Council Seeks New Increase For Education

BOISE, Dec. 12 (AP)—Idaho's United Education Council has recommended that the 1957 legislature be asked to increase the state's share of the cost of running public schools to 15 million dollars.

The council also recommended that the legislature be asked to appropriate for the 1957-58 school year an additional \$2,000,000 for the state's share of the cost of running public schools.

The UEO is made up of the Idaho Education Association, the Idaho Association of Parents and Teachers and the Idaho School Trustees Association.

Formulas Asked

It urged distribution of the money under three separate formulas, the first \$10,000,000 would be allocated according to the present method, the second \$5,000,000 would be allocated according to a new formula proposed by an interim committee, and the remainder according to a formula proposed by the interim committee. But it requested that "cost factors" be substituted for "cost factors" in the formula to distribute the three million dollars.

Salary Hike Included

Salary increases for teachers are included in the money would "provide a basis for the public school program," the council said. Spokesmen explained this meant extra money to increase teacher salaries.

The council said more than 23 million dollars would be needed to provide public school education in Idaho on a basis comparable to neighboring states.

It said its recommendation would provide an increase of \$25 per child per year daily attendance, but would be increased twice that much with neighboring states.

The \$150,000 amount was certified by the state board of education as needed for present-level education needs of the minimum education program.

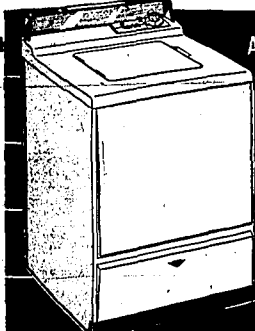

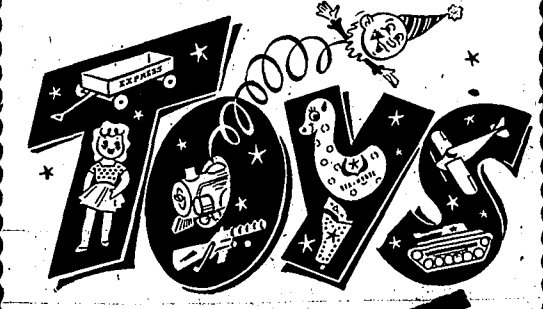

U. S. and Communist Chinese negotiators are scheduled to meet again on the subject of the U. S. prisoners in Geneva tomorrow. Some officials believe that if Peking is ready to free the 18 Americans, they will notify the United States at that meeting.

The American and Red Chinese negotiators have been meeting periodically at Geneva since August, 1950. Communist China agreed Sept. 10, 1955, to return "expeditionary" all-Americans then in Red China against their will.

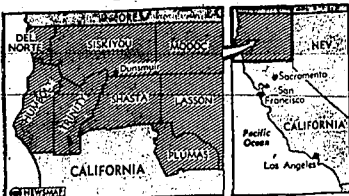

"I should state that this idea has been supported and subscribed to by our children and their grandparents," King wrote.

"We all feel that our gift will make for a richer and more meaningful Christmas."

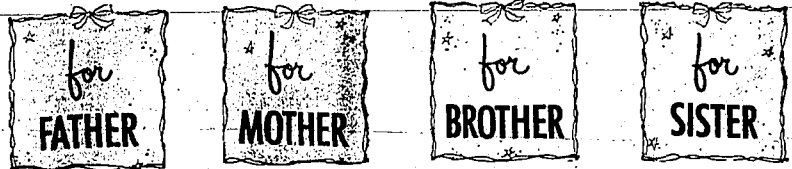

Chief Engineer of Vast Road Building Project Envisions Economic Progress

NEW YORK, Dec. 12 (AP)—The "do-it-yourself" engineer who will direct the greatest road-building project since the Romans believed it will open a fantastic new frontier for economic and social progress in America.

In writing it "might mean the very survival of the country," says Bertram D. Tallmy, white-haired 55-year-old chairman of the New York state thruway authority and former state public works commissioner who goes to Washington next month as federal highway administrator.

President Eisenhower named Tallmy to direct the first years of the long-range multi-billion dollar super-highway program after a nationwide search for a man who was both engineer and administrator.

"He is one of the world's greatest builders of roads," said Secretary of Commerce Sinclair Weeks. "This assures the nation that history's biggest public works project will be constructed with outstanding skill, vision and integrity."

Tallmy, in an interview at headquarters of New York state thruways, a road which he built, looked at the national project.

"The opportunity for social and economic progress in that nation which will result from the successful completion of this system is beyond anything any of us can conceive at this time," Tallmy said.

"I have seen vast new industries spring up almost like magic in open areas. I have seen big new trucking lines spring up. I have seen property values jump from \$500 to \$20,000 an acre. Recreation areas are enjoying a vast boom with vacationers coming more frequently and from greater dis-

tances.

"It has happened in one state on one road only 426 miles long, and across the nation more than 4,000 miles. The ultimate result cannot be foreseen.

"That is really the reason for this program."

Tallmy also underlined the great security the gas-tax system provides for the state. "It is possible even more important in the decentralization of industry which this makes possible.

"With the enemy able to bomb concentrated areas, this decentralization might mean the very survival of the country."

Tallmy, a 5'11", 180-pound out-doorman who prefers for fishing to golf, a do-it-yourselfer who wire and painted his own summer cottage on Bowman lake, personally walked over many miles of the thruway.

"I don't believe a man can get behind a desk on a construction job and know what's going on," said Tallmy, the grandson, son and father of an engineer. "For me to do the job the way it's got to be done, I must make frequent visits with state governors and highway officials. We must get in an automobile and go out and look at the problem before we can make a decision."

Tallmy has seen more than 150 million dollars worth of new industrial plants employing 30,000 persons with an annual payroll of 250 million dollars spring up along the thruway.

A four-million-dollar TV assembly plant went up at Batavia, N. Y., a 30 million dollar shopping center in Yonkers.

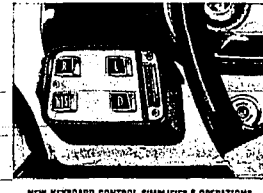

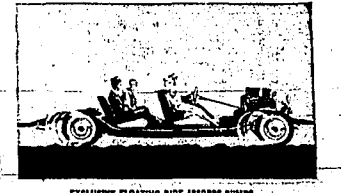

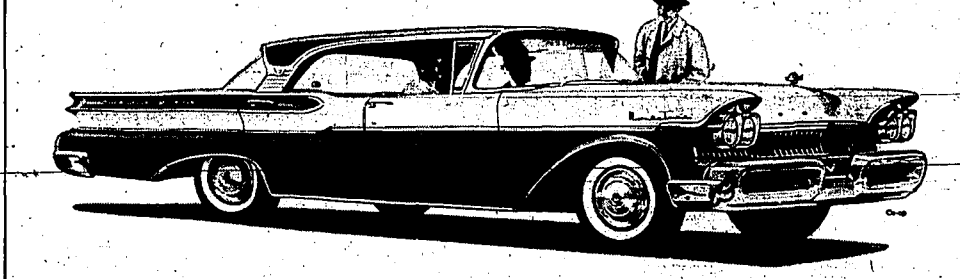

U.S. Diplomat Evicted From British House

LONDON, Dec. 12.—An American diplomat has been evicted from his London home because his neighbors consider the United States "despicable" for failing to back the Anglo-French invasion of Egypt, it was reported today.

Mrs. Eugene Sabatini, assistant U. S. air attaché, was ordered to move out of the house he occupied for two weeks. He received the eviction notice in a letter from collector Maurice G. Holt, which said:

"In view of the deplorable conduct of the United States and the consequent profound contempt that I, in common with many millions of my fellow countrymen feel for that country and its nationals, I am not prepared to allow an American to occupy any property over which we have control."

Feeling is high. It was the first reported case of its kind in the wave of anti-American feeling which swept Britain and France when the United States failed to back the two countries in their invasion of the Bure canal zone.

Some British service station operators have also refused to sell gasoline to U. S. servicemen stationed here.

The story of Sabatini's eviction was printed on the front page of the London Daily Mail today. Sabatini, a pilot in the 1944 invasion of Normandy, was quoted as saying his eviction "came as a great shock."

"I couldn't understand at first why Holt was so bitter," he said, "After all, we're doing a job here, and we have nothing to do with American policy."

Receives Letters. The major who moves into an apartment, said he received nearly 20 letters of apology from British friends. His neighbors gave him a box of candy as a farewell present.

The Daily Mail quoted Holt as saying "this is a matter about which I feel very strongly."

"It has been reported back to Washington as evidence of anti-American feeling. I am only too glad," he added.

Washington Merchants Boost Sales by Shop and Park Plan

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Retail sales in downtown Washington "chaotic" and parking lot operators believe they have found a way to escape the economic stagnation that threatens many downtown business districts of many cities.

"After a year and a half of trial, they are elated with the results of Washington's downtown park and shop plan," said Arthur J. Sundlum, chairman of the Washington board of trade's downtown committee, said. There is no doubt that "it has been a great boon to downtown business."

William G. Barr, executive director of the National Parking association, called it "the most successful program" of reviving downtown trade in the nation.

Here's how the "park and shop" plan works: A housewife (or man, too, of course) who wants to shop downtown drives directly to a private parking lot or garage which displays the red, white, blue and black "park and shop" emblem.

At each place she visits, she presents her parking ticket to the cashier, who puts on a stamp which entitles her to one hour free parking.

Some stores require a \$2 minimum purchase to be eligible for a parking stamp; others hand them out even to "just browsing" customers.

When the shopper returns to the parking lot, she says nothing if she has a stamp to cover each hour she was parked. If she has only one

stamp but was parked for two hours, she pays for the second hour at its lower rate.

Merchants buy the stamps from the Park and Shop association for 20 cents each. Thus they underwrite most of the cost of the plan.

Parking lots which customarily charge 50 cents or more for the first hour of parking lose a little on one-hour parkers but make it up on longer-staying customers.

Major department stores so far have remained aloof from the plan. They take the position that their profit margins on small sales are too low to absorb the extra cost of parking stamps.

The man believed behind it was removed any hope for an easing of the regime—and guaranteed a violent tank showdown.

George met an appropriate end plotted with the Russians to start the revolt and kill it. As a Bolshevik in 1944, he had the experience-for-honorific—He was attempting to escape to Russia.

No one had better motive for getting away. And no one knew better that Hungary was ripe for a "small" revolt, but he had so suppressed the nation that its mood was one of desperation. Prices were impossible stores were barren. The secret police had curtailed more liberties with each year for 10 years.

And then—standing before them—was the example of the successful protest of the Poles against the Warsaw regime and the Russians. The greatest shock to the Hungarian Communists and their Russian masters must have been the type of people who fought the protest.

Believe none of the stories that this was a misguided uprising fo-

found its under among the common people.

The areas of destruction, the buildings most desperately defended and the dead themselves are the most eloquent proof of this. It was the workers' sentiments that Soviet siege guns smashed, factory buildings that became forts and the shabby men with broken axes and hasty hands of the laborer who died by the thousands. The women with their hair bound with kerchiefs and the cheap and tawdry dresses of working people.

A 17-year-old girl, later wounded at Corvin theater, told me she fought

because "It isn't right that my father with four children to feed should get only 500 forints (\$50) a month."

They will go on fighting for them.

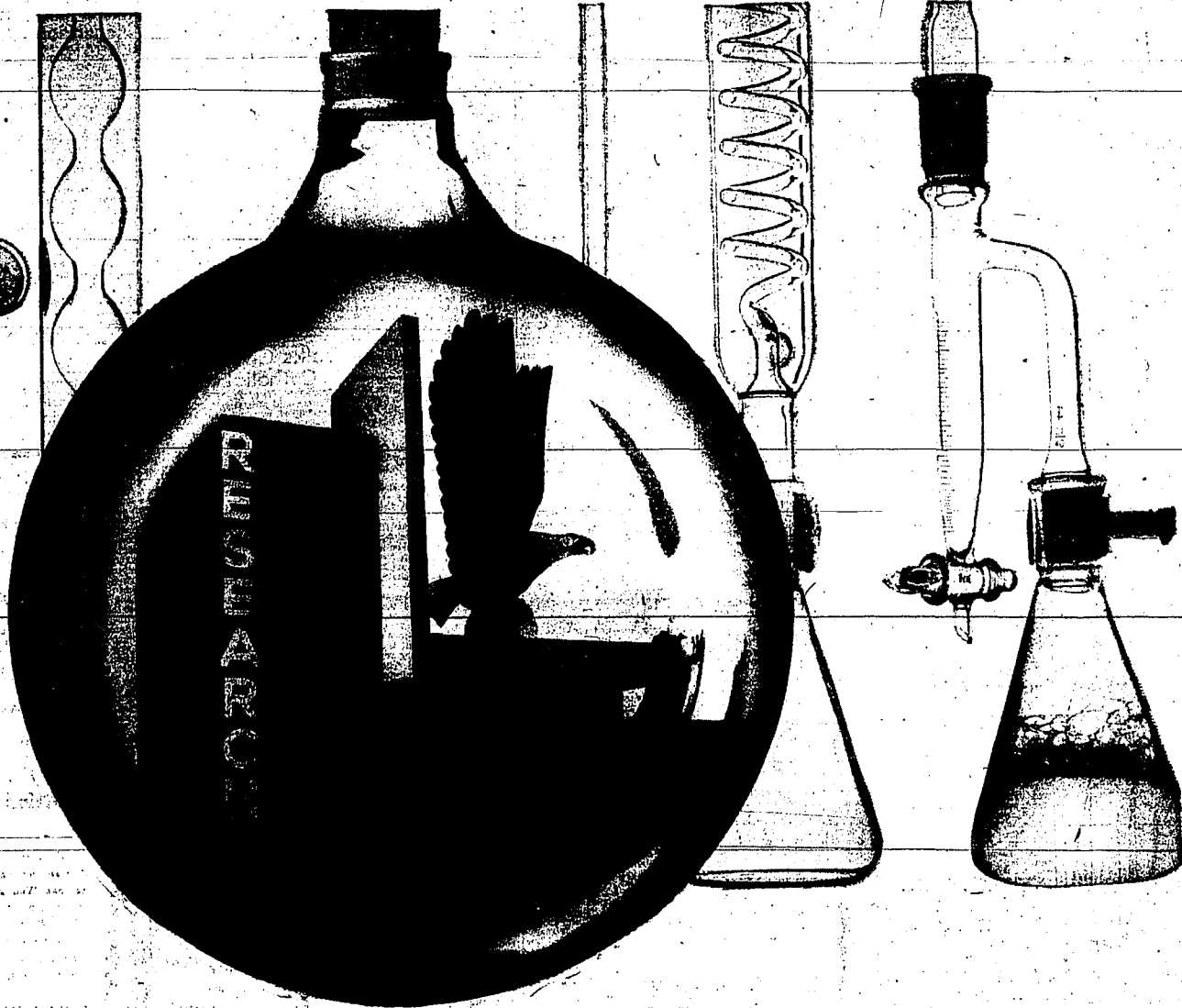

Low Income Groups May Save Work, Worry on Federal Tax by Using 1040A

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—If you made less than \$5,000 this year and had less than \$100 in outside income, stop making extra worry for yourself.

Pay your taxes the simple, easy way. Use form 1040A, the punch card which a bureaucrat can fill in through a machine instead of auditing by hand.

The internal revenue service reported with consternation today that some 6,000,000 persons went all the trouble last year of filling out the regular tax form 1040 when they could have done the job with the simpler punch card. That made more work for both sender and receiver.

To make sure this doesn't happen again, the tax agents are sending punch cards to this lower income group this year.

Of course, some individuals who get them may find that their deductions total more than 10 percent the maximum allowed by the automatic punch card. In that case the revenue service advises using form 1040. The tax collectors, however, figure this won't apply to many people in the below \$5,000 bracket.

Millions of the tax forms begin about the end of this month. You'll be getting yours about the same time this Christmas. The forms are available in each form will be accounted for by a do-it-yourself booklet or sheet.

About 18 million wage earners will get the 1040A punch cards, six million more than a year ago. Some and send along a payment on any \$272,000 will get the longer 1040 form. About 3.5 million forms will go to those who must file an estimate of income and pay their tax quarterly. Another 6.7 million punch cards will go to farm-ers.

Plea Rejected To Link West, Baghdad Pact

LONDON, Dec. 12 (AP)—The North Atlantic Treaty Organization will not yield to Turkish pleas for a link-up with the anti-communist Baghdad pact to protect the oil-rich Middle East from Soviet penetration. Informed sources reported today in Paris.

Turkey has expressed fear of growing Soviet influence in neighboring Syria and attached so much importance to the threat it sent Premier Adnan Menderes to the Paris NATO meeting.

Turkey is a member of both NATO and the Baghdad pact whose other members are Iran, Pakistan, Iraq and Britain. The pact was recently shaken by Britain's intervention in Egypt, and Turkey feels it needs strengthening.

Turkey, backed by the Moslem members of the Baghdad pact, still is bringing pressure on the United States to join the pact in view of the stepped up Arab campaign against the alliance.

Syrian Foreign Minister Salah Biazar described the pact as a "tool of imperialism to weaken Arab unity" and accused the member countries of plotting with Britain, France and Israel against Egypt.

Railway Express Asks Rate Hikes

BOISE, Dec. 12 (AP)—The Railway Express Agency has asked the Idaho Public Utilities Commission to authorize a four per cent increase on its rates for shipment within Idaho.

Milk, cream and related products, daily newspapers, human remains and mail traffic were excepted from the agency's request.

The agency said higher intrastate rates are intended to parallel similar boosts in interstate rates effective Dec. 17.

The application also said the increases would help offset employee wage increases amounting to \$15-20,000 throughout the nation.

Don Koorth, commission secretary, said the P.U.C. would accept proposals for 30 days following receipt of the application.

Theft Suspect Awaiting Trial

KIMBERLY, Dec. 12—Calvert O. Stanger has been bound over to Twin Falls district court to answer a charge of first degree burglary following a preliminary hearing in Kimberly before Justice of the Peace Ray F. Potter.

Stanger and Owen J. Garner appeared before Judge Potter Saturday on charges of burglarizing the Okieberry Hardware store. Murder charges were filed on the morning of Dec. 4. Garner pleaded guilty to a lesser charge, petit larceny, and was fined \$50 and 60 days. His fine was paid and he was released from custody.

Stanger appeared with his attorney, H. N. Jewell, Twin Falls, and claimed he had nothing to do with burglarizing the store and taking a cash register containing less than \$5. Judge Potter continued Blank's bond at \$10,000 that had been set Dec. 5, and he was remanded to custody of the sheriff after failing to post bond.

The two men were arrested in Rupert a few hours after Okieberry's wife reported the burglary. The cash register was dumped on Okieberry's lawn after he awoke and surprised two men carrying an object from the store. Stanger and Garner were arrested after a description of the get-away car had been broadcast.

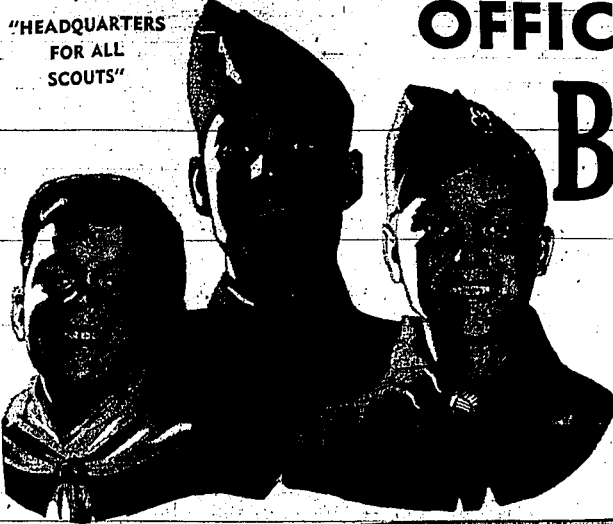
Divorce Asked
