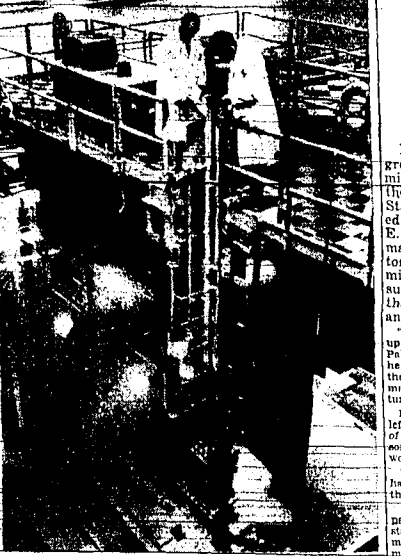

**TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS**

WASHINGTON—America's military capacity to resist Russian invasion of the Middle East has been questioned by a group of congressmen led by Representative John F. Dulles and Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff.

Although their statements are not intended to be a criticism of the military, they were not entirely satisfactory to their listeners.

The committee's action in the administration, in the opinion of bipartisan critics, has failed to build a strong case for the military, which could be transported to the scene of conflict almost overnight.

Under the current law, the military is largely to economy troops. Admiral Radford has concentrated on creating a defense force for nuclear warfare.

According to official testimony, the United States does not have enough transport planes to carry a single division with necessary vehicles and equipment.

It was pointed out that at least three fully equipped divisions would be needed to hold the Russians pending all-out mobilization.

**NEED OF MORE TRANSPORT PLANES**—This very dilemma was pointed out when the house appropriations committee held hearings on the military budget during the last session of congress. It was raised by Representative Daniel P. Flood, Pennsylvania, regarding the incident.

It was pointed out that what would happen if we had trouble in the Middle East, and how we would transport our troops.

It was pointed out to me that the testimony indicated that there is not enough aircraft to move even one division, including its hardware, over the ocean in one flight to foreign shores.

**NO PROGRAM TO AUGMENT AIRLIFT**—Senator Stuart Symington, former secretary of the Senate Committee on Appropriations, said in a speech that we are totally inadequate with respect to airlift for the army. If the figures you gave are correct, we still plan to remain inadequate. Is that a fair statement?

**UNTHINKABLE ALTERNATIVE**—This slighted tendency becomes especially serious because any striking force probably would have to be flown from this country—direct to the Middle East.

It was pointed out that the Pentagon experts concede, the only alternative would be to throw A and B bombs at the invading force. But every diplomat knows that this is a very serious matter.

The United States, the Middle East crisis shows, must have a system of national defense which is not dependent on the air force alone.

The lack of such a balanced defense system "could be a real disaster," he said.

# Progress Is Noted in Grazing Report Despite Dry Condition

The Sawtooth National Forest staff made considerable improvement in range lands during 1956 despite the lack of moisture, according to the annual grazing report.

The forest service reseeded another 1,800 acres last year to raise the total of land seeded since 1940 to 17,120. Spraying to eradicate sagebrush on 2,450 acres was reported.

G. W. Carlson, staff member, reported that the brush eradication is done on land where the brush has invaded natural grass areas or there is a good understory of grasses. He noted the brush withdraws a large part of the moisture and soil nutrients needed by grasses. Studies completed this year disclosed grasses showed 100 per cent better growth after sagebrush had been eliminated.

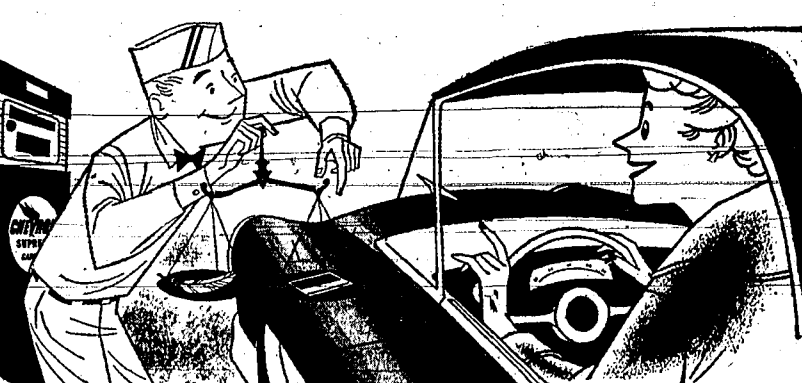

## Aides Launch Study for Ike Doctrine Plan

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—Advisers to President Eisenhower are launching a study of the economic phase of the Eisenhower doctrine for stabilizing the Middle East.

Here are some of the aid projects being considered:

Development of the Jordan river valley. This would require a settlement of Israeli-Jordanian-Syrian border claims and disputes to be fully effective. But the planners think a good start can be made without waiting for such a settlement.

Development of the ancient Taurus-Euphrates valley in Iraq. A Tennessee valley authority-type development of power and irrigation resources in the Nile river valley, stretching all the way to the river's source in central Africa to its mouth in Egypt.

Improvement of highway and rail systems linking the middle eastern nations.

Setting up a system for low-interest farm or small business loans for the area to spur production and increase the income of the farmers and small businessmen.

County Agent Gives Report For Activities

RHODES, Jan. 15—Extension teaching and other activities of the Lincoln county agent and home demonstration agent at huge were today and varied during 1956, County Agent J. Howard Manning reported.

The agent made 338 home and farm visits during the year and the home demonstration agent made 18 visits. The county agent handled 1,006 calls and 1,170 telephone calls.

There were 38 news articles and stories published and 1,502 bulletins distributed. Ten adult demonstration lessons were given, two adult training, nine 4-H leader training and 75 other adult work meetings held. In addition six YMCWYM meetings with 160 persons attending and 20 4-H club work meetings with 3,330 attending held.

There were 106 meetings held by leaders with 860 persons attending. During the year, 16 clubs were organized with 40 boys and 100 girls participating. All 60 of the boys and 95 of the girls completed their projects.

There were 12 boys in first year work and 24 girls; 12 boys in second year and 15 girls; four boys in third year and 17 girls; seven boys in fourth year and 15 girls and two boys in fifth year and 13 girls. During the year 124 youths who received definite training in leadership, 120 in demonstration, 26 in group recreation leadership, 20 in music appreciation, 60 in money management, 10 in farm and home safety, 10 in citizenship, 92 in personality improvement, one in forestry and 28 in health, nursing and first aid.

### West Seeking Bid for Egypt Pact in Canal

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—The western powers apparently intend to make a major effort to get agreement with Egypt in the next seven weeks on some practical plan for operation of the Suez canal.

The need for at least a provisional agreement was stressed by March 1, according to the Secretary of State, according to the State Department.

But the Egyptian government, which has been in power since the 1952 revolution, has been slow to accept the new British plan.

The Suez canal, jammed during the recent fighting in Egypt, is expected to be partially cleared by March 1—enough to allow at least 10,000 tons of cargo to pass through the canal, which comprise about half the canal's normal capacity.

From that date until the waterway is a complete free of warships, some authority will be given to the Egyptian government to decide which ships will not go through the canal, which will and which will not.

It is thought the Egyptian government will have the power to allow or deny passage to any country it does not like. At the moment, those would include France and Britain, which attacked Egypt last November.

Diplomats did not give any indication of a concerted plan of attack on the problem.

But in general, informants said, they are eyeing the following:

1. The Best Canal Users association probably should be expanded to include the largest membership and should have a large role in future relations with Egypt over the canal.

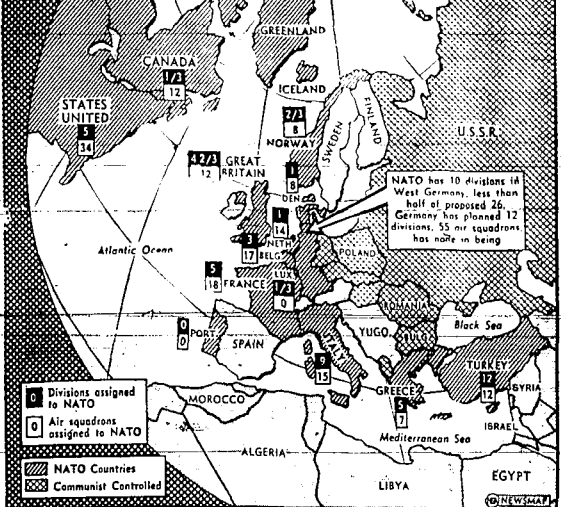
2. The canal should be operated by a company to be handled by the users association because Egypt is not equipped to do it.

3. The users association could collect tolls from the shippers and pay part of the money to Egypt for use of the canal.

Presumably Dulles is working in terms of an agreement by which the canal would be operated by a company having it to operate the canal with it. They rejected a similar proposal after the canal was closed and it was blocked.

Egypt has refused to enter into an agreement with the United Nations, but has left the way open for action through the United Nations.
