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**Influence Not Tried, Asserts Head of Firm**

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 1 (UPI)—The president of the Arizona Public Service company said today his firm and five other Rocky mountain utility companies were "not trying to 'brainwash' the federal government" by supporting the federal power project.

Walter Lucking, whose company along with five others today filed suit in federal court in Denver to try to "brainwash" Interior department officials in an effort to wreck the federal power project, told the secretary of the Interior, in 1953, a booklet setting forth our views, concerning the government's power project, which our government's position is different than at the time of the hearing. The information presented with regard to public power project is factual and public record is open.

From the information available on the report of the house government operations committee, it appears that the public interest was given a very narrow view of the facts presented at the hearing, as being given to the American people.

We feel that our company has the right, as also is the obligation to present to any agency of government facts on the public interest in the federal power project.


He was cornered in the parking lot of an apartment house by some reporters who had been tracking him. Wallaroo faced off for a last stand, and Bullock got a grip on the east.

BURLEY, March 1—One of the rising young stars on the American music scene is a remarkable young southerner who will appear at the Burley high school auditorium.

Richard Cass, a pianist from Greenville, S.C., will be presented here for the sixth year of his annual Cass Community Concert Association. He will be the featured participant three years ago when he was chosen to represent the South in the annual Young Artists competition of the National Federation of Music Clubs.

He also won international honors in two recent competitions.

New York—The National April 11, 1955, Cass was selected for the federation's honor. A second honor followed hard on the heels of the first, as he was awarded a Fullbright scholarship for study abroad.

Fullbright scholarship was renewed for a second year and he spent another year at the Ecole Normale de Musique in Paris.

While in Europe he filled many professional engagements including recitals in such cities as Bonn, Rheims, Bourges, Cannes, and Paris. After returning to the United States he joined the Transylvanian orchestra at the Brevard festival.

Born in Greenville on May 3, 1931, Cass studied piano at the University of South Carolina, training at home, later studied privately with Mrs. Lawrence Bentz

— who served as district council executive for the Snake River council since 1943, has resigned to

the post of director of guidance activities of the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

Every section of the nation was represented at the convention.

The first question was whether public high schools should make a

strong effort to teach moral and spiritual values.

Twenty-six principals rated this

task "imperative." Thirteen chose it "desirable." Only one said it is "unnecessary."

Religious observances of some type were listed by 18 principals as an important part of their guidance activities of their schools.

Another widespread approach is to teach moral values in the context of other educational processes, especially history, literature, science, social studies and psychology. About half of the principals listed this their method.

The question which evoked the widest range of views and the largest number of answers was: "What part, if any, should schools play in teaching about religion play in a public school program of moral and ethical concepts?"

Under the individual replies could be categorized, eight principals assigned an important role to religious teaching; 10 a small role; 10 no role; six no role at all; together, and the remaining 16 either declined to answer or lined up with the principal who confessed, "I honestly don't know."
