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## Link Is Found— On Chemistry For Life Cells

LOS ANGELES, April 10.—The discovery of a long-sought link in the chemistry of living cells, which may lead to new fields of attack on cancer, was announced today by Washington scientists.

The discovery, made after years of research, has disclosed an unusual relationship between the free radicals of molecules—the free radicals, which are the building blocks of life processes, they are expected to determine whether a molecule will be a factor in the formation of cancer or the damaging effects of radiation.

The research was directed by Dr. Robert C. Marsh, professor of biology, in collaboration with Dr. Richard E. Smith, associate professor of physics, at the University of California, San Diego.

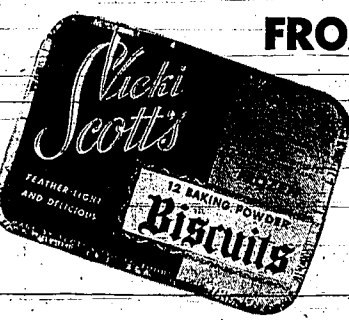

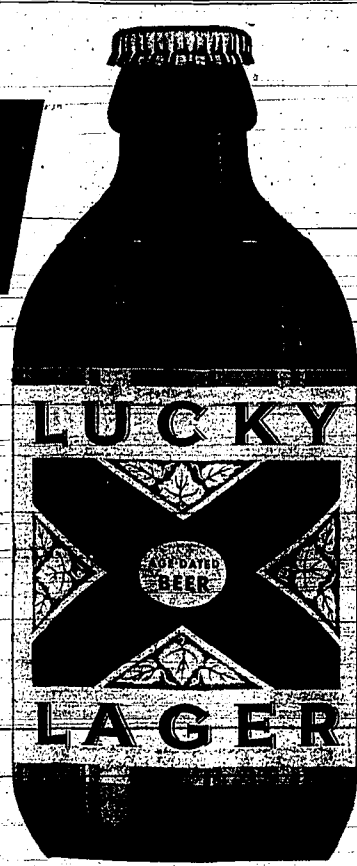

## Court Orders Officer From Marine Corps

FARRIS ISLAND, R. C. D. 10—Marine Lt. William D. Conroy pleaded guilty yesterday to allowing a private to be sentenced to dishonorable discharge from the marine corps.

Conroy pleaded guilty to one of the specifications in a court-martial proceeding, an officer and a gentleman resulting from a March 9 assault on Pvt. David Lee Porter, 19, Hartford, Vt.

The sentence was the equivalent of a dishonorable discharge for an enlisted man. If it is approved by higher authority, Conroy will be banished from the armed forces for life and denied all veterans benefits.

The seven-member general court-martial board deliberated 30 minutes before agreeing on the sentence, one of the toughest under the circumstances.

Due to a mixup, newsmen and spectators were not present in the courtroom when the sentence was read by Lt. Col. Wilton E. Hunt, president of the court, and the sentence was: "To be dishonored, that is it."

The sentence will be reviewed by Brig. Gen. Wallace M. Green, Jr., commanding general of this marine depot, and then the case will be sent to the War Relocation Authority for review in Washington.

The court began deliberating Conroy's case at 10:30 a. m. After the defense presented three of the lieutenant's superior officers as character witnesses.

Maj. Donald E. Holman, the trial prosecutor, contended that Conroy was a mature individual who should have known better than to attack Porter.

Capt. Alfred Route and Capt. J. H. Dunn, Jr., both former company commanders over Conroy, testified that he performed his duties efficiently.

"He was a dyed in the wool marine... his passion for the marine corps was overwhelming," Dunn testified.

## Model Parley Of U. N. Held By University

STANFORD, Calif., April 10 (AP)—Five hundred and fifty college students from seven western states gathered at Stanford University today to carry on in model form a session of the United Nations.

These 500 students, who should have been delegates to the U. N. will deliver the keynote address at a general assembly of the United Nations conference tonight.

Sixty U. N. member countries will be represented by delegates from colleges and universities in Arizona, California, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, and Washington.

The model U. N. is organized into secretariat, general assembly, security council, economic and social council, trusteeship council, economic and financial committee, social and humanitarian committee, and an ad hoc political committee.

The secretary-general is Chester W. Barnard, 21-year-old senior history major from Albany, Ore. All administrative work is done by students from Stanford, which originated the idea in 1950.

The delegates have bonded up on the political and social life of the countries they represent, and will tackle many of the same problems now before the United Nations.

# Ex-Film Producer Asks USIA Action

WASHINGTON, April 10—The former film producer Eugene W. Castle says congress should take the United States Information agency out of the news business and leave the field to the regular private American news agencies.

Castle, founder and former president of the multi-million-dollar Castle Films company, said the country would be better served if the USIA with its multiplicity of promotion projects, were altogether abolished and its necessary functions conducted by the department of state.

Castle testified on March 12 before a house appropriations subcommittee considering President Eisenhower's request for 140 million dollars in new appropriations to run the information agency in the new fiscal year. His testimony was made public today as part of the transcript of the subcommittee's hearings.

# Reds Set Back

TWIN FALLS, April 10—The most powerful communist movement outside the Iron Curtain stood shaken and nearly shattered today in the wake of a crushing labor election defeat in Italy's largest industrial complex.

Final returns in the shop showed election of the Fiat Auto Workers showed the communist-dominated General Confederation of Labor (GIL) won only 21.3 per cent of the vote, compared with 33.8 last year and 61.3 three years ago.
