## Demos Warn '58 Election No "Shoo-in"

**WASHINGTON**, March 13.—The Democratic national committee is calculating that 1958 election results will scare any Democrats who think their candidate should be shoo-ins in future elections.

Democrat John F. Kennedy's "magnificent" speech on the question of the soul-searching not going on among both Republicans and Democrats about how to approach elections was not mentioned by Sen. D. Eisenhower who will not appear on the ballot.

Democrats—National chairman George W. Ball and Sen. Daniel Inouye—said Saturday that Democrats last week-end that their party cannot assume it will win in 1958 just because Mr. Eisenhower will not be a candidate.

Mr. Kennedy's speech on soul searching was contained in Democratic Sen. John F. Kennedy's life magazine article in which the Massachusetts Democrat said his party had new ideas and new faces.

On the other side of the political fence, Sen. George A. Alben, R-Vt., told reporters Saturday that he thinks that the GOP must remember it is a Republican party, not an Eisenhower party.

Sen. Alben said Mr. Eisenhower was elected because of personal popularity and faith among the voters that he could best provide leadership.

He added, however, that

Mr. Eisenhower could not translate that popularity into victory for other Republican candidates.

Both Alben and Mr. Kennedy suggested

his party needs better public relations and a generally amiable operation at national, state and local levels.

conferences this spring to assess political

strengths and weaknesses.

to provide an early start for the 1958 congressional campaign in which the

Democrats will have one

longshot chance to win control of

the house and senate.







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**Shuffle Noted  
In "Ike" Posts  
Since Election**

WASHINGTON, March 13.—President Eisenhower's team has undergone extensive reshuffling since the November elections. More than 20 major posts have been changed. So far, the second term turnover has been restricted to the second echelon of policy-making officials. The White House says the shuffle itself, but there may be some coming later in the year.

One official, Assistant Defense Secretary Robert Tripp, has been moved from his post as director of investigations toward his connection with firms holding military contracts. Others remain as they were, including those whose posts are health or a desire to return to private business. Several simply transferred to other government posts.

The departing officials quit because they didn't like Mr. Eisenhower's programs of "modern Republicanism," they kept their posts, and others were given them.

There is no public indication that policy differences figured in any of the resignations.

During Mr. Eisenhower's first term there were three changes in his cabinet. Paul J. Mitchell replaced Martin Durkin as secretary of interior, and John C. Stennis became Opa Lubin as secretary of health, education and welfare, and Fred A. Beal followed Beale as attorney general.

Of these, only Durkin, former head of the AFL, Plumb's only left with a bias at administration.

Mr. Eisenhower's success to date in carrying his top policies relatively intact contrasts sharply with the record of his predecessor.

Under the new administration, Uncle Tom Democratic presidents, there were many instances of policies which resulted from public clashes over policy. For example, the late Secretary of Interior Harold I. Stassen, who had been nominated with a bias at the nomination of California's citizen Edward W.
