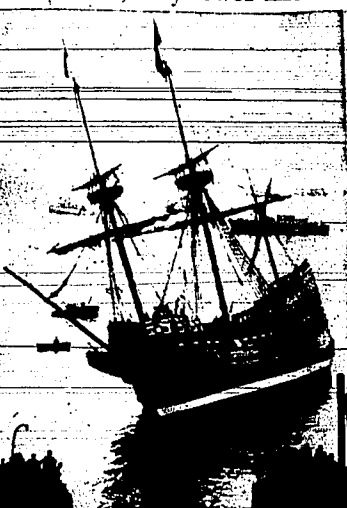

CRACK IN CONSTITUTION

Most of our state and governmental authorities agree that the U. S. constitution falls far short of adequately a situation wherein a president of the United States suffers illness which puts in question his ability to perform his duties.

The feeling is growing that this gap must be closed if orderly, effective government is to be assured in this country at all times. This is the view of the majority of the nation's health fast-flying age. In a time of emergency, the health of the president is a matter of life and death. We must be fully prepared for any stroke of misfortune.

President Eisenhower, who gave the matter much thought while recovering from his 1955 heart attack, believes action is vital. Attorney General Brownell suggests amending the constitution at an early moment. Many lawmakers have tossed plans into the hopper, and constitutional specialists offer a variety of proposals.

The constitution, quite plainly states, that in the event a president is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office they shall fall to the vice president.

But two big dilemmas have long persisted. One is whether the vice president, upon taking over his superior, actually gains the office itself or simply a temporary assignment of its powers and duties.

The overwhelming consensus among those who attend to the problem is that the vice president should acquire the president's status as under secretary when the president is fit to serve again. This is Brownell's proposal, presumably with Mr. Eisenhower's approval. Much more perplexing is the second puzzle: "Who shall decide when the president is unable to perform his duties?"

Among those proposed as qualified to make this vital decision are the president-elect, the supreme court, the chief justice, with the aid of a medical panel, and various types of "inability" commissions.

Cattle Loss Set At 56,000 Head

KANSAS CITY, April 4 (AP)—Federal officials today set a preliminary estimate of 56,000 head of cattle in the disastrous drought of March 23. And two other states haven't estimated their losses by number.

The breakdown by official and unofficial sources showed:

Kansas, 25,000 dead cattle; New Mexico, 12,000; Texas, at least 10,000; and Oklahoma, at least 10,000.

In all, many thousands more in the tri-state district of Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma, and Colorado, 11,000 cattle between 4,000 and 5,000 sheep.

Oklahoma officials still are surveying that state's losses. In Nebraska, livestock losses were said to be "negligible."

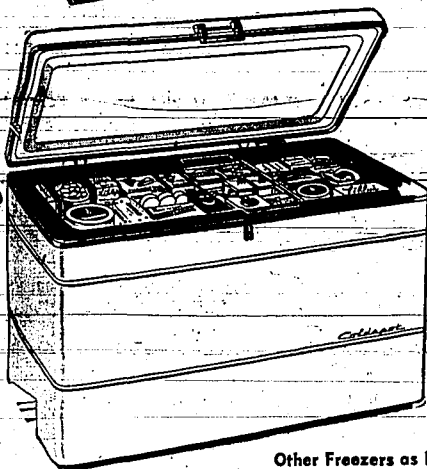

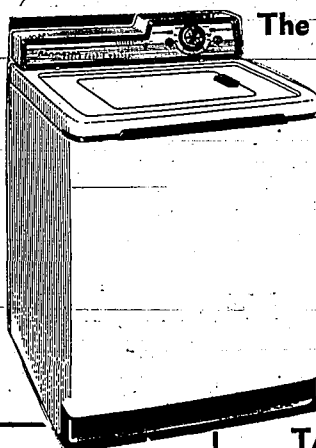

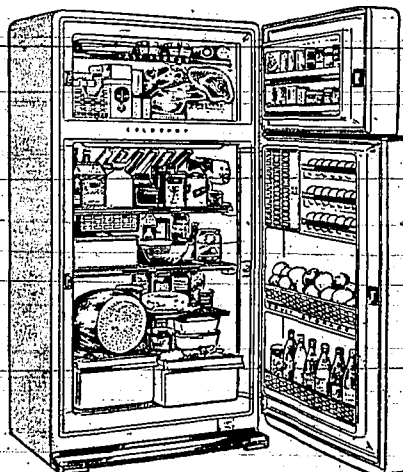

Sailor Jumps Vessel at Sea For Teasing

CAPTAIN South Africa, April 4.—A British seaman, who says he jumped off his ship at sea because his shipmates teased him, was picked up 30 hours later in a million-to-one chance Atlantic rescue 100 miles west of Cape Town.

Captain Sigma, 35, told his story yesterday from a Capetown hospital bed where he is recovering from his ordeal.

Divorce Suits Are Begun in District Court

Excess Aspirin Is Harmful To Tots, Pediatrician Warns

WASHINGTON, April 4.—More parents who "foolishly" tell a child that the aspirin the doctor has prescribed for him is "candy," "Never tell a child that any medicine is candy," said a pediatrician under a reporter's nose. "Tell him it's medicine and the doctor said they should take just this much, no more."

Aspirin in large enough quantities is toxic even to adults. But it takes very much less to poison a child than to poison a grown-up.

"Toxic children, especially when they are ill, do not tolerate aspirin well," Jacobson explained. "Even a relatively small amount can be hazardous to a very young child. No parent should undertake to give a child aspirin without consulting the doctor."

Once a child has gulped a fistful of aspirin, Jacobson said, there are only two things a parent can do:

1. Make him vomit immediately.
2. Get him to a hospital as quickly as possible.

Hospitals, by applying emergency resuscitative measures, usually can save the life of an aspirin-poisoned child if he gets there in time.

"The death rate so far has been mercifully low, less than one per cent," said Jacobson. "But it is tragically unnecessary for any child to die, or to have a close brush with death, from this cause."

"All we need is to use a little common sense and lock up that aspirin bottle."

These facts are well-known to doctors. They apparently are not so well known to parents, who persist in leaving bottles of aspirin on the shelf next to the tooth paste, while easy reach of small fry.

Doctors who attended the spring meeting of the American Academy of Pediatrics here this week listed aspirin poisoning as one of the major remaining menaces to childhood health. Academy leaders urged all pediatricians and the press to join in a campaign to warn parents of the danger.

"If you have a child under four in your home," said Dr. Harold Jacobson, assistant health commissioner of New York City, "you should treat aspirin like a deadly poison."

"Don't put it on the top shelf of the medicine closet. Lock it up," Jacobson said. Small children seem to have a nature penchant for eating aspirin by the handful.

They apparently like the taste of ordinary aspirin tablets, which most adults find bitter, as well as the flavored aspirin which are put up especially for children," he said.

2 Hungarians Receive Polk News Awards

NEW YORK, April 4 (U. P.)—Endre Marton, Associated Press correspondent who covered the Hungarian revolt, last October, arrived in this country yesterday with his wife and two daughters. He said he would stay in the United States.

Within three hours after his arrival by plane from Vienna, he attended a luncheon where he was presented with a special George Polk memorial award for his heroic work in covering the news from Hungary.

The George Polk Journalism awards are given by Long Island University. They are named for the Columbia Broadcasting System correspondent who was murdered while on an assignment in Greece in 1944.

Marton shared the award with his wife, Ilona Nyilas, who worked for the United Press, and who like him spent many months in Hungarian communist prisons on charges of espionage.

Marton sent the first eyewitness account from Budapest of the Hungarian revolt of last October and then remained there for three months dodging bullets, the only non-communist reporter to cover the revolt throughout its course.

Jinx Raft Forced To Take Shelter In Ocean Voyage

SAN SIMONE, Calif., April 4.—A rough seas and a damaged rudder on the raft Lulu III forced skipper DeVere Baker to put into San Simone harbor in northern San Luis Obispo county late yesterday.

Hard luck continued to dog the craft in its attempt to drift to Los Angeles.

San Simone boasts no pier, so Baker moored 300 yards offshore and with his one-man crew, Crawford Hartley, made for land in a rubber life raft.

Crawford fell overboard and was rescued by Baker, then just before reaching shore the rubber raft doubled up, throwing both men back into the brine. They got ashore, safe but wet.

Baker plans after reaching Los Angeles to add fore and aft sections to the raft and drift to Hawaii. That would be followed by an attempt to drift from the Gulf of Iran to the coast of Latin America, which Baker theorizes is what happened to the lost tribes of Israel.

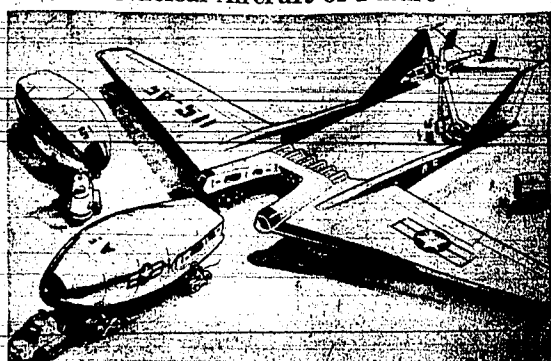
