Three States Rate Disaster Status in Enlarging Floods

President Eisenhower today declared a flood disaster in a third state—Virginia. Four other states were suffering from the mid-winter flooding. Parts of Kentucky, Tennessee and West Virginia were designated a disaster area yesterday. The president declared an emergency in six southwestern Virginia counties that are part of a broad, seven-state area in which the floods have spread death, misery and destruction. The toll in the floodlands rose to 13 and the homeless numbered high in the thousands.

The toll stood at seven dead in Kentucky, four in West Virginia, one in Virginia, and one in Tennessee. An eighth state, South Carolina, received a warning of moderate flooding upstream on the Saluda River in Columbia.

The Tennessee river, key artery of the Tennessee valley authority, flooded over into lowland areas. Chattanooga and rescue workers began preparing for duty today. A city relief fund evacuated a family of nine from their ground, Chattanooga. The national guard sent three amphibious trucks and 200 soldiers from Nashville to the area.

Water tumbling down mountain streams of the Great Smoky forced the evacuation of 100 families from their homes at Sevierville, on the edge of the Smoky mountain national park. Business there was closed and, for a while last night, the community was in darkness.

High water from the Tennessee river spilled into an area between Chattanooga's famed Lookout mountain and the suburban community of Knoxville.

By this morning, the flood area in the regions of the Appalachian, Cumberland and Ohio rivers, and northern Georgia, where flows are expected by Saturday.

A flood alert was issued for upper reaches of the Colorado river in northern California, where flows are expected by Saturday.

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Action Is Launched Out Move for 'Right to Work' Measures

BOISE, Feb. 1 (AP)—The Idaho house of representatives was asked today to take the first step toward writing a "right to work" law into the state constitution. The house state affairs committee introduced a resolution calling for a constitutional amendment. If passed by a two-thirds majority of both houses, the amendment would be placed on the ballot in the 1958 general election, where it would need a simple majority of the votes. Rep. H. Grant Gardner, R., Payette, chairman of the committee, said the amendment would be a constitutional amendment rather than a law because "these states which enact it by statute have it as a biennial issue."

Gardner also said that if a "right to work" bill is passed by the legislature, he feels a referendum should be held on the issue at the 1958 election.

Talks Slated In Gambler's Tax Charges

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 1 (AP)—Assistant U. S. Attorney John Lockley will confer in Reno Monday with U. S. Attorney Franklin P. Rittenhouse on a new trial for gambler Elmer "Boss" Remmer.

Remmer, well-known San Francisco-Nevada gambler, was convicted in Carson City, Nev., Feb. 22, 1952, of having evaded income taxes totaling \$38,469 in 1944 and 1945.

Remmer has never been arraigned on the 1944 charge, nor has there been an indictment by a federal grand jury.

Time Not Ripe For Tito Trip; Says Belgrade

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Feb. 1 (AP)—The Yugoslav foreign minister today said the time is not yet ripe for President Tito to visit the United States but the trip will be made in the future.

Spokesman Ranko Draskovic told newsmen the U. S. and Yugoslav governments have concluded that the visit of President Tito to the United States would be mutually useful.

He said, however, for which the state has not yet been asked to be caused into effect for the time being, the Yugoslav spokesman added.

He explained that "the conditions and atmosphere which have been created in this connection in the U. S. have shown that the time for such a visit is not yet ripe."

Draskovic was asked at his weekly news conference about an editorial in the official Yugoslav newspaper, Borba, earlier this week. The editorial suggested that Tito call off his planned trip because of anti-Yugoslav feeling in the United States.

Officials here also have denied reports that the visit was to be canceled.

Plans for a Tito visit to Washington have aroused considerable congressional antagonism in the United States. The controversy has been intensified by the recent visit to the United States of King Saud of Saudi Arabia.

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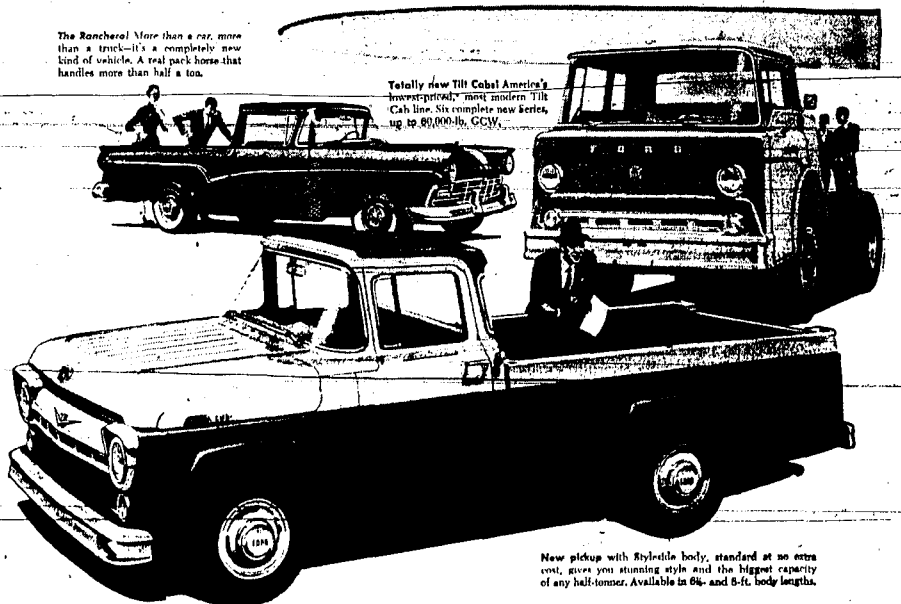

TUCKERS NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The original new dealers' grandiose dream of a public power empire to benefit suffering consumers has finally turned into a "power trust" which Franklin R. Roosevelt sought to drive out of business.

As the great North American continent has along the Niagara and St. Lawrence rivers in New York, the confluence of huge dams and transmission networks had not brought the blessings and benefits forecast by the cheap power in the pre-war thirties.

It has not, for instance, lowered consumers' cost of living. It has not, for instance, attracted industries of the kind that need or employ large working forces, for most of them are pulled into the area as "parasites" to force down electric light and service bills to the general public.

Curious Twisting of Senators' Hopes

While private industry and utilities have not enjoyed most of the benefits appreciably, it has, however, according to contributors residing far from their location, they have cut the costs of conventional fuel—coal and oil—as they can compete with the power of the great dams.

Such a public power empire as Sen. Richard L. Neuberger of Oregon recently complained to the Senate, has been the public power expenditures in the Northwest, he said, the labor force in that area has increased by an average of 100,000 men, while the nationwide average is 100,000.

The aluminum and allied industries buying most of the power of the Northwest, he said, have not added more than 20,000 to the area's working total. The great increase has been in the aircraft factories.

Encouraging Milestone

A significant milestone in U. S. transportation history is quietly approaching. Within a few months the last of the 12 major airlines will be off the government subsidy list.

Commercial aviation in this country got its start some 30 years ago. During most of that time the domestic carriers have had a big helping hand from Washington.

Looking over today's fleets of multi-engine aircraft, one would not think back to the days when the first big airline networks were being formed from a confusion of short-haul lines.

The federal government played a proper role in encouraging and guiding the growth of flying from its hesitant beginnings to the huge operations we now know.

America's domestic service is the envy of the world.

There is a notion held in some quarters that, once extended, federal aid is never withdrawn. But the record of the airlines disproves it.

All but one of the big 12 already stand on their own feet, and only unexpected developments can prevent it from being an even dozen by spring.

Believers in the private enterprise system may take heart from this performance.

Subsidies made sense in the early stages of growth, when, in addition to making constant the uneconomical airman alone, the struggling carriers had to scratch for customers to help defray heavy costs of equipment. But all sides were agreed the grants ought to stop when finances of the airlines were sufficiently strong.

Many of us may have forgotten that the transcontinental railroads also similar help from the government in their pioneer days, particularly in the form of land grants to provide right of way. So, despite our attachment to free enterprise, we do have a tradition of federal and other aid to beginners in such vital fields as transportation.

Nevertheless, it is rewarding to see a maturing industry cast off its ties of dependence on government.

As the domestic airlines are about to complete the process, we must hope, too, that our overseas carriers and our web of feeder lines may before too long manage to follow suit.

Highways for Vehicles

Nobody questions the superior safety value of our most modern highways. But perhaps there is insufficient attention to certain features of these roadways.

The opinion of the public comment is directed at their remarkable width, the lack of intersections, and the broad division between opposing streams of traffic.

All these things do indeed contribute heavily to safety. But the words "limited access" have a lot to do with safety performance on the super-roadways.

Engineers long ago found that one of the principal sources of trouble was the "friction" caused on highways by traffic entering and leaving at side roads, peeling off and coming on at innumerable gas stations and hot dog stands, parking on narrow shoulders.

and moved the rights of members and nonmembers of labor organizations to the opportunity to work? Meanwhile, the house—primarily a conservative body—has been urged to accede to recommending printing of the right to work bill, which would prohibit similar legislation in the future rather than the constitution.

A pair of Idaho senators yesterday pumped the gun on the senate finance committee and introduced a bill calling for appropriation of \$3 million for the state's minimum education program during the 1957-58 session.

The education law study committee and Gov. Robert E. Smylie in their public messages recommended \$75 million for the minimum education program and noted this was the maximum possible under existing law.

Smylie urged, however, the legislature consider "enriching" the program to provide more help for the schools.

"If this bill is passed," Barlow said, "it should give the public school system a respectable appropriation and should relieve some of the burden of the public school system on a local level."

"I believe the additional fund, between the \$65 million and the \$75 million, should come from industries and people not presently carrying their share of the load," he added.

Health Chief Takes Stand In Discharge

BLACKFOOT, Feb. 1 (AP)—Idaho's state mental health director said Thursday he will not interfere in the discharge of the administrative director of Idaho State Hospital.

Dr. E. Wayne Smith, the hospital superintendent, announced last week the discharge of Victor McLaughlin, the hospital's administrative director.

Dr. John Butler, director of the division of mental health, met with Smith and McLaughlin Thursday during a routine visit to the hospital.

He said he will not interfere but said he believed the dismissal "could have been handled differently."

Dr. Butler said that McLaughlin has the right of appeal to the state merit system council, which can review the action if it wishes.

Smith, in his announcement, said he believed that McLaughlin "there have been personal differences of opinion between you and myself" and asserted that the administrator had "continued to interfere in patients' problems." Smith said the result was a division in the loyalty of staff workers.

GOP Senator Election Seen In Texas Vote

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—Sen. Andrew P. Schoepel, chairman of the Republican senatorial campaign committee, said today he thinks there is "an excellent chance" to elect a GOP senator from Texas April 2.

He promised that the committee will give whatever help it can to Thad Hutcheson, the only Republican in the field for the special election to fill in a two-year senate vacancy.

Since there is no primary before the election, the Democratic vote may be divided among five or six candidates in normally Democratic Texas. However, Hutcheson is still the underdog.

A pickup of one senate seat would enable the Republicans to gain control of that chamber, which is now under Democratic domination.

Schoepel made his comments after a news conference with Martin Dies, a candidate for the senate seat, that Republicans are trying to raise "an enormous sum of money" to elect Hutcheson. Dies said the senate elections committee to assign investigators to the campaign.

"I do not know if Congressman Dies is talking about it," Schoepel said. "But as chairman of this senatorial campaign committee, I can say that we are going to try to give Thad Hutcheson whatever assistance we can in this campaign—the same as we have helped all Republican candidates for the senate."

"I know of no such fund being raised by anyone for Mr. Hutcheson. I hope that any such fund will contribute to his campaign, which can do so according to law."

Schoepel said that any such fund, from his committee to the Hutcheson campaign will be reported as required by law.

"I think what concerns me, Congressman Dies," he said, "is that he is realizing that Thad Hutcheson has an excellent chance of being elected to the senate."

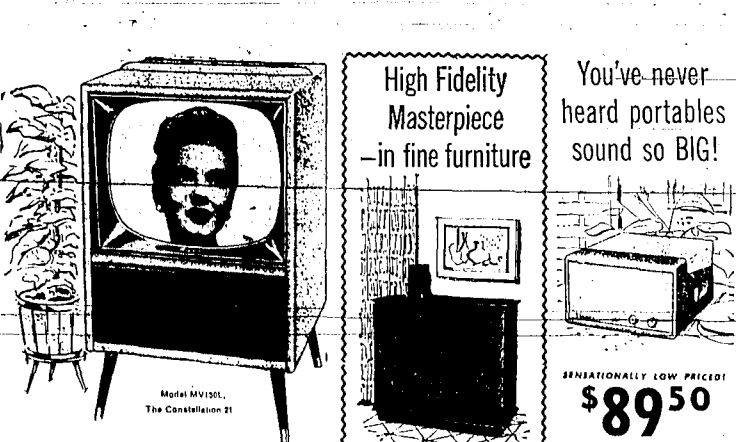
