The great plains area still is digging out of snow drifts as high as house tops today. Deaths in the week-end blizzard rose to 33, spread over eight states: Texas 7, Illinois 7, Oklahoma 5, Kansas 4, Nebraska 3, Indiana 3, Missouri 2, New Mexico 1 and Iowa 1. Sixteen of the deaths were attributed to traffic accidents in which the storm was a factor. The other 17 included seven dead of exposure, six who were overcome by carbon monoxide

Mayflower Replica Scheduled To Duplicate Original's Trip

LONDON, March 25 (AP)—The Mayflower will set sail for America on April 13.

This is not a yellowed newspaper clipping from 1920. It is a 1957 announcement by the flamboyant skipper of the Mayflower II, a 220-foot replica of the original ship which brought the Pilgrims to Plymouth Rock three centuries ago.

And because it is 1957 and the ship is not to colonize but to show Anglo-American friendship, some changes have been made.

A peril unknown to the Pilgrims—a shipyard strike—could yet delay the sailing date.

The committee for education would not have encountered "one vote in opposition" if the sales tax bill had passed.
Turner defended his stand on the issue and expressed his regret that the question of the school should not have been a political issue.
"I originally agreed with former Gov. Len Jordan's action in closing the school," Turner said, "but the question definitely is settled, favoring leaving it open instead of wasting money closing and reopening it."
He noted that Lewiston is perhaps the only town in Idaho which has available employment, through its Potlatch Forest mill, to enable students to work their way through school.
He also pointed out that senate leaders indicated during the session that the recent appropriation will be the last they will authorize, and that the school board should be recommended the school be operated by the city of Lewiston as a junior college, similar to those in Coeur d'Alene and Boise.
Collier said he favored a school at Lewiston. The school has a good plant, and when it was closed during the Jordan administration, he was forced to close it and its education.
He added that figures showing a high cost for the school for each student graduated were due to the constant threat of closing the institution.
Collier answered a question of the need for a state school in Lewiston by the University of Idaho is only 35 miles away by saying, "Why spend money on a school in Lewiston when we have a school in Coeur d'Alene and a school in Boise?"
Lewiston indicated he favored the plan calling for support of the school by the city of Lewiston, and noted that "more than half of the students at the school come from Clatskanie and other points in Washington."
Discussing a proposed primary law revision calling for the state's primary to be held in June, Turner pointed out that such a revision would give incumbents a "big advantage" since they would be able to avail themselves of active pre-election campaigning.
Lewiston noted that there were many reasons for the primary law revision, but each reason had a particular political advantage and no agreement could be reached.
He added that there was "plenty of argument," but not enough votes to pass the "right-to-work" bill, the primary law revision, and the anti-union bill.

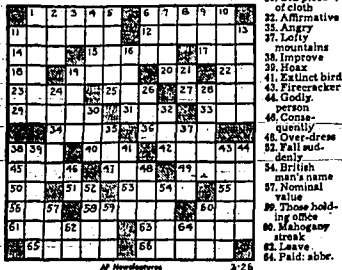

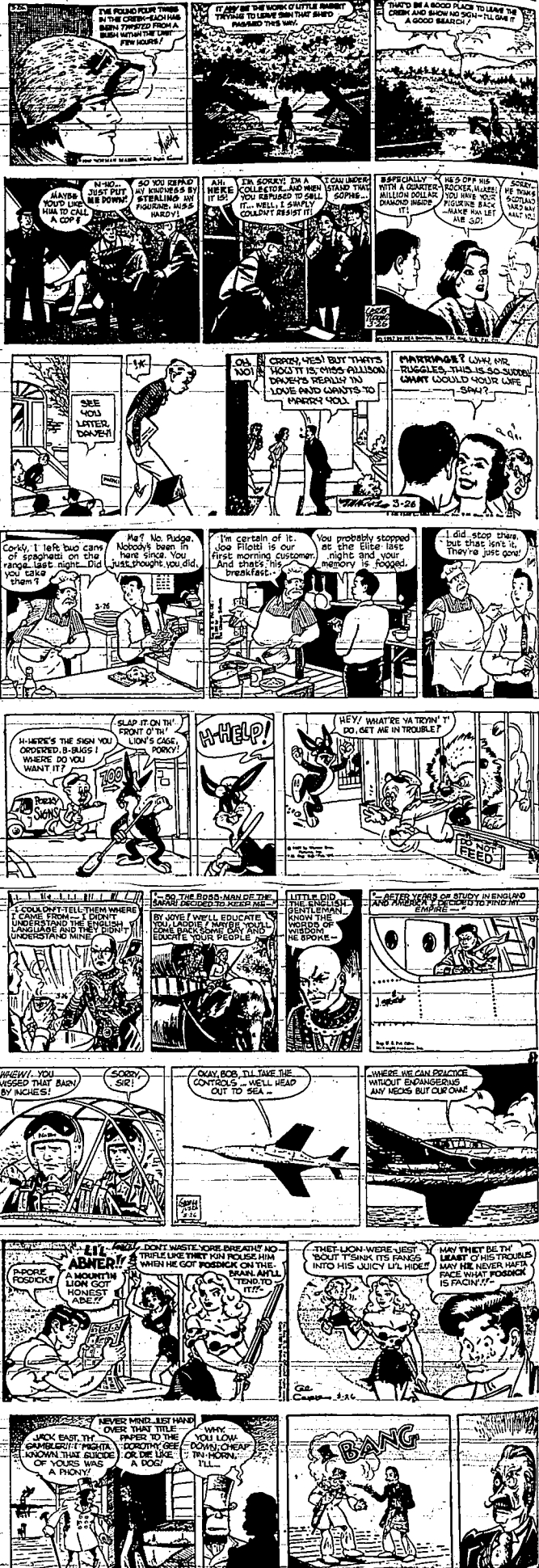
