U. S. Confirms Korea Cut Off Electrical Use

SEOUL, Korea, U. S. military authorities broke a two-day silence today and confirmed that the republic of Korea cut off electric power to the U. S. first corps headquarters for almost 12 hours Saturday.

The authorities did nothing to deter reports that the cutoff was deliberate, designed to get the United Nations command to discontinue 18 million dollar bill for electricity supplied to U. N. forces during the Korean war.

Part of the first corps installations at Ulsungpo, 20 miles south of the Korean truce line, was without power Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

It was resumed after U. S. eighth army officials protested to ROK officials in Seoul.

After refusing to discuss the incident up to today, eighth army headquarters here finally issued a statement saying the power interruption caused only "minor inconveniences" and it considered the matter "closed."

The Seoul Electric company also issued a statement saying the trouble was caused by line failure and denying it was "intentional." But the statement reserved demands for payment of the U. N. bill.

Beven Hits Suez Policy of Britain

CARMARTHEN, Wales, Feb. 19 (AP)—Socialist leader Aneurin Beven said last night that anyone who supported the government's Suez policy is "guilty of an offense against the future of mankind."

The socialist "foreign secretary" in the house of commons told an election rally here, where the country's next by-election will take place in 12 days, that the logical conclusion of the government's policy would have been to start a third world war. If the Russians and United States had been drawn into it, he said, "Great Britain would have been nothing but a charred ruin."

Changes Foreseen In Photo Ban Rule

CHICAGO, Feb. 19 (AP)—The legal profession may revise its controversial rule against news photographers and broadcasters in courtrooms.

Judge Philbrick McCoy, Los Angeles, disclosed this possibility Sunday at a meeting of the American Bar association's house of delegates.

McCoy is head of a special committee on canons of ethics of the American Bar foundation, an ABA affiliate.

Road Completed

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador, Feb. 19 (AP)—Construction of the 197-mile El Salvador section of the Pan American highway has been completed, it was announced today.

The presidential palace said the final 16 1/2 mile gap between Sarama, in the southeastern corner of El Salvador, and Coacatan, on the Honduran border, was now finished.

Total cost of the Salvadoran section was \$4,000,000, of which \$2.6 million was paid by the United States.

Oil Prices Increase Is Climax To Nation's Inflation Flurry

NEW YORK, Feb. 19 (AP)—Glamor over the hike in prices of gasoline and fuel oil has brought some sort of a climax to the turmoil over the latest flurry of inflation.

Actually the rise in the price of crude oil and its products has been less than for many another product.

For whatever reason—oilmen are quick to point out and to document.

But it is nearer to the pocketbook of the average person than, say, the price of steel.

Congressional critics also have

pointed out that prior to the blocking of the Suez canal, pressure for a rise in crude oil prices to offset rising costs of oil industry labor and materials was checked by rising stock of oil in spite of production costs aimed at preventing it.

After midnight oil was cut off, European demand for western oil cleared out the overhauling supplies and a price rise of 25 to 30 cents a barrel followed this January. The rate of

oil production is still tightly controlled.

Oil men point out, however, that it was the first hike since June, 1953, and the second since December, 1947—a period in which many other products had taken several jumps.

The American Petroleum Institute says that the price of east Texas crude oil is now 21.6 per cent higher than in 1948 and 12.1 per cent higher than in 1953. The price of milk in New York City, incidentally, also has gone up 12 per cent since June, 1953.

Based on the average price, before taxes, in 50 cities, the API—Adv.

says the price of gasoline is 18 1/2 per cent higher than in 1948 and 6 per cent higher than in 1953.

Oilmen cite the following rises in prices of other products: Iron and steel up 5 1/2 per cent over 1948 and 23.7 per cent over 1953; metals and metal alloy products up 6 1/2 per cent over 1948 and 19.8 per cent over 1953; machinery up 42.2 per cent over 1948 and 167 per cent over 1953 and motor vehicles up 34.8 per cent over 1948 and 14.3 per cent over 1953.

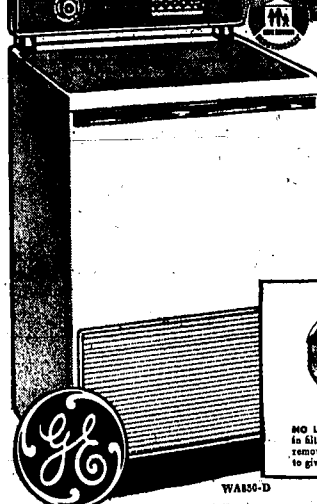

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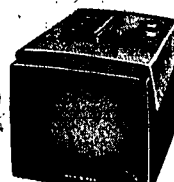
