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New Gross Income Tax Plan Entered For House Action

Payment of one-half of the cost of all taxes by an individual or corporation who operated at a loss for that year. 3. Lowering of the tax rate on retailers from 6 mills to 3 mills. 4. Inclusion of a wholesale tax in addition to the retail tax for those retailers who sell goods from interstate wholesalers who do not pay the tax.

Suez Opening Bringing New Old Problems

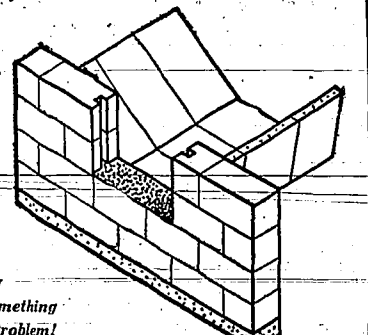

New Chairman Says GOP Can Recover Control of Congress

WASHINGTON, March 11 (AP)—since they failed to do so last year while Mr. Eisenhower was winning reelection by a landslide.

From the GOP viewpoint, winning house and senate majorities in the 1958 elections looks like a strenuous assignment. Normally, the party in opposition to an administration gains congressional seats in the middle of a presidential term. That would mean democratic gains in 1958.

Each of the 11 Democratic senators whose seat is at stake next year was elected in 1952, the year of the first Eisenhower landslide. A number of the 21 GOP seats up for grabs next year seem in much greater jeopardy. Hence senate Democrats already are talking of converting their present 48 to 47 margin into a more comfortable majority next year.

In the house, the present 414 is 231 Democrat, 200 Republican and two vacantees. The GOP needs to gain 18 seats to recapture control.

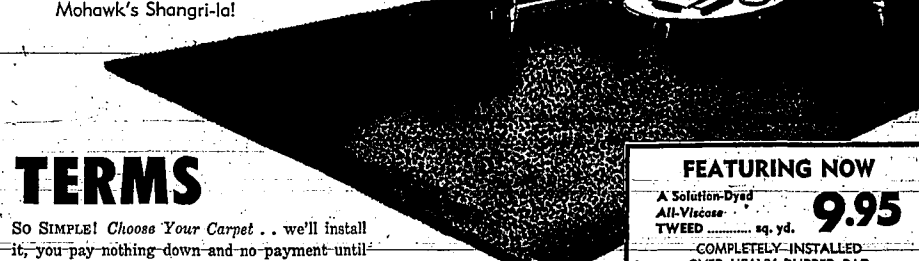

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60-Mile Gale Sweeps Over Midwest U.S.

Outer winds that reached more than 60 miles per hour pounded the central portion of the nation today, bringing mid-central states as far north as the Great Lakes.

The storm swept southward, bringing out of Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas with velocities of more than a mile-a-minute, the small tornadoes that swept south of Wichita, Kan., but damage was confined to a wrecked TV antenna.

Winds of 60 miles per hour swept the plains states and sections of the northern and central Rockies.

The south winds sent temperatures climbing over the Mississippi valley and into the Great Lakes. Readings jumped by 30 degrees in northern Illinois and eastward early today as compared with the same time yesterday.

Thunderstorms and thunderstorms accompanied the warmer air in the central and southern plains, the middle Mississippi valley and the Great Lakes.

Snow flurries occurred in the north and central Rockies and showers again hit the north and central Pacific coast.

Forecasters said the mild air will overpass the east today with "much warmer" temperatures expected by Tuesday.

Warmer winds also are seen for the Great Lakes and south to the Gulf region, along with scattered showers and thunderstorms. It will be cooler in the central and northern states and fair weather is predicted for the Southwest.

Storms are expected in the northern Rockies west to Oregon and Washington, with showers along the Pacific coast from northern California to Seattle.

Official Urges Mass Shelters For Air Raids

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Civil Defense Administrator V. J. Peterson has urged Congress that without a mass shelter program, 90 percent of America's city dwellers might die in surprise atomic attacks.

Even with the best shelter policy, he said, 40 per cent of the population could be killed.

Peterson said in closed-door testimony published today that he has recommended to Congress a mass shelter building program to cost \$3 billion dollars.

His study will spend \$100,000,000 next year studying "human reactions to atomic attacks." This is "probably the most important item on the list," he said.

He said he is not sure whether the American people will be willing to "accept the cost of building mass shelters" or whether they will "have complete faith in the government."

His experts believe only about 10 per cent of the nation's population would survive an atomic attack, he said.

Officially, Peterson said, the nation has 400,000 shelter places and 42.5 million dollars to buy more.

The civil defense chief has disclosed previously that he wants to build 1,000,000 shelter places, at a cost of \$3,000,000,000 for work on test shelters not nothing for their general construction.

Man Who Guided First Russian Revolt Says Soviet Liberation Is "Inevitable"

TWIN FALLS, Calif., March 11 (AP)—Leonid Brezhnev, who headed the first Soviet-led democratic government in Russia, said today that the liberation of the people of that country from communist dictatorship is inevitable.

When liberation is achieved, Brezhnev said with earnest conviction, the nation of a new world will be born.

Four days ago, on March 12, the people of Russia rose up in spontaneous revolt without plan, or organization—and overthrew Nikita Khrushchev, now 76, in the sole suc-

cess of the provisional government that took over after Nicholas II's abdication ended Romanov rule. Khrushchev's regime died a scant eight months later in Nikolai Lenin's seizure of power, with the communists on Nov. 7, 1917. Lenin was supported by Khrushchev's like Joseph Stalin, Leonid Brezhnev, and V. M. Molotov, invited by Khrushchev's government to return from czar-imposed exile.

Khrushchev has been in exile from his homeland from the time the communists took and consolidated control, most of 40 years. He now is working on a research project of the Herbert Hoover library on the Stanford university campus.

The object is a history in documentary form of the provisional government, from the rise of the original revolution through the Lenin-led communist coup.

"I know them," he said, "the Russian people," said Khrushchev, sitting in the scholar's cubicle, small and spare, which is his work room.

Although absent from Russia nearly 40 years, Khrushchev has devoted himself to study of his country's history and he has kept in touch on Soviet events through other exiles and foreign visitors to Russia.

His career before World War I was as a political lawyer, a defender of politically accused. He covered

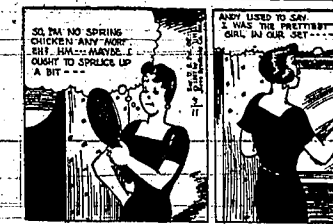
