TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Republican and Democratic leaders on Capitol Hill have defied and repudiated the liberal wings of both major parties in organizing key committees for the current session. They disregarded the known wishes of both the Eisenhower and Stevenson-Truman factions.

Their selection of control of committees dealing with social, economic and foreign affairs problems in the hands of conservatives. They took special pains to deprive the White House of the right to select "outsiders" of dominant influence over such questions as taxation, appropriations, business and industry and finance generally. Only in the field of foreign affairs did they forebode approval of Ike's general policy.

Although they violated the sacred sanctity and preference system which they satisfied their purpose, they refused to ease the path for an Eisenhower civil rights program when they named Sen. James O. Eastland, Mississippi, to the committee. And no more than a handful protested against placing such an opponent of civil rights in this all-important post.

NEW DEALER'S ADVICE, REJECTED.—The Democrats snubbed National Chairman Paul M. Butler, who had urged the committee to be a liberal. They emphasized again that the Republican Johnson regime would take no advice from such new dealers as Harry S. Truman, Adlai E. Stevenson or any other Democrats.

In naming Sen. John F. Kennedy, Massachusetts, as foreign affairs, Sen. Estes Kefauver, who opposed the Johnson regime, was named as the new chairman of the committee. They took this way of revealing their resentment against the new administration by Stevenson and his running mate from Tennessee.

HONOR FRANK LAUSCHKE.—The Democratic honor of Sen. Frank J. Lausche, a Republican, also offended the liberals. They named the man who supported the late Senator Taft, a Roosevelt administration, to such important committees as banking and currency and interstate and foreign commerce. EISENHOWER LIBERALS GET INNOUOUS POSTS.—Three Eisenhower liberals, including two who had served under him, were sent to the foreign affairs committee. They are Sen. John Sherman Cooper and Thurston B. Morton, Kentucky, and Sen. Jacob K. Javits, New York.

VIEWPOINTS OF OTHERS

HIGHER FREIGHT RATES WILL HURT THE WEST.—There is a growing concern over the effect of higher freight rates on the West. As authorized last week by the Interstate Commerce Commission, the action is an emergency measure to deal with the problem of rising freight rates.

This is the second time this year that the rates have gone up. Last March there was a general increase of 6 per cent. And there is now pending before the ICC a request for a 15 per cent hike. This one is being considered by the commission, and that may have been its justification for permitting the present emergency relief to expire.

ISRAELI ROLE UNDER THE NEW EISENHOWER DOCTRINE.—The Middle East was the subject of some of the closest questioning by congressmen when their foreign policy committee held closed sessions with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles. He has indicated that many of the operating details on the new policy will not be revealed in open committee hearings, for reasons of military security.

Rep. Wayne L. Hays, D., O., denounced the closed hearings. He walked out of a secret session on January 10, after Dulles had been clearing that Dulles was trying to "take the committee's hands" by giving it confidential information.

WE ARE DEPENDENT, TOO.—Recent increases in the prices of crude oil and gasoline in the United States are expected by the experts to become nationwide. Some crude prices have shot up 12 per cent.

In consequence, motorists may soon be paying more for fuel and homeowners likewise for heating oil.

ONE OF THE FIRMS INVOLVED IN THE BOOST DECLARED that one big cause was the notable rise in the oil industry's costs since the last price hike in 1953, three and a half years ago.

But it is agreed, too, that the sharp drop in shipments of Middle Eastern oil via Suez to the U.S. east coast is a prime factor. Furthermore, U.S. shipments abroad to take up some of the serious Middle East slack have put additional pressure on our supplies.

Health Funds Boost Sought By President

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—President Eisenhower proposed today that federal spending for health be boosted 10 million dollars in fiscal 1958 to 600 million.

He also asked legislation providing for expansion and improvement of voluntary health insurance plans.

Under the recommended legislation, the President said, "family insurance companies and nonprofit associations could pool their resources and experience."

The proposed budget calls for an increase of 10 million dollars in new grants for construction of medical research facilities.

The President estimated federal aid to hospital construction at 100 million dollars, an increase of 17 million dollars over the estimate for the current (1957) fiscal year.

The budget also includes 40 million for the recently started program of grants to communities to stimulate construction of waste treatment facilities.

In addition to more research on disease generally, the budget would provide money for community health services to the aged and chronically ill, for research on air pollution, for collection of accident prevention, and for health services to children and Indians.

Reimbursement for medical and drug laws would be tightened.

The President said federal grants for Bala polio vaccine no longer will be needed.

Interest Rates Hiked, Claims Ike in Budget

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—President Eisenhower said today the "present record" of the federal government's budget "has been a record of steady improvement."

He said the federal budget for fiscal 1958 will be 262.9 billion dollars. This would be within the permanent debt ceiling of 275 billion.

Eisenhower predicted in his budget message that the national debt on June 30, 1958—the end of the fiscal year—will be 262.9 billion dollars. This would be within the permanent debt ceiling of 275 billion.

In the past two years, congress has authorized a temporary increase in the debt limit to 262.9 billion dollars. This would be within the permanent debt ceiling of 275 billion.

When Mr. Eisenhower took office in January, 1953, the national debt stood at nearly 267.3 billion dollars. It now is slightly more than 275 billion but will drop during the next few months as big tax collections start pouring into the treasury.

Regarding the debt, the President said, "The federal government is maintaining the supply of funds available for private financing of other activities."

Kentucky's Water Resources Noted

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP)—Kentucky has underway an elaborate survey to catalog the state's water resources, and the problems which go with them.

The survey is being made by Groves Land, Jr., an assistant professor in engineering at the University of Kentucky, in cooperation with the state's conservation department. It will include such things as hydrology, flood control, hydraulics, navigation, irrigation water supply, and related subjects.

Kentucky's conservation program provides a sound control of water, Land said. "Almost all of our soil is due to movement of unconsolidated water, and this study will supplement federal water control program now in existence, by serving as a guide for design of future conservation projects."

Hope Is Seen For Tax Cuts During 1958

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey today held out hope for a general tax cut next year.

If the government does not begin to reduce spending and cut taxes before much longer, he said, "we'll have a depression that will cur your hair." However, he did not couple this statement with any definite time element.

Humphrey also virtually invited congress to cut President Eisenhower's budget—71.8 billion dollars for fiscal 1958—if it can do so without maintaining proper protection and services for the American people.

"If congress can find ways to cut the budget," he told newsmen, "I would be very glad to see it."

Humphrey, discussing the budget with reporters, said that if the President's program is "adopted and resolutely followed, we can, a year hence, give consideration not only to some further payment on the public debt but also to further tax reductions."

Newsboys' Fund Has Anniversary

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—This is the 50th year of the "Newsboys' Scholarship" at Harvard.

The idea for a scholarship at Harvard started with Nathan S. Bokstom of Brookline, then on the staff of a Boston paper (the Globe).

Since it was raised through public subscription, the fund has permitted more than 35 newsboys "with at least one year on the street" to attend the university.

Among those named have been Dr. Samuel Levine, a noted heart specialist, as well as various architects, attorneys and others.

The man who founded the plan, Bokstom, now is 72 and still regards himself as "young." The first recipient was Myron Heller, now a public accountant.

School Offering Valley Students Science Program

Magie Valley high school sophomores and juniors are eligible to apply for admission to Brigham Young University's Junior Engineers and Scientists Summer Institute, scheduled for June 2 to 15 at Provo.

Purpose of the institute is to give participants first hand experience in campus classroom and laboratory activities under supervision of BYU scientists and engineering faculty members.

Cost of the institute is \$75, although students unable to afford the fee will receive aid from industrial firms in the Utah area. Scientists of Tomorrow, the sponsoring organization, reports the institute is in its eleventh year and is striving to eliminate ability to pay as an admission requirement.

Area high schools will receive application forms and additional information in early April. Applications are due May 2.

Railroad Extends Rates Reductions

BOISE, Jan. 16 (AP)—The Union Pacific railroad announced here today it had extended until March 31 its emergency-reduced freight rates on hay being shipped to drought-stricken areas.

William J. Hyman, special UP agent here, said the hay would be handled at half the regular rate to all points within the designated disaster areas.

Hyman said several thousand carloads of hay already had gone at the reduced rate from Idaho to Texas, Kansas and Oklahoma.

"Keep Youth Busy" Proposed As Preventive of Delinquency

By HAL BOTTE

NEW YORK, Jan. 16 (AP)—Amid all the suggestions on how to cure the nation's growing problem of juvenile delinquency, Dr. Laurence C. Jones offers a simple, old-fashioned prescription.

"The only solution is to keep the young people busy. Give them something worthwhile to do. Then they'll stay out of trouble."

Does this remedy sound too easy? Dr. Jones says it has worked unthinkingly with 6,000 boys and girls he has educated since 1909.

In that year Dr. Jones, a northern Negro with a college degree, \$1.85 in cash, a few clean shirts—and a lot of faith—started the "Primer Western Country Life School." The site was a clearing in the woods 22 miles southeast of Jackson, Miss. His first day was a slump.

His first class consisted of three boys who could neither read nor write. The ceiling of his open-air classroom was a cedar tree.

Today Dr. Jones, known as "the little professor of PRIMER WOODS," and his "work-at-you-go" school are national figures.

Usually famous, other educators listen with respect when he says: "The boys engage we have now are just a result of not giving our young people enough to do."

They have energy and have to do something—good or bad. In the old days, they had chores. They don't have enough chores at home any more to keep them occupied.

"You can't build enough boys' clubhouses to give them all the recreation they need. It would cost too much. But there are plenty of public schools already built that stand empty at night."

"Why not keep them open in the evening and provide them with programs to keep the young people busy? It would be a big help."

As Dr. Jones, his brown face a lamp of kindness, is anxious to see more common-sense understanding applied to the problem of curbing juvenile delinquency.

In nearly a half century, helped by more than 50,000 individual contributions (both white and Negro), he has built up a million-dollar endowment for his own school, which now has 150 students, a faculty of 46, and a \$250,000 plant consisting of eight buildings on 1,700 acres of farm and woodland.

For his efforts Gov. Hugh White at a testimonial meeting in 1955 called him "Mississippi's first citizen."

Lower Runoff Is Anticipated On Watershed

A slightly lower runoff in 1957 than the 1954-1955 average is expected for the upper Snake river watershed by the U. S. weather bureau, reports Lynn Grandall, district engineer of the U. S. forest service and Snake river watershed for the state.

The Snake at Moran and Fall River near Squirrel are the only locations expected to exceed the 14-year average. Runoff at Moran is predicted to be 103 per cent of the average and runoff at Squirrel, 101 per cent.

Other percentages predicted include Snake river near Hite, 99; Henry's fork near Ashton, 99; Teton river near St. Anthony, 96; Snake river near Blackfoot, 94; and Snake river at American Falls, 91.

Predictions are based primarily on present snowfall, precipitation during the past three months and assumed normal precipitation during the next six months, Grandall said.

According to snow surveys made Jan. 7 and 8 by soil conservation service and forest service employees, the CCO camp near Fall River shows the highest percentage of water content compared to normal figures. They measured 30 inches of snow with a water content of 4.5 inches, compared to a normal content of 4.0 inches, or 141 per cent of normal.

Last year's water content was 72. Measurements at Alton ranger station showed 14 inches of snow and 23 inches water content, compared with 14 inches a year ago and a normal content of 23.

The East Rim station, draining into the Snake, recorded 21 inches of snow and 9.3 inches water content, compared with 21 inches a year ago and a 4.4 inch normal content.

Figures for Grover park divide, which drains into Fall River, were 34 inches of snow and 6.4 inches water content, compared with 34 inches last year and a 4.7 average.

Snow King mountain, draining into the Snake, was measured at 30 inches of snow and 4.7 water content, compared with 30 inches a year ago and a 4.4 normal water content.

Twenty-one inches of snow were measured at Bryan flat, draining into the Snake, with a water content of 4.0. Water content in 1956 was 6.0 and the normal figure is 4.3.

Deerfoot snow was recorded at 34 inches last year and 7.1 inches water content, compared with 34 inches of snow and 7.3 inches water content, compared with 34 inches a year ago and a 4.7 normal water content.

Two measuring stations—Greys boundary divide, which drains into the Snake, and Greys creek, which drains into Mud lake—recorded lower water contents than normal.

Greys boundary had 22 inches of snow and a 4.3 water content, compared with 43 inches a year ago and a 4.7 normal water content.

Greys creek had 27 inches of snow and a 3.8 water content, compared with 27 inches a year ago and a 4.0 normal water content.

U. S. Claimed Leading Reds In Arms Race

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—Adm. Arthur W. Radford told congress that the United States probably has won the military race over Russia slightly during the past 12 months.

He also told the house foreign affairs committee that passage of President Eisenhower's Middle East program will "practically eliminate the chance of war" in the oil-rich region.

He testified in secret Jan. 8. The committee made public today a heavily-censored version of his testimony.

Economic aid aspects of the president's plan for protecting the middle east from communism appeared headed for trouble in the senate. Strong sentiment was building up to nullify economic aid from other portions of the plan—the requested authority for the president to use U.S. troops if necessary to resist any communist aggression in the Middle East.

Rep. A. S. E. Cavanaugh, R-Mo., asked Radford if the United States has "lost out" in the arms race with Russia in the past 12 months.

"I think we still have a definite superiority over the Soviet Union," Radford replied.

"Do we have a greater superiority than we had a year ago, or not, or is it a superiority?" Cavanaugh asked.

"My own feeling is that we probably have a little greater superiority," Radford replied.

His subsequent testimony at this point was heavily censored.

Ask Troops Back

TOKYO, Jan. 16 (AP)—The village of Tachikawa, which said it didn't want U. S. soldiers four months ago, admitted today it had appealed for their return.

But Col. Burton K. Bama, commander of the nearby Tachikawa air force base, said he would not lift the 11 p.m. to dawn curfew he had clamped on his command.

Senator Has Little Hope for Okay of Dam in Hells Canyon

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (Special)—Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, D. N. M., chairman of the senate irrigation and reclamation subcommittee, is not hopeful of congressional approval of a federal dam in Hells canyon.

"On balance," he told a CBS radio audience, "odds are against its federal dam at Hells canyon as the Idaho Power company goes ahead and builds its dam at the site. I think there's a possibility of passing it to approve the federal structure in the senate but only a slim chance in the house."

He said the President's probable approval of a high federal dam at the Pleasant Valley site just below Hells canyon on Snake river might leave congress "in such a confused state" that passage of the Hells canyon bill would be impossible.

Anderson, however, emphasized his personal support for a federal dam at Hells canyon. Such a dam was defeated 41-41 in the senate last year and failed even to clear the house rules committee for floor action.

School Board Rehires Ritter

WENDELL, Jan. 16—A. J. Ritter, superintendent of Wendell school, was rehired for three years by the school trustees Monday evening. This is Ritter's sixth year as superintendent at Wendell.

A petition was received from taxpayers in Orchard Valley requesting the Wendell school board to take necessary steps for reorganization. The board decided to sell the property east of the grade school at 2 p. m. Jan. 20.

Meeting nights of the board were changed to the second Monday of each month from the second Wednesday, Harry LeMone, representative of the county civil air patrol, will meet with the board on Feb. 11.

The appointment of a new school board for high school boys and girls was discussed. The board decided that as long as no appropriation had been made in the budget, the project is impossible at the present time. The board appropriated \$75 to cover graduation expenses.



Algeria Knot Set for Talks By U. N. Unit

France is preparing to put its friendship with the United States and other western countries to the test in a United Nations debate on Algeria.

The problem of Algeria's future has been put on the program of the General Assembly for debate. Against French opposition, at the demand of the "anti-colonial" bloc of Asian and African nations.

The assembly can take no effective action on the issue. But to France, a vote in favor of the independence of Algeria would be a complete repudiation of the French position.

Premier Guy Mollet and Foreign Minister Christian Pineau are trying to line up all the countries they can to concentrate on those of western Europe and the western world.

France's side.

Of all the countries in the world, the attitude of the United States is of most importance to France.

If the United States does not support France, the relations between the two traditional allies, severely strained by the Suez canal dispute, will be a new low.

On Nov. 1, 1954, Algerian nationalists demanded independence. France has been fighting a war in Algeria. This war, which does not often get into the headlines, has forced France to equip about 500,000 troops.

The rebels naturally have the support of the Arab countries and the "anti-colonial" bloc.

The Algerian issue has been raised repeatedly in the U. N. But France refuses to recognize the competence of the U. N. even to decide the issue.

The reason is that, legally, Algeria is not a colonial possession. It is officially a part of France itself. It is represented in the French parliament.

France points out that the U. N. charter specifies that none of its provisions "authorize the U. N. to intervene in matters which are essentially within the jurisdiction of any state."

Mass Flights Are Seen for Egypt's Jews

LONDON, Jan. 16 (AP)—Fifty thousand stateless Jews face expulsion or evacuation from Egypt in a tragic flight rivaling the exodus of Moses 2,400 years ago.

Nearly 1,000 refugees already have arrived in Naples, Italy, with stories of persecution, mistreatment and loss of their possessions—the aftermath of the Israeli invasion of Egypt.

Egyptian authorities deny that the Jews must leave. They dispute the stories of persecution.

But long queues have formed outside the airport and ship-loading offices, the exit visa department of the interior ministry opened three extra offices and another shipload of refugees is due in Naples Sunday.

More are expected to follow.

Take their ancient Jewish roots, who were led out of Egypt by Moses in the days of the pharaohs; their objective is still the "promised land."

As one refugee said in Naples, "for us now only Israel remains as the final place of settling."

Herbert A. Friedman, executive head of the United Jewish appeal, says that Jewish agencies have launched a 100 million dollar emergency drive to help Jewish refugees from Hungary, Egypt and North Africa.

He says that the entire Jewish community in Egypt faces expulsion, although organizations are prepared to help Egyptian Jews escape.

'Economy Myth,' Charge Demo Officials

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—President Eisenhower's record budget, shared misgivings among some Democrats today and prompted a Democratic charge that Republican economy is a myth.

"Republicans are giving Democrats a real lesson in the art of spending while at the same time leading the country to believe that they are the guardians of the purse strings," Sen. Thomas G. Abernethy, D. Miss., said. "The President's budget is cold evidence that the economy is a myth."

Abernethy said the President, in four years already has spent 20 billion dollars more than was spent by former President Truman in the last years of the previous administration.

"Mr. Truman was fighting a real economy," Abernethy added.

Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D. Va., chairman of the banking committee, said the 1957 budget will result in increased inflation.

"The federal government itself is contributing to the inflation by increasing federal trust fund expenditures and by increased commitments under federal credit programs in which the government insures and guarantees private loans," he said.

"It is added," he said, "that in times of peace and prosperity, sound budget requires elimination of non-essential expenditures to the extent that debt and taxes can be reduced," Byrd said.

Sen. Oliver Bridges, R. N. H., ranking Republican on the senate appropriations committee, praised the Democrats' "emphasis on fiscal integrity" and the fact that the budget is balanced for the third year in a row.

The kidnapping story and 16 other persons involved with the case were subpoenaed to appear before the grand jury by Superior Judge Louis H. Burke yesterday at the request of District Attorney William D. McKesson.

"The surprise action" came after police said they had uncovered no positive evidence in probing Miss McDonald's story of how she was abducted from her home by two men Jan. 4, held captive for 24 hours and then dumped off on the desert.

Miss McDonald and other principal witnesses were scheduled to testify tomorrow. Today, the grand jury was to be given an account of stories told by the blond beauty and other figures in the bizarre case.






