**LCN SPOOKING THE POLITICIANS**

We hope our readers will not become bored with the continued comments on Lewis-Clark Normal school at Lewiston, which has come through another session of the legislature with an appropriation for \$371,700.

But it is not the appropriation that is the cause of the controversy. It is the fact that the school is being wasted in Idaho, in this particular instance with the approval of the governor. With taxes in Idaho rocketing sky high, we think the people should know that a lot of all this about "minimum requirements" is political subterfuge.

Even though the Lewis-Clark Normal appropriation passed the house with virtually no debate, as Governor Smylie had predicted weeks before, in a talk at Lewiston, it was a different story in the senate.

During almost two hours of debate before the senate finally voted its approval of the LCN appropriation, 32 to 11, the highlights of all the speech making were significant. Numerous senators, some speaking as if they were concerned with their own conscience and good judgment, served notice that this may be the last time they will support Lewis-Clark Normal school.

They suggested that instead of maintaining the school as a state-supported teacher training college, the people of Lewiston and others interested in keeping the school open should get busy at turning it into a junior college.

There is no denying that approval of the LCN appropriation drew plenty of criticism in the senate, including that of Sen. T. J. Keithly, Republican of Washington County, member of the interim education committee.

Keithly read from a committee report, citing figures that it cost the state an average of \$1,150 per year per student for the Lewis-Clark school with an average attendance of 155.

He said this compared with an average of about \$218 per student in the education college at the University of Idaho, "only a few cents away."

Although they voted for the appropriation, President Pro-Tem O. J. Buxton, Democrat of Teton county, and Sen. Tom Heath, Republican of Spaulding county and minority leader, said this may be the last time they will support Lewis-Clark Normal school.

"If the people around Lewiston don't start getting something like Boise Junior college, the college in Coeur d'Alene or the school we have in Rexburg," said Buxton. "It won't be long before Lewis-Clark will be the next session of the legislature."

Heath said if the appropriation were approved, "it should serve as a warning to the board of regents and the people of Lewiston that they had better get busy." He said the state "can't afford to subsidize schools like this for a specific area indefinitely."

Even though the Lewiston interests won the support of Governor Smylie and the Lewis-Clark Normal must be enlarged into a four year school to attract enrollment and operate efficiently. By implication at least they have served notice of that being their objective.

Their own with the support of opportunist politicians and despite their attempts to discredit legislative interim committee reports challenging the arguments for operating LCN as a state institution, they face a rising tide of opposition.

The politicians themselves are sensing that mounting opposition and even some of the horse traders are getting spooked.

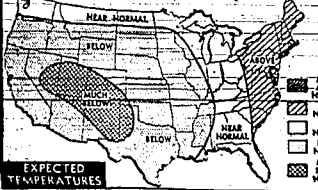

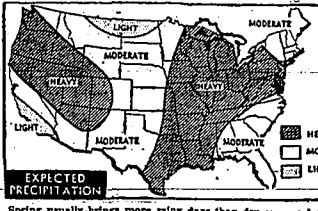

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# Expert Offers Mid-East's Oil Plan for U. S.

NEW YORK, March 20 (AP)—An expert proposed yesterday that the United States adopt a policy of offering to help Arab countries but at the same time strengthening the West's bargaining position to reduce an attempt to place one-sided war camp against another.

The proposed policy is outlined in the current issue of Foreign Affairs, magazine of the Foreign Policy Association. An advance copy is reported creating interest in Washington.

The expert is Walter J. Levy, New York, consultant to international oil companies and to governments on oil matters. He warns that Europe will depend for many years to come on Middle East oil. Neither nuclear power nor any other source of energy can make an appreciable dent for decades.

The United States faces "a challenge to every aspect of its life" at a time when Arab nationalism is rising and the USSR is trying to exploit it to the permanent damage of the West, Levy says.

He contends the United States must seek a program which: Assures access to foreign oil, on an equitable basis, for itself and its allies in times of peace and times of turmoil; Provides that the oil flow will be in accord with basic policy and strategic needs; Offers encouragement to foreign operations by U. S. oil companies and seeks friendly collaboration with western nations whose companies are likewise engaged.

It would avoid too much reliance on agreements with Arab nations in view of past experience, year away from too heavy a dependence on the United Nations for solution, and "show a firm line in asserting the interests of all concerned in the Middle East."

# Morse Assails 'The' Mid-East Policy in Talk

CHICAGO, March 20 (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse, D. Ore., criticized the administration's Middle East policy last night and warned that mistakes now could lead to "the worst prospect of annihilation."

Morse spoke at a meeting of chairmen of 102 Methodist regional boards of social and economic relations.

"We are no longer in an age when a wrong or mistaken policy can be reversed and what was lost reclaimed," Morse said.

"Today when a foreign policy goes awry, we wake up one morning faced with the awful prospect of annihilation, as we were last October when a situation in the Suez area suddenly erupted into war," he said.

Despite this, Morse said, the Eisenhower administration and the President himself have enjoyed an immunity from critical appraisal almost unknown in American history.

# Smylie Rapped

BOZEMAN, March 20 (AP)—Rep. C. E. Hilger, D. Mont., today accused Gov. Robert E. Smylie of disregarding the public by vetoing two 1957 legislative bills which would have regulated practices of health and accident insurance companies.

Hilger, who sponsored the bills, said the governor's veto showed that his business is more important to him than protecting the innocent, unsuspecting public.

# American Menu Invading Saigon

SAIGON, March 20 (AP)—The American canteenburger invaded this former French colony today.

A French-trained cook, slightly bewildered, nudged up Yankee hot dogs and hamburgers instead of the familiar French cuisine.

An exception, in the French merchant marine, Jean Delavigne, was the man who broke through the epidemic barrier for a familiar touch of home—just off the fashionable Rue Catinat.

The new American-style snack bar opened yesterday, offering doughnuts and waffles as another sign of Uncle Sam's growing impact on Indochina.

# Demo Leader Making Move In CIO Label

WASHINGTON, March 20 (U.P.)—A nationally-advertised show of independence from his friends in the Michigan Democratic party, Walter P. Reuther, the last of the two dominant unions in the CIO before the AFL-CIO merger, is making a move to become the CIO president, a position of the CIO and a vice president of the UAW and a vice president of the AFL-CIO.

Reuther has made some recent appointments without consulting his friends. Although Reuther was understood to support the appointment, he was reported to be not completely satisfied that he was not consulted.

Reuther's move was interpreted as a move to show he was not the hand-picked man of the CIO, even though he still would welcome its support.

Although Reuther's political friends have not been announced, he is expected to run for a sixth two-year term as governor next year and is regarded as an aspirant for the presidency in 1960.

Reuther is now engaged in a great debate over the course to be followed in 1960. Adlai E. Stevenson was nominated in 1952 and 1956 as a moderate who could keep the South in the party. Even so, four southern states went for President Eisenhower in 1952 and five gave him electoral votes in 1956.

Even Stevenson was named to the left of the middle-of-the-road Democrats in the party. Where the party record must largely be made during the next four years.

# Quick Action of Montana Man Helps in Saving Crash Victim

HELENA, Mont., March 20 (U.P.)—A quiet hero wouldn't talk much about it, but his action yesterday helped save a wrecked stranger from bleeding to death on a dark highway.

Mr. and Mrs. M. O. Estill were driving home to Great Falls after a Montana high school basketball tournament. They saw a car on the side, about 10 miles north of Helena. Piled in the front seat were two men. On top of the car was Howard Smith, 28, with blood-stained clothing and a cut in his forehead. Under Smith, his wife and a young boy, Robert H. Jones, 23, both of Great Falls.

"Somebody will have to do something or he'll bleed to death," said Estill. The Great Falls guard realized if anything was done it would have to be his doing.

Estill couldn't crawl down the spilled front seat, with nothing to hold his 180 pounds off the two injured men. He smashed the rear window, broke it, he could see the blood bleeding of the unconscious Smith. Estill could not recall from a first aid course taken years ago where to apply the pressure to staunch the flow, and the neck was slippery with blood. All he could remember was that if you can not stop bleeding any other way, stick your finger into the wound.

For 30 minutes, Estill, cramped and uncomfortable, kept one finger stuck into an open vein. Jones, pressed down by Smith's body, kept yelling.

Another motorist stopped, meanwhile, went on to Helena and sent back an ambulance.

Smith was reported as still in critical condition in a Helena hospital. He also had chest injuries Jones has been released.

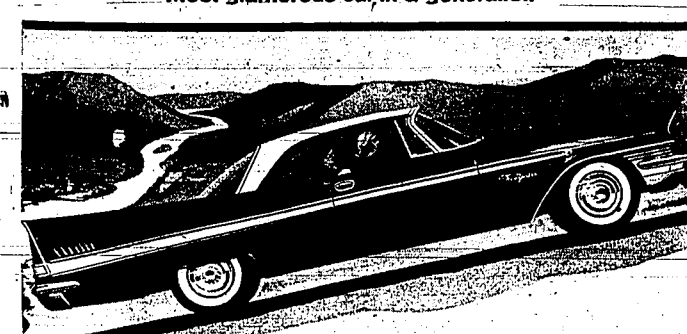

Italy established a 24-20 lead at halftime and went on to win handily. B. Peterson scored 16 points for the team and Teverbaugh led the winners with 24.

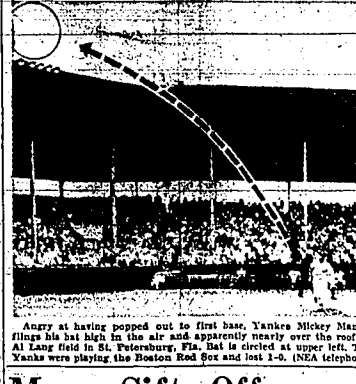

## Moore Sifts Offers For Defense of Title

NEW YORK, March 20 (AP)—Archie Moore weighed a couple of Canadian offers for the perplexed international boxing bout sought light advice Tuesday on whether it could arrange championship fights. The 40-year-old light heavyweight champion had been given a December 18 deadline by the NBA to sign for a June title defense.

Moore came to town Monday ready to sign papers with the IBC for a Detroit bout with the winner of the Tony Anthony-Chuck Spleser 12-round April 5.

Archie's timing was OK but president James D. Morris of the IBC would sign him because of the club's legal troubles.

"I'm going to consult my lawyers to get a legal opinion," said Moore, "on what I can do without flouting Judge Ryan's decision. The lawyers may take several days to make their decision."

Judge Sylvester Ryan ruled March 8 that the IBC was guilty of monopolizing the promotion of world championship fights. He ordered that the government, which brought the anti-trust charges against the IBC, and the boxing club, to propose decrees within 30 days.

"It's too bad about the delay," said Moore's manager, Charlie Johnson, "but that's the way it is. Temporarily, we'll look elsewhere. We've got two terrific offers from Canada—Toronto and Vancouver—for a title defense against Volande Pompey (stopped by Moore in the 10th round in London, England, June 6, 1955). "We'll look into it and if anyone else has any offers we'll be glad to listen. Of course if Morris gets permission to negotiate with us, we'll discuss his proposition again."

Baseball injuries continue to plague big league clubs in spring training with Bill Skowron, Carl Furillo and rookie Larry Raines already sidelined for extended periods and Milwaukee's Lew Burdette and Hank Aaron the latest victims. Furillo has been unable to do any serious training. In fact, his condition has worsened since, in favoring the left leg, he has caused his right shoulder to ache as well.

Raines was one of the leading contenders for Cleveland's shortstop and third base spots until a foul tip from him out resulted in a broken arm. He has been in the hospital 300 in 148 games for Indianapolis of the American association last year.

In the New York Giants' camp at Yonkers, "Pete" Cushman, a sidelineer with a pulled muscle in the back of his left knee. He got it when he stepped into a hole while breaking a ball in the outfield. Three Giant pitchers also are behind in their training—Ruben Gumen and rookie Curt Barclay with injured legs and Steve Rickard with an aching shoulder.

# Farm Leaders

## Look for Way To Heal Splits

WASHINGTON, March 20.—Agricultural leaders are looking for ways of healing a sharp split in congressional farm forces.

Those forces—also able to push through legislation—have been interpreted in agricultural circles as a harbinger of dark days ahead for farm legislation unless unity can be restored.

The problem was being considered in farm examination and other meetings here and in other parts of the country.

It was discussed at a staff conference of the National Grange here Monday. The National Grange and Union planned to go over it at leadership meetings in Denver and the National Grange was invited to attend the congressional session for the council, which is composed of farm organizations in the National Grange.

Meanwhile, Newsum issued a statement saying in effect that there was little hope for future farm legislation without votes of congressmen. To get such votes it will be necessary, he said, for agriculture to come up with better proposals.

The Grange leader added that both rigid and flexible price support systems—the latter favored generally by Democrats and the latter by the Eisenhower administration—have proved unsatisfactory.

# Deadline for Wool Payment Reported

WASHINGTON, March 20.—Wool producers in the West are reminded of this month to market and file applications for government wool incentive payments by the next summer.

Any late crop wool marketed after March 31 will not be eligible for price support until the summer of 1938.

The payments are designed to reflect on the average, the difference between prices growers received in the market and the government price for the same wool.

April 15 is the deadline for signing of agreements to return land under the conservation program.

## Report Given Here for 19 Street Pro

More than nine miles of Twin Falls streets were graded and repaved during the calendar year.

Balleger, superintendent of streets and water, reported city commissioners and city council members that he recommended no work for 1957 until current work is completed.

Balleger said that of thirty miles of streets had been graded and repaved by the Barber-Greene Station, with 2 1/2 miles being a partial improvement district No. 1.

He said 23 streets had been graded and repaved, and 10 streets had been graded and repaved all or part of the base in the city.

During the year, he said, asphalt plants had prepared 20,000 tons of crushed gravel and 20,000 tons of liquid asphalt. All of this was used in the city.

Balleger said the city department was furnished by the department with materials by property owners whose job is to maintain the streets.

Road materials are purchased by the street department, the department reported, included 20,000 tons of crushed and washed gravel and 20,000 tons of asphalt.

Among other activities noted upon by Balleger was the installation of 100 feet of drainage and numerous catch basins and feet of intersection concrete curbs.

He said 10 parking lots had been installed and 250 signs of traffic signs were used on the streets.

Balleger noted that 7000 between the curb and sidewalks were trimmed during the year and concrete street bridge "A" constructed at the Perrine and crossing Elizabeth boulevard. The project was by contract.

On the 30 miles of street in the city street system, he said, 15 miles are now paved. Then more streets are scheduled to be paved this year, he added.

He reported other future activities of the department include repairs to damaged streets and to seal coating of streets already paved. He recommended the commissioners not start any new projects for the department this year.

The superintendent said that the tree-trimming had been done by Vaughn's Landscaping and Tree Service at an average of \$200 per tree. He said Sterling Vaughn reported the Siberian elm was the most predominant tree in the city and also the most undesirable.

He said Vaughn recommended the city take measures to control future tree planting. Vaughn recommended all new trees should be planted between the house and sidewalk and at least three feet from the latter. Vaughn recommended the use of smaller trees and said the location should be planned in conjunction with power poles.
