Woman From The Netherlands Is Speaker for Club's Meeting

Soroptimist club members and their guests, meeting at the Turf club Thursday for a holiday dinner, were entertained by Mrs. William Zeydel, formerly of Amsterdam, Northern Holland, The Netherlands, who spoke of customs of her homeland and of her impressions of the United States.

Mrs. Zeydel and her husband came to Idaho last May under the sponsorship of the Valley Christian church of Twin Falls. Explaining the sponsorship plan, Mrs. Zeydel said it took three years to gain entrance to the United States. It was required they have a sponsor who would be responsible for them five years and this role was assumed by the Valley Christian church.

The Zeydels lived in Indonesia prior to making application for entrance to this country. They left the islands for safety when communist infiltration became so strong it was dangerous for them to live there. The Indonesians, no longer liking Dutch people since the establishment of a republic in 1949, do not know what they are doing, according to Mrs. Zeydel, and they need much help. It is a young country, its people do not know how to rule themselves, and they need much education to enable them to become better rulers, she said.

Following acceptance of their application to enter the states, the Zeydels traveled by plane. Flying from New York, Mrs. Zeydel called her husband's attention to huge fields of "tulips" as they neared Chicago. Closer inspection revealed the tulip fields to be large new-car lots where brightly hued automobiles were parked. Mrs. Zeydel could not understand tulips as they are an important business in The Netherlands, where only imported persons have automobiles. General transportation is provided by tramways and bicycles.

Of concern to Mrs. Zeydel was transportation in the French poodle, Romeo who was forbidden

and stated, "I should know; I am the farmer!" The issue appeared to be settled.

Zeydel is employed as a bookkeeper by Step-Kin Auto Parts company and Mrs. Zeydel is employed at the Mayfair dress shop. Both speak English fluently.

air transportation and came by boat through the Panama canal to San Francisco. The trip took six weeks. The Zeydels, believing San Francisco to be close to Idaho, had planned to meet Romeo there when he arrived but finally settled on sending him by rail to Spokane.

Comparing the size of Idaho with The Netherlands, Mrs. Zeydel says her new home state is six times as large in area but the population of Idaho is 50,000 compared with the 10 million who inhabit The Netherlands. The land in Holland is good and every inch is cultivated. Beets, potatoes, wheat and the colorful tulips are among the most important farm crops. Dairying is carried on extensively. There are many industries and labor is cheaper because the standard of living is lower, she said. The Dutch people are not generally accustomed to the type of heating, plumbing and utilities Americans demand for their homes.

Mrs. Zeydel says Christmas does not differ much in the two countries. Instead of Santa Claus, the children eagerly await the visit of Saint Nicholas who comes by boat to Amsterdam, then travels by horse, accompanied by a little black boy. The Christmas celebration is Dec. 25 and the nativity is observed Dec. 26.

The Zeydels are enthusiastic skiers and have traveled to Sun Valley and Magic mountain for the sport but here too they find satisfactory skiing conditions. There is no skiing in The Netherlands. Those who wish to learn travel to popular European resorts, particularly the Swiss Alps. Other sports enjoyed by Hollanders are skating, English football or soccer, basketball and sailing.

A small family argument ensued when Zeydel, asked if inundation of the land by sea water makes it unproductive for several years, agreed that it did for about two years. To this reply Mrs. Zeydel took issue, saying a certain kind of seed thrived

Five Die, 20 Hurt in Trio Of Accidents

Five persons were killed in two fiery collisions involving trucks and 20 persons were hurt when a bus and truck crashed near Lincoln, Neb., and burst into flames. The worst wreck occurred last night when four persons died in the flame-seared wreckage of two trucks and an automobile west of Texarkana, Tex.

Authorities said an army truck from the Red River arsenal smashed head-on into a grain truck on highway 82. Moments later, a car rammed into the wreckage and touched off a fire.

Killed were Mrs. Bessie Hooper, 46, DeWalt, Tex.; her daughter, Mrs. Marie Wood, 26, DeWalt; Mrs. Curtis Carlton, 34, Brazoria, Tex.; and an unidentified soldier serving the army truck. The driver of the grain truck escaped injury.

The driver of a gasoline truck was killed late yesterday when the vehicle crashed and exploded at Getzville, Ind., and sent a river of flames racing down U. S. highway 45.

The truck, loaded with 7,000 gallons of gasoline, rained into a race to the city southern of the community and flames from the wreckage blew a hole in the highway.

The driver, Robert L. Williams, 33, Mount Vernon, Ind., was trapped in the cab and burned to death.

The truck exploded on impact with the tree, and then blew up a second time 20 minutes later with a blast that rocked the entire hamlet.

Flames from the blaze were so hot they melted nearby telephone and power lines.

Twenty persons were injured at Lincoln, Neb., when a bus and truck collided in flames on highway 45. Most of the injuries were minor.

The Lincoln bus was on route to Lincoln from Lincoln, Neb., when the crash occurred. Bus driver Bob Allison said he was suddenly in control of the vehicle apparently as a result of a broken tie rod.

Witnesses said gasoline from the truck exploded several times.

Government Analysts Predicting Big Church Boom in Nation During 1957

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP)—Government experts predict 1957 will bring the biggest church building boom in history.

A record 775 million dollars was spent during 1956 for new and enlarged churches, synagogues, Sunday school buildings and other religious edifices.

A commerce department analyst looks for an increase of about 13 percent in religious construction during the coming year. That would make the total outlay a whopping \$875 million.

This is a lot of money to spend on churches, even in America. It is, for example, seven times as much as the 1947 figure, and 20 times the 1927 total.

The church building boom is the concrete-and-steel expression of an equally phenomenal increase in church membership. The latest figures compiled by the Yearbook of American Churches (mostly for the calendar year 1955) showed church membership at an all-time high of more than 100 million, an increase of more than 30 percent since 1940.

Sunday school enrollment also has been climbing rapidly, from 20 million in 1950 to 30 million in 1955.

The ideal wave of children, particularly in suburban congregations, has been a main source of the pressure on churches to expand their physical facilities.

For churches planning to take the plunge into building projects during 1957, the commerce department has good news and bad.

It reports that "building materials generally should be in adequate supply, with no more than minor spot shortages."

Construction costs "are expected to continue to rise," but at a somewhat slower rate than in 1956.

Mortgage loans—on which most churches must depend for a substantial share of construction costs—probably will continue to be tight.

But churches as a group have achieved an excellent credit rating in recent years, and may have trouble lining up loans than some private homeowners. Moreover, churches rarely seek the type of low down-payment, long term loans which is particularly scarce.

A large majority of the new churches to be built in 1957 will go up in suburban areas. The upsurge in church membership has been predominantly concentrated in the suburbs, while many downtown and rural churches have been struggling for existence.

Another characteristic which many of the new crop of churches will have in common is modern design. In only a few years ago, the bald, bold lines of contemporary architecture were rarely seen in houses of worship. Traditional styles—mainly Gothic, colonial and Georgian—were widely regarded as the only "appropriate" architecture for churches.

Now the trend is running strongly toward modern design, both because of the construction economies which it usually offers, and also because of a growing conviction that churches should speak in the language of their age, architecturally as well as otherwise.

Iron Curtain Envoy Get Bid To Attend Fete for President

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP)—Ambassadors and ministers from Iron Curtain countries—including those from Russia and Hungary—have been invited to be "honored guests" at President Eisenhower's inaugural ball next month.

The communist diplomats last week received instructions to accept a January dress affair despite two facts which will make their attendance somewhat ironic.

One of the money received from inaugural ball ticket sales will be donated to the Red Cross.

The name of the president reviewing stand for the inaugural parade preceding the ball has been changed from "court of honor" to "court of the spirit of freedom" as a tribute to the Polish and Hungarian uprisings against Moscow.

Inaugural ball committee and state department spokesmen emphasize that tradition and protocol are responsible for the "honored guests" list.

George N. Zaroubin and satellite diplomat since the first inaugural ball, ever since the British and France were the only countries with representatives here, foreign dignitaries have been invited as special guests to honor the new chief executive.

The tradition still holds even when the invited guests are Communist.

George N. Zaroubin, who advised the inaugural ball chairman, Carl L. Shipley, on the diplomatic invitations, the inclusion of the Iron Curtain countries must be "automatic"—that is, you don't invite some and not others.

Shipley had no problem on the subject.

Chinese Reds Rap Yugoslav In Stalin View

TOKYO, Dec. 28 (AP)—Communist China assailed Yugoslav Communists today as a threat to the international communist movement.

It also criticized Tito and other Yugoslav communist leaders for their views on Josef Stalin and his mistakes and said they were "going too far."

The rebukes were contained in a long article to appear in the Sunday issue of the official Peiping People's Daily which has been broadcast in summarized form by Radio Peiping.

It is understandable that the Yugoslav comrades bear a particular resentment against Stalin's mistakes... we also agree with some of the points in comrade Tito's speech (at Pula), but we are amazed that... he attacked almost all the socialist countries and many of the communist parties," the article said.

Tito, it added, took a "wrong attitude" when he maintained the issue was whether Yugoslav's independence communist course or the "Stalinist course" would win out.

Such a contention, the article said, "is an article with split in the communist movement."

"Even if some part of their criticism of socialist parties is reasonable, the basic stand and method they adopt infringe the principles of comradely discussion."

The matters concerned are so vital to the unity of international communism that "we cannot but offer our brotherly advice to the Yugoslav comrades," the newspaper said.

The communist New China News Agency broadcast excerpts from a 4,000-word article entitled "More on the Historical Experience of the Dictatorship of the Proletariat."

The article was prepared by the editorial department of the newspaper on the basis of a discussion at an enlarged meeting of the political bureau of the central committee of the Communist party of China.

The article said Stalin "displayed certain great national chauvinism tendencies in relations with brother parties and countries."

The late Soviet dictator, it added, contributed much to the progress of the Soviet Union and international communism but also made "serious mistakes" in both domestic and foreign policies.

It charged that the attitude of Tito and his associates toward Stalin's mistakes and other related questions "... cannot be regarded by us as well balanced or objective."

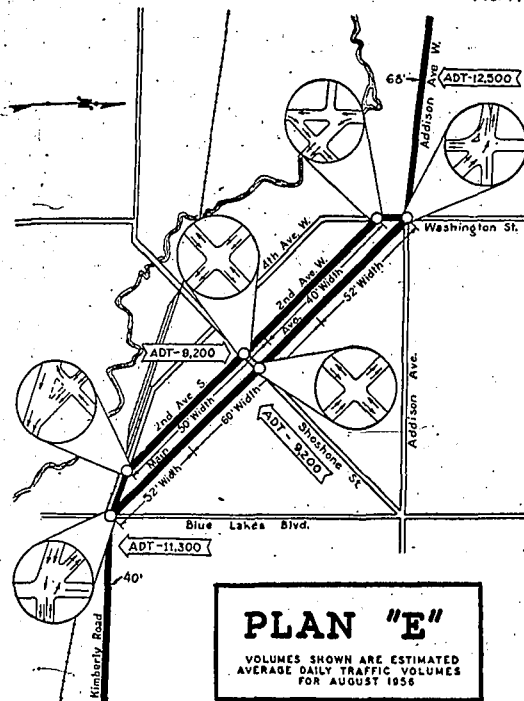

Expansion Cut Foreseen in Steel Tax Acts

NEW YORK, Dec. 28 (AP)—In denying a fast tax writeoff for new steel plants, the Internal Revenue Service may have let some of the steam out of the business expansion program that is making money to light.

At the same time he may have put more steam into the pressure for still higher prices.

These apparent cross purposes sends about this way.

Some steel companies say they will defer or reconsider part of their program to build more steel-making capacity. Others say they will go on building but must have higher prices to pay for it.

Even before the tax decision, as low seems likely, that will work through other factors as it does last summer and fall and build up pressure for higher prices all along the line.

The steel industry had asked tax concessions through a fast depreciation allowance for proposed new facilities, totaling nearly 2 1/2 billion dollars. Washington refused this Wednesday.

Even if the building programs are halted or delayed, this may also affect plans of other industries for expansion that has been held up by delays in getting structural steel.

This would ease somewhat the big program for industrial expansion or stretch it over more months and years than first planned. Washington has estimated the expansion boom will hit a new peak in the months just ahead.

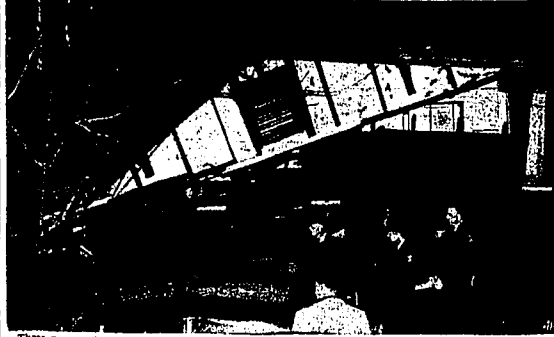
Even before the steel tax decision, however, there had been a few signs of slowdown in the big building programs that had strained the financial markets.

General Electric has announced it is holding up three building plans because "too many people are trying to do too much all at the same time." It says other companies are cutting off their programs because financing them was too expensive.

The steel companies aren't likely to give up their fight for new tax rules governing depreciation. What they have just lost is the decision on fast writeoffs for building new facilities to furnish structural steel for industrial buildings and more steel for the builders of oil tankers and freight cars.

Their central argument about depreciation allowances, however, is that they are no longer realistic. Steelmen say the cost of replacing old steel mills is now so much higher than when the mills were first built that they should be allowed more liberal allowances in writing off the depreciation of their mills—that it should be figured on a replacement basis rather than on the basis of original cost.

Polish Situation Growing More Tense As First Free Post-War Ballot Nears

WARSAW, Dec. 28 (AP)—The situation in Poland is more serious now than during the Intelu week-end in October when Nikita Khrushchev and other Soviet leaders flew here as Russian troops stood ready.

That is the view of one highly placed Polish official as the nation prepares for the first free post-war election on Jan. 20.

"Wladyslaw Gomulka, who was cheered wildly when he was swept back to power in the events following the Poznan riots, had the task of getting the country back on its economic feet before the tide of national 'self-expression' becomes uncontrollable.

The official who expressed his fears, realized only too well, as does Gomulka, that the Soviets barked on giving the Poles sufficient rope to hang themselves.

Gomulka, the man who was the symbol of new found freedom, two months later is the object of rumormongering from the people who still have bad living conditions, little food, and high prices and unhappy prospects for the near future with worn out pre-war industrial and farm equipment.

There are also complaints from students and intellectuals who insist there must be greater political freedom.

At pre-election meetings, these people have been unwilling to back government candidates and insist they must have representatives in parliament who are in opposition to Gomulka.

There is no doubt that the United Workers (Communist) party will win. But there is a bitter fight on hand from the contending peasants party who have won headway with promises of abolishing compulsory deliveries from farm collectives, reduction of taxes and better equipment and supplies in the building and agricultural industries.

The Gomulka government believes Poland has gone almost as far politically as she can with safety.

Hemmed in between East Germany and Russia, and harassment by Soviet trade policies, Gomulka must look to the West, however, for economic help if he is to maintain a lid on the powderkeg of new freedom and anti-Soviet feeling. The Poles estimate they need 300 million dollars credit to cope with the economic situation.

Observers here believe Washington is wary of doing anything that would lead to a flung-type explosion. But the feeling here is that such an uprising is more likely if there is no relief for the poverty-plagued country.

The traditional Polish hatred for the Russians could easily spark a revolt. Gomulka may have to resort to a fresh operation to prevent it.

Observers believe that would undoubtedly be misunderstood by those pressing for political freedom and might bring a violent reaction. That would be the sign of "irresponsibility" that the Soviets, with their troops on hand, are waiting for.

Report Avers Japan to Stop Surplus Buys

TOKYO, Dec. 28 (AP)—Kyodo News Service reported that Japan's new government decided tentatively today to quit buying American farm surpluses, especially wheat, and to buy Australian wheat on regular account instead.

Government officials refused to comment directly but Tokyo Agents later Nobunaki Kishi told reporters after a cabinet meeting.

"It is not appropriate to continue the past policy of buying American farm surplus products. The policy requires re-examination."

The cabinet named a committee to recommend a final decision. Kyodo said Japan will not buy any surplus American farm products next year but may resume later.

Japan this year imported about 700,000 tons of American wheat on regular account and about 450,000 tons under surplus crop agreements. This accounted for about half of all the country's wheat imports.

The preceding administration of Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoiyama had decided tentatively to buy American surplus and reject an Australian offer of 400,000 tons of wheat. Australia offered lower tariffs on Japanese products as an inducement.

The May Seek Usage for U.S. Armed Forces

New York, Dec. 28 (AP)—President Eisenhower is thinking about asking congress for authority to use U. S. Armed Forces to keep peace in the Middle East, the New York Times said today in its news story.

Times Washington Correspondent James V. Reston reported that the President and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles plan to talk about the country's future Middle East policy with leaders of congress in a meeting at the White House next Tuesday.

Reston said President Eisenhower and Dulles discussed future Middle East policy yesterday at a White House conference but did not bring up the subject of armed action.

It is noted that President Eisenhower privately has said his agreed with the president's view on sending troops into Korea to halt communist aggression there.

Reston said that Mr. Eisenhower and Dulles would seek the views of the congressional leaders on receiving congressional approval for the President to use the nation's armed forces in the case of Middle East aggression.

Washington officials were reported worried about Soviet penetration in the Middle East. They fear that incidents in Syria, Iraq, Jordan and Jordan might invite further Soviet penetration.

This uneasiness was said to have increased since the attack on Egypt which led to a weakening of the Middle East.

Consequently administration officials have been discussing what action can be taken by the United States to make it clear to the Arab states that they are not to be treated as a chaotic situation develop to the benefit of the Soviet Union, Reston reported.

Report Avers Huge Meteor House-Sized?

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP)—Smithsonian Institution scientists have concluded that the giant shooting star which dug the famous Arizona meteoric crater weighed at least 12,000 tons, that weighed in at about the size of an average house.

The Smithsonian, in a report to the scientists also found evidence that the great fragments which flew in from outer space began 8,000 and 50,000 years ago came from a direction slightly south of west.

Previous weight estimates had ranged from 10,000 to 10 million tons. The line of approach had been figured as slightly west of north.

The weight calculations were based on the amount of meteoric particles found in earth samples from the floor of the crater, adding into consideration the area over which they were collected. The crater, 600 feet deep, is 4,100 feet in diameter.
