DARCA, Venezuela (UPI)—Males Rockefeller and his brothers have invested around 12 1/2 million dollars in Venezuela in the last 10 years in a series of unique experiments...

A look at the official 1956 presidential balloting shows that President Eisenhower built nearly half his 9,642,000 winning margin...

Four years ago the President performed what was then viewed as an outstanding job of getting feet by capturing New York by 535,000 votes, California by 700,000, Ohio by 300,000, Illinois by 443,000 and Pennsylvania by 243,000.

This time he increased his plurality over Adlai Stevenson to an astonishing 1,569,000 votes in New York, to 847,000 in Illinois, to 625,000 in Ohio, to 408,000 in Pennsylvania...

Altogether, Mr. Eisenhower advanced his percentage of the vote in 29 states, and lost ground in 11. This was according to the face of predictions that he would draw a smaller share of the vote in many key areas.

Aside from the big five, the President made notable percentage gains in Connecticut, New Jersey, Massachusetts and Utah. In New Jersey, with a total vote just under 2,600,000, Ike's margin came to a staggering 758,000. He got nearly 65 per cent of New Jersey's vote.

THE ROCKEFELLER brothers got into this business enterprise at the invitation of the oil companies...

IN A crash program to increase local food supplies in a hurry, some big risks were taken to introduce...

There were some sad failures and total losses of around \$75 million dollars. But today the Rockefeller Venezuelan Ventures are valued at about \$100 million dollars.

Another venture which paid off was the introduction of modern dairying methods, pasteurized milk and home deliveries.

Somebody else personally bought out three of the farm enterprises for three million dollars. He is experimenting on production of basic foods to make...

In 1952 the Rockefellers formed THEO—the International Bank of Venezuela, which includes the oil company investment in these enterprises and writes off their losses.

The fundamental Rockefeller idea, however, is to take these enterprises, show they can be run profitably, and then to give them to private investors.

IN ADDITION TO these private enterprises, the Rockefellers have organized in Venezuela and four other Latin American countries the International Association—AIA—for educational work.

About \$7,000,000 has been spent here for this more than 10-year program. It is now about two-thirds from the Venezuelan government and one-third from the oil companies.

Chou's Invitation for Russian Visit Is Tip on Soviet Worry

By United Press
The announcement that Chou En-lai is to visit Moscow shows clearly how worried the Soviet government is over its present situation. It is evident that the invitation to the Chinese communist leader to go to Russia was both unexpected and urgent. Chou was in Pakistan, in the middle of a highly successful tour of East Asian countries, when the Moscow invitation reached him. He plans to go to India to confer with Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru then fly to Peking for consultation with his Red Chinese cabinet colleagues, and continue on to Russia, arriving on Jan. 7. From Moscow, it is announced, Chou will go to Warsaw to visit "Victor" Polish communist leader Wladyslaw Gomulka. This visit, too, is unexpected and certainly significant. It is uncertain whether Gomulka extended his invitation on his own initiative—possibly without consulting Russia—or whether he acted in cooperation with the Soviet government. Gomulka is steering Poland skillfully on a different course. As the result of the Polish revolt, he has won a great measure of independence from Russian domination. He is now trying to keep the aroused Polish people from anti-Russian outbursts. It is possible that Russia wants Chou to talk to Gomulka in order to keep him in line. But it must be remembered that at the time of the Polish revolt, Chou expressed his approval of Gomulka's bid for independent communism. When Chou later supported Russian intervention in Hungary, he sent a secret message to Gomulka expressing that this did not mean a change in his attitude toward Poland. Chou visited India before Prime Minister Nehru went to the United States to see President Eisenhower. While he was in India Chou made no attempt to keep secret his opinion that, while he publicly approved the Soviet intervention in Hungary, he believed that Russia had unleashed its own prestige and had harmed world communism by its brutality. It seems certain that the Russians want to fix up their relations with Red China and try to keep Chou from making any statements which are critical of Russian policy. Undoubtedly also, they want to hear what Nehru said in his long talks with Chou before he went to Washington. Nehru, the No. 1 Asian "neutralist," has come around to restrained criticism of Russia for

Bus Terminal Spree Fatal to 3, Hurts Five

CLEVELAND, O., Dec. 26 (AP)—A crowd of gunners fatally shot a bus driver and young woman, and five bystanders were wounded in a wild terminal shooting spree before the gunman himself was mortally wounded by police bullets.

The man had been ordered off a Greyhound bus for allegedly molesting the 18-year-old woman. He was killed minutes later in the Cleveland bus terminal.

Georgeann Karzke, 18, Port Eads, and bus driver Leo Almerico, 40, Cleveland, were dead on arrival at the hospital.

Homeless police said they were shot at the entrance of Pittsburgh-Cleveland bus, parked at a loading ramp, by a still-undetermined assailant.

The gunman went berserk, witnesses said, after Almerico ordered him to leave the bus on Miss Karzke's complaint. The assailant was shot down by Detective Sgt. Michael Sirok in an alley next to a church.

Earlier, on his flight from the bus ramp to the church, the assailant shot and killed Michael Karzke, 25, changed fire in the terminal waiting room, where the five bystanders were injured superficially in the gunfire.

Police quoted other passengers on the bus saying that Miss Karzke had complained to them and to the driver that the man had been molesting her since the bus left Pittsburgh. Witnesses told officers the assailant was shot in the front of the bus near him.

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Color Scheme, Canned Music Boost Efficiency for Workers

NEW YORK, Dec. 26 (AP)—Felt jittery today? Does the job and the place where you work get on your nerves?

Maybe it isn't just because it's the day after a long holiday. Could be you're one of those 12 million or so blue-eyed of the spectrum for east and west walls of a factory or office building, and warm and reddish beige garners — one fourth of the total force — whose "restless" moods are estimated to cost the industry three billion dollars a year.

The toll comes in lost time, poor production, damaged machines and spoiled goods.

Combating tension and anxiety, stress and worry, business management has turned to a variety of remedies:

Psychiatrists chosen paint jobs, cooled music, air and sound conditioning, special lighting, posture chairs, smoking and coffee breaks, encouraging hobbies, and of late the tranquilizing drugs.

Some of the tension is an entirely personal thing. But much of it is traced to the pressure of mechanized society. Doctors say that the conditions under which work is done adds greatly to the problem in many cases.

Some industries have grabbed on to this quickly as a safe argument.

"Human beings react to color more quickly than to any other stimulus," a paint manufacturer contends. He advocates cool hues at the blue end of the spectrum for east and west walls of a factory or office building, and warm and reddish beige garners — one fourth of the total force — whose "restless" moods are estimated to cost the industry three billion dollars a year.

A wire rope plant in Muney, Pa. reports it has used a paint job to cut lost time from accidents by 28 per cent and to reduce absenteeism to two per cent from five per cent. It has painted its machines "eye rest green" and its control panels and dangerous parts with "advancing colors."

Tension that cut production often are credited to on-the-job boredom. Many consider canned music a good antidote: An estimate 50 million Americans hear canned music at work every day.

The aim is to find music that will revive bored workers without distracting them. The choice often varies with the time of day. Workers efficiency, the experts claim, sags badly between 10:30 and 11 a.m. and the best tempo then is thought to be 42 beats a minute.

Noise and monotony are also productivity killers and are tackled by sound proofing working areas or by such things as coffee breaks.

When workers tackle the toughest problem themselves they often turn to hobbies — and some then get tense about their hobbies.

Others try sedatives. One medical school reports that 338 tons of sedatives are consumed in this nation each year.

Some people ease tensions by laughing, crying, talking, drinking, yawning, sex, physical exercise, increased eating.

"Whether these release tension is debatable," one psychiatrist says. "But for some people, some of these methods do, sometimes."

And others seem to flourish on tension. The psychiatrist contends that "one man's tension is another's pleasure." Pressure may cut the productivity of one worker, while another does his best work when fighting the clock.

Nippon Students Protest Red Acts

"Let us share the suffering of the Hungarian people," one of the student placards said.

The demonstrators were members of the "Hungarian people sympathy university students league" formed by students of several Tokyo universities soon after the Hungarian uprising. The students pledged to fast on an empty lot in front of the embassy and vowed not to eat for four days.

Fire Battalion Chief Herman Hurd said although the exact cause of the blaze was not known, the parents had left the Christmas tree lights on all night.

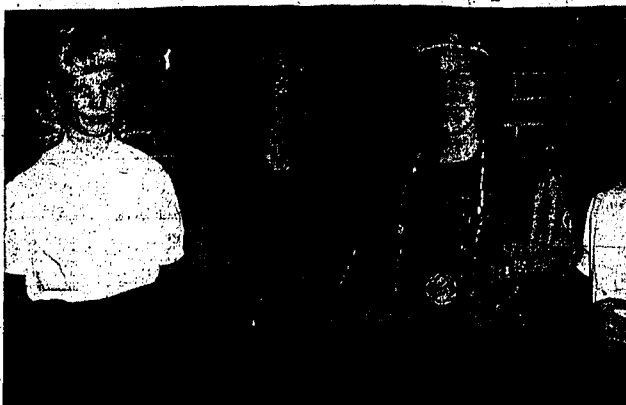

U. S. Budget's Increase Seen

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—The high cost of government may go up to \$1.5 billion dollars in the new fiscal year beginning next July 1.

This was indicated this week by officials who said military needs may call for at least an extra two billion dollars, and nonmilitary items could cost a half billion more than this year.

The estimates were supplied in connection with the budget now being drawn up for President Eisenhower's submission to congress in January.

It appeared that the budget makers would have their work cut out for them to hold the total to any sum much less than 12 billion dollars. Spending in this fiscal year, which ends next June 30, is estimated at \$9,100,000,000.

However, no deficit is in sight for next June unless concrete cuts are made, thanks largely to the individual income tax, the government's revenues are again figured to be large.

Secretary of Defense Wilson indicated in October that the military might need 1 1/2 and 2 billions more in the fiscal year, and since then, the world's troubles have been heightened by the Middle East conflict. Also, costs of military equipment have been increasing.

Spending in this fiscal year, which ends next June 30, is estimated at \$9,100,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—Republican national headquarters is keeping its labor division staffs busy with campaign in a continuing effort to court the labor vote, it has been disclosed.

The GOP national committee's labor desk will be manned by Robert J. Slagter, Public Affairs, a plumbers' union member who was on the headquarters staff during the 1954 campaign.

He replaces Roy James, director of labor activities during the campaign, who has returned to his job as a Republican staff employee of the senate labor committee.

Butler E. Kates, Gormley's assignment will be to keep a skeleton GOP labor organization active until the 1958 election campaign and to serve as liaison between that organization and the national committee.

Although detailed studies have not yet been made, GOP managers believe they increased their share of the labor vote in the 1952 elections. President Eisenhower polled larger margins than in 1948 in the industrial eastern states. The Republicans also picked up house seats in the eastern states while losing 10 in the states west of the Mississippi river.

With most labor leaders committed to the Democratic party, the GOP undertook an extensive campaign this year to woo the rank and file labor vote.

Group Organized Republican labor committees, rising in size from 20 to 5,000 members, were said to have been organized on a city and county basis in 20 states.

States with 10 to 50 county committees in all large industrial areas were Pennsylvania, Indiana, New York, Michigan, Minnesota, Texas, New Jersey, Wisconsin, Nevada, Connecticut and Maryland.

Protestant Clergyman Defends Controversial Motion Picture

NEW YORK, Dec. 24.—A leading Protestant clergyman said this week that the controversial film "Baby Doll" is not as sexy as Cecil B. DeMille's "Ten Commandments" movie which was based on the Bible.

The Very Rev. Dr. James A. Pike, dean of the Protestant Episcopal New York cathedral of St. John the Divine, devoted his entire sermon to a discussion of the motion picture which Francis Cardinal Spellman condemned as immoral and charged Catholics not to see "under pain of sin."

Dean Pike, who attended the premiere of the movie last week, told his congregation, "I don't think that I am alone in seeing 'Baby Doll' is not portrayed for its own sake," he said. "It is portrayed in such a way as to make it a picture with a sinful motive and could, in the course of it and as a result of it, include in sinful thoughts. The same would go for many great works of art."

"Whether it hurts or helps you is left to God and your conscience," he said.

Dean Pike said the sinfulness of viewing such pictures as "Baby Doll" depends on the motive of the viewer and how he receives the experience.

"One could attend this picture with a sinful motive and could, in the course of it and as a result of it, include in sinful thoughts. The same would go for many great works of art."

Dean Pike said that persons seeking sex in this regard, "I would advise" to see "Ten Commandments" instead of "Baby Doll," written by Tennessee Williams and directed by Otto Preminger.

The national leader for several weeks, Dowler wound up in fourth place with an average of 47.1 yards on 47 efforts. He was the No. 2 sophomore kicker of 1956. UCLA's Kirk Wilson won the title with an all-time punting record average of 49.3 yards per try.

Kilroy said "if he wants it, this matchmaking is his business. He will have to go to court."

He said in his telephone conference with commission members he considered the nine charges against McCoy, and the commission then made a motion, accepted by a unanimous vote, accepting the determination of judges and accepting the decision as was presented to the commission members.

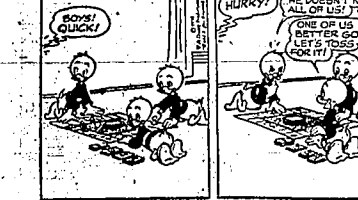

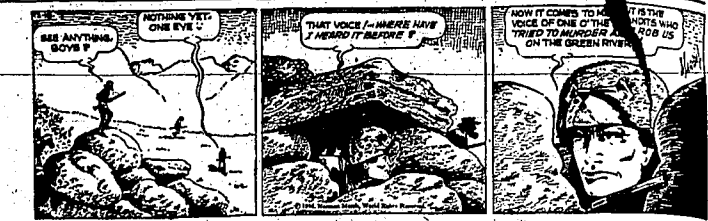

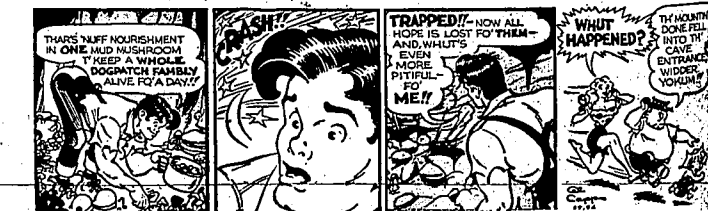
