

Senate Vote Okays Bill to Allow Lease Of SICE for School

BOISE, Jan. 29 (AP).—Bill calling for sale or lease of the long closed Southern Idaho State College of Education passed its first legislative hurdle today when the senate approved it 36 to 6. Only Sen. Vernon Daniel of Payette county from the Republican side joined five Democrats in voting against the measure. It had been introduced by a group of southern Idaho senators, led by Republican Sen. K. C. Barlow of Cassia county, who in previous sessions also led the fight in an attempt to reopen the school. Passage of the SICE bill, which calls for sale or lease of the property at Albion on or before May 1 of this year, was a great personal victory for Barlow.

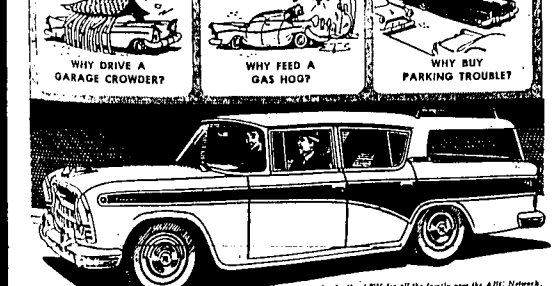

PARIS, Jan. 30 (U.P.)—Christian Dior is celebrating this week his 10th anniversary as dictator of Paris fashion. He presents his new spring collection Thursday.

His followers succeed with accuracy in today's house of Christian Dior represents a flourishing empire of high fashion, with branches in New York, London and other cities.

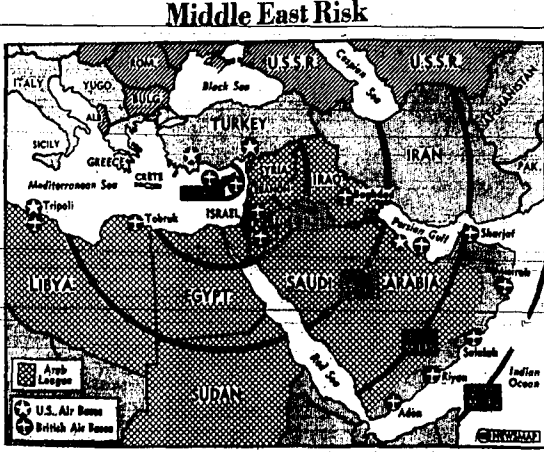

Geiger Counters Used by Doctors

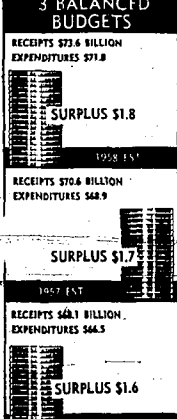

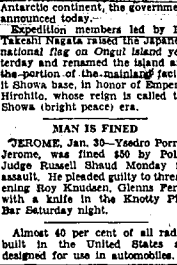

"Mountain Madness" May Cost Lives
Of 150 on Peaks Throughout World

ZURICH, Switzerland, Jan. 30 (AP)—The annual epidemic of "mountain madness" is sweeping Europe again and it probably will claim more than 150 lives before the spring thaws.

Medical dictionaries don't define mountain madness. But any Alpine guide can tell you what it is. The strange impulse that compels otherwise steady and reasonable mountaineers—people who ordinarily look carefully before crossing a stream, to risk life and limb on Europe's most dangerous peaks.

A controversy is building up over whether some sort of control should be imposed. For example, a certificate attesting that a man's health is up to it or testifying that he has been on snow and ice before.

Sir John Hunt, leader of the British team that conquered Everest, is on record for some such control. So is Lionel Terry, veteran Alpine guide who led the unsuccessful Everest attempt early this month to save two young climbers on Mt. Blanc.

Terry, veteran of expeditions to the Andes and Himalayas as well as the Alps, believes no one should try Mt. Blanc in the winter without 10 years mountaineering experience. But there are equally eminent experts who believe controls on mountain climbing are as unfeasible as trying to stop pleasure driving on congested highways.

The experts are in agreement on something—their ire at those who say the sport is pointless, particularly when it comes to the Alps.

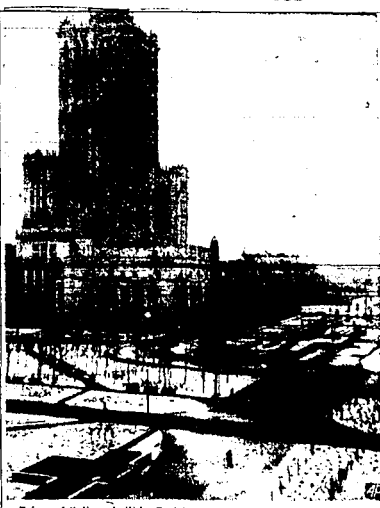
