Senate Probe Of Diplomats Still Planned

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—The senate internal security subcommittee today subpoenaed 11 members of the House of Representatives with a general invitation to U.S. diplomats in the Mid-East despite Canada's bitter protest over the subpoena.

The subpoena, named in the senate's internal security inquiry, targeted:

- Six of the House subcommittee members signed a statement saying they would continue in its "duty to disclose" evidence, "at certain times," of communist activity in the United States.

Britain Schedules Drastic Arms Cut As Economy Move

WASHINGTON, Apr. 5 (AP)—Diplomatic and military officials reported today that the United States has no plans to fill any "vacuums" which may be created by Britain's announced intention to cut back its military forces. The reduction program, announced in London yesterday, is regarded in official quarters here as an unhappy but unavoidable result of Britain's need to cut costs. The net result, it was generally agreed, will be a weak

Commerce Fund Cut After Week's "Dare"

The United States has already announced that it will supply Britain with 1,500-mill-range guided missiles as soon as they become available.

The eventual establishment of a missile base in Britain—with atomic warheads—will give the United States a permanent base in Europe. American control will give the British a striking power against Russia which they have not heretofore had.

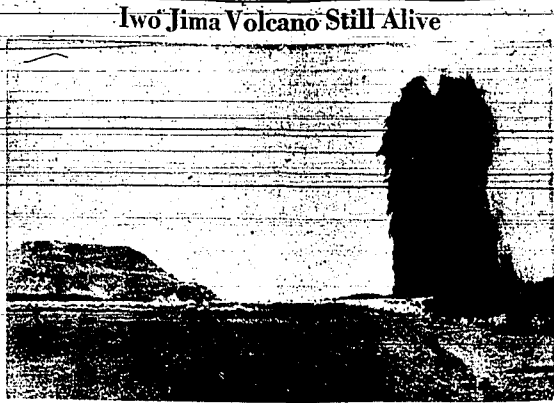

'Park Avenue Folks' Slowest To Pay Bills, Collector Notes

NEW YORK, April 5 (AP)—The most unpaid bills in New York are those owed the grocer, the butcher, the laundryman. The highest, to collect are those owed the dentist. The "Park Avenue crowd" of alleged elite are "getting to be pretty terrible on payment of bills." These are the opinions of Abraham Miller, a bill collector, processor, server, and treasurer of skipped personal bills. In the last 20 years he has collected more than \$5,000 bills and served around 800 legal bills everywhere from city hall to gangsters' back rooms. "Dentists, he says, cut across all other bills. You just can't pick out one type of person and say his type leaves more bills unpaid than any other. "Take actors," said Abe, "I get quite a few unpaid actors' bills. They are the thing to you got to time them when they get money. If they have it, you'll get it. "Take Park Avenue—I'd say 25 per cent of the people I deal with there are living beyond their means. The wife has charge accounts in most of the department stores. I been working Park Avenue for over 25 years and I got a Park Avenue case I'd simply make a call and it'd be paid. "Now there's a few seven or eight months a year, and you can't get hold of them. Four or five months in Florida, then back in town a month or so, then away someplace else. "Also on Park Avenue we have this thing which is what we call kept women. A fellow gets an apartment, and he's living with a lady friend a

>Drop Charges

WARSAW, April 5 (AP)—Roman Catholic church sources say Bishop Czeslaw Kaczmarek of Kielce will return to his post tomorrow after the dropping of all charges against him by the Polish government. The bishop was sentenced in 1951 to 12 years in jail on charges that he was a fascist and a spy for the West. In December the supreme court said his sentence had been annulled and a new trial would be held. A government announcement Wednesday said proceedings had been dropped for "want of proof of guilt."

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—The attorney for Teamster Secretary-Treasurer John English today vigorously denied published reports that English had given "tips or encouragement" to the senate racketeering committee. The attorney, Herbert Thatcher, indicated that English had been accused by the committee's executive board of being a "stool pigeon" as a result of the reports published Wednesday. Thatcher emphasized that English had volunteered no information to the committee, which has been investigating the finances of Teamster President Dave Beck and alleged links between his union and the underworld. The committee charges Beck took \$32,000 of Teamster cash for his own use.

LONDON, April 5 (AP)—Four of the winners of the Queen Elizabeth II beauty contest were exempted from military service. They were Misses Margaret, Elizabeth, and their kimono made of different materials. "They bowed low as they would to the emperor of Japan," said Miss Pui Nui, wife of the Japanese ambassador. The four were the first Japanese women to be crowned since World War II. In all 100 debutantes, including Miss America, were presented.

End of Costly Rail Problem Nearing End

SAN FRANCISCO, April 5 (UP)—Southern Pacific and Standard Pacific railroads applied their best efforts to three years in the hope of solving a costly, highly-expensive rail problem. Now they think they have it licked.

Starting July 1, Southern Pacific expects to put in full operation an up-to-the-minute check on empty boxcars and where they are needed, said James W. Corbett, SP operating vice president.

The surprising thing is that we don't have this kind of information, said L. E. Boyd, assistant to the SP general manager.

"It does any railroad in the country as far as we can develop," Boyd estimated SP's ownership of empty boxcars at 35,000 in 1955 at \$12.75 a day. He said SP's out-of-pocket costs for empty boxcars in 1955 amounted to 15 million, conservatively computed at 6 cents a mile.

Cutting down the time boxcars are empty and idle, Boyd said, will mean staggering inventory charges and "premium storage on extremely expensive track."

Not joined L. J. Lyons, SP's vice president of freight car service, and C. J. Freney, industrial operations research manager at Standard Pacific, in reporting on SP's new car control plan before the Railway Systems and Procedures Association in Chicago.

About 200,000 punched cards will be fed each week into an IBM data processing machine in San Francisco. At the end of each week there will be a forecast of future car movement based on empty cars on hand in each of SP's 11 divisions along 8,000 miles of track between Portland, Ore., Los Angeles, and San Francisco.

Until now railroads have had to depend on men with the "right feel" as a good car distributor, Lyons said.

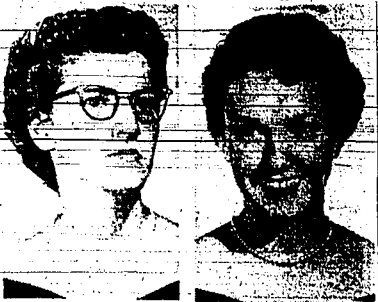

Pope's New Rule in Holy Communion Shows Result in Attendance Increase

WASHINGTON, April 5 (UP)—A Vatican ruling in beginning to produce significant changes in the worship habits of America's 22 million Roman Catholics.

Pastor-priests have noted a substantial increase in the number of persons receiving holy communion during the two weeks since Pope Pius XII relaxed the church's long-held requirement of "prolonged fasting before communion."

Catholic officials here said this is precisely the result that the holy father hoped to achieve. They expressed confidence that the trend toward frequent communion will continue and become even more pronounced as the new rules are explained to congregations throughout the country.

"The purpose of this change was to make it easier for Catholics to receive grace, or supernatural help, to lead a 'good life,'" said a spokesman for the National Catholic Welfare conference. "The blessed sacrament is a chief source of grace."

Previously, the church considered frequent communion a most effective way of deepening the spiritual life. Previously, under rules which have been in effect since the fifth century, Catholics began fasting at midnight of the day on which communion was to be received. They looked neither food nor drink until noon, and fasted for many hours preceding holy communion.

The first move toward relaxation of the fasting rule came in 1953, when Pope Pius authorized the holding of evening masses on a limited basis. Catholics who attended evening masses were permitted to take communion if they had gone without solid foods for three hours and without liquids for one hour.

Study Shows Throttle, Bottle Are Villains for Holiday Toll

CHICAGO, April 5—Once again the throttle and the bottle have been shown as the arch-villains in the nation's huge holiday traffic toll. The National Safety Council reported today that an analysis of the 433 traffic deaths occurring over the 1956 Labor day week-end shows that speed was a factor in 71 per cent of the fatal accidents, and drinking in 48 per cent.

This is almost twice the year-bound percentages in each category, the council said, and is only slightly lower than the figures for the previous Christmas holiday week-end, when the conviviality of the season could be expected to result in more drinking.

The traffic death total of 433 for the Labor day holiday week-end was about one-fifth greater than the toll for non-holiday week-ends in September, the council said.

Even so, compared with normal week-ends at that time of the year it was one of the safest Labor day week-ends in recent years. In 1955 the Labor day total was more than 600, and in 1954 it was about one-third higher, and in 1949 it was well over one-third higher.

The council pointed out that the 433 traffic deaths total for the Labor day week-end included only "immediate" deaths—those which occurred during the 75-hour period from 6 p.m. Friday, Aug. 31, to midnight Monday, Sept. 3. The council's records indicate that the total number of people who eventually may die from those accidents will reach 500.

The pattern of Labor day acci-

dents, the council found, followed not only the pattern of Christmas accidents as revealed in the previous analysis, but of "normal" year-round accidents. Accident types and people involved were much the same.

As for the Christmas holiday toll, more than half of the fatal accidents and deaths occurred in the first 30 hours of the holiday period.

For pedestrian accidents alone, seven out of 10 occurred in the first 30 hours of the holiday period. More than half of all the pedestrian accidents occurred on Saturday, Sept. 1.

Other facts shown in the council report were:

1. More of the accidents occurred between 6 and 9 p.m. than in any other three-hour period.

2. Non-accident accidents were the most frequent type. This includes running off the road or over-turning.

3. Eighty-two per cent of the fatal accidents occurred in rural areas—10 per cent more than the year-round average.

4. Single driver accidents were most frequent. But two drivers figured in 103 of the fatal accidents.

5. Victims of the holiday accidents were mostly drivers.

6. Approximately four out of seven accidents occurred during darkness.

7. Eighty-five per cent of the fatal accidents over the holiday period claimed a single life. Twelve per cent took two lives. Each of the two most serious accidents, both multi-vehicle collisions, took five lives.

8. Ninety-two per cent of the drivers in the fatal accidents were men. But the council pointed out that while exact mileage of men and women drivers is not known, men undoubtedly drove more than women over the holiday.

The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers has objected to a sub-contract let by Clawson to a non-union firm, The Idaho Electric company, Jerome.

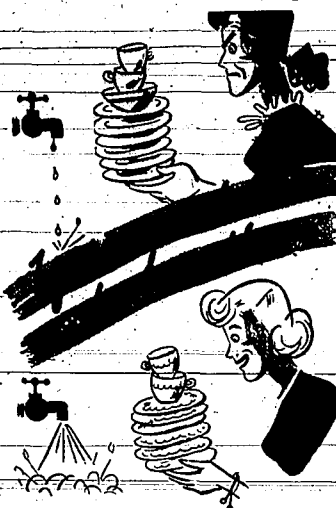
