

Newest Political Party Dates To Days of U. S. Depression

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 11.—In the depths of the depression a doctor looked out his window in Long Beach, Calif., and saw three old women pawing for food in a garbage can.

For the next 15 years motorists on the busy Pacific coast highway could read the same picture while looking at a blue billboard which proclaimed: "Townsend plan will succeed."

Then the sign faded and disappeared. The plan had failed.

The doctor at the window—Francis Everett Townsend—will be 90 years old Sunday.

But he still is not ready for the retirement which he proposed for all Americans at the age of 60. In fact, he is this year launching to fight for bigger pensions—a new political party—the Women's Anti-Poverty party.

Townsend proposed that every American retire at the age of 60 on a pension of \$200 a month. Funds for this granddaddy of giveaways were to come from a three per cent tax on all gross incomes over \$2,000. All pensioners were to be forced to spend the entire \$200 in the month they received the payment. This, said Townsend, would stir spending and

help end the depression. Townsend, a general practitioner who says he feels better today than he has in 50 years, explained his new political party at one of his temporary homes here.

"We need a new political party," he said in a crisp clear voice. "The Republican and Democratic parties are not concerned with the general welfare of the people. The new party will be spearheaded by women, but, of course, we'll let the men in."

"Women will lead the program because they are more favorable to our cause," he said. "Women might be able to straighten out the present bad state of affairs. Men often think only of politics and individual advancement. Women are more interested in justice than politics."

U. A. Johnson, former deputy U. S. secretary of state for Far Eastern affairs, has four children and each was born in a different city: Washington, Tokyo, Seoul, and Rio de Janeiro.

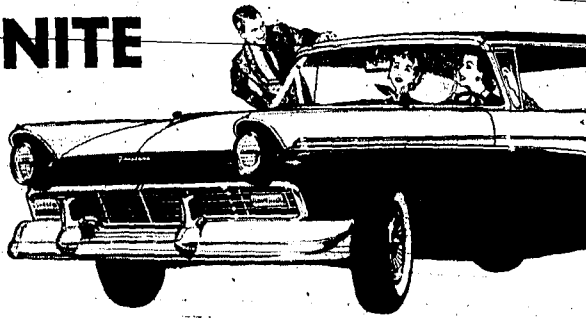
