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### Farm Agency Lists Damage To Dry Areas

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The agriculture department report today shows that 25 million acres of land in the great plains states have been damaged by soil blowing at one time or another.

### Israelis Warn Of Defense In Gaza Regions

JERUSALEM, Israel, March 18.—Premier David Ben-Gurion said today Israel would fully defend its right to passage through the Gulf of Aqaba and that return of Egypt to the Gaza strip means the search for a peaceful solution is being most vitally thrown away.

Ben-Gurion, in the first interview he has granted since the Israeli withdrawal from Gaza and Sharm el Sheikh on the Gulf of Aqaba, also renewed Israel's demand for freedom of passage through the Suez canal and appealed for international pressure against Egyptian "illegal blockade."

In this connection, he recalled that "President Eisenhower has stated that it should not be assumed that Israeli shipping will be interfered with in the Suez canal."

The 70-year-old prime minister who wrote out his replies in answer to questions by the United Press seemed to be in excellent spirits despite the tensions of the past weeks and a government crisis threat that has not entirely disappeared. He appeared tired.

Ben-Gurion repeated his previous offers to sit down with Arab leaders and negotiate either a peaceful settlement of the problem or non-aggression and suggested that this could be done by the United Nations. He was firm, though, and he stated "we are here to stay."

## Confabs Over Cyprus Pacts Seen Nearing

There seems good reason for hope that new negotiations may be started soon for a solution of the Cyprus problem.

The Greek Cypriot leaders who are fighting British rule have offered to declare a truce.

British government reaction has been favorable. The No. 1 British condition for a resumption of negotiations is that the rebels stop their campaign of terrorism.

Whether it will be possible, under the best conditions, to find a permanent settlement of the complicated Cyprus situation is another thing.

Greek islanders started a campaign of assassination, ambushes, bombings and sabotage two years ago.

They demanded that Britain grant Cyprus the right of "self-determination" which meant that they wanted Britain to hand the island over to Greece.

Britain refused and was supported by Turkey, which ruled Cyprus for centuries before the British took it over in 1878.

A campaign of violence intensified. Archbishop Makarios, head of the Greek Orthodox church in Cyprus, became the political leader of the "self-determination" campaign.

Britain charged that Makarios also was implicated directly in the terrorism. On March 9, 1956, Makarios was arrested and deported to the Seychelles islands in the Indian ocean.

British forces under Field Marshal Sir John Harding, commander in chief and governor of Cyprus, have "pressed" a determined drive against the small but well-organized and bold group of extremists who are responsible for the terrorism.

In recent months, the extremists have suffered some punishing blows. A number of their leaders have been captured or killed. On March 9, Gregoris Antoniou, second in command of the rebels, was killed in his mountain hideout.

Last Thursday the rebel organization, called "EOKA," announced that it would cease fire immediately if Makarios were freed.

The British government showed great interest in the offer, said Field Marshal Harding.

The ceasefire offer is now under consideration by Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and his cabinet.

There are indications that Britain might take Makarios to London—not to Cyprus—to see if there is possibility of fruitful negotiations.

## Scientists Use Exhaust Fumes To Bring Cancer in Research

NEW YORK, March 19 (AP)—To make the problem of rising lung cancer deaths a little more complicated and pressing, two scientists have produced skin cancer in mice with the exhaust fumes of an ordinary gasoline automobile engine.

The experiments were similar to those in which a number of scientists have used the exhaust fumes of cigarettes—the smoke that is to produce skin cancer, again in mice. None of these experiments can be said to be conclusive, but the new ones indicate the automobile is highly suspect.

Sidney Mittler and Stanley Nicholson of the Armour Research Foundation of Chicago hooked up the exhaust pipe of a six-cylinder engine with an apparatus that condensed this into a sticky, oily substance.

This when painted twice a week onto a clipped shoulder patch of 187 mice for 14 months produced skin cancer in 76 per cent of them.

It was a normal mouse. But then, city dwellers spend their lifetime in automobiles loaded with gasoline engine exhaust fumes.

## Hot Rod Clubs Draw Mixed Reaction By Officials, Groups Through Nation

CHICAGO, March 19 (AP)—The more to provide young hot rod enthusiasts with "drag strips" where they can show under supervision has received a mixed reaction.

Proponents of the idea claim that drag strips promote safety by getting the hot rodders off the streets and onto their own supervised racing strip.

"I never will subscribe to the fallacy that youth has to be given an opportunity to blow off steam. Let them get into athletics. An automobile is a potential killer."
