Bonding limits of class A and B districts are raised from 10 per cent to 15 per cent of assessed valuation. Limits of class C districts are raised from 6 per cent to 10 per cent.

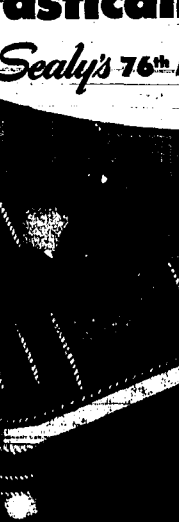

### IT'S AN IMPORTANT DECISION

When the state highway department offered five suggested plans for re-aligning highway U. S. 30 through Twin Falls some time ago, the *Times-News* expressed itself as favoring what is described as proposal "D."

This plan would make one-way traffic streets of the Second avenues through the city, with east and westbound traffic going in opposite directions.

To our way of thinking, it would keep most of the through traffic off Main avenue and thus relieve downtown congestion. Moreover, if the flow of traffic followed the Second avenues in opposite directions, it would be leading all such traffic directly past our established parking areas, making for great facility around the city.

In expressing this opinion, however, we were careful to point out that we made no pretense of being experts. We have every confidence in our state highway department and raise this question again only because of one factor under consideration.

As we understand it, the department is inclined to favor what is known as plan "E," which calls for turning westbound traffic one-way from Five Points east to Five Points west over Main avenue and eastbound traffic from Five Points west to Five Points east over Second avenue south and west.

The majority attending the meeting of business and city officials Wednesday afternoon agreed that the plan favored by the highway department would meet with their approval, although a few were inclined to favor making one-way streets out of the Second avenue and keeping through traffic off Main avenue.

One of the reasons set forth by the highway department in favoring the use of Main avenue one way is the cost that would be involved in widening Second avenue north and east.

This, to our way of thinking, raises a logical question. Shouldn't the Second avenue be widened on the city and the Second avenue north and east be widened to the same extent? It seems to be only one other real problem in developing plan "D." That is the redesigning that would be necessary at the two Five Point approaches to avoid traffic congestion.

No problem seems to be insurmountable in these days of modern highway construction, so it is possible, if the city will recognize the need for widening the Second avenue in any event, the highway department might think more favorably of plan "D" and could redesign the Five Point approaches without too much difficulty.

We have no desire to prolong a decision in this connection, because we know the department is hoping to reach some agreement within the next 30 days. Neither are we attempting to take issue with the plan the department has favored for the reasons it sets forth.

One only thought is that the city might well give serious consideration to relieving downtown congestion. Now would seem the logical time to consider such an improvement, because it might have an important bearing on determining the best all around downtown system for Twin Falls. And if we do not act now it may be more difficult to undertake widening the streets in question, and at such time the cost would be vastly higher.

Offhand, it seems to us that through traffic or one-way traffic should be kept off Main avenue at all possible. If we can raise our sights to the point of widening both Second avenues at the same time, to make for even greater efficiency, let's give it serious consideration.

### WE'RE GLAD HE'S STAYING

No doubt a man with the evident talents of Secretary of Labor James Mitchell could have his pick of many remunerative jobs in private industry. It is no wonder, therefore, that he has promised to stay at his post during President Eisenhower's second term.

People no longer need to be told that Mitchell has earned the esteem of both business and labor leaders in his tenure in the White House. Few who have ever occupied the job have managed to get more respect from both sides of the street.

Indeed, more than almost anyone in the Eisenhower cabinet, Mitchell perhaps represents the blend the President favors of good hard economic sense and warm human consideration in treating of the average American's daily problems.

We do not have many economic statesmen—men who can place the problems of industry and labor against a broad backdrop where the national need comes first and special privilege is canceled out. Mitchell seems to be one, in the judgment of those who deal with him at every level.

#### Hit by Storms; Wave of Cold

A wave of arctic air swept the north where temperatures ranged from 20 to 30 degrees below zero.

The snow piled up in a wide band from the Rockies across the central states into the Great Lakes region. Freezing rains plagued an area from southern Iowa to St. Louis.

Further south, heavy rains fell in the lower Mississippi valley with some amounts ranging from one-half to one inch. Lighter rains fell in eastern Texas and Arkansas as colder air pushed as far south as the Gulf of Mexico.

Weathermen said the band of snowfall will spread eastward during the day, with accumulations from New York to Virginia. Rain was seen for the south-east from Florida to the Gulf of Mexico. It was expected to continue over most of the central and southern plains, the Midwest and the Appalachians, and in the North-west from the Rockies to the coastal region.

Meanwhile, rivers continued to rise in sections of the midwest and east despite the colder weather.

The Green river climbed to two to three feet above flood stage near Bowling Green, Ky., yesterday, and the high water was expected to surge downstream to Woodbury, Ky., by Saturday.

Some minor flooding occurred in the Ohio and Ohio valley. A rise in the Connecticut river and its tributaries caused lowland flooding.

LONDON, Jan. 25 (AP)—British Defense Minister Duncan Sandys flies to Washington tonight to begin a week of defense talks with Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson.

The chief topic of the conference is expected to be Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's plans to build Britain's defense on guided missiles, including secondary emphasis on strengthening Britain's hand in negotiating atomic know-how for American missile.

Sandys will also discuss the law of former Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill, who will take with him the widest powers of any defense minister since Churchill held the post in World War II.

He said Sandys' first task will be to formulate "in the light of present strategic needs a defense policy for the United Kingdom."

The prime minister told the house of commons today that he will have authority to give decisions on all matters of policy affecting the size, shape, organization and disposition of the armed forces, their equipment and supply, including the defense research and development and their pay and conditions of service.

Nickerson said that "within minutes after the Suez canal was blocked on Nov. 1, radio messages went out to tankers at sea, new routing orders were initiated, and the huge job of shifting the sources of a large part of Europe's oil from the Persian Gulf to the Americas got under way."

Although virtually no American crude had been going to Europe in recent years, Nickerson said, American firms made crude shipments averaging 239,000 barrels daily for the month of November—despite the fact that it was not possible to begin shipments until the second week.

By mid-January, Nickerson said, the first state nearest the Gulf coast was 400,000 barrels a day over the normal "emergency rate," the oil men reported.

Some 583,000 barrels daily have been added to the 534,000 barrels of crude oil, gasoline, lubricants, fuel and other products which normally went to the European area from the U.S. and Venezuela, Nickerson reported. He added:

"These shipments from the American total more than two-thirds of Europe's emergency requirements. All told, roughly three-fourths of normal daily supplies were shipped to the European area during December and January."

Nickerson told his company managers that despite all efforts of the international oil companies, "the shortage cannot be completely made up."

# Informal War Conducted by British Units

Great Britain and the kingdom of Yemen are fighting an informal war in the southwestern tip of the Arabian peninsula. # Defense Cuts May Increase Help by U. S.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 (AP)—Great Britain's proposed substantial reduction of defense spending is likely to bring greater "crisis" phase contributions of defense money and manpower to collective security.

British Defense Minister Duncan Sandys will arrive here this weekend to discuss defense problems with U. S. officials. Sandys comes at the invitation of Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson.

The trend of discussion was indicated yesterday by Prime Minister Harold Macmillan in the house of commons. Macmillan said that the United Kingdom's defense burden must be lightened, that it no longer is bearable. The British put much thought and money and their trust and confidence in an air-borne, fire-brigade defense theory. It was that hot-shot and mobile armed units could arrive almost anywhere quickly, like the marines, get things well in hand.

The fire-brigade defense theory blew up in the recent British armed action against Egypt. The fire-brigade was conceived as a big stick in support of British policy, the United Kingdom's No. 1 political weapon. The fire-brigade landed, evidently to rid Egypt of the Nasser government.

It was British Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden, however, who resigned instead. British pride and British prestige were severely damaged. U. S. diplomatic pressure compelled the British and French to withdraw from Egypt. All of this has caused Britain to take a new, cold and suspicious look at their national defense achievements, commitments and general posture.

## Reds Laud Flier Trained for U. S.

TOKYO, Jan. 25 (AP)—An American-trained flier expert won top honors in Red China's first awards for contributions to science.

The radio said that Tien Hsueh-shen, one of the most controversial figures during the exchange of nations between the United States and Red China in 1945, won one of three top awards valued at \$5,000 each, given by the Chinese Academy of Sciences.

He won his award, the radio said, for a book written in the United States "covering the theories of the automatic control and the automatic regulation of various systems in engineering technique."

## Music Banned

VIENNA, Jan. 25 (AP)—The Bulgarian ministry of culture today ordered all dance bands in the country to stop playing "disident" western music.

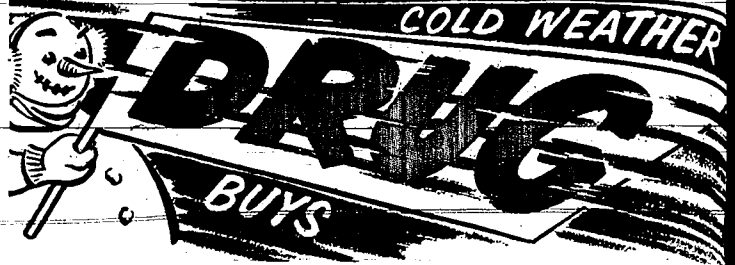

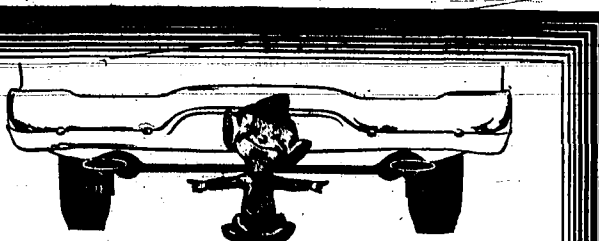
