

Dulles Claims U.S. Won't Set War to Thwart Red Plans

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (UPI)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles assured the House of Representatives today that the United States will not go to war in the Middle East simply to thwart communist subversion. He said this country would resort to military force in that area only in the advent of armed aggression there. Dulles said the "Eisenhower doctrine" calls for other ways to counter possible Russian subversion in the oil-rich area. Dulles made the comments during testimony before the committee now considering President Eisenhower's proposal to offer military protection and economic aid to the Middle East.

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THE FARM OUTLOOK

The immediate outlook for America's farmers in 1957 is reasonably bright. More of the surplus crops of farm products will be exported than in the past 12 months. That will still leave levels considerably below the all-time peak.

At the end of 1956, farm prices had risen six to seven per cent above the same period the year before. But they still were more than 10 per cent below the highs of February, 1951, in the middle of the Korean war. (Once again, it should be noted that the long decline had a bipartisan character, despite all political commitment to the contrary.)

What impresses the farm economist is the lack ahead in the new year is the certainty that the government will continue to support the farm and the likelihood of substantial exports. Together these factors should lift prices and reduce surpluses.

Export totals are figured for fiscal periods running from July 1 to the following June 30. Last season, America's farm exports came to \$1.4 billion dollars. For the current fiscal year, the prospect is that a peak of 4.1 billion dollars will be attained.

The boost in exports appears to result partly from extraordinary government efforts to regain world markets for surplus crops as cotton, and partly from developing markets which are handicapping output abroad.

We should do no cheating that the misfortune of others have given us this opportunity to improve our farmers' circumstances. But we can take advantage of the situation to make adjustments that might otherwise take much longer.

If higher exports plus reduced production under the soil bank plan lead to really healthy cuts in farm surpluses, then the government will be at hand to find and enact into law long-range farm programs which will substantially prevent any buildup of excess stocks.

EISENHOWER DOCTRINE

President Eisenhower's proposal to seek standby authority to commit U. S. military forces to defense of the Middle East is a measure of how gravely we view communist penetration of the area.

The plan, of course, is certain to come under the closest congressional scrutiny and to meet steepest opposition. But the informed guesses indicate it probably will win approval.

It is bound to be welcomed by those who believe that the best way to keep the general peace is to draw a line giving the Soviet Union clear notice how far it can go.

Some objectors will insist that if we make this commitment, stretching our possible active defense area to include one more trouble spot, we may be pulling our lines too thin. Others will question whether such means will pay the kind of economic and political dividends which have worked well for the Reds elsewhere.

In recent weeks we have watched much renewed stature in Asia and Africa as champions of national independence. To hold off Communism, to keep the peace, to keep our policies, we would have to stress the purely defensive nature of the proposed commitment.

Whatever attitudes and emotions Mr. Eisenhower's plan may stir, one thing is definite. There is a need for new policy. At least old policy in new dress, or attempts to fill that need. On those who object it would seem incumbent to offer counter-proposals of equal or greater substance.

CHIANG'S OPTIMISM

Congressman who have visited Formosa recently say that Nationalist Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek is looking bright about an early return to the Chinese mainland.

At this distance one must conclude that Chiang's present purpose is to shore up the morale of his Nationalist troops, many now denied the chance to see their home-land.

Certainly nothing said by President Eisenhower or any Washington member of his official family would justify Chiang's optimism. With the U. S. air and naval support, the Nationalists would be embarking upon one of the most foolhardy military adventures in history.

Chiang must know this. What is harder to understand is the report that American military and diplomatic representatives on Formosa are giving unqualified support to the idea of a Nationalist invasion.

Clearly they would not publicly undercut the generalissimo in statements he may make to bolster Nationalist morale. But if they give earnest private endorsement to the plan they may convince him it has full support in Washington and is therefore really workable.

Mr. Eisenhower and his top advisers have given no indication they hold such a view.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—The Eisenhower program to defend the Middle East against Russian maritime forces faces heavy opposition from Capitol Hill to Cairo because of the strategy itself and the fact that other areas will be fought with atomic rather than conventional weapons.

At the same time, the White House plan, as unveiled to members of Congress by Eisenhower last week, is being widely different from the precedent set by the distinguished proposal.

Explaining it to congressional conferees, its sole author, Secretary Dulles, described it as a more limited extension of the Monroe doctrine, which covered the western hemisphere, and the Truman doctrine, which covered Greece and Turkey against possible communist invasion or economic infiltration.

In order to impress the critical Democrats, there is a reminder that 1941, F.D. declared that "America's first line of defense is now the Rhine and Elbe rivers."

VITAL DIFFERENCES—But questioning men from Capitol Hill discern vital differences. When President Monroe barred the western hemisphere from European colonialism, French and Spanish, there was no such awful thing as an A or H bomb. And when Roosevelt and Truman extended the doctrine to Russia, it had not yet perfected or exploded the ultimate in military warfare and destruction.

The congressional opposition to the Middle East program are deeply concerned over more extensive commitments because of this development. And, indeed, are the diplomatic representatives of the nations which President Eisenhower proposes to protect. They do not want to become an atomic battlefield. If it would mean their demoralization as going concerns.

U. S. DETERMINATION IN SHOWDOWN CLASH—However, military experts agree that there is no other way to deal with Russia's superior nuclear power as Russia, and so much nearer to the possible scene of conflict. In fact, for that reason, several presidential and congressional minds to this realization and development.

They include a recognized and responsible spokesman for the Air Force, Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther, former commander of SHAPE, Gen. Lauris Norstad, exponent of aerial warfare and General Curtis LeMay, secretary of the Air Force. They would not have done so, naturally, if there were not every expectation that the desperate Russian, American and British nuclear arsenals would be used in a showdown clash in the Middle East, and elsewhere.

TWO-PRONG WARNING TO RUSSIA—Thus, Washington will give a two-fold warning to Russia, assuming that Congress agrees to the Eisenhower-Dulles proposal.

We have notified—or we will—that the United States will never again exercise the same restraint which it has in the past. It is not a restraint in force. We will indicate that we will fight with every weapon in our possession, and that means all the arsenal of atomic power. We have already said so. We have said so in the past. We have said so in the future. We are equipped with A and H bombs and artillery ammunition.

Together with past and prospective guarantees to provide a nuclear defense to 50 nations around the perimeter of the Russian empire, Washington believes that Russia and Bulgaria will be forced to make a World War III of atomic proportions and horror.

VIEW OF OTHERS

Avers Report

WARSAW, Poland, Jan. 7 (AP)—Poland plans to ask Communist China for the economic aid it has been unable to get from the United States, informed sources said today.

Polish officials said a Red Chinese trade mission will arrive in Poland later today for talks on an aid agreement.

Informed sources said the government of Premier Josef Cyrankiewicz decided to ask for large-scale Chinese aid after it became apparent the United States was not willing to give it.

Red Chinese Premier Chou En-lai, who arrives here Friday from Moscow, will make the final decision, the sources said.
