Bellevue Rocked, Artillery's Shells Scattered in Area

BELLEVUE, Feb. 11 (AP)—A national guard detachment team equipped with mine detectors is scouring the hills east of Bellevue, looking for unexploded 105 millimeter artillery shells that were hurled over a wide area in a dynamite explosion Sunday afternoon. Searchers are handicapped by more than a foot of snow on the ground. The shells were spread around when a concrete powder magazine in which they were stored disappeared at 1:30 p.m. in a blast that came close to shattering every window in the community. TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—A movement to obtain northern support and understanding for the South's anti-segregation attitude has been proposed by numerous newspapers and members of Congress from Dixie.

The movement is based on the Supreme Court's famous decision to the people and their elected representatives to state.

Jack Kilpatrick, editor of the News-Leader at Richmond, Va., has urged that the South should not be regarded as a "lost cause" but as a "lost opportunity."

It was Kilpatrick who first suggested that southern states adopt "interposition" resolutions in protest against the Supreme Court's rulings with respect to schools and transportation.

Eight southern states have officially adopted the measure, and Texas and Tennessee are expected to do so at current legislative sessions.

The "interposition" resolutions range from Alabama's proposed use of force to mild protest in North Carolina.

Shotgun Supposed to Make Tree Bear Fruit

With Lincoln's birthday anniversary tomorrow, the TV channels have been loaded with events of the life of this great American. One program showed a Lincoln walking on a custom-made horse in a store, putting groceries in a paper bag. But the paper bag was not a paper bag. It was a machine-made bag, patented in 1872, seven years after he was assassinated.

In honor of his birthday, let's consider some more early American particularly as it applies to the outdoors.

Cowhide hinges were used mainly by early colonists. Handmade iron strap hinges were added later, but because of every description—apples, grapes, pears, plums, figs, etc.—all grown from seeds. A gentleman 12 years ago, while at a party in London, got seeds of the grapes and apples in the pocket-book after which he took a voyage to America. These seeds have now greatly multiplied.

Incidentally, it was an old colonial custom to "pepper old fruit trees"—meaning, to blast away with a shotgun at close range to make an old tree bear again, writes Eric Sloane in his book, *Eric Sloane's Almanac and Weather Forecaster* (Duell, Sloan & Pearce, N. Y.). This custom, he says, was brought over from Europe where some farmers still practice it.

THE REAL LINCOLN

If Abraham Lincoln still living, it would take a big birthday cake to hold all the 148 candles. And even so, Abe wouldn't like the party because he wouldn't be able to recognize himself.

For many years, well-meaning but ever-emotional writers on this great president spun a web of biographical sugar that all but obliterated the simple strength of the man. It became difficult indeed to arrive at an objective appraisal of Lincoln and his work.

Then, of course, there arose the happily short-lived cult of debunkers who strove with desperate blindness to slash away those fine details which lovingly contrived the plaster saint. They coined words like "biomolecular" and tried to reduce him to a subhuman level.

So one group was blind to Lincoln's human failings while the other concentrated on those failings, relating his splendid accomplishments to the fairy-tale Lincoln.

We think Lincoln wouldn't have liked one method or the other. He was the foe of artifice and the destroyer of vanity, but he knew the value of an emotional approach. Who could have listened to the wonderful Gettysburg address and not have had his emotions deny for the moment his essential tragedy and waste of the war between the states?

Lincoln told his own suffering and of the anguish he felt for the suffering of others. His humanistic and, above all, human qualities made him feel it deeply.

So let's put extremes behind us and be inspired for today as he really was—as he hardened his muscles with work, nourished his mind by firelight, lost elections and won them, and generally did the best he could.

Today, deny him nothing that was his; give him nothing that wasn't his. That would be a fine birthday gift for Abraham Lincoln.

SUPREME COURT OVERRIDING OF STATE SOVEREIGNTY

In commenting favorably on the Kilpatrick plan to invade other sections, an editorial in the *Shreveport (La.) Times* says:

"Kilpatrick is actually every state legislator outside the South meets this year. He urges that southern states and delegations from their legislatures to appear before the legislature of the southern states and convince them that the real issue now is to preserve their state rights, and not merely the South's secession."

The Supreme Court's overriding of state sovereignty in other than racial matters may lead to a more sympathetic response to the South's difficulties. It has stirred criticism in legal and judicial circles as well as among affected politicians.

PO SHOTS: In regard to inquiry on southward starter, to make own starter, use 2 cups warm water, 2 cups flour, 1 cup salt, 2 1/2 cups granulated sugar and 1 cup granulated yeast. Flour kneaded in. Bake again. Bake 45 minutes in moderate oven. 350 to 375 degrees.

SCIENTIST-EDUCATOR-ENVOY

Americans will join the President in feeling real regret that Dr. James B. Conant is retiring as our ambassador to West Germany.

Conant is not a veteran diplomat. But he possesses a rare combination of talents which has enabled him to earn distinction as a chemist, a top school administrator, a government scientist leading vital wartime work, and an envoy in a crucial world trouble spot.

Conant was president of Harvard university when the broad public phase of his career started. His eminence as a chemist led him to be chosen for a key role in the atomic energy research which led to successful production of the A-bomb.

Having in this great enterprise demonstrated his skill in coordinating and interpreting the efforts of other men, Conant was tapped for further service.

At the outset of the Eisenhower administration he was named high commissioner for West Germany, then still in occupation status. Later his post was altered to that of ambassador as the Germans gained freedom.

Conant's career is a striking example of the educator and scholar who can function with skill both in the quiet backwaters of scientific research and in the mainstream turbulence of practical everyday affairs.

It is good news that he is not retiring altogether but may devote himself to useful needs of the United States at the high school level.

Whatever he now chooses to do, the nation voices its thanks for his many dedicated services over a long course of time.

STICK TO ISSUES

The senate will have at least two major pitfalls to avoid if its inquiry into U. S. Middle Eastern policy for the past 10 years is to serve the useful purpose it may possibly achieve.

One is of course the standard danger of lapsing into strictly political unheaviness which in the past has been the fate of many such inquiries and can only muddy the relations we have abroad.

The other is that, since two senate committees will be probing an area in which diplomatic confidences are important, they could err seriously on the side of damaging the whole western position in the Middle East.

One hoped sign that more than ordinary good sense and restraint may mark this inquiry is the decision to go back 10 years. That means that American policies framed by both Democratic and Republican administrations will be under examination.

There is a bad warping of emphasis, such an investigation should manage to skirt the worst evils of partisanship.

There is logic in the 10-year span, too. Going back that far takes the probe to the beginnings of the Israeli nation, whose founding by the United Nations was the action which touched off the continuing struggle with the Arab States.

We need to know afresh all the details of Israel's founding, to see what, if any, seeds of injustice were planted then.

We need to understand as well, how wise or foolish our general Middle East policies have been as we strove through the years to balance our concern for emerging peoples against our traditional alliances with Britain and France and our need for materials and bases in Middle Eastern waters.

The nation will benefit from this inquiry only if its leaders are dedicated to learning the truth and not to searching out political capital.

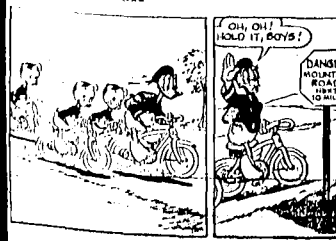

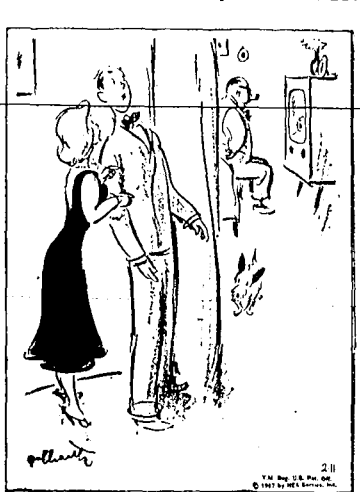

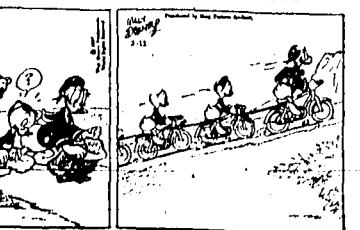

Fourth Annual Police School Slated at ISC June 17 to 28

BOISE, Feb. 11—The fourth annual session of the Idaho Law Enforcement Training Academy will be held June 17 to 28, inclusive, on the campus of Idaho State college, Pocatello, under the sponsorship of four organizations.

The dates for the yearly session were set here by members of the Idaho Peace Officers association steering committee headed by Chairman Thomas J. Gearty, FBI special agent-in-charge, Idaho—Montana division.

The training session is sponsored by the Idaho Municipal league, Idaho Peace Officers association, Idaho State college and the federal Bureau of investigation.

Four years ago the sponsors, after a long study of problems confronting all levels of law enforcement in the state, called for an expansion of police training and the professionalization of police personnel. The course of study as outlined by the steering committee includes

basic police subjects, public relations and police courtesy, scientific aids in criminal investigation, accident investigation, firearms training, identification of evidence, youth problems, photography, fingerprints and other related subjects.

At the conclusion of the 12-day school, each trainee who successfully completes the 100-hour course of instruction receives a diploma issued by Idaho State college.

Members of the steering committee other than Gearty are Police Chiefs Howard Gillette, Twin Falls; A. C. Engen, Coeur d'Alene; P. T. Demarist, Boise; A. L. Oliver, Pocatello. Other members are Blaine County Sheriff L. E. Cruz, State Police Supt. A. E. Perkins and Sgt. Roger Tucker, president, IPOA.

While in Pocatello the trainees will utilize the facilities of Idaho State college. Each municipality sending an officer to the academy assumes the cost of transportation, housing and incidentals.

In Twin Falls, Gillette said he had not selected a trainee from his 23-member force but expected to do so in a few days.

The strike was ordered through leaflets distributed yesterday by the political committee of the outlawed "Union with Greece" group.

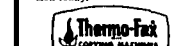

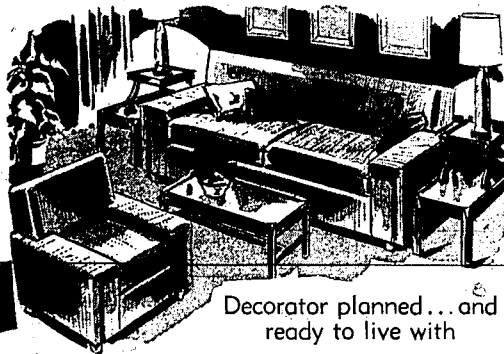

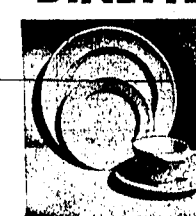
