## Pocattello Judge Is Given Appointment by Governor As Supreme Court Justice

BOISE, Dec. 22 (AP)—Dist. Judge Henry McQuade was chosen by Gov. Robert Smylie Saturday to become the youngest justice of the Idaho supreme court. Smylie picked the 41-year-old former prosecuting attorney to serve the remaining four years of the late Justice Donald Anderson's term. McQuade told the governor he expects to be able to do the robes of the state's highest court shortly after Jan. 1. Smylie said he hopes to appoint a new district judge to succeed McQuade by 31 Jan.

### Magic Valley Hobbies No. 52 Skindiver Finds Life Under Water Is Slow Motion World Full of Scenery

A Twin Falls minister has turned to what he terms the "slow motion world" underwater to provide him with diversions from his church work. The Rev. R. R. Cronk, pastor of the Twin Falls Seventh-day Adventist church, learned scuba diving from a friend while he was a pastor in Pocatello five years ago. Since that time he has pursued his hobby in both North and South America, searched for bodies of drowning victims, gone after the legendary "Payette hole" sea monster, and explored an underwater ghost town in Idaho's primitive area. "It's like being in an entirely different world," he says, referring to life underwater. "I call it a slow motion world, because everything, including the vegetable life, moves slowly and gracefully. The only exception occurs when fish become frightened. They can move pretty fast."

After a five-year tour of duty as a missionary in Brazil, the Rev. Mr. Cronk and his family moved to Pocatello, where Herbert Knight, who is now assistant fund raising secretary for the American Red Cross in San Francisco, interested him in diving. "I had always been interested in swimming," the Rev. Mr. Cronk said, "and I didn't actually believe that skindiving had much to offer that I couldn't obtain from swimming. I was never so wrong in my life."

Knight "checked him out" in the Idaho State college swimming pool and the Rev. Mr. Cronk began purchasing his skindiving equipment. During the spring of 1950, he and another man were asked to search for the body of a drowned fisherman in the Portneuf river. He reports they didn't find the body, although it turned up later

### and began in look for an aqualung.

The call is a "scuba," he said, "standing for self-contained underwater breathing apparatus. It's the same of skindiving equipment."

While attending a church summer camp for youth at McColl, the Rev. Mr. Cronk went in search of the legendary Payette lake sea monster.

"Of course, I didn't find him," he says, "but I did find the most beautiful fresh water diving site I've ever seen."

Another summer the Rev. Mr. Cronk and Knight fished streams and washed out rocks to get in an old mining town, 20 miles east of Shoshone, which had been buried by an avalanche in 1905 and later flooded.

"We had an enjoyable time exploring the old town," he reports, "but all and the rotten condition of the buildings and other items made it impossible to explore much, although I got a brass lantern as a souvenir."

The Rev. Mr. Cronk also has dived in Puget Sound, off the coast of Florida and near Natal, Brazil, when he returned to the United States in 1955 for a short visit.

He hasn't let his new interest in skindiving keep him from his first love—swimming. He has kept up his American Red Cross instructor's certificate, both in regular swimming and in teaching swimming to handicapped persons.

"I hope we can get a YMCA and swimming pool here in Twin Falls soon," he says. "I'd like to get an opportunity to teach swimming to the handicapped."

The Rev. Mr. Cronk estimates that the cost for skindiving equipment runs around \$350 or \$400 for a waterproof suit, fins, spear gun, scuba tank, depth gauge, snorkel and other items.

He has three warnings to those who are interested in taking up the sport. "The most important thing is to receive proper instructions from a qualified teacher," he says. "There is a lot more to it than just being a good swimmer."

"When coming up, he adds, the diver should rise slowly enough to decompress and avoid the bends. "For example," he points out, "if a

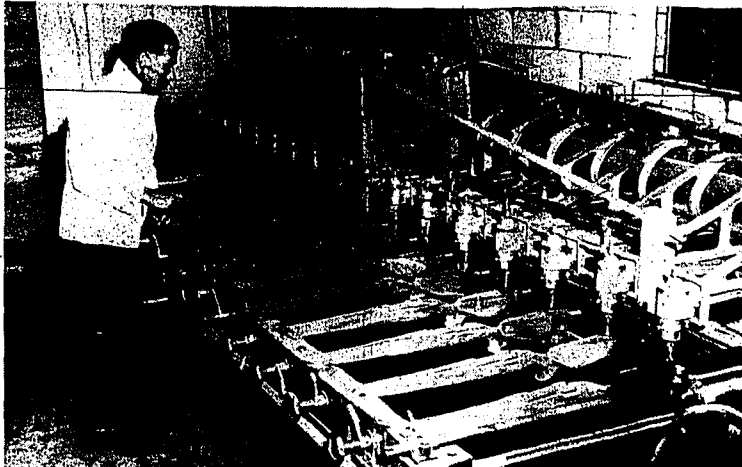

—Burrounded by a high hedge on Second avenue west is a cinderblock manufacturing plant. Most of the people living outside a block radius of the plant are unaware of the firm's product, but aptly named, every continent are familiar with Herrett's Gun Stocks.

Specializing in custom-made handgun grips, Herrett's Blocks, owned by Steve Herrett, has become a pace-setter in the world target market. This has been accomplished in three short years because Herrett has perfected machines that put out perfect jobs on an assembly line basis.

A former tool maker, Herrett began his plant 11 years ago with an idea. He was interested in guns and began thinking of ways to turn out custom-made grips, priced low enough for everyone to afford.

Up to this time, custom stocks were made by men with a whittling knife. This type of production, while eventually resulting in what the customer ordered, made the price prohibitive and took too long.

Using his spare time and money, he began working on machines that could do the job. Over the years he invented and discarded more machines than he kept. Even today, while trying to further perfect his machine, Herrett says more go on the scrap heap than stay in the shop.

Finally, after eight years he was ready. Then began the job of getting public acceptance. Herrett advertised in national gun magazines and the orders began to come in slowly at first and then snowballed. Today, the business is still growing.

The business has grown since 1935 and with it the number of employees. Herrett has eight persons working for him on an assembly line basis. Each worker handles one phase of

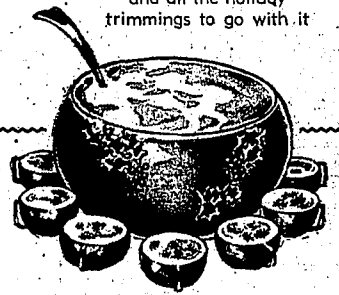

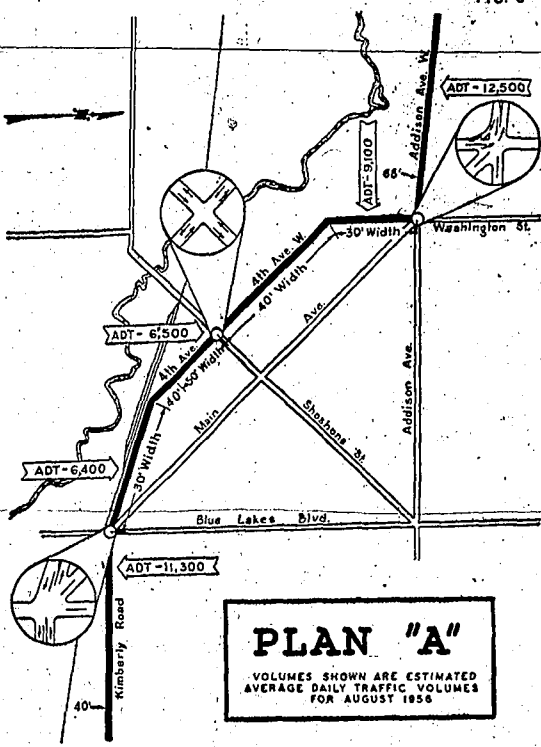

### Improvement of Present Route Is One Of Five Plans Given for Highway 30

(Editor's note: This is the first of a series of five articles outlining the five different plans proposed by the highway department for routing U. S. highway 30 through Twin Falls. Each article will include details of the plan.)

One of the five proposals submitted to the city of Twin Falls for re-routing highway 30 through the city calls for improvement of the present route.

"Designated plan 'A' by the engineer for the state highway department, it does not require a high priority rating in the five analyses by the department. The 20-page report submitted to city officials Friday by Ellis Mathes, state highway engineer, notes that 'the present routing of highway 30 within the city limits is inadequate to handle the future internal and external traffic volumes'."

The present route runs from Five Points east over Minidoka avenue to Fourth avenue south, up to Blue street east and along Fourth

to widen the three streets along the present route is estimated at \$10,000. This is based on widening 8,000 feet at the unit price of \$12.50 per foot.

The preparation of 25,000 square yards of road bed at 10 cents a square yard comes to \$2,500; construction of new curb and gutter is placed at \$20,000; surfacing the road is set at \$75,000 with the base costing \$25,000.

To properly light the entire route with mercury vapor lights on metal poles is estimated at \$10,000. This would call for 60 poles at \$500 each. Lamp sums are placed on the cost of drainage structures at \$10,000.

Editor, Times-News:—I have been interested in the writer's campaign for state revenue. It appeared that Mr. Self would make a determined effort to raise the tax line. I am sure that he would do after he has been elected. This first public statement of his intention was a tax measure. The following quote is from the Times-News:—

"Self offered a one-eighth-of-one-per cent tax on total volume of all goods and services in the state, with the exception of farm products, timber, raw materials and other new wealth."

Self noted that a tax similar to one in use in other states would add millions of dollars of previously untapped revenue to the state's income, at the same time heading the general tax base in making it more equitable."

"With this gross volume tax," he said, "these operators would have to pay on everything they sell, regardless of whether it is stored in the state or whether or not it is stored in any other state."

"In the paragraph Mr. Self admitted his tax is a version of the sales tax of the other states."

One-third of the accidents in Idaho are caused by drivers under 24 years of age, he said.





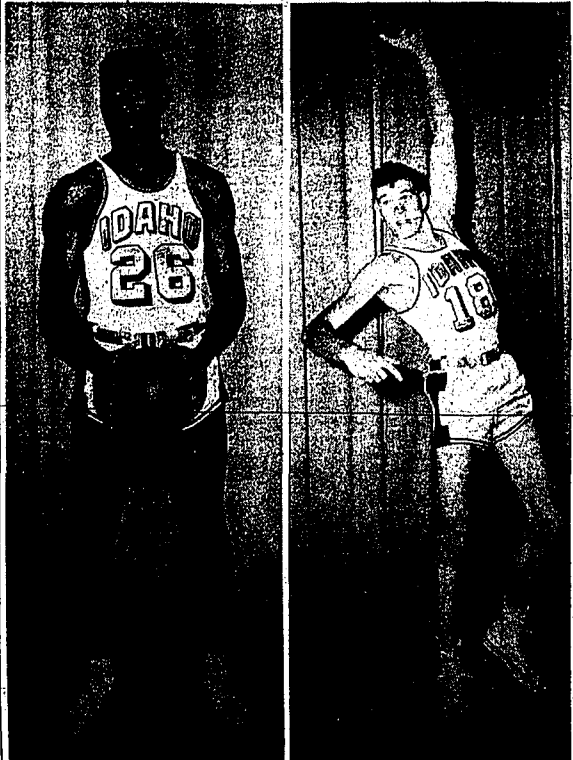

### Science Finds No Sure Cure Of Headaches

NEW YORK, Dec. 22 (AP)—A year-end review of what science knows about headaches reveals that the staff is a headache for science. You may call it a crying shame because, in the words of a scientific reviewer, "headache is possibly the most frequent complaint of modern man."

Dr. Arnold P. Friedman and Theodore J. C. von Storch found that in the last five years science has added greatly to its understanding of basic causes or to its ability to cure. But that wasn't due to any lack of effort.

They studied the reports of 117 investigations into causes and how to find and treat causes in the journal of the American Society of Neurology. Fundamental in science's present knowledge of headache is to never a disease.

**Assessment of Efforts**  
But a symptom of what? Once you have eliminated the acute illness, the flares in the body structure, the knock on the head which can do cause headaches, you have left an assortment of causes which are as quill obscure.

These fall into two classifications: the migraine and the tension headaches which are, by far, the most common kinds. The review of scientific investigations in general agreement that "the vast majority" of tension headaches had their origin in the disturbed, but hidden, emotions of the victims rather than in their physical bodies.

But a symptom of what? "Although it is difficult to verify that in many of these patients the primary etiology (cause) is psychogenic (originating in the mind) the importance of psychological factors in the headache problem cannot be minimized."

**Patients Differ**  
The trouble here is that these psychological factors can be different from patient to patient. The doctors remarked: "Not all patients with migraines are compulsive, perfectionists, or rigid... repressed hostility is an extremely common factor among many persons who do not have migraines and may have hypertension, ulcers..."

In tension headaches, they found "the fundamental, psychic factors were largely unconscious, although most patients were aware of their anxiety. As in migraines, the most frequently observed conflicts—in cases of tension headaches, were those over hostile impulses. These patients demonstrated aggression, hostility, and an intense resentment against members of their families or persons who represent family figures."

Although the treatment of migraines has been tried, they found that most investigators still found a certain "treatment" the "most useful." But mind-treatment "may be of great value in reducing the intensity and number of migraines attacks in most patients." That is even more true for tension headaches, they added.

### Setting up New State Is Not New Idea But Actual Practice Is Very Difficult

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Setting up a new tax-free state of "Kansaska" in the mountains of north California, as California's chief said today, is no new idea.

The idea originated with residents of the remote and thinly populated area who protest that southerners in control of the state legislature are treating the region like a colony. They want their eight counties to secede from California and establish a sixth state of Kansas. There would be no income or sales taxes and all revenues would come from land taxes.

Such dreams are not new. New states have been proposed by secessionists before—but accomplished only once. That was when West Virginia split off from Virginia in the turmoil of the Civil War period.

During the 1920s, California probably will stay in one piece.

Under the U. S. Constitution a new state can't be formed out of an old one unless congress and the state legislature approve. There apparently isn't any way to bypass this restriction.

In the case of West Virginia the circumstances were unusual. A convention appointed by the Virginia legislature in Richmond voted party in 1862 to secede and join the confederacy. The issue was put up to the voters.

But before the vote could be cast the governor jumped the gun and joined arms with the rebels. This gave secessionists in the western part of the state an excuse to set up their own government of "Kanawha" in protest.

President Abraham Lincoln recognized the new government and it was permitted to send senators to the U. S. congress. Later, congress approved the creation of the state of West Virginia, and Lincoln proclaimed its existence on April 20, 1863.

**Northwest Native Assumes Position**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—The interstate commerce commission has announced the election of Commissioner Owen Clark as its chairman for the calendar year 1937.

Under the anti-trust system Clark, a Washington state Republican, will succeed the present chairman, Anthony P. Ryan, Connecticut.

Clark, 43, one-time chairman of the Washington state public service commission, was appointed to ICC by President Eisenhower in 1933. He took his oath July 10 of that year to his post as an unexpired term of William J. Patterson, North Dakota independent, a term which ends Dec. 31, 1936.

The new chairman is a native of St. Maries, Ida. He received his early education in the public schools of Yakima, Wash., attended Yakima Valley Junior college and obtained his law degree from University of Washington in 1923.

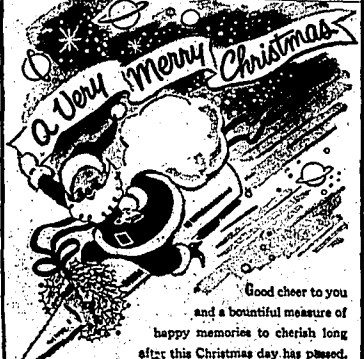

### Army's Files Still Record Camel Corps

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Except in the circus, the camel hasn't done as much good as it has done in the army's files. The army wants us to know that this is the 100th anniversary of the army camel corps, which first used the brute with the hump didn't last long, militarily. In fact the low-leaved creature which doesn't need watering had only a short dry run.

It was back in 1856 when a platoon of the club-footed hunchbacks was employed to lug the army's gear across the arid mountains and deserts of the woolly west.

Sum Olayed

Jefferson Davis was the secretary of war. He rushed through a bill which congress finally adopted, calling for the colossal sum of \$30,000 to pick up a bunch of camels. But the idea was to push the mule back in front of the plow where mules belonged.

Seventy-five camels were bought in from Asia Minor and Africa at about \$50 a hump. They were sent to Camp Verde, a spit and a holler from San Antonio.

To their credit, the working water tanks did a fine job for a time. For one thing, the camels helped open up new routes from the Gulf to the Pacific.

But after a while the army men began to complain that these pack animals smelled to high heaven. Not only that, they said, the humpers scared the heck out of small children and horses broke loose from their leazes.

And even worse, the camels turned up stubborn and refused to move a foot from the center of a mountain trail—even with a fire built under.

During the war between the states things didn't get any better.

Slush Swamps

Camels sloshed through the swamps from camp to camp. Some of them perished while sloshing.

In 1856, the army auctioned off one group of humpers at something like \$15 a hump to Stielzel Woodcock. This fellow peddled five of the animals to a circus.

Feeling like a man who had made a bad investment, Woodcock swatted the rest of the "humpers" on the rump and sent it skidding. Later, he thought better of it and rounded it up for a "camel caravan" between Laredo, Tex., to Mexico City.

Then came the robbers. They stole most of the rest.

Some Escaped

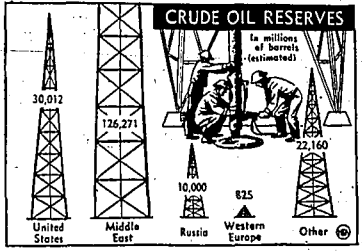
But some of the camels escaped. Many lived to a ripe old age, as camels go, and wound up in menageries. They were considered to be "army veterans."

If there is any moral to this tale, it's this advice from the army new service:

"Next time you see a camel, you might salute. Could be it's a descendant—return of the Civil war."

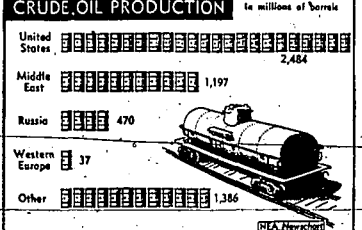

### Smog-Hounds Nip at Pollution But U. S. Job Is Only Starting

CINCINNATI, O., Dec. 22 (AP)—"Smog-hounds" are snapping at the heels of America's climate gray with air pollution.

But the hunt is far from over. Arthur C. Stern, chief of the nation's community air pollution program, says "the problem is growing as fast as our increased attention to it. We are just keeping up."

Los Angeles remains the hardest-hit victim of this smog-fog. But New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Detroit, Boston, San Francisco, Pittsburgh, Cleveland and dozens of other cities report new trouble.

The "smog-hounds" waging the battle against smog are dozens of doctors and technicians from health agencies who have joined the burgeoning national air sampling network.

"They measure the gill, gases and grime that humans pour into the earth's atmosphere. They freeze; heat; boil; dissolve; distill; filter; which splits and test samples for radioactivity.

Some scientists believe there is a direct relationship between these polluted substances breathed by millions of Americans and various diseases which attack the respiratory system, including cancer of the lung.

"The U. S. public health service hopes to have 100 air sampling stations on the job next month. The aim is for at least one sampling station in all metropolitan centers and each of the 48 states. Some stations will be set up to test the air over deserts, mountains, forests and farms.

The service recently cooperated with Connecticut and Washington on statewide surveys, and a similar one is under way in Tennessee. The major local area survey is a \$175,000 federal-state-county-city project in Louisville, Ky.

Stern—the job of analyzing air pollution—the first step in eliminating it—is more difficult today than ever. Detection equipment is more costly. And in contrast to the days when coal was the chief fuel, 70 per cent of the nation's energy and heating now come from gaseous and liquid fuels now.

Government scientists and auto manufacturers already are deep into the problem of how to reduce carbon monoxide from cars. The results are being submitted to the house of representatives small business committee, which asked for a report.

Stern reported "spectacular" results in removing solid particles from air wastes, especially in the urban cruises. The dock strike, which upset sailing schedules, forced others to turn toward Florida.

### Missiles Test Is Conducted Under Wraps

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Military officials continue to cloak their missile test operations with the greatest secrecy—although the test center on Florida's populous east coast is open to public view from an observation gallery.

The Pentagon officials declined to acknowledge such a test was conducted.

Notice Refused  
The defense department refused to permit advance notice of the recent test firing of a standard Viking rocket similar to the first-stage engine planned for launching the projected earth satellite.

Newsmen, in requesting permission to go to the base for the test, were told that the satellite project, a purely military effort, would not be encumbered by military security. The explanation for the refusal was that other military test equipment was on the base.

Reach Is Open  
The missile test center is heavily guarded on land by fences and sentry posts. But most of the area is in plain sight from a beach across a narrow strip of water. And civilian-operated boats are free to sail close to shore, where launching equipment and missiles are in easy camera range.

Security officials say the test site is supposed to be a "closed" area without preliminary publicity. But for safety reasons, boats and aircraft are warned away from the launching area and down-range path several hours before firings—an unusual invitation to sightseers.

### Indian Envoy Will Visit Red Satellite Chief

VIENNA, Dec. 22 (AP)—Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru has sent an envoy to Budapest for the third time apparently in hopes of persuading the Hungarian Communist regime to speed broadening of the government. It was reported here today.

Diplomatic sources said J. V. Khosla, Indian ambassador to Czechoslovakia, will confer with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and other Hungarian red leaders before the end of the week.

Khosla arrived in the Hungarian capital from Prague yesterday. It is his third visit since the freedom revolt against the communist masters of Hungary erupted eight weeks ago. The sources said Khosla will sound out the Hungarian communist leaders on widely-circulated reports that Khrushchev intended to widen the government by including pro-communist non-communist Hungarians.

Sources in Budapest were reported to regard Indian interest in the Hungarian problem as highly significant. They considered it possible Nehru may come up with a compromise aimed at solving the crisis which would prove acceptable to the Hungarian people and the communists.

### Bride's Aid

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 22 (AP)—A Pennsylvania firm says it has developed a new electric appliance that literally burns up odors and makes it impossible for your nose to tell what's cooking in the kitchen.

The device, as described by Oxy-Odeurizer, Inc., Wayne, Pa., is a small, electrically heated wire catalyst fitted into the center of a 10-inch diameter aluminum tube.

### Deep South's 'Integration' Noted Distant

The third anniversary of the Supreme Court school integration decision is less than six months away, but any meaningful implementation of the decision in the Deep South appears at least as distant today as it did in May, 1954.

Most of the "integration" activity in the Deep South is limited to desegregation of some public buildings, generally believed to be a half-year ago. The decision is virtually the end of a long ideological war.

There are most extremists on both sides, as well as more moderate observers, agree upon now is that the decision represented a major victory but no ultimate triumph. Ahead lies many a year of anti-integration law suits, campaigns and extrajudicial resistance on state and community levels.

There is little likelihood that 1957 will witness any real integration in the states which would be most affected—in terms of population. Those states are Mississippi, Alabama, Virginia, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Louisiana and Florida.

Here and there a few Negro children may gain entry into the schools. They will have had to make their way through a mass of legal obstacles, created by legislative action, and such other and no less effective barriers as economic pressure or intimidation by organized or spontaneous white groups.

Confronted with this resistance, the Negroes of the Deep South will probably again concern themselves primarily with getting Negro voters on the rolls as their best weapon in the quest for equal civil rights.

# World Production of Crops, Livestock Keeps Pace With Growing Population

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—The agriculture department said today that world production of crops and livestock is keeping pace with expanding population.

The department's report said world production this season rose to a new high of 120 per cent of the prewar (1925-29) level. The percentage was 118 in 1955-56 and 116 in 1954-55. For the free world alone, percentages were 126 in 1955-57, 125 in 1954-56, and 122 in 1953-55.

On a per capita basis, based on the rising world population, production of the free world is holding steady at 97 per cent of prewar for the third consecutive year. Free world per capita production is 100 per cent of prewar, and the communist area output is 81 per cent.

The communist bloc output rose two per cent from the level maintained during the two preceding seasons. A sharp increase in the Soviet Union and a moderate rise in mainland China more than offset declines in the eastern European satellites.

Free world production was slightly below 1955-56 largely because of slight declines in western Europe and Australia.

The department said outstanding features of global agricultural production this season are:

1. Record crops of rice, corn, sugar, and tobacco.
2. A generally high European production despite last winter's freeze.
3. A 10 per cent increase in total Russian production resulting from favorable weather in newly developed areas east of the Volga and Ural.
4. Record stocks of some of the more staple products, wheat, corn, cotton, and tobacco, were carried over into the current marketing year and sub-

### New Advance Expected for Cancer Cures

Among the more fervent prayers for 1957, the world will include one for the cancer cure.

In modern countries like the United States, cancer comes to one of every three families and kills one in six of us.

Hopefully, it can be reported that the cancer cure is now here for many who will have the disease this year.

One in three cancer patients now are being saved—they are saved by a surgery or radiation or both. Only a few years ago, the figure was one in four.

One can predict with certainty that further advances toward cancer control will be made during the coming year. At long last, research is producing more general success than ever before, and along the massive front, from studies of cell chemistry to the treatment of patients, steady progress is being made.

Few if any responsible scientists expect that 1957 or any other year will produce a single drug which will cure all cancers. There is a growing likelihood, however, that eventually—and no one can say when—a variety of drugs will be developed which may cure many of the cancers that now resist radiation or are too far advanced for surgery.

Science in recent years has developed about a half-dozen drugs which will cure certain types of cancers in laboratory animals. One big hope is that some drug-molecule assembly might be chemists' laboratories will begin to cure human cancers. So far drugs have given substantial help to patients, but none has permanently cured human cancer.

Beyond the field of drug treatment—or chemotherapy—is several avenues of lively research promise. They include:

Biochemistry—which is revealing differences in the chemical chemistry of cancer and normal cells and suggesting new ways of treatment.

Endocrinology—which has shown

CHICAGO, Dec. 21 (AP)—Strength and surprise are the key elements in the defense against the holiday highways during the holiday season. The top targets are speeders and drunks.

Those points were brought out today by the Associated Press survey of plans drafted in many states to curb motor vehicle accidents during the Christmas and New Year periods.

Officials don't want to experience another yuletide like last year's when fatalities hit a 200-a-day clip in the United States.

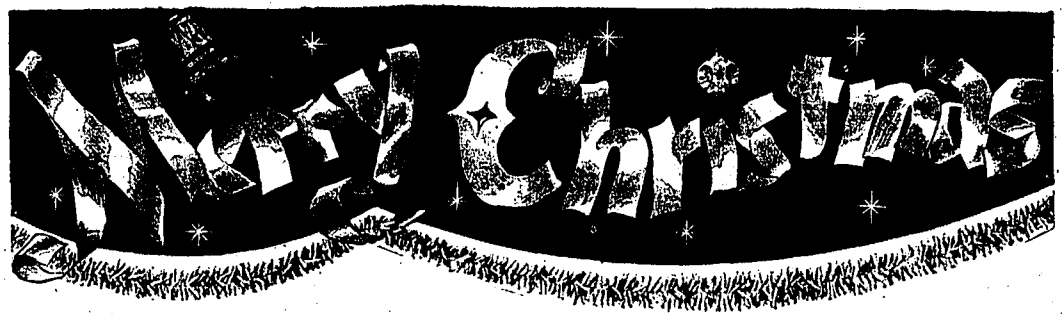

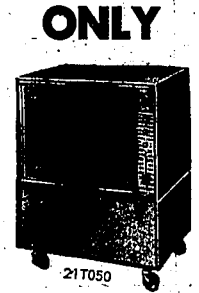

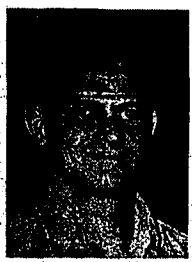

### Roundup Set On Rabbits in Drought Area

LONGA, Kan., Dec. 22 (AP)—The Kansas jackrabbits which poke their heads above the prairie will wish they hadn't.

Irrigated farmers are organizing "rabbit roundups" against the fast-multiplying creatures who are nibbling at a precious wheat crop already decimated by the great drought.

Don Christy, a Scott City farmer and veteran of the old "dust bowl" days, reports that the Modoc Gun club in western Kansas recently deployed members with clubs across the fields and killed 800 rabbits.

Reminder of '36

On a lesser scale, it is a reminder of the "dirty thirties," when farmers with clubs, forming circles up to 30 miles across, killed 25,000 rabbits in a day.

In those dreary depression days, farmers loaded the carcasses on freight trains and shipped them east for relief. The long-legged jackrabbits are a very edible—not as strong as ducks but weighing about 10 pounds and dresses about half that.

Today's problem is that the jackrabbits have multiplied in the few green areas, mostly irrigated farms, which have escaped the five-year dry spell.

May Be Increased

Rabbit drives have been reported in Finney, Meade and Scott counties. They are expected to increase the farmer's desperate battle to hold the line until the rains come. The rabbits seem to multiply faster in dry years. In wet years many of the young drive men are the sons of the old drive men.

The jackrabbits are only a side effect of the drought which followed the big flood of 1937. Four major rivers and streams halted their flows last summer to the point where members of the Wichita Motorcycle club bounced 25 miles up the dry bed of the once-beautiful Arkansas river.

### Atomic Industry Meets Growing Russ And English Challenges During 1957

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—The atomic industry is speeding up to meet a double challenge—Russian and British threats to U. S. leadership, and the possible entry of the government into A-power production.

In spite of solid progress in 1956, the year raised crucial questions which 1957 may resolve: Is the private nuclear power industry going fast enough? Or should the government build atom-fueled electric plants with the taxpayer's money?

Republicans argued the latter proposal, advanced by Democrats in the 84th congress, but the battle raged on through the election campaign. Democrats accused the administration of a policy of "drift" and Republicans accused Democrats of promoting "socialized power."

But as the campaign oratory died away, there were some signs that the Democrats commanding capital hill, the Republicans in charge downtown, and at least a part of the industry itself, were about ready to seek a compromise in the congress.

The shape of the possible compromise was not clear, but it called for more government aid but a significant extension of the public power program.

As 1956 ended the privately owned electric utilities were launching a campaign to speed up the private construction of power reactors. The industry hoped this would help persuade congress and the public that government intervention is not needed.

### Drugs Trade Is Red Boon, Expert Avers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—A California attorney has estimated that U.S. drug addicts pay \$7,737,000,000 a year to a "world crime syndicate" for heroin, much of which comes from Red China.

This estimate came from Robert A. Neeb Jr., Beverly Hills, Calif., chairman of the Southern California committee set up to advise the state attorney general on crime prevention.

Neeb discussed ways of dealing with drug addiction in a statement prepared for the senate judiciary subcommittee on juvenile delinquency.

He said that one out of four California crimes are traced directly or indirectly to narcotics and that crimes of drug addicts cost the people of that state 100 million dollars a year, including law enforcement costs. The bill for the whole country, he said, must be staggering.

Neeb said the average heroin addict spends \$50 a day on the drug, maintaining 100 thousand addicts in the nation, he put their outlay at \$2,750,000,000 a year "to support the world crime syndicate."

"The Mexican border and our west coast ports and airfields are 'highways' for the narcotic traffic into this country," he said.

He said the most deadly of the drugs, almost pure heroin, comes to the west coast from Communist China.

"It is well known that heroin of almost pure strength comes a principal export of the communists from Red China, that the manufacture



### Better Times For Farmers Seen in 1957

By EZRA TAFT BENSON

Better times are ahead for American farmers.

Net farm income rose slightly in 1956 after a long downward slide. The prospect is for further increase in 1957.

Prices received by farmers, now running ahead of a year ago, are expected to average higher in 1957 than in 1956.

During this present marketing year, surplus stocks of cotton, rice and wheat are being reduced. We appear to have passed the peak of government holdings of farm products.

Total farm output in 1956 was a record high. With the soil bank in full swing next year, this volume should come down.

The foreign market look nearly a sixth more farm products in 1956-57 marketing years. A record export volume is in prospect for 1956-57.

Population continues to grow. Consumer incomes are expected to rise during the coming year. The domestic market for farm products is expected to be strong in the year ahead.

Prices of articles farmers buy may creep up somewhat during 1957, but with acreage reductions under the soil bank program, total production costs may change little. Total receipts are expected to rise and result in an increase in net income. Selling prices are expected to average higher than in 1956. Cattle slaughter for any product will be the same as in 1956, with no marked price change expected.

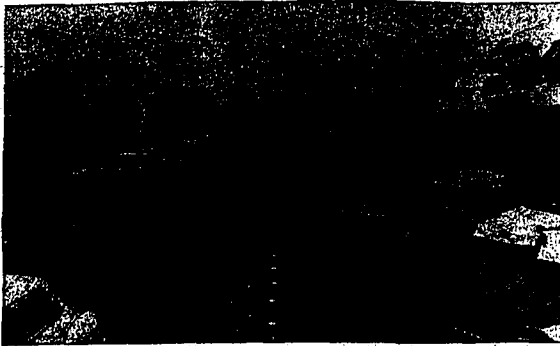
Milk production will probably go up, and cash receipts from dairy products are expected to increase moderately.

Poultry production is likely to be at record levels. With the exception of broilers, prices of these products are likely to average a little lower than in 1956.

Food supplies will be abundant everywhere except in the drought areas. Prices this winter should average a little above 1955.

The outlook for farm people, while not as rosy as we would like to see, is nevertheless encouraging. Prices have risen. Surpluses are declining. Markets are expanding some and abroad, they are moving in the direction of a prosperous, expanding and free agriculture.

# Most Economists See More Creeping Inflation Through Nation During '57

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Further creeping inflation in 1957 is predicted by most Washington economists.

Prices, which "look off" last May on a six-month spurt but carried living cost up 24 per cent, are believed likely to continue creeping but generally upward during 1957, some economists say.

President Eisenhower has declared the trend "must be stopped." The idea of stopping it, in the expressed view of the new chairman of the president's council of economic advisers, Raymond J. Saulnier, may be the leading problem for us over the next year.

Moreover, the Euro crisis draped in question mark over all the forecasts. There have been no scarce buying or hoarding panics but the lid could come off if the United States became a participant, instead of an interested bystander, in an actual or threatened shoring-up war.

The Middle East crisis therefore stirred speculation whether the administration might reverse, its stand against steadily rising price-wage controls. The answer, from the chief of defense mobilization spokesmen: "There is no present indication we will ask congress for control powers, although it is possible."

Barring new crises, there is general agreement among observers, congressional and institutional economists here that the price trend will be a badge, not a break-through, some believe the over-all rise in 1957 will not exceed two and 2/3 per cent.

But the trend embraced the Eisenhower administration during the election campaign and continues to do so, for the "businessman's stability" has made economic life set out in 1953 to prove that economic growth and high employment can be achieved without inflation.

For three years it seemed to be winning. The price averages varied no more than a point or two, up or down. Then, last May, the consumer price index took a surprising jump to match the old all-time high of October, 1952. It hasn't stopped yet.

In November, most of the Federal Reserve chart-watchers dropped their earlier forecast that the index shortly would "level off." As the new year approached, the consensus of the top-quotations agencies was:

1. The rise may accelerate slightly, rather than slow down, in the winter months.

2. Food prices, representing 30 per cent of the index no longer can be counted on to cancel out the rising

# Prelate Gives Unusual Blow For New Film

NEW YORK, Dec. 22 (AP)—Francis Cardinal Spellman, in an unprecedented attack on a motion picture from the pulpit of St. Patrick's cathedral, has exhorted Catholics not to see "Baby Doll" under the "pain of sin."

The cardinal-archbishop of New York underlined the gravity of his condemnation by delivering it in person from the pulpit, midway through a solemn mass at which he was presiding.

"The revolting theme of this picture," he said, "and the brazen advertising promoting it, constitute a contemptuous defiance of the natural law, the observance of which has been the source of strength in our national life. It is astonishing and deplorable that such an immoral motion picture has received a certificate of approval under the so-called self-regulatory system of the Motion Picture Association of America."

The Catholic Legion of Decency had condemned the "Fanny Hill" Williams story as "morally repellent" and accused it of "carnal suggestiveness and unmitigated emphasis on lust."

It was the first time the Legion, Roman Catholic film reviewing organization, had given a "C" condemned rating to a motion picture which had received the Motion Picture Association's production code seal of approval.

The cardinal's statement marked

the first time he has personally condemned a motion picture from the pulpit. He previously denounced two other films, "The Moon is Blue" and "The Miracle" but in pastoral letters to all parishes in the New York archdiocese. The last time he spoke from the pulpit was in February, 1949, when he attacked the communitas for impersonating Josef Cardinal Mindszenty of Hungary.

# Prosperity in 1957 Is Seen By Executive

The automotive industry will be in a steadily expanding national economy during 1957, providing, of course, that world peace can be maintained.

Our industry should produce and sell approximately 6.2 million automobiles and 500,000 trucks, this is about 10 per cent more for passenger cars. Total production, including trucks and vans, to other markets, should approximate 8.3 million cars and trucks.

This market growth will be in line with a further upward trend in general business activity. Our national gross product for 1957 should be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$48 billion, with domestic income reaching possibly \$30 billion against \$27 billion in 1956.

We also look forward to another year of substantially full employment. On this basis, and with a prevailing confidence in our economy, personal consumption expenditures should continue to increase from current levels.

Although it has been historically even that prosperity and progress is not based on war peak or peak and defense expenditures, we can look forward to somewhat higher spending in that area, too. This will be in the neighborhood of \$10 billion. Other government spending—federal, state and local—also will rise some.
