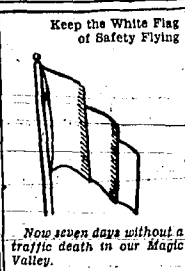

Tots Account for 200 Pounds Of Wieners at Jaycee Events

In a brief period Saturday, 200 pounds of wieners were roasted by independent meat company, Carter, many shades at four Junior Chamber of Commerce Christmas tree bonfires.

Health Director Gives Address At Meeting of Hagerman PTA

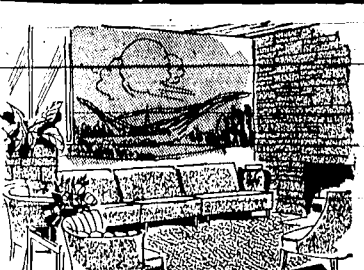

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Stories of certain organizations around Christmastime to bring cheer and assistance to less fortunate persons and families are an accepted part of life in this country. Few persons realize, though, the size of the task undertaken by many of these organizations.

The BURLY ELS, for example, distributed tons of food, candy and hundreds of toys last Christmas but Robert Fance, secretary of the group, says the task could not have been accomplished without the aid of many individuals and businesses in the area.

The Burlly Els program was under the direction of Rosa Greenwald, who takes care of the Christmas needs of Cassia and Blaine counties. He sent four large bags of walnuts in California, bought 500 pounds of candy, 1,200 large oranges and more than a ton of candy. Then the members of Commerce in Burlly packed another 250 pounds of walnuts and candy.

The chore of readying these goodies for distribution at free picture shows in Burlly, where the Burlly Els were handed members of the Els 1956. The group, for the past three years, has distributed 1,800 at the Burlly theaters, 450 in Paul and 150 in Rupert.

Some of the food for the food baskets was purchased at cost and was donated by merchants in the area. For the baskets, the Els handled 55 cases of canned goods, macaroni and noodles, 100 pounds of cheese, 10 cases of breakfast cereal, 100 loaves of bread, 150 cases of flour, 250 five-pound sacks of sugar and a 1,000-pound sack of rice. The baskets were packed, stored and frozen for the occasion. The 100 baskets filled by the Els were distributed on Monday. Toys came from stores and individuals. The Jaycees, led by Gale Mack, president, repaired the mechanical toys and the Lady Els, under the leadership of Mrs. Helen Coffey, cleaned, repaired and dressed the dolls.

Highway Slaughter in 1956 Mounts to Record of 40,200; No Relief Is in View

CHICAGO, Jan. 5 (AP)—The National Safety Council today reported a record 40,200 persons were killed in traffic accidents in 1956, the greatest slaughter on the nation's highways in 15 years.

And the council added a grim warning that there is no indication that the reckless traffic toll will slacken in the near future.

The council, which tabulates traffic deaths and accidents across the nation, said last year's toll broke the previous record of 33,333 deaths set in 1941.

It said figures also show the ratio of traffic deaths per mile still is climbing, indicating more disastrous records will be set in the future.

The council's announcement came on the basis of the worst holiday traffic carnage in history. An all-time holiday record of 113 deaths was recorded in the nation during the Christmas week-end and this was followed by a New Year's week-end record of 412 fatalities.

A record of 1,124 deaths also was a record for the combined week-end. An indication of the increasing death rate on the highways was in the fact the 1956 traffic toll was 56,496, or about 1,700 under last year.

The fatality rate showed an increase in every month of 1956 except October, the council said. The October decline broke a string of 10 straight months in which the toll showed a steady increase.

Council officials hoped the October slump would help prevent a new record for the year. But November's toll deaths killed 3,700 persons for a

four per cent increase over November, 1955.

The council said all hopes of keeping 1956 off the record books as the bloodiest in history disappeared with the November toll.

Council figures showed most of the increased traffic deaths came outside city limits. Safety drives in metropolitan areas achieved a 13 per cent death reduction in November and an overall increase of only one per cent from January through November, the council said.

The council also noted that the highway death rate, or the number of highway deaths in relation to mileage traveled, was up five per cent over 1955.

A United Press survey showed at least 11 states set traffic death records in 1956. They were North Dakota, Wisconsin, Montana, Georgia, Florida, Missouri, Arizona, Louisiana, Iowa and California.

California, which has the nation's highest traffic fatality rate, recorded 5,777 deaths for the year, or 118 more than the previous record of 1943.

Other record death marks by states were Florida, about 1,200; Georgia 1,110; Missouri, 1,114; Wisconsin 907; Iowa 885; Louisiana 879; Arizona 441; North Dakota 139 and Montana 265.

South Dakota, with a toll of 194, escaped a new record by only three deaths. Indiana's 3,204 was its worst since 1953.

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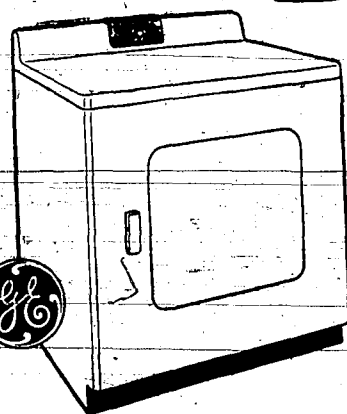
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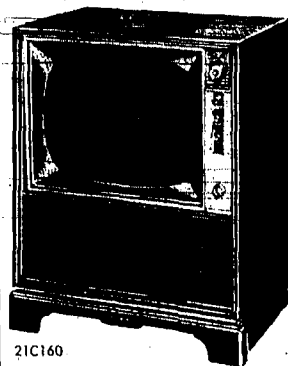


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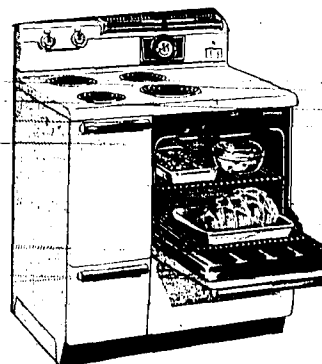
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
