BOISE, Dec. 6 (AP)—The National Beet Growers Federation today named Ralph Benson, Loveland, Colo., chairman for the coming year. Benson, who also is president of Mountain States Beet Growers Association in Colorado, succeeds W. H. Gorst, Worland, Wyo. Other officers named at the concluding session of the group's 11th annual meeting were Melvin Bennett, Gering, Neb., first vice chairman, and William Carlson, Weir, second vice chairman.

The meeting was scheduled to end Tuesday afternoon with a session on resolutions presented by a committee headed by Arvid Nilgren, chairman.

Brief Slated to Oppose Three Dams in River

PORTLAND, Dec. 6 (AP)—Five organizations opposing Idaho Power company's plan to build three low-dams in the Hells canyon reach of the Snake river, filed a brief with the Oregon hydroelectric commission yesterday.

The brief asks the commission to deny Idaho Power's request for a license for the project. The firm already has been licensed to build the dams by the federal power commission.

The five organizations—the Oregon State Grange, the Oregon State Labor Council, the Oregon Farmers Union, the Oregon RZA Cooperative Association, and the Hells Canyon Development Association—opposed in the brief that if the water is granted "the legal problems created would haunt the people of the state of Oregon for at least the 50-year period" which a state license would cover.

The organizations also asked for criminal action against the company, contending that Idaho Power had diverted the Snake river into the Bruleides dam site without first obtaining permission of the state engineer.

8 California Counties Want to Form State, Develop Region

REDDING, Calif., Dec. 6 (AP)—Mountain men in this remote area laid plans today for eight northern California counties to secede and set up a 40th state, featuring legalized gambling and freedom from income or sales taxes.

A small group met this week and elected Rep. Clair Holt, D., Calif., to advise them how to proceed to form a new state of "Shasta." A severe snowstorm prevented attendance of all counties involved.

The dream of a new state reflects long-smoldering problems of the thinly populated, undeveloped area, which was triggered by an expected boom in the 1957 session of the California legislature over water development.

The eight counties, Shastay, Modoc, Del Norte, Humboldt, Shasta, Trinity, Lassen and Plumas, comprise about one-fifth of the state area. The bulk of California's undeveloped water originates within borders of the proposed state and the hills and valleys abound with wildlife and trout.

However, the counties have but 1.7 per cent of the state's registered voters. They are represented in the 20-seat state legislature by only two assemblymen and four senators. In contrast, the city of Los Angeles alone has 31 assemblymen.

Patrick Hanratty, 55-year-old developer, said he would like to see a paper mill near Palman and each of the 20 Chinese dollars a month. He said he heard very little about the world situation while in Red China.

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Egyptian Official Charges Turkey and Iraq With Involvement in Suez Fight

CAIRO, Egypt, Dec. 6 (AP)—Wing Commander Ali Sabry, chief political adviser to President Gamal Abdel Nasser, said today Turkey and Iraq were "indirectly" involved in the Anglo-French attack on Egypt.

He said the United States also will be linked with "evil" in the minds of the Arab people if it joins the Baghdad pact of which Turkey and Iraq are members.

"An exclusive interview, Sabry said, the United States also will denigrate its good will by cooperating in the U. N. emergency force in preparing to clear the blocked Suez canal while British and French troops are withdrawing from the canal zone.

However, he said the actual clearing work can begin only after all the invasion troops have left.

The political affairs chief of Nasser's cabinet said he is in a "class-topper desk in a modest second-floor office of the presidency."

"I think the Baghdad pact has become a psychological thing in the minds of the people of this area," he said. "It is rather than good."

"If the United States joins it, she would be linked with that evil."

"The Baghdad pact has been inked with aggression against Egypt in this crisis. There was Turkish pressure. Turkey has been used to avoid World War III by agreeing to United Nations action, and now we are concentrating our attack on Cyprus."

"Lately we found out some things about craft, mainly French aircraft carriers, were hidden in Turkish waters. A Baghdad pact power thus took part indirectly in the aggression."

Sabry also said Iraq oilbases were used for refueling Anglo-French planes, and that wounded were evacuated to Iraqi hospitals. "That was indirect participation in aggression," he declared.

He made four other major points in the interview:

1. Egypt is still ready to give guarantees of free navigation of the Suez canal. But Israel should take up its demand for passage with the international court at The Hague.

2. He believes there can be no immediate progress toward a peaceful Palestine settlement because of the Israeli attack on Egypt.

Asked how long it will take to clear the Suez canal, Sabry said: "That depends on the technical position. There has been no full-scale survey yet. There will be expert missions from the United Nations here, perhaps tomorrow or the next day. With our engineers they have to survey the job, decide on the equipment needed and the time it will take."

On the U. N. "plus for settling the canal dispute," he said: "We are ready to give guarantees of navigation of the canal. But the immediate problem is the aggressors who are still in our territory. It is not a question affecting only Britain and France, but also other countries friendly to Egypt."

On willingness to participate with Britain and France in future canal negotiations, "I cannot give a definite answer, but personally I don't think Britain and France can take their aggression against Egypt during the world war but they have not been willing to participate in negotiations."

On a Palestine settlement with Israel: "I do not think there could be any now—because of the British attack and treachery. How could we believe Israel wants to live in peace? How can we believe Israel will not 'alter-ego' itself with some other colonial power, and serve as a base for aggression?"

On the prevention of World War III: "I think we have a big part. We could have been more stubborn. We could have rejected United Nations action. We thought it better to give full support in principle to world war, even at the risk of Britain and France refusing to withdraw. As a matter of fact, we were still not sure of the withdrawal."

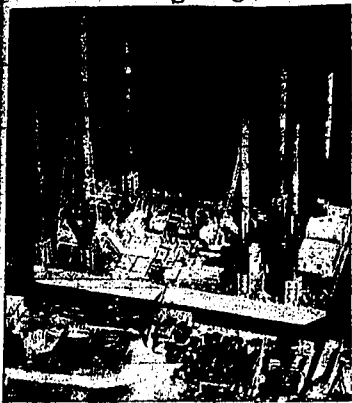

Business Events in '56 Given Good Portions of Headlines

By SAM LAWSON
NEW YORK, Dec. 6 (U)—Business this year has managed to grab a sizable share of front page space. Fast-moving jobs has brought about a break of top stories about business for about events, closely affecting business and their customers.

While the dying year could still appear the top story in some of the news, the trouble here—just one man's opinion—are the candidates for the 1956 business awards. 1. Inflation and tight money—two sides of the same problem. The rise in the price of living after a few years of stability jolted many consumers. The rise in the cost of doing business hit manufacturers and merchants ever harder. The tight money policy—aimed at heading off inflation—brought grief to the main: first from home builders and small businessmen and later from companies seeking to borrow to expand and from governments seeking funds for civic projects.

2. The Eisenhower story. His decision to run early in the spring and his illness early in the summer were the chief headlines in the stock market and his reelection in November added with about the same amount of confidence of many businessmen in continuing prosperity.

3. The steel market. Its backing and filling over the year puzzled readers and made some wary of the future. Stock price averages are now slightly below the point at which they started the year, but still a fair distance above their low points of the spring and fall.

4. The steel strike. Its effects on all but closely allied industries was largely in its backwash—a wage and price increase that whipped up inflationary trends and set an example for other management and labor groups.

5. The Detroit story. Layoffs in the spring and summer and revival of auto production and sales in the fall affected the general economy and were credited with shaping public as well as business psychology.

6. Business spending on capital goods. Record outlays—and even more, record plans for building additional plants and buying equipment—bolstered good times.

Father Given Girl Custody By New Rule

BOISE, Dec. 6 (AP)—The state supreme court has reversed a decision on a tenth district court habeas corpus proceeding and returned custody of a 4-year-old child to her father.

The child's parents, Miles Allen and Jean Paul, separated in California in early 1954 and were divorced in Idaho in 1955. Paul returned to Idaho with the child, according to the opinion handed down by Chief Justice C. J. Taylor and three concurring justices, Paul took his daughter back to California in April of that year.

Bounce Dulles Rumor Flayed By New Action

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and personal associates confidently expect him to continue in office through President Eisenhower's second term.

That confidence was underwritten yesterday by the state department's report on Dulles' assessment of the full recovery and competence "for full resumption of his normal duties."

While agreed with questionnaires that the department issued the Dulles report to cool hot rumors, Dulles shortly would resign. The statement was over the signatures of Mrs. Gen. Leonard D. Mr. Eisenhower believes in supporting his subordinates, however, and evidently intends to keep Dulles in the cabinet. Perhaps that must be viewed on an as-of-now basis because the dispute over criticism of foreign policy has just begun.

Prediction of another four cabinet years for Dulles might be challenged on grounds of age. The secretary will be 66 years old next Feb. 25 and would be within reach of the 73rd birthday when Mr. Eisenhower's second term ends in January, 1961.

TOKYO, Dec. 6 (AP)—Kichisaburo Nomura, Japanese ambassador to the United States at the time of the Pearl Harbor attack, warned today that communists may soon try to break Japan's close ties with America.

He said such "subversive activities" can be expected following resumption of diplomatic relations between Japan and Russia. The Japanese parliament yesterday ratified agreements restoring peace between Japan and Russia and paved the way for opening embassies in Tokyo and Moscow.

In an interview on the eve of the 10th anniversary of the Pearl Harbor attack, Nomura spoke as one of the United States' staunchest friends in Asia. He has consistently urged close cooperation with the United States, including military alliance.

Nomura favors restoration of peace with Russia, but he warned of increased communist subversive and propaganda activities here.

"Japan must retain its ties with the United States, or we may become a satellite of Red China or Russia," he said. "Red China has a treaty with Russia. Therefore we must have and strengthen ours with the United States."

Cut Is Sought In Acreage of Spring Spuds

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—The agriculture department advised California and Florida farmers today to trim their 1957 acreage of potatoes by 10 per cent.

The department also recommended a nationwide two per cent reduction in acreage for spring vegetables and a five per cent decrease in acreage for spring melons. The recommendations are not mandatory in all states.

If these marketing guides are followed, the department said, supplies should be adequate to meet all requirements.

About half the spring potato crop is grown in Florida and California. Spring potato acreage in the other 31 spring potato states would be unchanged.

The department recommended total spring potato acreage of 18.8 million acres, compared with 19,000,000 acres in 1956.

The recommended acreage in the department said, would produce 21 million hundredweight.

The department called for a fresh spring vegetable acreage of 41,000 acres, compared with 42,300 acres in 1956, and 1,037 spring melon acres, compared with 1,040,000 acres, compared with 1,050,000 acres this year.

Millions Are Spent on Study of New Atomic Dangers of Strontium Fallout

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—The atomic energy commission is spending many millions of dollars in a continuing worldwide radiation survey called Project Sunshine.

Other agencies studying the whole world are the National Academy of Sciences, the British Medical Research Council, and the scientific committees of the United Nations.

Project Sunshine—now about three years old—is particularly interested in radioactive strontium-90, by far the most serious fission product of nuclear explosions.

Sunshine collects radioactive fall-out from bomb tests at more than 50 countries and territories. It tests soils in all of the earth's major geographical regions for their Sr-90 content. It also samples milk in Mississippi, England, Japan, and many other widely separated places.

Precisely all of the scientists involved in Project Sunshine research on the processes by which Sr-90 gets from the bomb to the person. The AEC's Merrill Eisenbud has described the operation's scope this way:

"From the standpoint of its most general dimensions and the variety of scientific mechanisms involved in the investigation, Project Sunshine rivals the most comprehensive scientific studies ever conducted."

Project Sunshine's data are not secret. But it does take technical competence to understand and translate them. They are pouring in and being updated all the time.

One fact that has worried scientists is the Sr-90 in a worse hazard in areas where the soil is low in calcium. The amount of radioactive strontium taken into plants is higher in such areas than elsewhere. Water is such an area. Its soil has 50 times less calcium than the average for other regions.

But Project Sunshine research indicates that Sr-90 acquisition by human beings is by no means directly proportional to the amount of calcium in the soil. According to official estimates, Washmen should have no more than double the world average of radio-strontium.

In October, Libby estimated that world average would be about four thousandths of an occupational MPC when all Sr-90 from tests by date had completed its slow descent and humans had taken up all they could.

Libby said recently that, now Project Sunshine data indicate this figure probably is too high and that the actual world dose will be lower.

People always have been bombarded by nuclear radiation—from naturally unstable atoms like radium or potassium, and from cosmic rays. Libby says cosmic rays penetrating the body leave "tracks" similar to radionuclides.

Cosmic radiation internally increases with altitude. According to Libby, the effect of Sr-90 on people today to now has been about the same as if everybody on earth moved 50 feet higher.

And when all of it now suspended, comes down and rain gets his share, the effect will be as though everybody had moved up 5,000 feet.

Or, as Libby says, "as though everybody had moved from Washington to Denver."

Tests aren't the only producers of Sr-90. Peacetime atomic reactors also produce it. The National Academy of Sciences says that by the time a worldwide nuclear power industry is developed, if it ever is, it will accumulate "waste" might represent more radiation than would be released in atomic war.

Such wastes are not, of course, broadcast around the world, but their existence creates a disposal problem of tremendous magnitude which isn't even close to solution now.

It is the menace of Sr-90 from fission explosions, however, that worries the scientists, inside and outside the government. Suppose the nuclear arms race gets hotter. Suppose other nations, in addition to the United States, Russia, and Great Britain, get into the competition, and tests mushroom.

Suppose other nations do not follow this country's example, and do not abandon testing of bombs both big and dirty. Dr. Ralph E. Lapp, writer on nuclear affairs, ages no reason to believe the test rate will be stationary.

Suppose, as Dr. Lapp believes, that the upward-arc-of-bomb-leaking is proceeding out of control. By 1957, Lapp fears, enough Sr-90 may have been "committed to the stratosphere" to give every person on the planet his near lethal dose.

"These possibilities may or may not be probabilities. The experts weigh them differently. And there has been much scientific and political controversy over how best to

control a world club on nuclear explosions.

But there is no disagreement that eventually there must be such controls and that, in any event, all-out nuclear war must never be allowed to happen if man wants to maintain his residence on this planet.

Some of the control problems seem at times to be almost insoluble. So also do the problems of atomic power waste disposal. But the time approaches when the must be solved—when, as the National Academy of Sciences says: "We had better be ready with the answers."

Funds Sought By Ike to Aid Baghdad Pact

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—The administration plans to ask congress for funds—about \$200 million, it is estimated—military aid into Baghdad pact nations on Russia's southwest flank, officials said today.

The action will be a further step to bolster these nations—Turkey, Iraq and Iran—and to try to bring stability to the Middle East. The United States just last Thursday took the unusual step of warning would-be aggressors that any threat on Baghdad pact members would be viewed "with the utmost gravity" by this country even though it is not a member of the pact.

The United States is especially anxious to strengthen the pact nations because of recent Soviet efforts to undermine the group. Soviet propaganda has been doing their best to stir up trouble, particularly in the Near East and its pro-Soviet neighbor, Syria.

Authorities refused to say how much money congress would be asked to put up for military aid to these nations. They also declined to say whether there is any plan to increase the rate of past military shipments to pact members.

The best information available now is that the administration tentatively plans to request about \$2 billion dollars for both economic and military aid to all foreign nations during the next fiscal year. Probably about 2 billion dollars would go for military aid.

Poles Visit Old, Modern Houses

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 6 (AP)—Five representatives of Polish homebuilding industry left Salt Lake City to continue their survey of the "United States' dwelling conditions. During their two-day Utah stop-over, the Poles took a look at an 18th-century cabin, which is tucked beneath a canopy on the Salt Lake Temple grounds. Then they toured the new home of Archbishop Joseph P. Parrish, which is so up to date it even includes a heating system that utilizes the sun's rays.

They said they were impressed not only by the labor-saving devices in American homes but by the amount of living space provided.

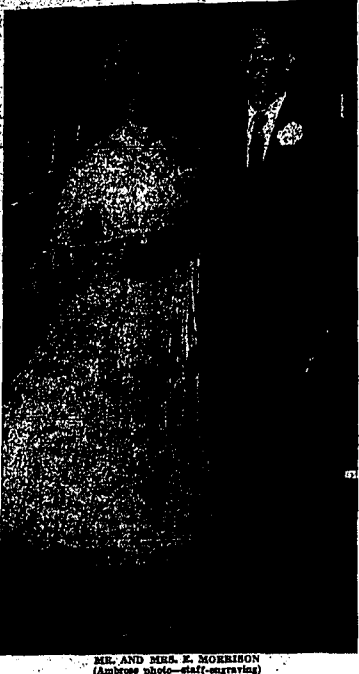

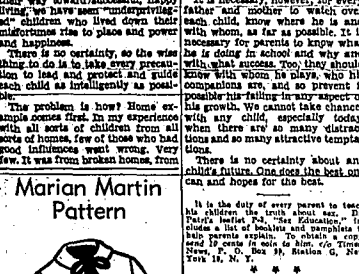

Red Students Hand Leaders New Troubles

By United Press

An increasingly-critical attitude toward Russian universities seems to be giving the Soviet government something new to worry about.

The students started asking questions about the policies of both government and Communist Party leaders after Nikita S. Khrushchev announced the downgrading of Joseph Stalin.

Now, it appears, the students are asking embarrassing questions about the Soviet movement in the Russian satellites for independent communist rule.

An admission that the students are carrying their criticism too far was contained in an editorial published on Monday in the newspaper *Kommunisticheskiy*, which is the official organ of the Communist Youth League. The League is the junior section of the Communist Party.

Students' expressions of "error and misunderstanding" with "unpleasant" and "liberalizing" corrections about the Soviet dictatorship.

Some students, the newspaper says, were "attempting to nullify the achievements of the revolution."

Postal Bulletin

had been reported previously in the news bulletins of the British Embassy in Moscow about the "new revolt" on the walls of the Kremlin.

The report said that an entire wall of a lecture at the University of Leningrad after fall had got satisfactory answers to questions about the Hungarian revolution.

Other dispatches have reported an increasing tendency among Russian students in general to indulge in independent communist criticism, and to seek more information about what is happening in the western world.

Discipline Eyed

There are indications that Soviet universities are planning to impose discipline over university students who seek young people in the West.

It is reported that a number of students who were expelled from the University of Leningrad for "disrupting" the study of the Russian Revolution after it had started, it is hard to stop.

Teaching of Democracy Lags In West German Classrooms

BONN, Germany (NEA) — Although the German people are free to elect their own government, the teaching of democracy is well-intentioned, but lagging.

Plump, elderly, retired German school teacher who is now acting as an adviser to a group of state school officials says his late afternoon class of 20 to 25 12 to 14 year olds is the best he has ever taught.

Life was under an emperor. As a result my students became socialists.

In the 20s I tried to teach my students about democracy and they became Nazis.

In the 30s when I was forced to teach my students to be loyal Nazis they finally became interested in democracy. And now that they're trying to teach democracy again God only knows what effect it will have.

His point, he explains, is that the German school system has been used so many times to try to professionalize youth that the old, hard-core of educators are disillusioned with any attempt at political education.

At a brand new six-story brick school in rebuilt Hanover you find an official who gives further insight into why education in democracy in Germany is lagging.

He explains that the all-important tradition of German education is sorting out students according to mental or mechanical aptitude. Then the schools concentrate on preparing them for the most profitable careers they can achieve.

Thus, maximum productivity is educated into the German citizen. Students who will go on to professional careers attend the new Hanover school, roughly equivalent to an American high school.

Also at the Hanover high school you find the German history books which have been rewritten to try to put the Nazi period in proper perspective. They're the same books used in all German schools.

The rewritten history book is the basic tool Germans use for teaching democracy. No schools have civics courses in which the democratic machinery and citizens' responsibilities are taught as such.

The need to interpret the fitfulness of the democratic way of life gives the individual teacher great responsibility in this task. But too many German teachers are old and recall too well the investigations and purges that well-dressed young men and women have two youngsters in school says, "I want my children to learn how to enjoy life and make a good living but I don't want their heads filled with politics. My generation was exposed to the Hitler youth movement and it only got us into trouble."

Basic control of the schools traditionally begins and ends with the cities and German state government has nothing to say about what is taught. Neither do German parents.

It is this typical attitude, and lack of participation of parents generally in German schools, which is the target of militant democratic teachings.

Still another parent problem you find in every German city and hamlet is the fact that a large percentage of young mothers work and with German school sessions only a half day, millions of German youngsters study under the direction of an elderly grandparent or aunt. This is another influence holding back democratic teachings.

In spite of this somewhat gloomy picture, however, the young German knows enough to hate and fear communism.

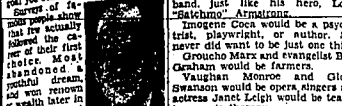

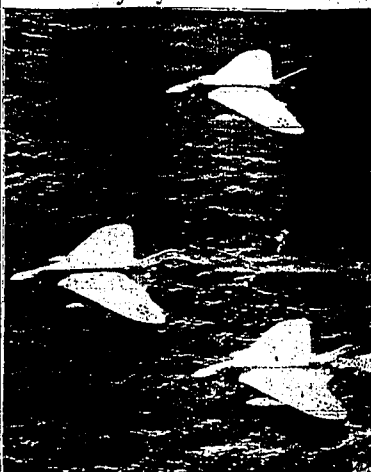
Boyle Advises Not to Fret if Children Can't Pick Careers

Doctors Show Fat Food Aids Clot of Blood

NEW YORK, Dec. 6 (AP)—Scientific experiments with 50 healthy men between 25 and 40 years old have shown vividly what fatty meals do to the blood. They increase the viscosity of the blood to coagulate, or clot.

That isn't helpful in men whose arteries may well contain the other conditions, which when all are combined, lead to clots in arteries or veins. These clots bring about some heart attacks and other life-threatening "accidents" in the blood circulatory system.

There had been some controversy in science on whether much fat in the diet could affect the clotting ability of the blood. Mrs. Raito Buzina and Axel King of the University of Minnesota designed their experiment with much exactitude with the idea of settling the controversy.

They worked in the "rigidly controlled" metabolic ward of the St. James (Minn.) State hospital where the end results of everything which goes into the bodies of patients are precisely measured.

After a night's sleep and with empty stomachs, the 50 men gave up blood samples into needles inserted into arm veins. Then they consumed 1,000 calories in the form of cream containing 40 per cent butter fat. More blood samples were taken an hour later, two hours and a half hour later, four hours later, and five and a half hours later.

This same experiment also was built around a meal of 840 calories made up of life, sugar and "divinity" candy, but containing only one-tenth of a gram of fat, which hardly is a touch. Thus, the scientists had blood samples of the "no-meal" state and of varying times after "high fat" and "low fat" meals.

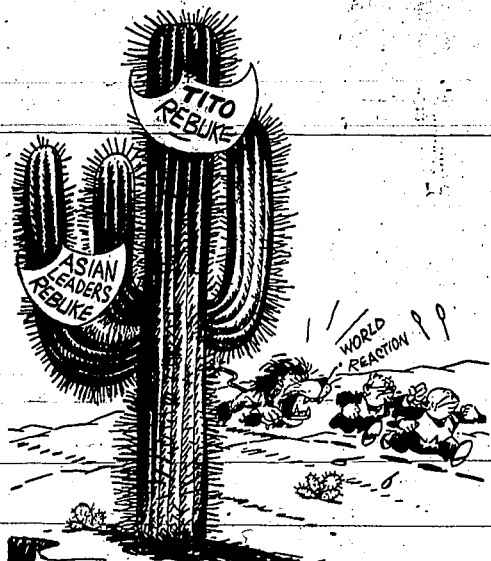
Measured Carefully
All these samples were measured chemically in test tubes for clotting times. And all the results were subjected to checks, double checks and then to statistical analysis of the through kind that scientists don't argue with.

The whole blood coagulation time was significantly shortened after the fatty meal, especially at two and a half to five and a half hours (afterward), but was essentially unaltered after a non-fatty meal or during continued fasting, the doctors reported to a technical publication of the American Heart Association.

They recalled previous experiments which "indicated" that fat in the digestive tract "influences" blood circulation. They also recalled two previous experiments which indicated the very opposite.

The "new data" of one of these two they subjected to a statistical analysis which, they said, "demonstrates clearly that its results were
