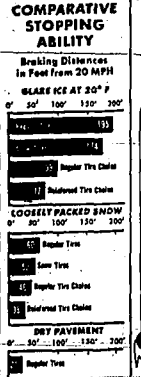
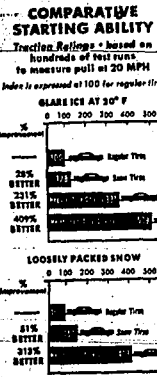

New Research Report Answers Queries On Problems Posed by Winter Driving

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—What's the lowdown on traction and stopping ability on snow and ice? Should motorists in snow-laden areas take any special precautions? What techniques for driving safely through the more dangerous winter months ahead?

These questions—and others which each winter cause public confusion due to conflicting claims, misinformation or just wafled thinking—are answered in a new research report by the National Safety Council. Entitled "Quit Your Skidding," the report is based on actual tests and studies by the council's committee on winter driving hazards—a group of 25 experts embracing all fields of traffic and automotive safety.

The chief objective is to reduce the higher-than-average death and accident rates which prevail during the winter months. Their second objective is to reduce the numerous traffic tieups and costly delays due to slippery surfaces and impaired visibility. Professors Ralph A. Moore, University of California, and A. H. Easton, University of Wisconsin, are co-authors of the committee.

Their findings include the following recommendations, drawn from the new report as follows:

1. It's up to you. You know that driving conditions are less favorable during the winter. It's up to you to winterize your car, to winterize your driving techniques and to winterize your determination to avoid accidents.
2. Have good tires—use the chains. Whether you use regular or snow tires, make certain that the tread has not been worn smooth. Use reinforced tire chains for deep snow, hard-packed snow or ice. Chains cut stopping distances about half, and give from four to seven times more traction than do regular tires. But— with regular tires or snow tires or even with greater help of the chains, slower than normal speeds are a must on snow and ice.
3. Keep windshield and windows clear. Be sure that your wiper blades, heater and defroster are operating properly. Clean snow and ice from the windshield and from all windows of your car. Ventilate to keep the inside of windows from fogging.
4. Get the road. The road. Your brakes occasionally while driving slowly and away from traffic. Use the road as a guide. When you can adjust speed to road and weather conditions.
5. Look ahead. Look ahead. Look back of the vehicle ahead so that you will have plenty of room to stop. Without tire chains it takes 10 to 13 times as far to stop on snow and ice as it does on dry pavement. You may find it hard to explain why you couldn't stop when the other fellow did.
6. Pump your brakes. The best technique for stopping quickly on snow or ice while maintaining full control of your car is a fast-up-down pumping of your brakes, jamming and "freezing" on your brakes is almost certain to lock your wheels. This is likely to throw your car into an uncontrollable and dangerous skid.
7. The committee's statement on special winter tires and tire chains follows:
 - Snow Tires: "Some say snow tires are good—others say snow tires are no good, but what will snow tires do for you?" The better snow tires are a big help in loose snow and slush. They are not much better than regular tires, however, on ice or very hard packed snow.
 - Tread treatments of some type known as "winterizing" give a small amount of tractive advantage on snow and ice. The difference between moving and not moving.
 - Reinforced tire chains have each link of the cross chain reinforced by projecting teeth or cleats. They cut braking distances in half on both snow and ice. . . . Increase traction to start or climb hills up to seven times over that with regular tires on ice. . . . output regular tires nearly four times on packed snow.
 - On glare ice, reinforced tire chains reduce braking distances. . . . have a much better resistance to side slip. . . . increase forward traction better than anything tested.
8. On loosely packed snow, snow tires were reported as 51 per cent better while reinforced tire chains were rated at 31 per cent improvement of the various temperatures.

The new committee report illustrated various traction abilities and stopping distances on snow and ice with different commonly used equipment as follows:

Concerning starting and hill climbing traction ability on glare ice, tests showed snow tires are only 28 per cent better than regular tires. Regular tire chains, however, were 281 per cent better, while reinforced tire chains proved to be 400 per cent better traction on ice than regular tires.

Effect of Temperature: "Temperature can change stopping distances on ice. Stopping distances are considerably longer when temperatures are near the melting point than when they are near zero. A small temperature rise or a little sunshine can make ice wet and slippery within a few minutes. Use of tire chains provides the shortest possible stopping distances regardless of temperature."

Their tests prove that a car with new tires going at 20 miles per hour on glare ice could stop at 114 feet at zero degrees but the same car at the same speed takes 230 feet to stop at 30 degrees above zero. With reinforced tire chains the braking distance was about 77 feet regardless of the various temperatures.

Traction Facts: "The new committee report illustrated various traction abilities and stopping distances on snow and ice with different commonly used equipment as follows:

Stopping Ability: Braking distances on loosely packed snow with various equipment at speeds of 20 miles per hour were as follows: Regular tires, 60 feet; snow tires, 32 feet; regular tire chains, 48 feet; and reinforced tire chains, 38 feet.

On Ice: On glare ice, however, all stopping distances were dangerously longer. They follow: Regular tires, 193 feet; snow tires, 114 feet; regular tire chains, 92 feet; and reinforced tire chains, 77 feet.

Other Tips: A common driving error is over-braking. Power brakes, especially, must be applied with a precise touch on ice and snow. You must see danger to avoid danger. More darkness, scattered windfalls, snow and sleet storms all cut visibility and multiply winter hazards. You can't change the weather but you can check to make sure that the rubber blades in your windshield wipers are alive and in good condition, and that your defroster is working properly. After a storm, carefully clear snow and ice from windshield, windows, headlights, and turn signals.

How to Start: Don't spin your wheels. Tires spinning on snow or ice have little traction. Ease off rather than bear down on the gas pedal. Too much gas means a wheel spin. Older cars can start in second gear on snow or ice for smoother getaway. Cars with automatic transmission and hydraulic drives were found to handle well on snow and ice.

To Keep Going: Once you start, it's up to you to keep going safely. Adjust your driving speed and distance behind car ahead according to conditions. In severe snow or ice conditions, pull out on your tire chains.

Over-steering is a common cause of accidents. Take advantage of the maximum turning power of your tires. If you over-steer, straighten a bit and then turn again—"pump" the steering wheel. When your rear wheels skid, turn the front wheels in the direction of the skid. Stay away from the brakes. Locked wheels make a skid worse. When you have overcome the skid either pump your brakes to slow down, or accelerate lightly to continue moving. The best way to stop on glare ice is to pump the brakes. This means to apply the brakes quickly for an instant, then release them. Repeat this on and off, once or twice a second—to a full stop. 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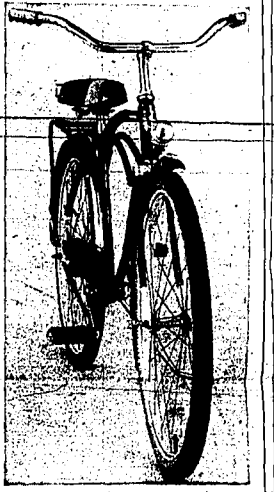

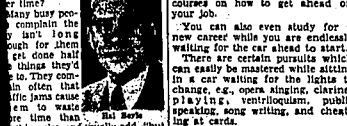

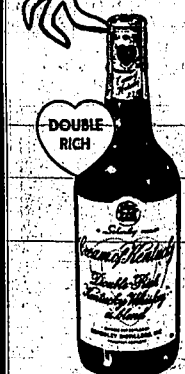

Nehru Shown China's Stand On Problems

NEW DELHI, Dec. 5 (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru will give his latest views on Communist China's policy to the United States, informed persons here report.

By this account, Nehru is expected to tell Eisenhower on the question of future relations between the two nations. The Communists get China's seat at the United Nations and whether the United States will permit lifting the trade embargo on Red China.

Nehru and Premier Chou held private talks for more than eight hours last week. Chou is touring India.

Review Given

Informants give this review of the Chou-Nehru talks:

Chou did not ask Nehru to relay messages to Eisenhower and Nehru did not propose to do so, but he did say that he would like to see two prime ministers speak most of their time talking about Peking-Washington relations and the future of Formosa.

Both agreed to accept the fact that the United States would not grant recognition to Communist China. They seemed to believe that a long-term better relationship could be made if Peking was in the United Nations and if western businessmen had a chance to deal with Chinese Communist trade organs.

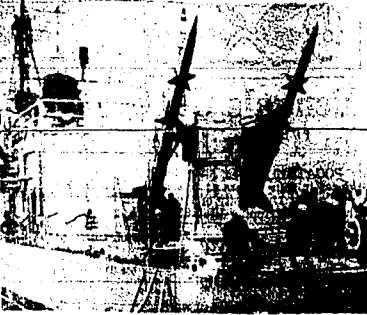
Events Discussed

Army Pigeons Grounded but Heroes, Deeds Remembered

SPORTSMONTH, N. J., Dec. 5 (AP)—The army pigeon is a dead duck.

The army has decided that the communications field—in peacetime, at least—is not for the birds. The decision is taking over.

That was the purpose of a acceptance ceremony announced last night from the great Pentagon complex in Washington. The pigeon is being retired from active duty—grounded, so to speak.

The Washington announcement said progress in electronic communications has "virtually ended any peacetime need" for pigeons. The swift wings and stout hearts that have done combat for America in two world wars and Korea are being deactivated.

The army signal corps pigeon center there—long a headquarters for training, billing, cooing, and breeding—is the least active in the country. It soon will be closed and some 1,000 birds offered for sale.

Eighteen feathered heroes, living here in honored retirement in the special "Churchill loft" which is reserved for those birds that have saved American lives in combat, will be given extra consideration. The army hopes to place them in public zoos or institutions.

That's the respect that put a heart-into the retirement of the heroic pigeon—as compared with the recent announcement that the army is deactivating its last tactical mule unit. The mule, though noble, was seldom glamorous.

One pigeon here is credited with saving hundreds of lives.

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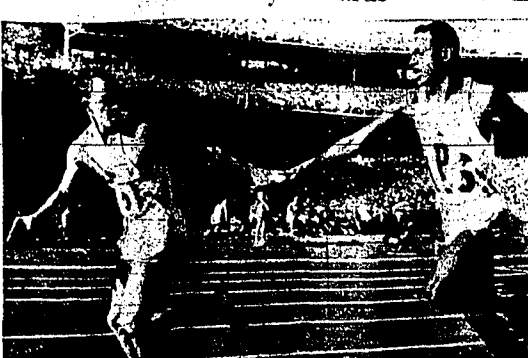

Canada Seeks Immigrants to Reside There

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 5 (AP)—Immigration from continental Europe is gradually changing Canada's make-up.

About 600,000 immigrants have come to Canada since the 1850's, most of them from Europe. With Canada's need for workers expected to continue indefinitely and the immigration department trying to lure them from non-British lands, there seems a possibility of an eventual three-way balance in Canada's makeup among people of British, French and other European origin.

John H. Kidd, executive secretary of the Canadian citizenship council says such a change may bring cultural benefits, bridging the historical gap between English and French and bringing these two cultures closer together.

In the 1922 census, Canada's population was 57 per cent of British origin. In 1951, this had shrunk to

48 per cent. People of french origin accounted for about 20 per cent of the population at both the beginning and end of the 60-year period. But the percentage for other racial groups rose from 13 to 22. The bureau of statistics, now busy tabulating census figures collected last summer, expects to come up with a population total of about 18 million when it finishes the job next January.

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
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
