Boan Has Life Term For Death

Speeds, Load Restricted on Valley Roads

Special load and speed restrictions for trucks and buses on state highways in five Idaho valley counties will go into effect Monday.

The restrictions, which are imposed because of the reduced supporting capacity of the highway surfaces, apply to the following highways:

- Highway 20, from Pocatello to Idaho Falls.

- Highway 20, from Pocatello to Burley.
- Highway 20, from Burley to Pocatello.
- Highway 20, from Pocatello to Idaho Falls.

A maximum speed of 30 miles per hour for trucks and buses weighing more than 10,000 pounds will be enforced on the above highways.

Outlay for Armory Construction Asked

BOISE, Feb. 15 (AP)—A proposed measure asking an appropriation of \$232,093 from the state's general fund for building national guard armories was circulated among legislators yesterday by members of the adjutant general's staff.

Explaining the need for the armory, which hasn't yet been introduced, showed that altogether under the proposed armory building program, \$998,234 in state, federal and local funds would be spent. At each armory location, the local government unit participating would be required to furnish the real estate, at no expense to the state.

Shepilov, 61, former editor of the Communist party organ Pravda, replaced V. M. Molotov only last June. The new foreign minister was first deputy to both men.

BOISE, Feb. 15 (AP)—Rep. C. F. Higer, D-Gem., said yesterday the Idaho legislature should ask the state attorney general to investigate whether the fixing of the price of bread in Idaho is a violation of the state constitution.

Higer said he had a statement during the session that would standardize the size and weight of loaves of bread in Idaho.

The proposed bill, which passed 22-19, would require the state attorney general to investigate the issue.

Firm Barred

BOISE, Feb. 15 (AP)—Attorney General Greydon Smith said today a temporary restraining order had been issued to bar Capital Savings and Loan company of Boise from doing business in Idaho for the time being.

Smith said the order, issued yesterday by Ada county District Judge M. Oliver Koenig, also temporarily restrained the firm from using \$1,600,000 in funds transferred to the company by the Silver Lake Savings and Loan association in Las Vegas.

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TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The apparent inability of the United Nations to solve several potentially grave crises has brought the U. N. to its lowest point. It has led to demands for dissolution or revision of its charter.

Within the last few weeks, its member nations which comprise more than half of the world's population, these countries and the question of the U. N. are being deliberately flouted by the U. N. are:

Russia's refusal to withdraw troops from Egypt; Israel's refusal to withdraw troops from Egyptian soil; France's refusal to withdraw troops from Algeria; India's refusal to hold a plebiscite on disputed Kashmir; China, a nonmember, in failing to take steps for Korean unification; and the problem of the U. N. has been helpless to enforce its demands through diplomacy or military action.

VOTING WITHIN U. N.—Moreover, voting within the U. N. has finally passed to the anti-western, anti-democratic and anti-colonialist blocs. Russia, by its veto, has blocked the U. N. by its single veto. The Soviet and Afro-Asian bloc, with 38 votes, can prevent action in the general assembly, where a two-thirds majority is required.

Some of the few South American nations vote with them when questions of colonialism are involved. On several occasions, members of the American bloc and the British commonwealth have lined up against Washington and London.

IMBALANCES AND INADEQUACIES—There are even more serious imbalances and inadequacies in the United Nations as now constituted. The United States and Russia, the two super powers, have the same vote in the general assembly as Iceland and Israel, with a combined population of less than 10 million.

Of these two big nations lead to war, it will be the populous and powerful countries which must make the most severe sacrifices of men and money. To the United States, 5 percent of the U. S. population—Russia can prevent 95 percent from taking effective action in the security council. And 36 percent can obtain a two-thirds majority in the general assembly.

REVISED "SECRET DIPLOMACY"—These distortions have led to two new "secret" U. N. was supposed to eliminate from international politics. They have brought a revival of the "secret diplomacy" that has caused so many wars. The world's affairs are being decided in the "back rooms" of the U. N. They are handled and dickered over in the New York hotel rooms of delegates and in the corridors of the General Dag Hammarskjöld as the tight-lipped agent.

GREEN PASTURES

The nation's top labor leaders, with certain exceptions, live pretty much like big businessmen, or big politicians. The lean, hard days of fighting on the barricades are over for most of them.

The organizations they head are in some instances massive. They administer operations that would make some businessmen green with envy. With their huge welfare and pension funds, they control the expenditure and investment of many millions of dollars.

Reports from this season's gathering indicate that the upper echelons generally are richer than ever.

DAVE BECK, head of the Teamsters' union, spends out comfortably in a \$122-a-day hotel suite. **JAMES C. PETRILLO**, Musicians' union boss, roughed it in a \$40-a-day single. Such other union presidents as David McDonald, steelworkers, and Alex Rose, hat makers, were among those who availed themselves of Miami's newest and most fashionable facilities.

Their scale of living doesn't deteriorate noticeably when they step outside their hotels. Cadillac is a favored form of transportation. Golf, fishing in chartered boats, the race track and the celebrated eating places draw them in to Miami.

Of course some are just too busy with union affairs to live it up. And some consciously refrain from any indulgence in luxury.

WALTER RUTHERFORD, AFL-CIO vice president, falls into the latter category. An old timer against the businessmen's windmills, he evidently wants to avoid any behavior that might mar his status as a proper antagonist of big business.

It is not enough for Rutherford that he dwells more modestly than some of his colleagues, or that he flew to Miami on a tourist-class plane. Firmly entreching himself with the "have-nots," he squanders his own breakfast orange juice in his hotel room.

Obviously this is dedication to a cause. Whatever one may think of Rutherford's motives, there is something to be said, however, for his semi-spartan approach. Some of the others seem to have forgotten their real responsibilities. They wouldn't go back to the barricades unless they were assured of clean food.

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TWIN FALLS

Church Move To Halt Death Penalty Starts

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—A church-led campaign to abolish the death penalty is gaining momentum in America.

Strong Protestant drives are now under way in New York, California and Massachusetts. In each of these states, Protestant church councils have adopted resolutions declaring that capital punishment is contrary to Christian principles and have appealed to the legislatures to do away with it.

Similar bills are being pressed in at least a dozen other state legislatures this year, with varying degrees of church endorsement.

The religious argument against the death penalty was stated succinctly by the legislative committee of the New York State Council of Churches:

"We hold that life is the gift of God and should not be destroyed by an individual or state."

In California, the church campaign has been spearheaded by the Rev. William A. Gillett, now an Episcopal rector at Ventura, but formerly chaplain of the Washington penitentiary. Gillett, who has called the "last mile" with a dozen condemned men, lists three reasons for his vigorous opposition to the death penalty.

1. It is grossly unfair in actual operation. Murderers who can afford costly defense counsel and numerous court appeals often escape the death chamber; unfortunately with neither money or influential friends the ones who are actually executed.

2. It is contrary to Christian concepts of how to treat offenders because "the object is to mend him," rather than to "mend him."

3. It is a waste of money. "The best use of money is for rehabilitation," if sentenced to life imprisonment rather than to the electric chair or gas chamber.

Shuffling out a human life, even in the name of the law, has a bad effect on the public mind, and a bad effect on the prison officers who carry out the sentences, and the relatives of both the condemned man and the victim.

Beyond this, says Gillett, "the degrading effect on you and me and on the rest of society must not be overlooked. It is our law, our gas chamber, our rope."

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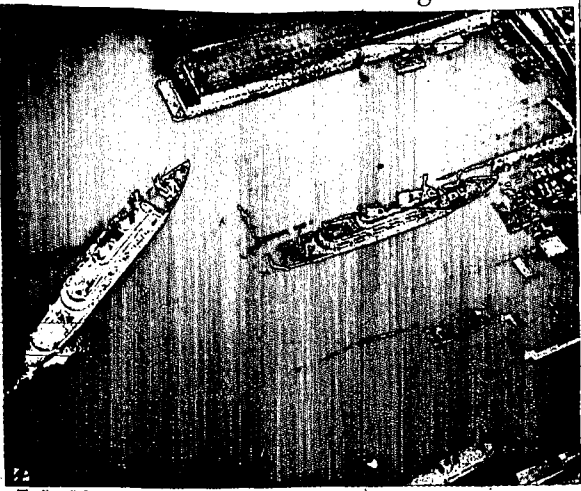

Owyhee Area Water Survey Results Given

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (Special)—Arlan aquifers contain a substantial supply of ground water in the Bureau-Grandview area of northern Owyhee county, a geological survey shows.

Northern Owyhee county is largely undeveloped public domain, some of which may be opened for desert-irrigation if a suitable water supply is shown to be available.

However, all the water sampled contained excessive amounts of sodium, making it unsuitable without treatment for irrigating some types of soil.

The water also contained amounts of fluoride, which would make it unsuitable for domestic supply without treatment.

The recent construction of several full-flowing wells has focused attention on the possibility of reclaiming some land by irrigating with ground water. But, the report concludes that, even with the substantial supply of undeveloped arid water in the area, use of the water for irrigation may not be feasible unless the sodium hazard can be met.

The report recommends a detailed hydrologic and geologic study of the area before development.

FPC Assailed In Dam Brief

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 15 (AP)—In a legal brief in support of the proposed federal Hells canyon dam, Washington state yesterday charged that the federal power commission has "failed to follow the intent of congress to the development of Columbia basin resources."

The brief was sent to the U. S. supreme court by the attorney general at the request of Gov. Albert Reynolds, the new Democratic executive.

It is in support of the Hells Canyon association's court challenge of the FPC license for Idaho Power company low dams on the Snake river.

The previous state Republican administration had favored the Idaho company's proposal for three low dams.

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Reds Sending 'Slanted' Mail Through U. S.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 15 (AP)—A house investigation of communist activities in this country disclosed today that large quantities of red propaganda are arriving here through mail channels.

Rep. Edwin E. Willis, D. La., heading the two-day investigation by the house un-American activities committee, turned his attention today to "local communist activities."

Irving Fishman, deputy collector of customs of New York, told the house investigators that at least 132,000 pieces of communist propaganda pour into the United States at New Orleans each year.

Rep. Morgan M. Moulder, D. Mo., a committee member, said he believed the port of New Orleans is performing postoffice chores for communists by forwarding mail to propaganda targets in South America as well as in the United States.

This route to South America may be cheaper and faster, he suggested. The U. S. addresses are colleges, youth organizations, as well as the Russian embassy which enjoys diplomatic immunity from the law which bans entry of subversive literature.

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Britain Plans Reduction of Europe Force

LONDON, Feb. 13 (AP)—Britain formally told her NATO allies yesterday she must cut the number of British troops in West Germany. A strained economy and a new security concept of military strategy lay behind the move. Details are still secret but it is reported Britain will reduce her troops in Germany from 80,000 to about 50,000.

The decision was announced as French Defense Minister Maurice Bourgoin-Maurion arrived in London and told newsmen France too wants to slim down her military system. It is here for talks with British officials on coordinating the two nations' cuts in military forces and spending.

"The British step came a day after Gen. Lauris Norstad, supreme allied commander in Europe, conferred with British Defense Minister Duncan Sandys and other officials. Norstad, an American, opposed the idea as 'dangerous'.

"A sharp while ago returned from the United States where he outlined Britain's financial situation. It is reported to have convinced Sandys and other British need to swap her military setup.

"Norstad came here as a soldier. Other military men, including British, oppose reductions in western strength because of his command.

"The British reply to Norstad's warning was to cite speeches by Sandys and Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

Sandys has emphasized the changing concepts of the atomic age. He said, in effect, there was no true sense against the hydrogen bomb. The British view is that it has no other recourse but to cut costs and build up firepower as quickly as possible through American aid. He said that British and American aid would be cut off if the British were to cut their military strength.

East Is Seized In Snowstorm; Cold Weather

Windy weather overcast the east today, unleashing snow from Ohio to northern Virginia and dropping temperatures as far south as the Gulf states.

Snowfall amounts generally were light in the storm area, but also scattered Pennsylvania and western New York. The heaviest accumulation was reported at Harrisburg, Pa., which was buried under six inches of snow.

Cold air pushing southward behind the storm sent temperatures falling an average of 10 degrees from the Great Lakes south to the southern Gulf coast area and east to the mid-Atlantic states.

Early morning readings ranged from 11 below at Madison, Mich., to near 40 degrees in the south.

A band of warmer air in the west brought scattered showers to Texas and Missouri and touched off the snow in Iowa and Minnesota.

Weathermen said the western storm will spread throughout the Midwest through the Ohio valley today, with the precipitation turning to snow in the Great Lakes region.

The warming trend extended from Texas through the central plains, to the Great Lakes, it was expected to push into the Great Lakes and Ohio valley today, moderating temperatures slightly.

Population of U. S. Swelling To New Highs

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—The population of the United States, growing by unprecedented numbers, hit the 170 million mark today.

The census bureau, which estimated the total, said the rate of growth will continue to rise rapidly. The largest increases in recent years have been among children—in the school and pre-school age groups.

The 170 million estimate was noted on a huge electric chart in the lobby of the commerce department building. The chart signals a birth every 6 seconds, a death every 12 seconds and the arrival of an immigrant every 2 minutes. Every 12 seconds, one American is added to the total population.

The bureau said the population has grown by nearly 18 million since the last official census in 1950 when the population stood at 151.1 million. The increase in the past seven years was almost the same as that in the 10-year period between 1940 and 1950.

Census officials said the number of children of elementary school age increased 31.7 per cent between 1950 and 1954 to a new total of 29.2 million. This was nearly three times the 11.2 per cent rate of increase for all age groups.

There also were larger than average increases of 15.8 per cent in the pre-school age group, 13.5 per cent in the high school age group, and 18.3 per cent among persons over 65 years of age.

By state, the biggest growth between 1950 and last year was nearly three million in California. Four other states—Michigan, New York, Ohio and Texas—grew by more than one million. Florida showed a gain of nearly one million.

The big three now are New York with a population of 16.2 million, California with 13.4 million, and Pennsylvania with 10.9 million. Pennsylvania yielded second place to California in the 1950 census.

Group Offers Health Board Ouster Plans

Under the committee's plan, a doctor would have to be named to the spot. It also criticized the board for naming its "two Boole members," Boyd and Dr. Alfred Poppa, "as an executive committee, adding to the confusion between policy making by the board and administration by the director."

It accused the board too of "direct interference in administrative procedure by the members of the executive committee."

"Without permission of the department's personal director, the executive committee and the governor's budget assistant did interfere in personnel matters that should have been handled through the administrative chain of the department, the director of health," the report said.

The committee accused Peterson and the board of failing to take necessary steps to assure maximum use of the Gooding Tuberculosis hospital.

It accused "individual members of the board" of creating a problem at State Hospital South by "arbitrary treatment of the superintendent and his therapeutic staff."

The committee said this resulted in loss of most of the psychiatric and "therapeutic staff members."

"At this date," the report said, "the superintendent of State Hospital South is the only psychiatrist on the staff."

The committee said this could have been avoided if Dr. B. Wayne Smith, the superintendent, had been given his choice of business manager or administrator.

The reference obviously was to Smith's recent firing of Victor McLaughlin as business manager of the institution.

"This error parallels the manner in which the office of director of public health was filled," the committee said.

It praised Peterson's building up of the health department through the years by "personal loyalty." It said a move by the board to oust Peterson was halted only by the fact that the public learned of the move.

"Had this been consummated, this committee feels it would have resulted in the loss of a man who is recognized on a national scale as being an outstanding authority in the field of public health," the committee said.

"The committee condemns the action of those individual members of the board, who were responsible for attempting to seek employment for the director of health out of the state, as a substitute for finding ways and means of releasing him."

The board said it had lined up a job for Peterson with the U.S. public health service if he would resign from the Idaho health post.

Rep. George Crookham, Jr., R.-Coeur d'Alene, filed a brief minority report. He agreed with legislative changes but said the critical aspects of the report eroded the "human equation."

House Republicans and Democrats agreed today to get together and decide upon increased revenue tax breaks for lawmakers, probably somewhere between \$750 and \$100 per day.

A Senate measure calling for tenure rights for public school teachers after two years in a given school system has so much opposition on the floor that it was sent back to committee.

The bill proposes teachers keep on the payroll after two successive years can't be discharged except for specific unfitness or reduction of number on the staff.

Meanwhile, Sen. K. O. Barlow, R.-Ore., made a plea from the senate floor that something be done in providing maximum security facilities for persons with mental troubles involved in criminal cases.

He said he had been told by Ward L. E. Clapp that the Idaho prison and the board of health seemed to be at "loggerheads in handling of such cases."

Barlow said it seems the prison has inmates with mental disturbances but not the type of personnel to treat them.

He added state hospital south in Blackfoot has the personnel but no detention ward.

Barlow said he meant no criticism of the board or prison but brought the matter up on the floor of the senate in an effort to get something done to remedy the situation.

Barlow called attention to two cases in his own county involving former inmates of mental institutions who have been involved in murders.

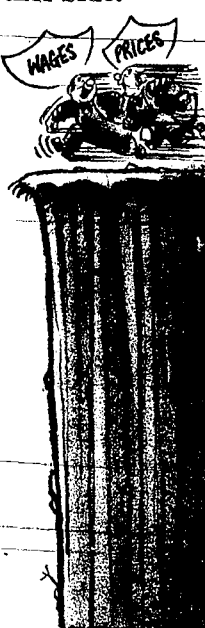
One, he said, involved a youth who had been treated and released for mental troubles, and who killed his mother.

Demo Leader Sees Passage For Doctrine

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—Senate approval of the modified Middle East resolution was forecast yesterday by Sen. Johnson, D., Tex., the majority leader.

Johnson said he favored the legislation, which proclaims the readiness of the United States to fight communist aggression in the Middle East if President Eisenhower deems it necessary.

He predicted it would be passed by the senate in substantially the same form it came out of the foreign relations and armed services committees Wednesday. Meeting jointly, the two committees approved the resolution on a 20-0 vote.

Republican leaders haven't decided yet whether to fight on the senate floor for restoration of the administration's original language, which would have given the President specific congressional authorization to employ American military forces in the strategic Mideast under certain circumstances.

Sen. Knowland of California, the GOP leader, said the state department is making a study of the new language. The White House reported that both Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles are inclined to believe "the language is designed to give the President the authority he asked for."

Johnson, just back from a brief Florida vacation, said he was "a strong advocate of a foreign relations policy produced by cooperation between the two parties."

"The most experienced and non-partisan members of the senate—senators like Russell, D. Oa. Byrd, D. Va., and Mansfield, D. Mont.—made their record on this matter. I hope the administration realizes that the senate has its responsibility in the field of foreign affairs also."

Nikolai S. Patolichov was named to take over Gromyko's former post as first deputy foreign minister.

Shepilov generally was associated with Soviet policy in the Middle East. It was his visit to Cairo while still editor of Pravda which preceded agreements for shipment of Communist arms to Egypt.

The new foreign minister, Gromyko, is well known to the West. He spoke for the Soviet Union in many of the major United Nations debates in New York. He also has attended most of the international conferences since World War II.

Shepilov's last major task as foreign minister was his foreign policy report to the supreme Soviet (parliament) last week. It was then that he launched the new Soviet "hand-off" doctrine for the Middle East, generally interpreted as Moscow's counter to the Eisenhower doctrine.

Patolichov, Gromyko's successor as No. 2 man in the foreign ministry, was a deputy foreign minister. The shakeup came as a complete surprise to Moscow observers who recalled the starring role played by Shepilov at a meeting of the supreme Soviet.

Shepilov had been regarded as the leading communist spokesman on foreign policy even before he was named to replace Molotov on June 24, 1955.

Firm Readies New Bids for Dam Projects

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 15 (AP)—Pacific Northwest Power company composed of four utility firms, said today it is renewing its claim to build Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley dams on the Snake river below Hells Canyon.

In a 140-page brief to be filed with the federal power commission tomorrow the firm said there is "uncontradicted evidence in the record" that the project is "fully adaptable to a comprehensive plan of development and should provide as much power, flood control, navigation and recreation benefits as any other alternate plan of record in this reach of the Snake river."

The firm urged the FPC to disqualify public power groups opposing its plan from further intervention. It said it is "the only project that could be in production in time to relieve critical power shortages of 1960."

The four firms are Pacific Power and Light, Portland General Electric, Washington Water Power and Montana Power companies. The firm filed for a license to build the \$24-million dollar two-dam project in September, 1955.

During the series, evening services will feature pantomimes from the sermon on the Mount, the Transfiguration, the raising of Lazarus, Christ in Gethsemane, Peter's denial, Judas' betrayal, Jesus before Pilate, the Last Supper, the Crucifixion and the Resurrection.

Season Peaks Hit In Unemployment

BOISE, Feb. 15 (AP)—Last week marked the peak for winter unemployment in Idaho, the state employment security agency said today.

The agency paid \$14,438 to 7,690 persons last week, the highest for any single week this winter.

But the agency said there were 80 fewer new claims, which should indicate a declining trend.

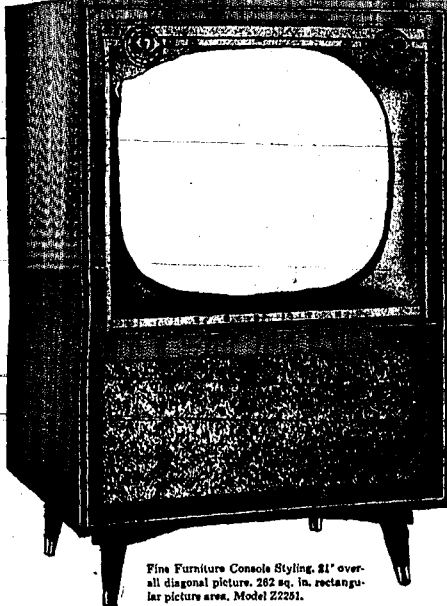
