

Gooding Voters Reject Five-Mill Levy of Schools

GOODING, March 28—With the defeat of the additional five-mill levy for schools in an election here Wednesday, Gooding schools face a possible reduction in the teaching staff, School Supt. LeRoy Ingersoll said Thursday. He said a staff school board meeting will be held next week to determine the district's course of action. The additional levy was defeated by Gooding voters in a vote of 172 to 153. This is one of the largest turnouts ever recorded in a school levy election, election officials reported.

The election followed on the heels of a budget hearing conducted by the school board Tuesday night. The hearing presented a tentative budget of \$248,000 as compared to a budget of \$225,000 for the previous year. The budget was presented to the school board by Ingersoll, who said the board would have to consider a five-mill levy to meet the budget. Ingersoll said the district could operate on the \$225,000 budget but that it would have to be released and classes enlarged. He said no other alternative would be to call another election.

The hearing Tuesday night was attended by approximately 50 persons, many of whom voiced objection to the tentative budget. Ingersoll said the board would have to consider a five-mill levy to meet the budget. Ingersoll said the district could operate on the \$225,000 budget but that it would have to be released and classes enlarged. He said no other alternative would be to call another election.

Storm Damage High Through Hard-Hit Area

DENVER, March 28 (U.P.)—The damage to crops, livestock and soil from the west-end blizzard in eastern Colorado has been estimated by federal officials at three million dollars. They predicted that a survey now under way probably would show the damage estimate to be on the conservative side.

The loss was divided equally with millions of dollars in livestock and crops. The vicious storm wiped out a million "if not more" in livestock, according to Colorado Director Burrell J. Monroe of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

"There won't be a harvest in Adams and Arapahoe," he said. "The crops in those two counties were completely knocked out. The livestock loss estimate was given by officials of the agriculture stabilization and conservation service."

U. S. Airplanes Join In Iran Kidnap Hunt

TEHRAN, Iran, March 28 (U.P.)—Three U.S. military planes joined Iranian troops and police today in a desperate air and ground operation to rescue a pretty American woman kidnapped by bandits who killed her husband and another American man. There were indications she is still alive. Vague and fragmentary reports reaching Tehran, 800 miles northwest of the town of Isfahan where the attack took place, said the kidnapped American woman left a trail of torn bits of paper. American officials said they hoped the bandits would hold her for ransom.

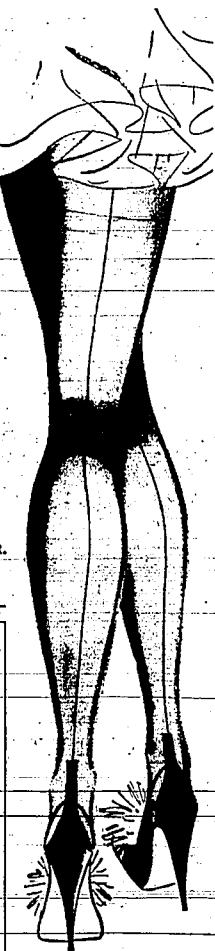

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THE PROFIT ISSUE

Senator Humphrey of Minnesota says the Eisenhower administration wants to blame organized labor, wage demands for higher living standards. He says the nation's business should bear the responsibility because of their "enormous profits."

Actually, most of the public warnings against inflation have urged that business and labor both exercise great restraint, the one in raising prices higher and the other in keeping wages down.

What is more interesting about Humphrey's statement is his plain implication that there is something improper about big profits. This is a notion that is alien to the stockholders as if the profits were the corporation's sole responsibility.

That has in fact been true, but usually with dire results for the business. There is one recent glaring example. The outcome? The profits are out of business and thousands have lost their jobs.

Corporations are not static organizations which can afford to stand still as the economy and the nation change. They must adapt and change. Business managers are constantly getting on how big the market for their line will be next year or five years hence, on what new products will sell and what old ones will drop out.

They have to back their bets with real cash. The bigger the country gets, the bigger the corporations, the bigger their profits, and the bigger the bets they must make on the expanding future.

Senator Humphrey did, that corporation is making enormous profits to its state, not only the obvious but the necessary. If they did not, they could not find the means to keep pace with a changing America.

Many business managers grow weary and impatient. They have little evidence that "profits" gains. What strains them is the endless worry involved in spending huge sums wisely and responsibly, in other words, in keeping the business future.

Profits are the economy's insurance policy against maladjustment and failure. They are a life insurance policy, a vital reservoir to be tapped with great care, for the sake of both business enterprise and the country it helps to sustain.

Ike Reported Ready to Ask Okay in Plan

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—The administration is expected to announce soon for a constitutional amendment permitting a president to hand over his powers temporarily to the vice-president upon being disabled.

Attorney General Herbert Brownell is expected to outline the amendment to the House of Representatives when he goes before the House Judiciary committee Monday.

The Justice department has been studying the problem of succession in case of presidential disability for more than a year. Brownell is reported to have recommended a constitutional amendment which would:

1. Permit the President to declare his own disability.
 2. Permit the vice president to temporarily take over the duties and powers of the presidency while the chief executive is disabled.
 3. Constitutional amendments must be passed by a two-thirds majority in both houses of Congress and ratification by three-fourths of the state legislatures to become effective.
- At his news conference last night, Attorney General Brownell said he hopes to confer shortly with Democratic and Republican congressmen on the amendment to clear up the present confusion over who should run the government when a president cannot carry on.

Defeated "Oscar" Actor Gets Prize

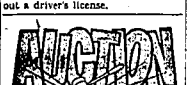

Surrealist Artist Notes Ape's Paintings Could Be Improved

NEW YORK, March 28 (AP)—Artist Salvador Dali said yesterday a chimpanzee would be able to paint better than "Botticelli" or "Bey" does, but that the fault may not be Dali's.

"I would expect much better from a chimpanzee," the famed surrealist said. After viewing photographs of the "chimpanzee" paintings done by the chimpanzee in a Baltimore zoo and sold for up to \$50 each.

"I would expect something more fluid," he added. "The method is no good."

Bey's method is to dabble with her fingers, toes and elbows in paint already smeared on a canvas by a keeper.

This, said Dali, is all wrong, and perhaps Bey should be allowed the same freedom permitted human abstract painters—to throw paint at a wall with a sponge or drop it in blobs on a piece of canvas.

"It is necessary to let the chimpanzee select the colors and quantity," he explained. "There should be a more scientific method. The chimpanzee should be allowed to express the maximum of movement and action."

But setting a chimpanzee painter to buy or selling his paintings, is not a bad thing at all, said Dali.

"Anything that costs alive or mineral—can be art," he said. "No one line is uninteresting. There is nothing wrong with accidents there."

Dr. Kenneth Campbell, local pastor, presided over the annual meeting of the Twin Falls Presbyterian church, which closed its sessions yesterday afternoon.

He also announced the beginning of a five-year Presbyterian expansion plan in both the U.S. and other parts of the world, which will include the merger of the Presbyterian church of the U.S.A. with the United Presbyterian church of North America.

Dr. Roth told members of the Presbyterian church that the increased support of the synod of Idaho to the U.S.A., the building of 100 new churches each year and the enlargement of the facilities of mission hospitals and schools are involved in the expansion program.

He announced a leadership training school will be held at College of Idaho, Caldwell, June 24 to 27, and that the school will be in conjunction with the annual session of the synod of Idaho.

Dr. Roth said Dr. Edward M. Clark, missionary to Japan; Prof. Christine Patterson, of Lewis and Clark college, Portland, Ore.; Dr. Carl F. Ziegler, department of adult work of the Presbyterian board of Christian education; and Dr. Louis Evans, former pastor of Hollywood Presbyterian church, and currently serving as minister at large for the Presbyterian church, whose 8,000-member congregation is the largest in the U.S. will be among the speakers at the June meeting.

Dr. Roth said that the members of the synod of Idaho had pledged more than \$65,000 to the synod's annual fund for a new chapel on the college campus.

Printing jobs there paid only about \$10 a week and "we could not live on it," Christopher said. Christopher said, "we were going to pass about \$100,000 worth, then pay off our debts after working hours at Salt Lake City and live on it last night, though."

Secret Service Agent F. E. Strout said the two men passed 12 of the bills in South Minneapolis drug stores.

Doctor Avers Tests by Labs Often Wrong

ST. LOUIS, March 28 (AP)—A high percentage of certain laboratory tests made to your health are wrong or false, says a doctor today.

The doctor, Dr. Lewis Smith, said that the tests often influence the treatment your doctor gives you.

The main reason for poor tests is that the tests are given by medical technicians who are not properly trained, he said.

Dr. Smith said that a national survey of 14 per cent of medical technicians made less than \$4 a week, 33 per cent get \$4 to \$7; 23 per cent get \$7 to \$10, and only 8.5 per cent get more than \$10.

He said that many are paid less than secretaries or typists. The result is too few good technicians and insufficient training.

Dr. Smith said a three-state survey some years ago showed 42 per cent of the tests for specific blood measurements were "not satisfactory" outside the bounds of acceptable accuracy.

The included tests for anemia, for blood sugar, blood salts, for nitrogen in uremia or blood poisoning, and for blood plasma proteins.

Dr. Smith said that the tests partly determine whether a doctor decides to give a blood transfusion—which can be costly and not without hazards—or start other treatments.

Dr. Smith declared erroneous or misleading laboratory reports "can be responsible for a major number of prolongations of illness and some deaths."

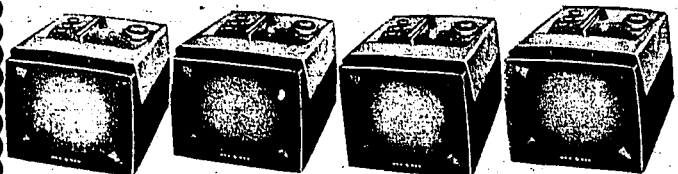

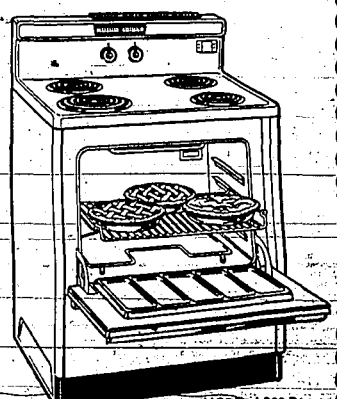

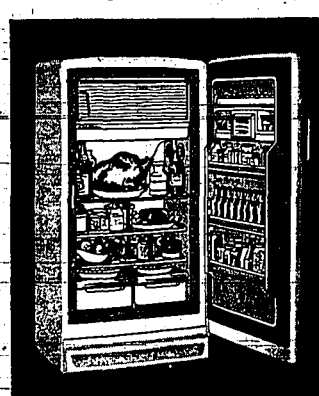

Church Plans To Help Two Yank 'Rebels'

HAVANA, Cuba, March 28 (AP).—The Catholic church has stepped in to negotiate the safe return of three American teen-agers who fell away from their homeland in the Cuban revolution, it was reported today.

Informed sources told United Press the archbishop of Santiago, Diego Flores Hernandez, is personally directing efforts to contact the rebels led by Fidel Castro in the Sierra Maestra mountains.

It was Hernandez who negotiated Castro's surrender to authorities in July 1953, after the revolutionary leader directed an unsuccessful attack against the Cuban army's Moca station in Santiago.

The youths, Charles E. Ryan, Jr., 18, Michael J. Garry, 18, and Victor J. Bushman, 17, disappeared from their homes on the giant U. S. naval base at Guantanamo Feb. 1, leaving notes telling their parents not to worry about them.

It has been established the youths "enlisted" in the rebel forces March 4 but their actual whereabouts is as much a mystery to authorities as when they first disappeared.

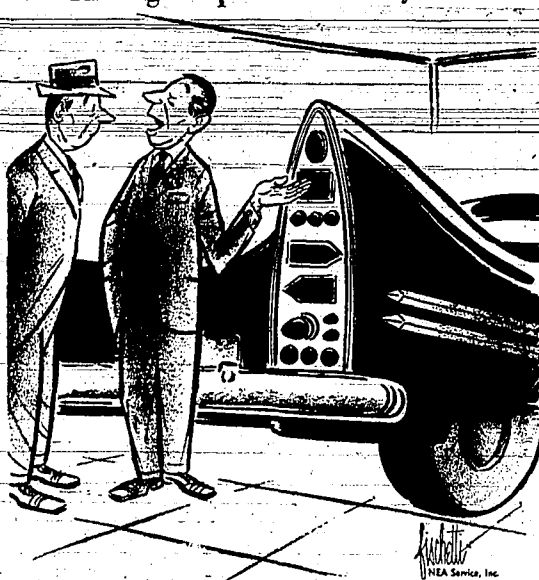
The status of the boys if they fall into the hands of government troops while with the rebels is not too clearly defined.

A U. S. embassy spokesman said the Cuban government of President Fulgencio Batista is "promising every consideration possible" but also called attention to the fact that the boys are probably armed.

The embassy spokesman said the U. S. government so far regards the three as "young adventurers—reckless kids in search of adventure."

Polio Vaccine's Founder Continuing Laboratory's 'War' Against Ailment

NEW YORK, March 28 (AP)—The show now being first in clinical rounds around the country are the last in the war on polio.

Jonas Salk, the modest Pittsburgh doctor whose vaccine provided hope for eventual victory over one of nature's most cruel and crippling diseases, does not himself consider it to be the "final word."

Today, at the Pittsburgh university laboratory in the city's municipal hospital, Salk works on outside the spotlight which fell on him two years ago. "The old 14-hour days under strain are gone, but you still find him there on Saturday."

1. Looking for better and stronger strains of polio virus to put in the vaccine.

2. Trying to eliminate the expensive "use of monkeys" for growing virus.

3. Establishing the length of immunity provided by Salk's vaccine. He says that all available evidence shows that the vaccine acts like a permanent natural immunization.

In other words, that three shots, in the proper dosage, would seem to protect a person for life.

But these 14 studies have been underway only five years. It is impossible to say, and doctors at the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis cautiously say, "the vaccine appears to be 90 per cent effective after three shots and provides immunity for two or three years."

In other laboratories, other doctors are working to keep up with Salk. Dr. Albert Sabin, Cincinnati, still is working a live-virus vaccine which he believes "would prove more effective than Salk's killed-virus type."

The public health service, the polio foundation—and Americans who have marked almost 5 billion dollars into polio wardens since 1938—still seek the "final" answer.

The polio rate fell dramatically in 1956 from a peak of 57,879 cases in 1955 and 58,935 in 1956 to "only" 10,128 cases last year. In the first weeks of 1957 the rate dropped to one-half of 1956 and one-third of the average of the previous five years.

But polio-fighting officials, while saying that the vaccine "undoubtedly" contributed to the decline, warn that it is not the whole story. Polio tends to wax and wane unexpectedly.

Dr. David D. Rutledge, head of the preventive medicine department of Harvard university, said in a recent article in Harper's Magazine: "The evidence that the 'presently available' polio vaccine does not decrease the number of carriers and the clear-cut vaccine failures, make it apparent that polio will not be eradicated by this means."

But polio officials say it would be "very foolish" for anyone to wait for an improved vaccine, which, at best, "is still some time away."

The places where are not waiting are the state of Idaho and the city of Chicago.

Idaho was hardest-hit in the "bad vaccine" scare in the spring of 1955—106 cases and seven deaths presumably induced by poorly-made vaccine. The state naturally took it slowly in "re-running" vaccinations. But since last summer, 25,000 shots have been given and there is "no public health" among the 400,000 residents. The legislature just approved \$100,000 to keep up the drive.

Chicago had a frightening near-epidemic of 1,111 cases last year. "Only 28 had received Salk vaccine," said Dr. Herman M. Bunde, president of the board of health. "But of these 280 had taken but one shot, and 28 had received two doses. Not a single case was reported where the victim had received the full three-dose inoculation."

With that in mind, said Bunde, "the response this year to the program is terrific."

Reports Claim Yugoslavs Out Of Reds' Fold

MOBOW, March 28 (AP)—Yugoslavia has been practically thrown out of the communist fold, informed sources said today.

This became evident by a series of statements made by the Yugoslav government which stated that this nation has given help to Hungarian rebels and by frequent new denunciations of national communism.

"No one calling himself a communist could have taken such a position," present Hungarian Premier Janos Kadar declared of Yugoslavia yesterday.

Approving words from Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev followed Kadar's speech, indicating Yugoslavia now is considered outside the communist camp.

"What can one say of those communists whose assessment of Hungarian events does not differ from that of the imperialists?" Khrushchev said.

Observers here drew these conclusions from the statements by Kadar and Bulgarian:

1. The Kadar regime—whose work the Kremlin has found highly satisfactory—is here to stay and further efforts to "break" the Yugoslav government will not be made.

2. Imre Nagy, Kadar's predecessor who was branded by Bulgarian yesterday as a "traitor" and "black traitor" and willful preparation of counter-revolution, may have to pay for his crimes.

Earlier Soviet statements on Nagy have pictured him as a weak but well-intentioned man who gave in to the demands of his anti-communist advisers. Foreign observers said Kadar now might bring the deported former premier to trial for treason.

Levy on Payrolls Is Eyed in Boise

BOISE, March 28 (AP)—Boise Mayor R. E. Edlerson said today the city council was looking into the possibility of imposing a payroll tax on residents and non-residents who work in Boise.

He said such a tax would be designed to get revenue from those persons who "broke" the city's limits, but who work inside the city and use Boise's facilities. He estimated that Boise had as many non-resident wage earners as residents.

The mayor said enactment of such a payroll tax would be accomplished by reductions in mill levies on property within the city limits.

Edlerson said the proposal as far was just in the "talking stage."

Cautious

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., March 28 (AP)—Inmates of the Bexar county jail know a good thing when they have it.

Before starting an hour-long riot last night, during which they smashed windows and broke water pipes, they carefully covered up their television set with blankets.

Ideal Irrigation Season Foreseen For Boise Valley

BOISE, March 28 (AP)—Boise project officials today turned water into the New York canal and predicted an "ideal" irrigation season for the Boise valley this year.

Project Supervisor Forrest Sower said the Arrowrock, Anderson ranch and Lucky Peak reservoirs and Lake Lowell should be filled to capacity by the spring runoff. He said water had been released steadily through water at the dams to keep storage available for the later runoff.

Sower said storage space still available in the reservoirs totaled 70,000 acre feet in Lucky Peak, 19,000 acre feet in Arrowrock and 21,000 acre feet in Anderson ranch reservoir.

He said Lake Lowell was about 25,000 acre feet from being full, and should be full within about 10 days.

Timber Delegates Seek Wood Usage

SPOKANE, March 28 (AP)—Increased use of wood in school building and more federal timber access roads were urged by a thousand delegates yesterday as they closed their 12th annual logging conference.

The resolution asking for use of more wood in schools said that such construction offered a saving of 20 per cent. Another said that certain main access roads should be built with public funds, although roads in the actual logging area of federal forests should be built by the loggers.

Another resolution stated that the proposed boundaries for a Glacier peak wilderness area near the head of Lake Chelan in Washington were "not properly conceived" and "not based on sound technical and economic information."

"It might," Beck said, smiling slightly. "Off the record, senator, you are assured it is not for myself, those diapers."

Some might question that last statement, committee chairman John L. McClellan drawled.

A member of the American Council and the International Council of Christian churches, Standridge has traveled abroad extensively. A question and answer period will follow his afternoon address.

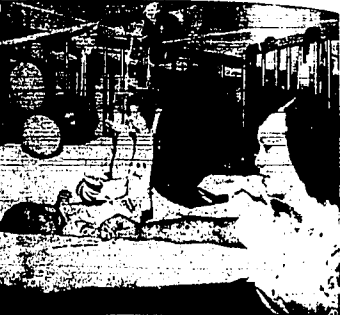

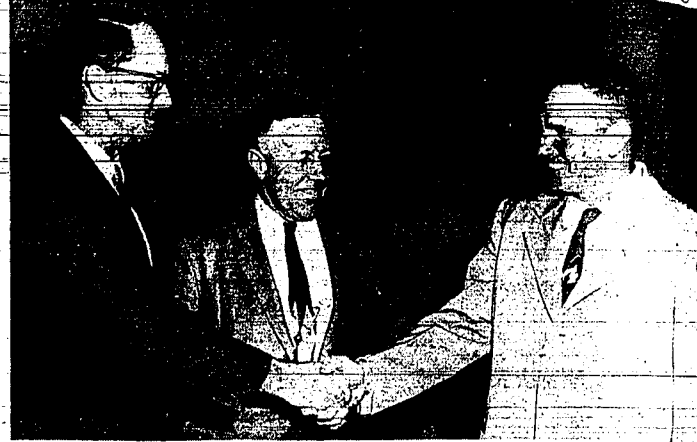

New York's Executive School Draws 400 "Bosses" for Retraining Classes

NEW YORK, March 28 (AP)—The boss is going back to school. One of his campuses—a place where an average of 400 bosses a week for 10 months of the year go in for intensive retraining in executive problems and methods—is a smallish overhanging Times Square. However, the American Management Association (AMA), which runs the business-executive schooling operation at the top of the Shulton-Astor hotel, reports that the old boys buckle right down to work.

The AMA now occupies a third of the hotel. Six months ago, it started using the famous old Astor hotel, recovered, of course—at its Times Square campus. On the site of the bandstand, where Rudy Vallee used to croon and Harry James heaved some sort of training. About 150,000 of these will go to internal company training for the general management. Another 100,000 will attend activities by outside institutions, such as those offered by the AMA.

Placed with growing complexity in their jobs, the executive swap managerial know-how and study basic techniques and approaches. The AMA uses 3,000 executives a year as "faculty"—a policy of management teaching in a management. Through 800 conferences, courses, this year, it expects to school 45,000 executives. If you want to count in the annual packing exposition, a sort of trade fair, the AMA total would reach 75,000.

Writer Reports 'New America' After 11-Year Asian Sojourn

(Editor's note: The writer, for the past five years United Press chief correspondent in Japan and Korea, has returned to the United States after 11 years in Asia. In recent weeks he has traveled in 20 states, seeing the changes of the past decade with a fresh viewpoint.)

By RUTHERFORD FOATS

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—A couple of once-famous figures are vanishing from the American scene—the rich and the poor.

I've been hardly a dozen of either variety of Americans while traveling recently in 20 states. Their virtual disappearance is strikingly evident to an American returning from a long stay abroad.

The great American middle class has replaced the New York skyline and the Golden Gate as this fabulous nation's most notable marvel.

The bloodless revolution has made suburbanites of average city workers. It has just put about everyone in steady, expensive automobiles with horsepower—and gas—to burn. It has made it almost impossible to tell at a glance a farmer from a merchant, an executive from a seaman.

From coal to coal, forests of \$10,000 homes with \$30,000 price tags have sprung up on tiny plots of land, subdivided into miles beyond the old city boundaries. There the middle-class shares the once exclusive addresses of the vanishing wealth.

And there they struggle, with the country faster, changing jobs

paint-rollers, power-lawn-mowers, wheeled seed spreaders and other gadgets to be distinctive on a street of identical houses.

The trend to uniformity in living standards and in thought may be faster than realized by most Americans who have lived in the midst of the past decade's changes here.

Far more completely than anywhere else in the world, television here is constantly exposing practically every home to the same ideas and the same vicious experiences. The commercial produce mass temptations to acquire the same new material things.

Americans also seem to be thinking more alike politically than they were five or 10 years ago. Regional disagreements, even on such issues as racial integration, are no longer as sharp as foreigners have been led to believe.

The population is moving around the country faster, changing jobs

and home towns, exchanging customs and rubbing the edges off prejudices.

There is an atmosphere here, unknown anywhere in Asia, that everybody is in about the same boat.

Suburban shopping centers are the biggest new landmarks. The parking lots of several of them combined could accommodate all the privately owned automobiles in Japan.

America's preoccupation with material things seems almost as intense as its foreigner's dislike of store, supermarkets and discount houses. Americans appear to be heading at a pace that once would have been considered "hell bent for the poor house."

But if the big crash comes, that poorhouse will be the best equipped in the world. And all your neighbors will be there.

Fowl Gaining Over Beef on Shopper Lists

By The Associated Press
Shoppers who have given ac-
count to some beef featured at
the favorite supermarkets or neighborhood stores will find a change in the meat supply situation this week. The week supply situation this week shows chickens taking over the most prominent position.

Beef and roasters, anywhere from 2 to 6 cents a pound cheaper than a week ago, will be the special meat of the week.

Lamb, anywhere from 2 to 12 cents higher in many areas, is featured in only scattered localities. Beef, too, is not nearly as popular as usual for the special feature meat. This probably accounts for more numerous mentions of veal.

Porter's prices are expected to be higher this spring since hog slaughter is running 15 per cent behind last year.

Turkeys, on the other hand, are expected to maintain their recent low level, and may well go even lower in price.

Recent weeks last year also showed low prices for certain types of meat such as sweet corn, canned food such as sweet corn, tomatoes, peaches and fruit.

Fresh vegetables, on the other hand, are in the out-
standing list in most areas this week. Includes storage potatoes, root crops like beets and rutabagas. Ice-cream is also in a list of a bar-
ren lot this week.

Peaches, apples, oranges and such great as kale, spinach and cauliflower are also good buys. Cauliflower is a bit lower, but still only moderate in price. The gradual decline of asparagus prices as the crop comes to market continued, but the price are not yet rated as good buys in most places.

Florida sweet corn also is more selectively priced this week and for sale. Lowers, radishes and shallots are in the bargain class.

Lemons and naval oranges from California, hollow rhubarb from Michigan and apples kept in controlled atmosphere storage to produce the first light shipments of California peaches also were reported in some places. Producers call this a sure sign of spring, heralding the arrival of good supplies of plums, peaches and other fruits in the next few months.

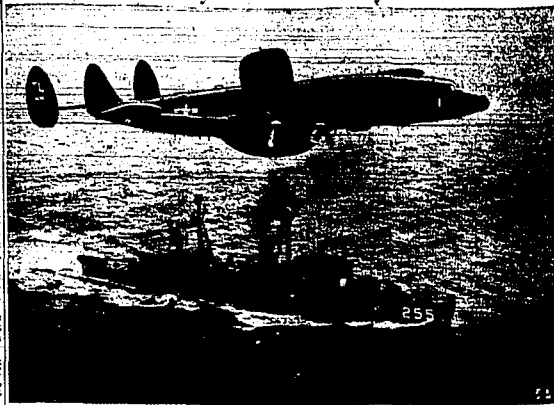

Railways Ask Okay to Boost Freight Rates

Solons Group Raps Foreign Airline Route

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—Senate commerce committee members said today giving the foreign airlines new routes into the United States could eventually destroy U. S. airlines or necessitate their return to full government subsidy.

Sen. George Smathers, D. Fla., called the state department's current negotiations to give the Dutch-KLM line three new routes into the United States "another give-away" problem. He echoed the feelings of several other committee members.

The committee yesterday heard testimony from state department, civil aeronautics boards and air transport association officials on the Dutch request. The lines would enter the United States at Houston, Los Angeles and New York.

Chairman Warren G. Magnuson, D. Wash., said his committee "does not agree with the state department's position in this matter." He fears domestic lines will come out "on the short end" of the negotiations.

Reds Showing Concern Over Recent Events

Soviet Russia is showing acute displeasure over developments in the international situation.

In recent days, the Moscow radio and Moscow newspapers have denounced President Eisenhower's decision to join the military committee of the Baghdad pact against communist aggression in the Middle East.

They have denounced the signing in Rome of a new treaty under which six European countries agree to form a common market, free of tariff barriers, and to pool their resources for the development of atomic power for peaceful purposes.

The decision of the United States to supply Great Britain with long-range atomic missiles has been condemned.

Soviet Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin, in a letter to West German

Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, has repeated Russia's refusal to discuss the reunification of Germany on any terms which might even possibly be acceptable.

It also has been disclosed that Bulganin, in a letter to Norwegian Premier Einar Gerhardsen, warned that Norway faces a catastrophe if it permits the establishment of guided missile and rockets bases on its territory under the North Atlantic treaty.

The tone of Bulganin's letter was openly bullying and threatening.

U.S. Ponders Trade Boosts In Red China

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—The United States has informed the Chinese government that it is "actively considering" whether it would increase trade with red China.

The United States is not willing to change its own policy of non-trade with communist China. The state department agreed to some increased trade with Britain, Japan and other countries if the ban against strategic trading is preserved.

Any American-approved increase in trade with the red Chinese would apply only to "essential goods" and not to potential war use. The state department said that at Bermuda last week, the U.S. and British officials made a "strong statement" to the effect that the U.S. would not lift the ban on strategic trade with the red Chinese.

Solons Deny Plan on Cuts For Business

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—The Senate yesterday turned down a proposal by Senator Fulbright, D. Ark., to cut taxes on small corporations 600 million dollars a year and get the money back out of an increase on large companies.
