## President Is Asking More Drought Aid

WASHINGTON, March 6 (U.S. Press)—President Eisenhower asked congress yesterday to approve an expanded drought relief program with \$100 million to be paid to 25 per cent of the drought-stricken areas.

Under the President's program states also would be responsible for administering disaster relief to provide emergency local guidance and supervision.

In a special message to congress, Mr. Eisenhower asked for authority to expand existing drought and other disaster relief programs. The President gave no estimate of the cost of the new program, either to the federal government or to the states.

Accompanying this message was a letter to the President from Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson.

Mr. Eisenhower "urgently" requested consideration and adoption of Benson's legislative proposals.

Many of the proposals in the report were directly upon the current drought situation, Mr. Benson said. "I feel strongly, however, that in this appraisal of the federal government's participation in emergency drought disaster programs we have found some important guide lines to more effective and efficient federal government participation in relief efforts of other types of natural disasters from time to time." He said he drew two particular conclusions from the report.

The first was the administration of emergency disaster programs must be kept close to the local people, Mr. Benson said. "It is the responsibility of the federal government to assume a greater part in alleviating human disaster, but it is the responsibility of the federal government to assist in meeting other local needs in times of disaster, calling on the federal government only to supplement the local resources."

Benson's letter said federal legislation will be offered "requiring a minimum of 25 per cent participation in certain future emergency agricultural programs for disaster relief."

Such state participation would apply particularly to the emergency relief program for drought-stricken areas. Under these, the federal government now pays \$150 a acre toward the cost of hay and \$150 a hundred pounds toward the cost of feed grain for disaster-stricken areas.

The states now pay one per cent or less of the cost of these relief programs, Benson pointed out. "The most state legislation now in session, that the House of Representatives has passed, would require states to contribute 25 per cent of the cost of such relief programs."

Benson said Congress will be asked to authorize a federal disaster program to drought areas. Officials said they do not know how much money will be needed for this until completion of a survey later in the year. The survey would take account of the effect of recent rains in some drought areas.

The existing program as outlined by Benson would be part of the existing and long popular agricultural conservation program. He said it added legislation will be needed to make payments to farmers and ranchers in particular areas under special circumstances such as, disastrous drought conditions.

Benson said the administration also will ask for legislation to extend for three years its authority to make special livestock loans in drought areas and to broaden the purposes for which such loans may be made. Replenishment would be scheduled over a longer period than now authorized.

## Plane's Cabin Slashed Open By Propeller

MEMPHIS, Tenn., March 6 (U.S. Press)—A Douglas C-47 transport plane, carrying 14 passengers, crashed today at 14,000 feet, causing a propeller to slash open the cabin top above the heads of 41 passengers.

The "pressurized" luxury cabin suddenly opened in a cloud of aluminum shrapnel and debris, and the plane crashed into a field of cotton.

The pilot, Capt. L. T. Hanner, said the plane was flying at 14,000 feet when the propeller struck the cabin top. The plane was carrying 14 passengers and 27 crew members.

The crash occurred on a flight from New York to Dallas. The plane was en route to Dallas when it crashed.

The cause of the crash is still under investigation.

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—American officials are making plans to unfreeze U. S. aid to the combatant Middle East area this month in a further effort to restore tranquility there.

All aid programs in the limited-area were necessarily suspended last fall when the British-French-Israeli attack on Egypt forced the recall of 199 foreign aid officials, together with their families, to avoid injury. That left no one in the area to administer the aid programs under way in Israel, Egypt and Lebanon.

Officials said Tuesday orders to return to their posts will go out to these 199 experts sometime this month — presumably as soon as the troops complete withdrawal from the last sunken ship is cleared from the channel of the Suez canal. Congress has appropriated 750 million dollars for military and economic aid in the Middle East during the fiscal year ending next June 30.

President Eisenhower has authorized 100 million dollars to use during the fiscal year.

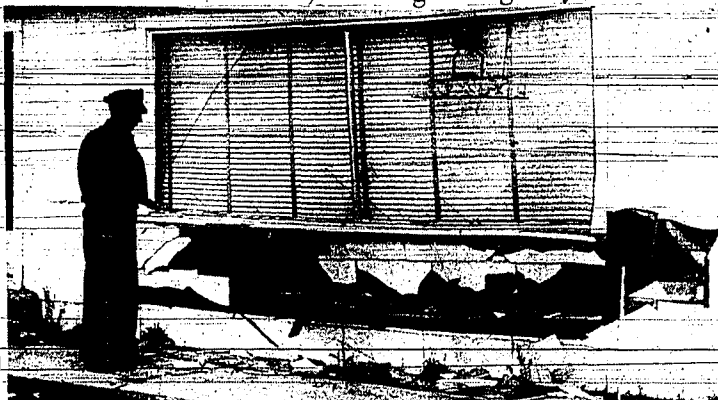
Awaiting congressional approval is Eisenhower's request for a freeze in spending 200 million dollars available under the area.

American officials expect the Israeli withdrawal to be swift. Likewise, they look for clearing of the Suez canal by mid-March.

NEW YORK, March 6 (U. S. A.)—A third force of calmer appraisal is beginning to appear in the business world. The optimists and the pessimists in the business world.

## Surplus Sales Termed Poor U. S. Planning

WASHINGTON, March 6 (U. S. A.)—David K. E. Bruce, ambassador designate to West Germany, says the program for sale of surplus U. S. farm commodities to foreign countries is "potentially dangerous" to normal trade and should be re-examined.

In a report published Tuesday by the senate foreign relations committee, Bruce said the "disposal program" is a "double-edged weapon" of foreign aid. The report on foreign aid operations in South American, is one of a series ordered by the committee.

Appointment Protested President Roosevelt's appointment of Bruce, a Democrat, already has drawn some Republican protest.

His comments on the surplus disposal program may add to the controversy over his selection. Senator Allen, R., Va., a member of both the foreign relations and agriculture committees, has labeled the report as "weak."

Opposition Seen Allen said in an interview that while Bruce made no specific recommendations for abandoning the agricultural surplus disposal program "his report reads like he wants to kill it."

"One who thinks this program is worth all it costs us and is less expensive than piling up unsalable farm surplus as losses," Allen declared. Under the program, the United States sells farm surplus for local currencies and then loans or gives the major part of these receipts to the local governments for economic or military projects.

production. Cutbacks in work weeks are expected in other industries.

But, the same time, the outlook in other industries is brighter than ever. Some Wall Street investment advisers are looking for gains this year in the profits of some industries, and especially of the larger companies in those industries. 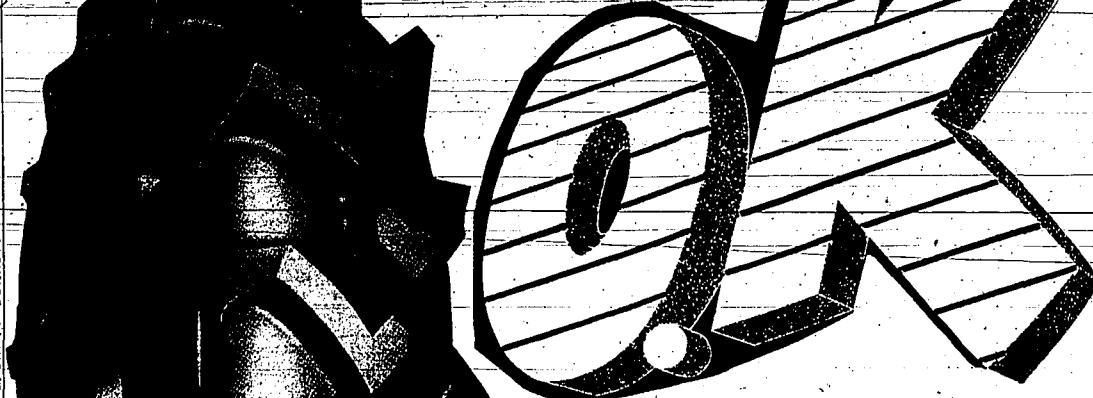

### Korea Orphan Group Arrives In Plane Trip

LOS ANGELES, March 5 (AP)—The largest group of Korean orphans to enter this country under the sponsorship of World Vision, Inc., arrived by plane here yesterday.

The 16 orphans arrived on a scheduled flight from Los Angeles, accompanied by Mary H. Creswell, Ore., who has brought other Korean orphan groups to the United States.

The plane made only one stopover (at Honolulu) on its way from Korea. It was in the air a total of 16 hours.

Sixty of the children who arrived at Los Angeles International airport yesterday's group were under three years of age. Thirty-two will go to homes in the Los Angeles area. The balance will go to other areas of the nation.

The orphans are American-born; whose fathers were American and mothers were Korean.

### Sea Battle

SAN PEDRO, Calif., March 5 (AP)—The crew of the fishing boat, Pioneer told yesterday of a desperate three-hour battle with harpoon, axes and knives against three giant manila rays caught in their net.

The Pioneer was fishing for tuna—about 250 miles off the coast of Baja—Calif. when the manila rays were snared. Each of the rays weighed about three tons and had a "wing spread" of 30 feet.

With guns virtually useless against the huge creatures, the Pioneer's 12-man crew harpooned the rays, pulled them alongside, chopped off their deadly stingers and hacked them to death.

### Warning Is Given On Gulf Shipping

AMMAN, Jordan, March 5 (AP)—Premier Suleiman Nabulsi said today any attempt by the United States to enforce Israeli freedom of navigation in the Gulf of Arabia would be considered "an attitude of enmity by the Arab world."

"Any reply to questions on the Eisenhower doctrine for the Middle East he said 'I do not see any communist threat here' and 'we do not welcome military interference.'"

He repeated, "I do not feel there is any communist threat in Syria and Egypt as the propagandists claim."

"Any plan for keeping peace in the Middle East should work through the United Nations," Nabulsi said in an exclusive interview with the United Press. "And it should be applied to any aggression."

### Cites Trip Value

PARIS, March 5 (AP)—Premier Guy Mollet told his cabinet today his trip to America, headed by the breach opened last October by France's participation in the Suez attack.

However, informed sources said Mollet's ministers told him his position in the French Parliament reached a record low during his eight-day trip to the United States and Canada. They urged the Socialist leader to call a confidence vote tomorrow to smash a trip act for him by the opposition Independent-Republicans.

### Divorces Asked In Local Court

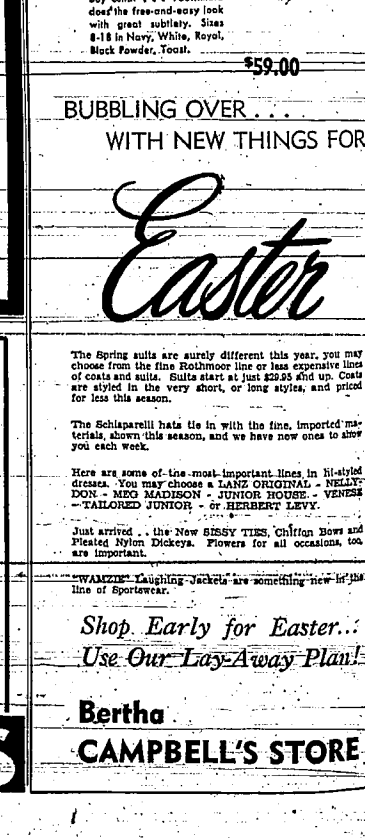

## Redskins' Boss Says Grid Profits Small

WASHINGTON, March 6 (U.P.)—Owner George Preston Marshall of the Washington Redskins denied today that professional football teams are "making an enormous amount of money." Marshall's unusually calm but vigorous defense of pro football was contained in a letter to Rep. William B. Miller, R-N.Y., who has demanded an investigation of pro football.

Marshall said Miller's statement that National Football League clubs are making large profits "simply isn't true." The Redskins owner said NFL gross receipts in 1956, including television fees, were less than \$9 million dollars—less than it was the largest year in league history.

"For 12 franchises," Marshall added, "that is not as much gross business as is done by small department stores in any one of the many cities in the United States. The net profits would be less than \$500,000 for the 12 clubs."

Marshall made these additional points in his letter to Miller: 1. The present draft system is a distribution of athletes on an equal basis. 2. Players instead of being handicapped by the team finishing last in the league are given the best position on the team.

## Battle Is Seen On Billboards In New Roads

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—Congress is about to get embroiled in a battle over billboards along new roads.

Most of the new roads are large numbers of individual motorists and nature-lovers. Arranged against them are advertising companies, organized sign painters and others who feel their jobs are at stake.

The issue: Should Congress enact legislation designed to keep billboards and advertising signs from sprouting up along the new federal system of interstate highways now under construction?

The 41,000-mile network of highways will be built over the next 12 years—much of it on new locations from funds raised by gasoline and other taxes levied on motorists and truckers. Construction work already has started.

Congressmen sponsoring legislation to control billboards reported today that long-suffering motorists and members of garden clubs from all over the country are writing in to commend their anti-billboard move.

But the congressmen are getting brickbats from sign painters, carpenters, advertising executives and some motel and hotel owners.

## Ash Wednesday Services Throughout Nation Mark Opening of Lent Season

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—Ash Wednesday services in Catholic and Protestant churches today summoned Christians to the 40-day annual observance of the holy season of Lent.

Lent has occupied the present place on the church calendar—the 40 weekdays and six Sundays preceding Easter—since 475 A. D. In that year Pope Pelic II formalized a custom that had been growing in Christian churches since the second century of setting aside a special period of solemn preparation for Easter.

Protestants, however, Catholics and Lutherans always have placed heavy emphasis on Lent. In recent years, a growing body of Methodists, Presbyterians and other Protestants have participated in Lenten programs.

Lent traditionally recalls to Christians the 40 days of fasting and prayer that Jesus spent in the wilderness to prepare for his ministry.

## Acid Throter Makes Attack

COONROSE, Tex., March 6 (AP)—An unusual assault thurs sold through an open door into the face of a witness in a \$5,000 bribe scandal in the Texas legislature last night.

Dr. R. E. McMeans, a prominent civil leader and chiropractor in this city near Houston, answered the back door burner of his clinic as he was preparing to leave for the night.

The assailant threw hydrochloric acid from a pint jar far into his face, all over the door. Mr. McMeans, 38, told police chief Ed Stephens he slammed the door and ran to a wash basin, where he scrubbed his face with water, diluting the acid.

McMeans testified last week before a grand jury and a Texas house of representatives committee investigating charges Rep. James E. Cox, Coonrose, consented to accept a \$5,000 bribe.

The purpose of cutting out some of our ordinary activities during Lent is to make room in our lives for a greater concentration on things of spiritual value.

"Lent can be of great value. If it is used as a period of partial withdrawal from the clamor and harassment of everyday life, a time when we renew and deepen our commitment to Christ."

He said that Lent above all should be a season of prayer—"private devotion, prayer as well as public worship."

"Those who do not already have the habit of daily private devotion can find no better time than Lent to start," he said.

The Rev. J. R. Taylor, pastor of the Presbyterian Church of the Pilgrims in Washington, said churches of his denomination are giving increasing attention to Lent because "we have learned from experience—that we need a period of preparation in order to appreciate the full meaning of Easter."

"There was a time when most Protestants shied away from Lent as a Roman custom. But we've gotten beyond the point where we're afraid of that. Lent is an historical phenomenon which goes back to the primitive church. And it is easy to see why it has endured so long—it meets a deep human need for an annual period of repentance, renewal, and dedication."

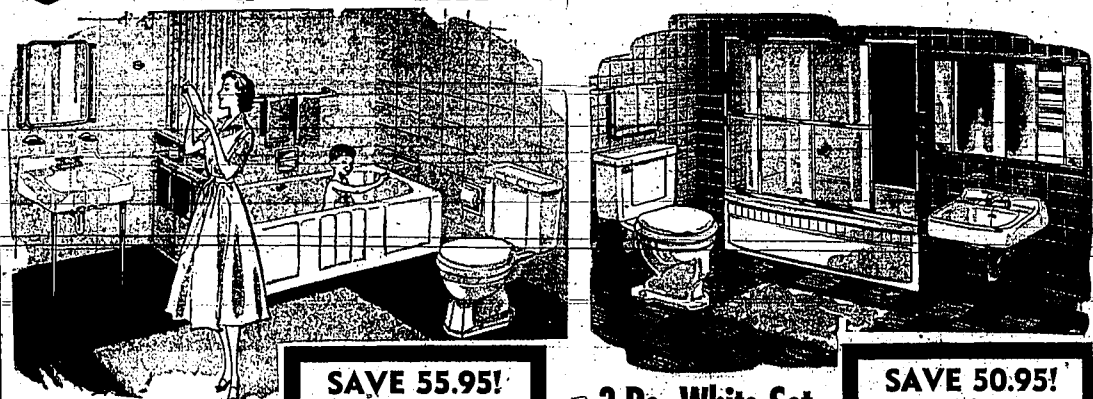
