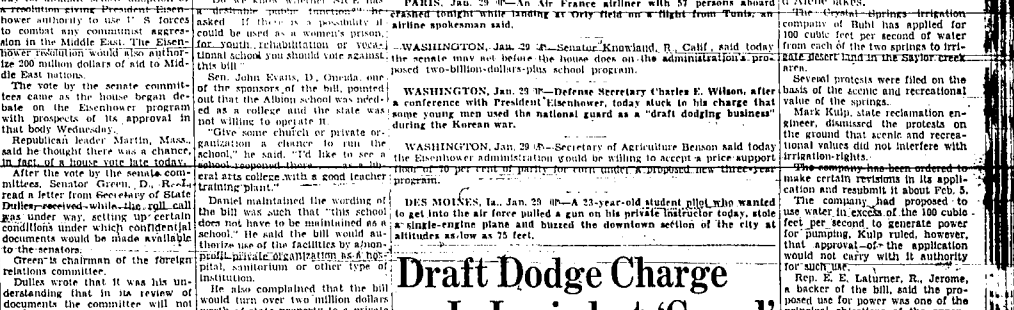

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, Jan. 29.—South Africa's white supremacy government is determined to smother a spreading bus and beer boycott by tens of thousands of Negroes in the restless slumtowns that ring Johannesburg and Pretoria.

A trial of strength appears imminent between white authority and the Negro people in the industrial heartland of the British commonwealth.

The bus boycott is in its fourth week. It began as a protest against a penny increase in fares for the nine-mile ride from Negro townships to the city. The buses, run by the Public Utility Transportation corporation, are segregated by race.

# Niece Located For Estate of Idaho Banker

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29 (AP)—Mrs. Florence Harrison said yesterday she believes she is the niece of an Idaho banker who died in 1900, leaving a large estate valued at \$250,000.

She had not known of the death of Philip P. Weber, a banker at Boise, until yesterday contacted her about it. A Utah woman, Mrs. Beatrice Holt, had told newsmen of Mrs. Harrison's whereabouts.

Mrs. Harrison, a widow of 12 years, said she is "nearly 80" and lives in the "best" of the estate and a son, could help.

Mrs. Harrison said her husband was Benjamin P. Harrison, a Utah miner at Bingham and Park City who moved to San Francisco about 14 years ago to live in shipyards at Oakland.

Mrs. Holt said Mrs. Harrison and a Miss Marion Stone were the only blood relatives of the banker she knew of. Mrs. Harrison said the banker was her father's brother and that Miss Stone, formerly of Boise, was her cousin. Mrs. Harrison said she had never known if Miss Stone was alive. The last she heard, Miss Stone was living near Portland, Ore., and had married a man named John. Mrs. Holt said she had said last name was Hill or Hall, she said.

Mrs. Holt said her husband, now dead, was a nephew of the banker. Administrators of the estate have been searching for heirs since 1904. They contacted Mrs. Holt.

Mrs. Harrison said she would ask an attorney to "handle it for me."

The elderly woman said she was born in Cherry Creek, Nev. The family moved to Belling in her early years. She lived in Salt Lake City after her marriage and until they moved to San Francisco.

Mrs. Harrison now lives with a granddaughter. She said she has one daughter, Mrs. and another in San Francisco, Calif.

She has a son, Peter Weber Harrison, a "radio" operator in a Spokane, Wash., casino.

Mrs. Harrison said the banker had no children.

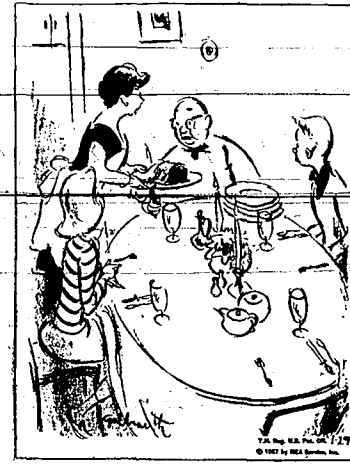

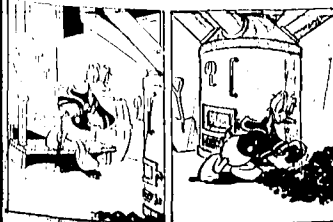

## Bureau Asks Base Acreage Crop Project

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—The American Farm Bureau federation was on record today in support of a base acreage program for corn growers to replace present acreage allotments.

A base acreage plan embodying the farm bureau's proposals was introduced in congress today by Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, R. Ill.

Federation President Charles Shuman urged quick passage of the measure by congress because commercial corn growers are making plans for spring planting.

The base acreage plan won approval from a majority of the nation's corn growers in a Dec. 11 referendum, but it failed to secure the necessary two-thirds majority.

The base acreage plan calls for a percentage of cropland to be placed in the soil bank. It also would reduce corn price supports to \$1.31 per bushel as compared with \$1.35 under the present acreage allotment program.

Shuman said corn farmers "repudiated" the ineffective corn acreage allotment program in the referendum and have ignored their corn allotments for years, "choosing to get along without price supports."

The 1957 corn allotment calls for planting 27½ million acres, but under Dirksen's bill, farmers would be required to place part of their cropland into the soil bank and cut corn acreages below 31 million acres.

A spokesman explaining the base acreage program, while allowing more corn to be planted, would cut into the planting of other feed grains, reducing their output.

## Excess Taxation for Defense Fund Poses British Problem

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Sir Winston Churchill, in the first of a more expensive project, expensive volume of his "History of the English Speaking People," wrote of a period when high taxes and other impositions were becoming too heavy for the people to bear, or beyond their willingness to bear.

"They were being taxed," Sir Winston wrote, "to the limit of their credulity."

It is a rich phrase full of meaning which, somehow, seems to bear on a current matter of similar import to the common man. Now, 700 years after the time of which Churchill wrote in such striking language, there is raised again the question: Is the credulity of taxpayers approaching a limit in accepting explanations of why taxes must be—and long continue to be—high?

The taxpayers in this instance are not the citizens of the United States. They are British subjects, who, it appears, are beginning to doubt that pinning a cluster of stars on a man's shoulders and flinging heavy bands of gold braid on his sleeve must, automatically, make him an infallible and always fair judge of what should be done each year with most of the money asked up by the taxpayer.

British subjects are beginning to focus a questioning attention on this matter because their nation is spending now for national defense at a rate which their leaders believe could cause the United Kingdom to go broke and hungry.

British Defense Secretary Duncan Sandys arrived here this week-end to discuss this and related matters with U. S. officials. Out of these discussions is likely to flow more commitments of U. S. men and money to the collective defense of the free world against the spread of police state slavery.

Now, 700 years after the time of which Churchill wrote in such striking language, there is raised again the question: Is the credulity of taxpayers approaching a limit in accepting explanations of why taxes must be—and long continue to be—high?

The taxpayers in this instance are not the citizens of the United States. They are British subjects, who, it appears, are beginning to doubt that pinning a cluster of stars on a man's shoulders and flinging heavy bands of gold braid on his sleeve must, automatically, make him an infallible and always fair judge of what should be done each year with most of the money asked up by the taxpayer.

British subjects are beginning to focus a questioning attention on this matter because their nation is spending now for national defense at a rate which their leaders believe could cause the United Kingdom to go broke and hungry.

British Defense Secretary Duncan Sandys arrived here this week-end to discuss this and related matters with U. S. officials. Out of these discussions is likely to flow more commitments of U. S. men and money to the collective defense of the free world against the spread of police state slavery.

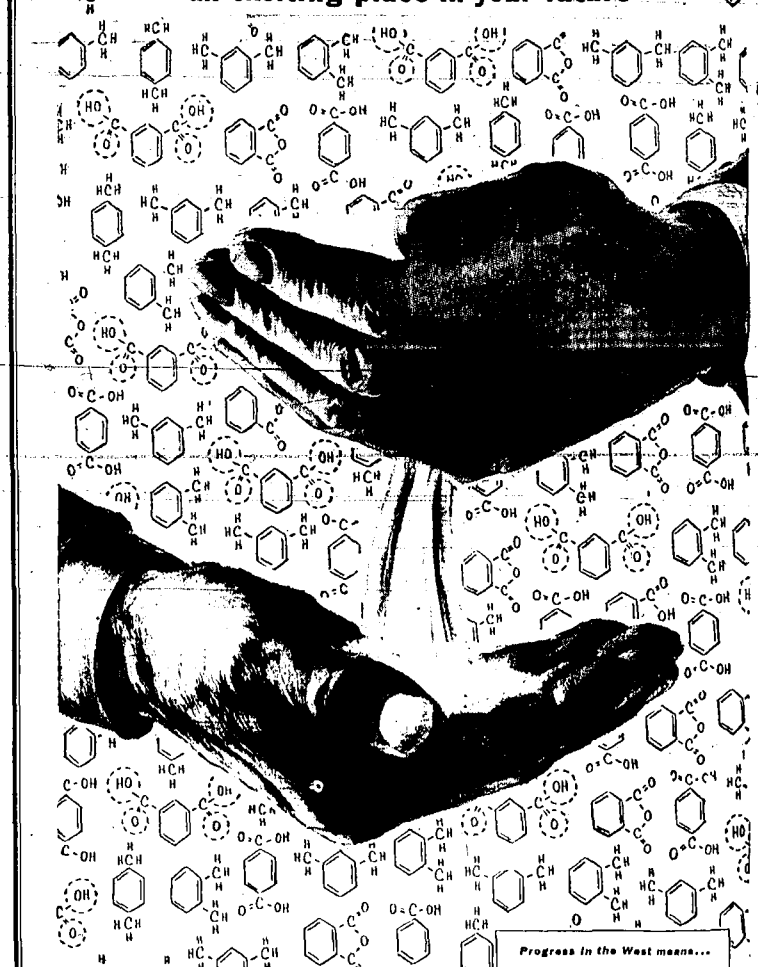
