

Buhlman Is First Traffic Fatality in Valley Area in '57

SHOSHONE, Jan. 14.—Magie Valley's first traffic fatality in 1957 was called up Sunday with the death of Jake Buhlman, 46, who was killed when he was struck by a pickup truck on highway 26, Roy O. Matthews, 46, Buhl, driver of the pickup, was taken to the hospital where he was treated for cuts and bruises.

Matthews, a former resident of Buhl, recently had moved to work on Matthews' farm, and was returning to Buhl on Sunday when the accident happened.

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Proponents of High Dam Launch Senate Struggle On "Mandate" of People

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (AP)—Senate backers of public power moved their fight today for a single high dam in the Hells canyon area with what they said was a "mandate" from the people in the last election.

Senators from the people in the last election, Sen. Wayne Morse, D., Ore., and 26 senators from 22 states, would introduce a bill today providing federal power in the Hells canyon area.

A similar bill was defeated by the senate last year 51-41. Morse and other sponsors said congressional election results in the Pacific Northwest last November constituted a "mandate" for federal development and rejection of the private development plan.

Several public power-minded senators including Morse secured important victories in the election. "For four years, administration spokesmen have said the people of the area should be free to develop how they see fit," Morse said.

"That decision on Hells canyon should be honored by the President, Secretary of the Interior and their supporters in congress," he said. "The federal power commission, after a long public versus private power battle, last year, has recommended construction of the first dam."

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House OK's "Little Hoover" Group for Probe of Finances

BOISE, Jan. 14 (AP)—The house passed 32-25 and sent to the senate today its own resolution to set up a 10-member bipartisan committee of both houses of the Idaho legislature to seek ways to cut state government costs.

The resolution was introduced by Rep. Kenneth Self, R., Twin Falls, and Greg Potvin, D., Power. Seventeen Republicans and 15 Democrats voted for it, while 13 Republicans and 12 Democrats voted against it.

The senate was scheduled to vote today on a resolution introduced by two Republican senators to set up a committee of five senators to conduct a similar investigation.

Like the senate resolution, the house resolution calls for the committee to report within 30 days. Self said it was introduced because "this body is the money-raising one."

Potvin called it "an attempt to guarantee that the investigation will be entirely nonpartisan." He said it would be "doomed to failure if one party or the other were in control."

Rep. H. Grant Gardner, R., Payson, had voted for it although he regretted that "the evidence indicates the long-standing jealousy between the two houses has reared its ugly head."

Assistant Minority Leader W. J. Sewell, D., Teton, said he "wondered if it would not duplicate work of the interim tax study committee."

Rep. Perry Swisher, R., Bannock, said the house resolution was "far more realistic and less of a publicity seeking resolution" than the one offered in the senate.

The resolution would call for appointment of five representatives by the speaker of the house and five senators by the president of the senate. In neither case would more than three be of the majority party.

The bill would require the committee to report within 30 days. Rep. Carl Burt, R., Ada, received unanimous approval for corrections to two bills he offered to try to speed up the process.

C. Wayland Brooks, Ex-Senator, Passes

CHICAGO, Jan. 14 (AP)—Former U. S. Sen. C. Wayland Brooks (Curley) Brooks, Chicago, died today at Passavant hospital following a heart attack. Brooks, who married Mrs. Arthur J. Peavey, Jr., formerly Twin Falls, was 59. Illinois Republican national committeeman at the time of his death, the former senator entered the hospital Tuesday after an attack of chest pains. His illness was diagnosed as a "dissecting aneurysm of the aorta," or a tear in the artery of his heart.

A hospital spokesman said death was attributed to the heart condition. "Mr. and Mrs. Brooks were frequent guests at the Magic Valley. They spent their vacations at a summer home at Pettit lake in Stanley.

Brooks was defeated three times in races for public office before his election to the U. S. senate during World War I. He attended the University of Illinois, the University of Wisconsin and Northwestern University, from which he received a law degree in 1925.

A colorful personality, Brooks was a strong isolationist and during the 1942 campaign found himself at odds with both presidential candidates, Republican Wendell L. Willkie and Democrat Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Brooks came back from France, he said, "determined to have something to say about running my government," and determined that "American soldiers should ever again be sent to die in foreign lands."

However, he voted for war on Dec. 8, 1941, and the following day, he was called back to active military service. He was wounded in World War I, and won a battlefield commission.

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Increases for Beet Acreage Are Disclosed

Consumption estimate for sugar has been increased from 8,800,000 to 9,000,000 tons and sugar beet acreage estimates have risen from 22,000 to 24,000 acres, according to a report received Saturday by D. C. Kimbrey, secretary of the Idaho Beet Growers association.

The increase in acreage allotment was the first announced since December 1956. The quota 100,000 tons over last year for the nation, an increase of almost 12 percent.

The increase in acreage allotment will produce 253,000 tons of beet sugar in excess of the total market requirements for the industry. The estimate is based on the 1956 average of sugar per acre with the member of the acreage loss of planted in harvested acres.

The director of the agriculture department's sugar branch said in a statement that acreage has increased because of the sugar beet are now 40 points above the 1955 and 1956 crop years.

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U. S. Proposes Five-Item Plan On Atoms Use

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Jan. 14 (AP)—The United States today proposed a five-point disarmament plan providing for peaceful use of all future nuclear production and sharing of the technology of atomic energy and hydrogen test explosions.

Outlining the program to the United Nations main political committee, U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., also proposed a cut-back in manpower to 25 million for the United States and Russia and 700,000 for Britain and France; cut-out of outer space satellite tests and safeguards against surprise attack.

The disarmament proposals, he said, would be carried out only under an effective inspection system. In the case of armed forces, such inspection would include President Eisenhower's "open skies" plan for mutual reconnaissance as well as utilizing aerial inspection teams.

Lodge summarized these five objectives for the U. S. arms reduction plan:

Graham Dies In Colorado's Gas Chamber

CANYON CITY, Colo., Jan. 14 (AP)—Coolly accepting his fate, John Edgar Graham was executed Friday night in Colorado's gas chamber for destroying an airplane that carried his mother and 43 other persons to death.

The 29-year-old father of two children, Graham was pronounced dead in 15 minutes.

After being taken into "unconsciousness," the perpetrator of the nation's worst recorded mass airplane killing was strapped into the gas chamber.

Graham was convicted of murdering his mother, Mrs. Dalis E. King, 53, she perished with 43 other women, children and men.

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Dworshak Introduces Bill to Get Dam at Burns Creek Site

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (Special)—Sen. Henry Dworshak, R., Idaho, has introduced in the senate a bill calling for the construction of a regulating reservoir at the Burns creek site in the upper Snake river valley.

The project would involve irrigation, flood control, creation of hydroelectric power opportunities, recreation and benefits to wildlife.

The project is being considered as a feature of the proposed dam and reservoir, and is to be integrated with it financially and operationally.

The irrigation storage space in the proposed reservoir is to be reserved for subscription by organizations which have storage rights in the Palouse reservoir. But any Burns creek storage space not subscribed to within six months from the first money appropriation for the project shall be made available in accordance with the federal reclamation laws.

The bill also calls for the construction of minimum recreation facilities. A key provision is the concern for the propagation and preservation of fish and wildlife.

The reservoir and lands adjacent to it shall be open to free public use for lawful hunting and fishing purposes, consistent with safety.

During the time when releases for other purposes are less than 1,000 cubic feet per second, a release of this amount from Burns creek reservoir shall nevertheless be maintained for the benefit of downstream fish life, the bill provides. But it does qualify this to allow a reduction for other purposes whenever the release is harmful to the primary purposes of the project.

The final section of the bill calls for the construction of facilities to deliver power to the reservoir area.

The senator expresses the hope that the Burns "Eddy" dam will be authorized for study by the executive branch that the project would be recommended to congress on a "participatory" basis. Of course, the "participatory" policy has yet to be tried, so it is exactly clear just what form it would take in a project such as Burns Eddy.

Dworshak said that Senator Chavez, D., N. M., had reintroduced the rivers and harbors bill, vetoed last year by the President, which contained the Burns Eddy dam. In that bill, the recommendation is for a federal dam.

Dworshak said about the future of the Columbia river basin, "There is growing awareness of the impending power shortage by 1950 in the Columbia river basin. While there is unanimity in the Missouri river basin and in the Colorado river basin concerning resource development, it is unfortunate that in the Columbia basin we face controversy and delay."
