Like Pondering Plans to Okay Duty Switches

NEW YORK, March 15.—President Eisenhower is seriously considering a constitutional amendment to "suspend" temporarily the powers and duties of the President during any disabling illness of the nation's chief executive, the New York Times reported today.

A new story by James Reston, chief of the Times-Washington bureau, said the President is expected to support the proposal which he received several days ago from Attorney General Herbert Brownell. The proposed amendment and the President's recent heart and lungs attacks, the Times said, are interrelated and have nothing to do with his physical condition.

The amendment would provide for the temporary assumption of presidential authority by the vice president during the duration of any disabling illness, the Times said, and it would probably authorize the President himself to declare his own disability and then summon the vice president to take over temporarily the "powers and duties" of the presidency.

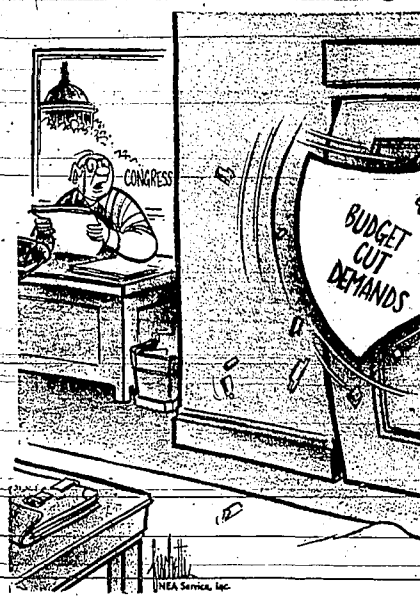

NEW YORK, March 15 (AP)—The camera's eye is a half-way between the Pearl River, N. Y., high school put its study hall on television, and according to the principal, things are working out just fine.

The study hall in the high school has a rather limited audience—two secretaries in the high school general office. 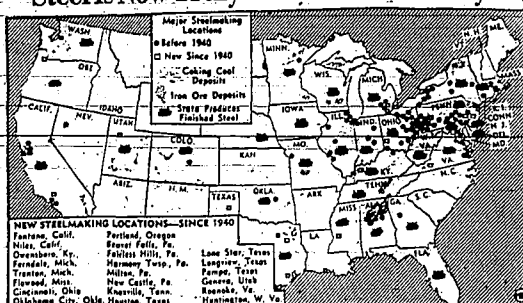

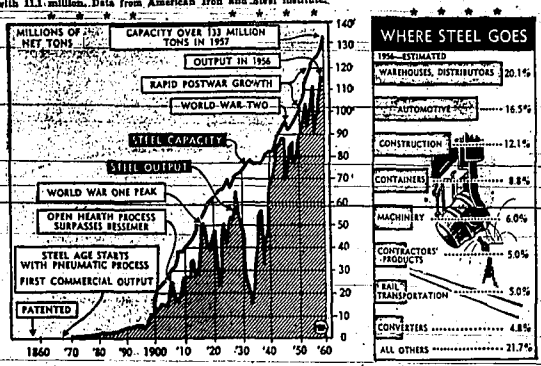
