### Chambers Ask Legislature To Complete Agenda, Call Special Session for Taxes

BOISE, March 4 (UP)—Delegations from 20 local Chambers of Commerce in Idaho last night adopted a resolution urging the state legislature to finish up all its business except the underfunding of the special session which would be called by the legislature. The delegates also voted 8-1 in favor of a sales and use tax with nine decedents abstaining from any stand at all. The vote was taken after an explanation of three tax proposals.

The chambers represented at the meeting were: Caldwell, Elgin, Emmet, Twin Falls, Pocatello, Boise, Buhl, Wendell, Preston, Idaho Falls, Blackfoot, Rimbey, Orofino, Burley, Wallace, Pocatello, Kootenai, Shoshone, and Mountain Home. All 190 members attended the meeting. A standing order of the legislature was read on the tax plans and the delegates voted on the tax proposals.

### Senate OK on Ike's Mideast Plan Seen

WASHINGTON, March 4 (UP)—President Eisenhower's Middle East "shield" plan appeared today to have a clear track and a green light for senate approval this week. Israel's announced intention of withdrawal from Egypt and defeat of a major amendment removed the chief remaining obstacle. Passage is now forecast by senate leaders for Thursday night. The senate met an hour early to push final debate on the measure, which already has consumed two weeks of debate. No-votes were expected today.

The senate version of the Eisenhower plan is to be a policy to use armed force if President Eisenhower deems it necessary to combat any communist attack on a Middle East nation seeking American help.

WASHINGTON, March 4 (UP)—A Northwest Public Power association official said today chances of getting congressional approval for a high dam at Hells canyon "are much better" than a year ago.

James A. Hales, D., executive secretary of the association, said the dam has an "excellent chance" of winning over legislators who opposed the project last year. "The case in favor of the dam was badly understated last year but we have evidence now to show that the benefits that would accrue from the project are 50 per cent greater than were previously pointed out," he said.

### Japan's Premier Turns Down Plan for Use of Suicide Fleet

TOKYO, March 4.—Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi vetoed today a proposal to send suicide "kamikaze" fighters to Christmas Island to stop British H-bomb tests.

But the newly elected Japanese premier warned that Britain will be held responsible for any damage or injuries to Japanese resulting from the scheduled tests and said Britain has "tacitly recognized" Japan's right to retaliate.

Kishi turned down flatly a house-budget committee meeting a proposal adopted Sunday by the Japanese council against atomic and hydrogen bombs to send "suicide" fleets to the danger area off Christmas Island in hopes that the British would call off the tests.

"I can understand the feeling behind the proposal," Kishi told the committee after being questioned by a Socialist diet member. "But the government must give this matter the fullest consideration to determine whether such suicide tactics are proper or not."

The government cannot say whether such dangerous tactics are the only means left to us.

Kishi said Japan had not yet received a reply from the British government over its second protest Feb. 12 against the scheduled tests. The previous protest in January was rejected by Britain.

"The Japanese government firmly requests that the British government make clear our position that if the tests are held, the British government will be held responsible for all consequences."

"We believe that as long as there is no reply from the British government, we can interpret it to mean that the British government has tacitly recognized our claim."

The prime minister said he believed Japan had no course other than to protest appeal to world opinion in protests against the tests.

Dr. Harold Vincent, director of the Benjamin Franklin library, which has set up business in the century-old Cafe Voltaire, a cafe frequented by students, said the United States borrow the mail-order catalogs more than any other volume.

"All the French are writing about the states," Vincent said. "We have all the facts but the catalog offers the best all-around picture they can get."

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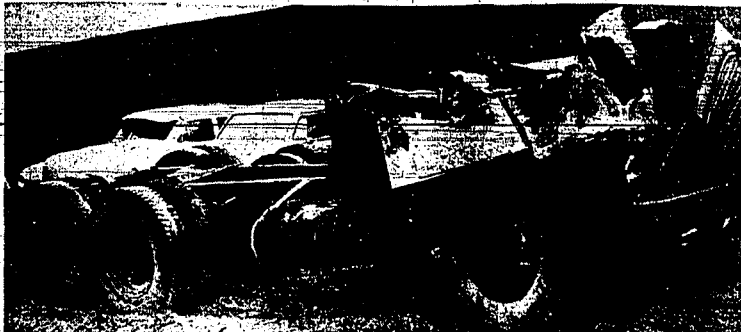

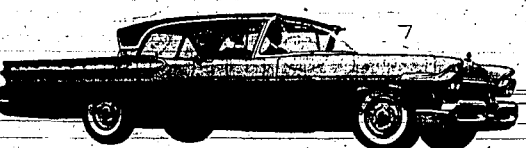

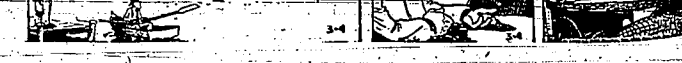
