400 Motorists Die As Holiday Death Toll Leaps in U.S.

The death toll on the nation's highways soared past the 400-mark today and climbed toward a new Christmas day record. The National Safety Council said the toll was running ahead of estimates and it was "increasingly evident" the council's forecast of 660 dead would be exceeded. 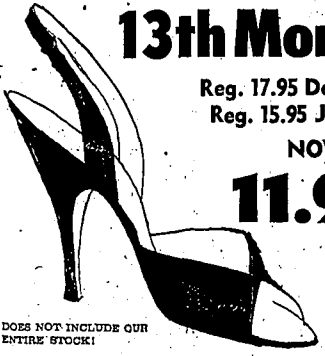

CARACAS, Venezuela (UPI)—Since half of the profits of oil companies operating here go to the government, this country stands to cash in handsomely on supplies more oil to western Europe.

The largest oil field in the western hemisphere and under Lugo Maracibo in western Venezuela. On a worldwide basis, it is rated second only to Kuwait.

On the map, Venezuela is in a favorable position to meet Europe's present oil shortage crisis.

As Harold W. Haight, president of Occidental Petroleum corporation, explains it, his oilfield here, Venezuela's production is not expanding any faster than the regular demands of its regular, established customers.

With the opening next year of new pipelines from Venezuela's interior to the Caribbean coast, and this year's new pipeline to the Gulf of Mexico.

When the allocations of western hemisphere oil are finally figured out to supply Europe's shortage, however, it is estimated that the rest of the world's Venezuela can be counted on will be an extra 50,000 barrels a day.

The real bottleneck is not production, however, as Mr. Haight points out, but a shortage of tankers.

Oil shipments from the Middle East to the United States and Canada will be cut down. Much of the increased U. S. production will move to the U. S. Gulf.

This will also make it possible for some of the Venezuelan production that would normally come to the U. S. to be sent to Europe.

Tankers from the Middle East, making the trip to Europe around Africa, will return by way of Venezuela. There they will pick up the oil from the pending markets in Brazil and Argentina.

Only by this complicated retooling of tanker schedules can western hemisphere producing companies keep their regular customers supplied and everybody reasonably happy.

Biggest producer in Venezuela is Occidental, a Standard of New Jersey subsidiary. It produces in near one billion barrels of oil over 25 billion dollars investment in Venezuela is perhaps the largest single American private-capital foreign investment.

Second largest producer here is Shell, with 725,000 barrels a day. With refineries on Curacao and Aruba, Shell's production normally gets to the Gulf of Mexico and it will step up deliveries there to the United States.

Next in size are Mens Grandis, a Gulf subsidiary with 500,000 barrels a day, and Sonny Mobil with over 100,000. The other producers are smaller, but up to a balance of 600,000 barrels a day.

Companies that have obtained additional concessions here are Shell, Esso, and Gulf. A new company being organized in Washington.

Proposals and taxes paid to the Venezuelan government from oil resources will this year come close to a billion dollars.

AND ANOTHER THING

It's evident that light footed Eisenhower and India's Prime Minister Nehru, as men of good will have discovered in recent extended conversations that they share a common interest in the world situation, such as the eventual triumph of righteousness.

Mr. Nehru has contributed an expression of his opinion that Red China against the United States to the effect that it should be hard for the United States and Russia to get together if only there could be somehow created an atmosphere of "mutual trust."

In all this, though, nothing much has been changed. Mr. Nehru has demonstrated he is an affable tough. Perhaps he has contributed somewhat to putting India in a rather better light than it has some times had in this country generally.

Mr. Nehru's statement is typical of what we regard as a serious defect in state department methods and tendencies to be corrected. It is going to be done. Two provisions come readily to mind. First, "Silence is golden." Second, "Don't let the devil see much of your mind."—Salt Lake Tribune.

TOO MUCH CRAVING

In accepting Russia's challenge to debate alleged American interference in Iran, certain countries, U. S. Ambassador James J. Wadsworth told the United Nations that Moscow "will regret" this move.

The expectation, of course, is that once the subject taken by the U. N. and the Soviet Union it will be possible to expose the full extent of Soviet terror in Hungary. We hope that this proves to be the case. But Mr. Wadsworth and his colleagues in the foreign policy should not forget that the Soviet leaders are skilled in turning an international debate into a medium for propaganda. It is clear that Moscow is willing to risk having the Hungarian story told again in order to exploit its own charges that the United States has interfered in Hungary.

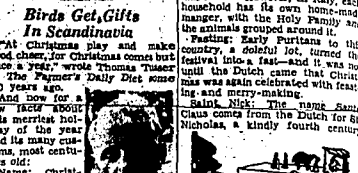

Nehru Begins English Visit, Eden Parleys

LONDON, Dec. 24 (AP)—Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru flew here today from Ottawa for talks with Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden on commonwealth relations which were badly strained by the Anglo-French invasion of Egypt.

The British action in the Suez canal crisis was condemned by India and it was believed Nehru would ask Eden for closer consultations in the future in hopes of closer commonwealth actions in meeting world crises.

"I think this Christmas season more particularly should enthruse us to think in terms of peace and settling our problems in a peaceful way," Nehru told reporters at the London airport.

"I do think there are indications and hopeful signs that we can work that way in spite of all the difficulties we have had to face."

Nehru was smiling and wearing a red rose in his scarf as he arrived with his daughter, Mrs. Indira Gandhi. He was met by Peter Freuchen, president of the board of trade; Indian Minister V. K. Krishna Menon; and Mrs. Vijaya Lakshmi Pandit, Nehru's sister and Indian ambassador to Britain.

The British press, which gave extensive coverage of Nehru's visit with President Eisenhower and his talks with Canadian leaders, was filled today with Christmas items. Newspapers devoted only a paragraph or two to Nehru's arrival.

Yankee Newsmen Will Visit in China

HONG KONG, Dec. 24 (AP)—American newsmen William Worthington and a state department ban today and boarded a train for Communist China immediately upon his arrival from the United States.

Worthington, who said he was a correspondent of the Afro-American Weekly News magazine published in Baltimore, told newsmen he was going to China for a month's tour. He said if the state department tries to take action after he comes out he is willing to make himself a test case.

The Chinese Communist government recently issued entrance visas to a number of American newsmen but they decided not to go to Peking because of strong state department pressure, and disapproval by President Eisenhower.

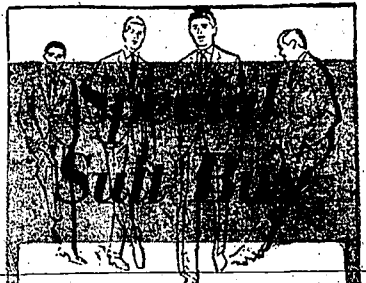

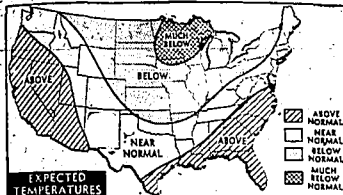

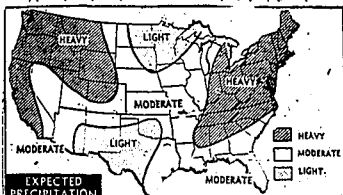

Safety Council Urges Healthy Respect Of Darkness When You're Driving Car

CHICAGO, Dec. 24.—Atraid of the dark? You need not be afraid, of course, the National Safety Council says. But you should have a healthy respect for the dark if you are driving a car. The reason is simple—you must see danger to avoid it.

The council offers the following suggestions to help reduce night driving accidents: 1. Slow down. Don't regulate your speed by posted limits alone. 2. Be alert. Keep a constant watch for pedestrians and for vehicles with dim lights or no lights at all.

3. Use headlights properly. Use upper beam only on rural highways when no approaching car is within 1,000 feet. Use lower beam when on city streets.

4. Don't wear tinted glasses at night. The advantage they offer in reducing glare is more than offset by the dangerously reduced vision.

5. Avoid alcohol. It impairs your judgment and reflexes.

6. Don't drink and drive. It is the most deadly time of the year, 75 per cent of the fatal accidents happened during the dark hours of 5 p.m. and 7 a.m.

7. Back the attack on traffic accidents' campaign, launched this month and continuing through 1957, will emphasize night driving hazards. Emphasis also will be on speed, drinking drivers and pedestrians, and pedestrian hazards, all of which increase the Christmas holiday toll, the council said.

The "back the attack" campaign, instituted because of the emergency traffic situation, seeks to encourage stepped-up enforcement by public officials, and to stimulate acceptance of enforcement by citizens.

Halt Promised In Boosts for Cost of Living

NEW YORK, Dec. 24 (AP)—For consumers Santa Claus is bringing tonight the promise of a two-month halt in the rise of the cost of living. For many industrial workers he is bringing the cessation of higher wage scales. He is putting the brakes on the stockpiles of the railroads, steel mills, producers of industrial materials.

For many factories the benign spirit offers the prospect of full production for several months more. For wage earners in general he is bringing the cessation of higher wage scales. For merchants he has a sack of wheat if more sober minded customers.

If some of these things—like rising wages and higher prices but a steady cost of living—seem contradictory, remember it's Christmas and the government statisticians and credit executives take the most pleasant view possible.

The commissioner of the bureau of labor statistics thinks living costs should hold steady through February and maybe dip a little because of upcoming clothing sales. As a whole they never were higher than at present.

His lay on the ground, groggy, until the last car passed past.

tion for construction license for Pleasant Valley and Mountain Sheep dams appeared mystified.

A group of these officials conferred with Seton last week and left saying privately they hadn't the slightest idea as to what the secretary thought or knew about the report.

Seton is not expected to announce his view for or against a high Pleasant Valley dam. An interior department official believes the secretary is more likely to confine any announcement to whether or not a further study should be made.

The official said Seton has on his desk a "preliminary" report and not a detailed report on which a construction recommendation could be made.

If Seton decides a federal dam should be more fully investigated, he may ask the FPC to hold a hearing on PNR's license application pending further study.

The FPC hearing ended Wednesday. It is believed the case could be reopened if new, important and pertinent evidence were offered.

An attorney has expressed doubt that the commission would seriously consider a proposal for a dam which would preclude the construction of one the commission has already licensed.

Idaho Power won a license, following a long hearing, for dams at the canyon, Oxbow and Browner. Hells canyon is third on the company's construction schedule.

The interior department under the Truman administration intervened at the hearing against Idaho Power, advocating a high license for Hells canyon dam. The department's opposition was withdrawn by President Eisenhower's first secretary of the interior, Douglas McKay. McKay said the issue should be decided by the commission.

Any bill to authorize a federal Pleasant Valley dam would face opposition from some public power advocates.

The National Hells Canyon association, which opposed dam-building proposals of Idaho Power and PNR, is against any Pleasant Valley project because it would block proposed construction of a considerably higher dam at Hot Pools. The project, these groups favor for the section of the Snake under discussion.

There has been speculation that the administration may recommend construction of a high Pleasant Valley project, jointly by the government and the private power companies. PNR officials, however, have stated no interest in such a partnership possibility.

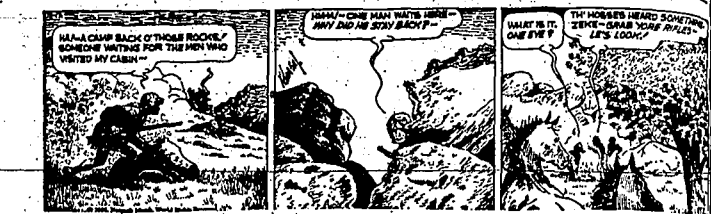

Highway Department Suggests Main as One of Five Possible Routes for U.S. 30

As an alternate to the present route of Highway 30 through Twin Falls, the state department of transportation suggests re-routing the highway along Main Avenue.

The plan "B" is one of five routes submitted to city officials last week by Matt Matias, state highway engineer.

Should the plan be adopted by the commission the resulting traffic volume on Main Avenue would require several improvements in the existing system, it was pointed out. One of the major changes would be elimination of parking in the business district of Main Avenue.

The current route followed by Highway 30 through the city from the Pine Point east to Main Avenue is along Main Avenue, then along Washington Street, then along Main Avenue, then Pine Point west to Washington Street, then along Main Avenue, then Pine Point west to Addison Avenue west to Main Avenue.

The feasibility of plan "B" is not supported in the conclusions reached by the highway department engineers.

The report and conclusions point out "the removal of parking in the business area would increase the capacity of Main Avenue... however, the gains would be offset by the need for a third signal phase to accommodate left turns at critical intersections."

The addition of a third phase would also reduce the capacity of Main Avenue at Main Avenue intersections. With the improvements indicated, it is estimated the intersection of Main Avenue and Shoshone Street would reach capacity by 1965.

It was further noted that further widening of Main Avenue in the business district is impractical because of the high right-of-way costs.

The estimated initial cost of improvements along Main Avenue has been set at \$240,000 by the department. This includes an estimate of providing an additional 500 parking spaces within two blocks of Main Avenue.

Should the city decide to adopt plan "B" the cost of the improvements as listed in the department report is high compared to the benefits to be derived from the plan.

To accommodate two-way traffic on Main Avenue, the department designates Main Avenue as a one-way street.

Left-turn lanes would be required. They are prohibited now.

To provide for this turning movement, left-turn lanes, three-phase traffic signals and restricted parking would be needed.

The report says additional left-turn lanes would be desirable on Main Avenue at the intersection with Second Street south and east, and Second Street west and north.

Other difficulties faced by such a plan are that Main Avenue narrows from 60 feet in width to 52 feet in width at each end. The 60-foot width is four feet less than the width recommended for four lanes with parking without provision for left turn maneuvers.

Production of New Weapons Begins in U.S.

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 24 (AP)—The Boeing airplane company will soon go into full production of a sub-sonic BOMARC missile, midget and midget on its electronic mind.

It is the M-66 "Bomarc" guided missile designed to open a new concept of defense for America.

The air force, which considers the vital activities of Bomarc are of its top military secrets, describes the new missile tersely as "A supersonic, jet-powered interceptor, capable of seeking out and destroying enemy aircraft at a considerable distance from the target."

This says a lot in a few words. It means that the age of "area defense" is about to be ushered in, supplementing the present "point defense" concept.

Point defense, as exemplified by conventional anti-aircraft like the now-familiar short-range "Nike" missiles, is composed of a ring of weapons surrounding a target area.

Area defense, on the other hand, employs missiles such as Bomarc which can go out and meet the enemy and destroy him before he can penetrate the U. S. borders.

The Bomarc missile has been more than 10 months in coming from the drawing board through the tedious process of designing, building and testing.

Hospital Fire Is Fatal for 7 And Injures 26

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Dec. 24 (AP)—Christmas tree set off a fire in Doctors' Memorial hospital here today which killed seven persons and critically injured 26 others.

Twenty-nine patients were in the hospital when the gasily decorated tree exploded in flames and set the lobby afire. Doctors' Memorial hospital building, trapping patients in their rooms.

Firemen blamed the blaze on defective wiring on the tree. They said the victims died of asphyxiation.

Killed were Mary Balliet, 48; Ella Muller, 57; Mrs. Lydia Becken, 85; Carolyn Vale, 12; Mrs. Barn Stone, 55; Clarence O. Green, 41; all Minn. residents, and a 13-day-old boy, son of the Robert Rasmussen, Excelsior, Minn.

Minneapolis firemen arrived within "seconds" after the initial alarm and extinguished the four-alarm blaze in 10 minutes. Many of the patients were led or wheeled by hospital staff members to relatively smoke-free rooms. Firemen, using loud speakers, pleaded with the trapped patients to jump from the windows. The entire building was laddered and five hoses and ladder companies evacuated the patients.

One Shepherd Gives His Gift, Mary Is Happy

The familiar Bible story of the shepherds is retold in a new way in a play brought to the stage at the University of Idaho. The play is an attempt to tell what might have happened if one shepherd had brought his gift.

They made haste for the journey. They were poor men and had no means for gifts fit for a king of kings. But they must go quickly, they reasoned, and find the babe for the lord had made known to them that it was here.

But Asa stood apart from them in thought. They called to him, bade him hurry, told him the journey must begin straightaway. And yet he stood.

And again they called and asked him why he delayed. And Asa bade them wait yet awhile. Then he took up his crude shepherd's bag and delved and searched into it. At length, he brought out from it two small objects, one shiny in the light of a star in the east and one dark, and told the others he was ready.

Find the Manger And the shepherds came to the city and found Mary and Joseph and the babe lying in a manger.

And behold, in raiment strange and rich, wise men from the East came to the manger, following a star which went before them, and they fell down and worshipped the child. From their treasure they presented great gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh. And the shepherds felt meager and ashamed.

Then, when the giving had ended, they stepped forward. He held out his hands, in one sheathing tool that he had used with his sheep. And in the other, a tiny cloth bag.

And Mary took them and smiled. Asa bowed.

When the shepherds returned to the field, making known abroad all they had seen, the eldest shepherd told the tale of Asa for the poverty of his gift. And Asa told him this:

"It came to me that the centuries would know that Mary felt the wonders of this night—the wise men and the star—that it would be written that he kept all these things and pondered them in her heart. A memory that I, but a mother needs a ringlet of hair from her firstborn's head in a bag around her neck to hold dear.

Reclamation Bureau Reports Application Processing Plan

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24 (Special)—The bureau of reclamation has established basic procedures for processing applications by local public agencies for loans or grants under the small projects act.

The bureau's regional office for the Columbia river basin in Boise is prepared to advise applicants on these procedures.

The small reclamation projects act of 1935 authorizes loans or grants to irrigation districts, conservancy districts, other public agencies, and states for the construction of projects similar to those of the regular reclamation program.

submitted to the governor of the state (or to a state agency designated by him), wherein the project is located. The project must be found financially feasible and assurance must be given by the state that the water rights for the project are as claimed.

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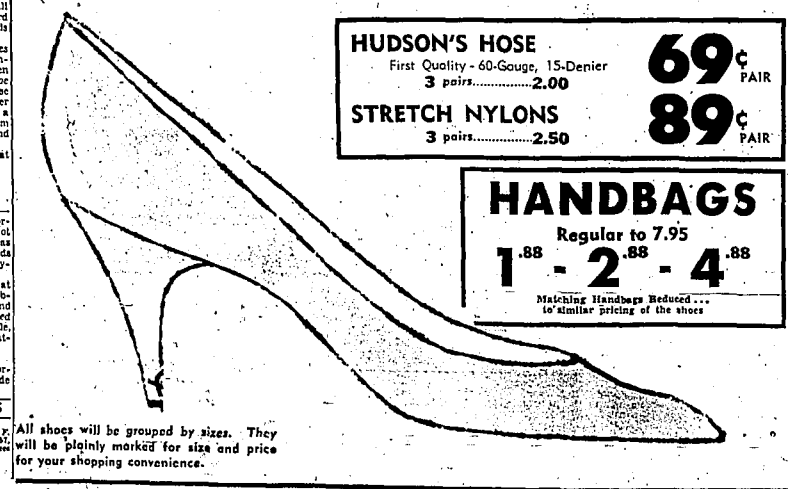
