Iceland Given Red Warning Over Troops

LONDON, April 12 (AP)—Soviet Russia told Iceland today to eject American troops or face a "crushing blow" in any East-West war. It was the latest and potentially most dangerous in a series of blistering threats by the Soviet Union against America's NATO allies.

A year ago local communists in Iceland almost succeeded in forcing withdrawal of the American airman and ground troops who maintain American installations in Iceland. Soviet of NATO's northernmost Atlantic base.

Weather Job Now Termed 'Respectable'

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—Dr. Jerome Namias holds that long-range weather prediction has become respectable and almost no longer regarded as a game for crackpots. He is a long-range weather forecaster, chief of the weather bureau's extended forecast section and the man who signs the bureau's 30-day outlooks.

He concedes that weather forecasting is not a "science" in the usual sense, that physics is. On the other hand, it is not wildcraft, either.

"I think," he says, "that we have escaped from superstition."

But if there is one expression a weather forecaster uses more than any other, it is "I don't know." Namias feels that the more effort must be expended on the research.

In a recent talk to the National Science Foundation's division of atmospheric, physical, and engineering sciences, he pleaded for a "scientific organization, some sort of institute," to bring together specialists in various fields concerned with finding out how weather is manufactured.

Only a handful of serious students have entered the field, he said, and universities generally do not offer courses in what Namias calls the "central problem"—massive, hemispheric long-lasting patterns of air circulation.

Given such research, solutions might be forthcoming in 5 to 10 years, he said.

There will be no abrupt breakthrough—the subject is far too complicated.

"Weather events" in Asia, for example, can have a surprising effect on weather in the United States. These effects in turn can have a "feedback mechanism," upsets the weather in Asia.

For successful forecasts, observations must be on a big scale. To predict the temperature in Evansville, Ind., Namias on one occasion had to know about an upper atmosphere pattern thousands of miles away in Alaska.

There are year-to-year repeats like those which plagued the drought-ridden plains states. One theory that weather in the plains is determined by the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. "What happens in the plains, this theory holds, is a 'resonance effect' of air patterns bred over the distant oceans."

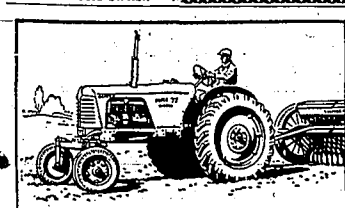
Daughter of Film Star Passes at 20

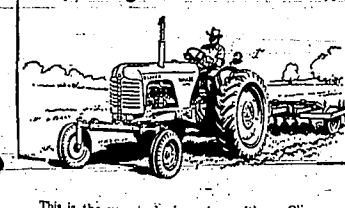

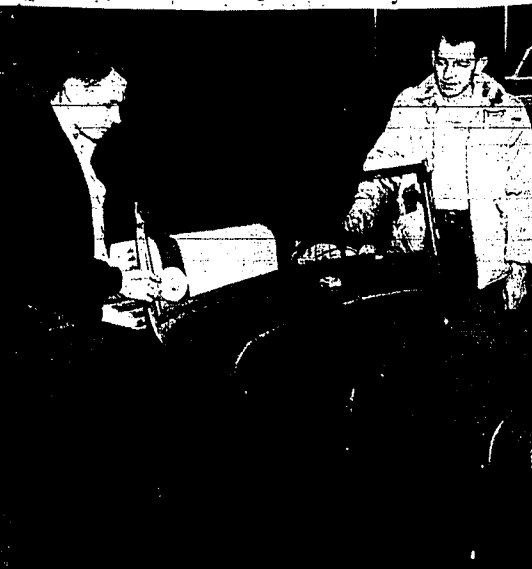

Senator Cites Power Needs In Dam Pleas

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D. Wash., said today that federal construction of John Day dam on the Columbia River "should be started at least by 1958 because of 'soaring Pacific Northwest power needs'."

Magnuson made the statement at the conclusion of a series of meetings between Northwest congressmen and the corps of army engineers to discuss appropriation needs for the project.

"Engineers tell us they can use any amount up to eight billion dollars in actual construction appropriations that we in congress decide to shoot for," Magnuson said. "Personally I'm for going after—and getting—the full eight million, but will compromise for less if that's what we have to do to get construction started."

Magnuson, a member of the senate appropriations committee, said "figures supplied us by the corps of engineers show that a \$100 million dollar appropriation would give us a minimum construction schedule, with no outlay for construction of a first step cofferdam."

A five million dollar appropriation for John Day would allow only three hundred thousand dollars for cofferdam construction, he said. "While the full three million dollars would earmark \$2,500,000 for construction of the first step cofferdam."

"Our delegation feels we need this cofferdam constructed as speedily as it can be built and have told the engineers so in conferences held to date," he added.

Top Court Backs Rule Over Roads

BOISE, April 12 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court yesterday upheld a Gem county district court conviction of Homer Nesbitt on a charge of obstructing a public road.

The 4-1 court opinion said that if Nesbitt were allowed to obstruct a road which ran through his property, then every other landholder on the road would have the same right.

Nesbitt had appealed his conviction, contending that the road was not a public road. He did not deny, however, that he had placed a large pile of dirt and a tractor in the road with the intent of obstructing traffic.

The state claimed the road had been used as a public highway since at least as far back as 1803.

Trial Set on Controls for Gas Stations

A district court trial to determine if two Twin Falls service stations can be controlled by the city of operation is scheduled for April 22.

Legal action to force the stations to comply with the city ordinance began last August when City Attorney Robert N. W. Ballen filed two complaints against the Perkins Standard Service station, Piner Avenue and Blue main buildings, and Gunner's Conoco station located at Pine Point north.

Based on the original complaint against Perkins was the Standard Oil company and Lyndon Development company. Joined with Gunner was Continental Oil company and Second Shoshone Realty corporation.

District Judge Robert M. Beckwith opened the door for the forthcoming trial in December when he overruled demurrers, or objections, by the companies and gave them 15 days to file an answer.

In their answers filed in January the two defendants claimed that the city ordinance limiting hours of operation from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. was an arbitrary exercise of the city's police power and a violation of the state and federal constitutions.

In addition to claiming the ordinance unconstitutional, the oil companies claimed that the city ordinance was a violation of the state and federal constitutions.

The oil companies further claim the ordinance is an attempt to limit the city's police power in excess of the grant of power extended municipalities by the legislature.

The companies will be represented by Ralph Brethren and Robert T. Bollen. The city will be represented by City Attorney Ballen and Frank J. Ballen.

Two cases are scheduled to be tried separately. Standard Oil company case is scheduled for April 22 and the case against Continental Oil company.

Both cases were joined when Judge Beckwith heard arguments on demurrers last December.

Senate Given House Act in 'Land Grabs'

WASHINGTON, April 12 (U.S.)—The house has passed and sent to the senate a bill to stop the armed forces from "grabbing" public lands for military purposes.

Rep. Carl Albert, D-Calif., sponsor of the bill, said the measure was needed "staggering proportions."

The measure would require the armed services headquarters to obtain prior congressional approval before they could withdraw more than 3,000 acres of public land for their own use. Under present law, only the approval of the interior department and the president is required.

The bill also would put severe restriction on what might be said as the armed service's practice of grazing hunting and timber privileges on military reservations to "high-brain" military officers and "weak-end" appointments.

Engle, chairman of the house interior committee, told the house that the army, navy, air force and marine corps at present "can get any amount of land they want merely by filling out a slip of paper."

He said the armed forces "have been getting by with this land grabbing entirely too long." He said the bill "puts the authority to decide how much land the military should have back with congress where it belongs."

Brucker Gets House Attack On Trip Plan

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—Secretary of the Army Brucker was attacked in the House yesterday for his plans to give Congressman a free trip to Kentucky to deliver a speech. Brucker acknowledged to newsmen he had made a mistake in not recognizing the coincidence in timing and place. He insisted, however, it is not a free junket to the Derby at the expense of the taxpayers, but a serious expedition.

Members of the House and Senate armed services and appropriations committees have been invited by Brucker to witness a military demonstration at Ft. Knox May 3 and 4. It is about 50 miles from Louisville where the Kentucky Derby will be run May 4.

Representative Mahon, D. Tex., told the House "this seductive army bubble could possibly cost the taxpayers 100 million dollars in reduced appropriations."

No doubt the army considers this good public relations with Congress, but it is not, Mahon said.

And it ought to be obvious to the most naive that it is mighty bad public relations with about 170 million plain Americans, most of whom are clamoring for economy and good management in the government."

Representative Burdick, R. N. D., joined in the criticism.

"The extravagant excursion is arranged for one purpose and one only—to give Congress a free ride and a quick report."

Mahon is chairman of an appropriations subcommittee which handles military funds.

Brucker's invitation, offering free transportation, meals and lodging for the duration of the army show, said any congressman wishing to answer for his trip to Washington May 5.

"I am not in a position to make arrangements for seats at the Derby," his invitation said.

Sight Returns, Man Crediting Faith by Wife

LOS ANGELES, April 12 (AP)—A man who was blind for three months following an auto accident today credited his wife's strong religious faith for the "miraculous" recovery of his sight.

Bob Nail, 24, said his sight suddenly returned to him last April 4 after he had gone blind for three months previously. He blamed his blindness on a severe concussion suffered in a collision auto accident six months ago.

Nail's eyesight returned to him after he had been blind for three months. He said doctors had offered him a \$10,000 operation to restore his sight, but he refused. He said his sight was "permanently" gone.

"On April 4 I got the oddest sensations. Things slowly took shape. I could see clearly. I said, 'I am starting seeing.' 'Yes, a cyclone had hit.' Nail credited faith for his eyesight recovery.

"I think the thing that kept me going was that my wife has a lot of faith and I have a lot of faith. I had enough between us to see me through," he said. The Nails are Lutherans.

Bid to Negro Called Error

RICHMOND, Va., April 12 (AP)—The director of Virginia's Chamber of Commerce said he was "awful sorry" but an aide used "Who's Who" to pick the guest list for a banquet and that how a Negro publisher happened to get invited.

The invitation of O. C. Powell, publisher of New York's Amsterdam News, caused no end of confusion at the statehouse because it's against the law in segregated Virginia for whites and Negroes to eat together. The confusion was compounded in this capital of the confederacy when Powell refused to sign back the invitation. Sen. George Thomas B. Stanley himself asked for it.

Stanley asked if Powell said in New York, and "until I get a withdrawal from the governor I will not consider dignifying this invitation."

"Who's Who doesn't give the race of distinguished Americans and Powell was invited along with Virginia's actor, the former Mayor Langhorne, Danville, Va.; Hollywood actor Joseph Cotten, a native of Petersburg, Va.; and former army Chief of Staff Matthew B. Ridgway.

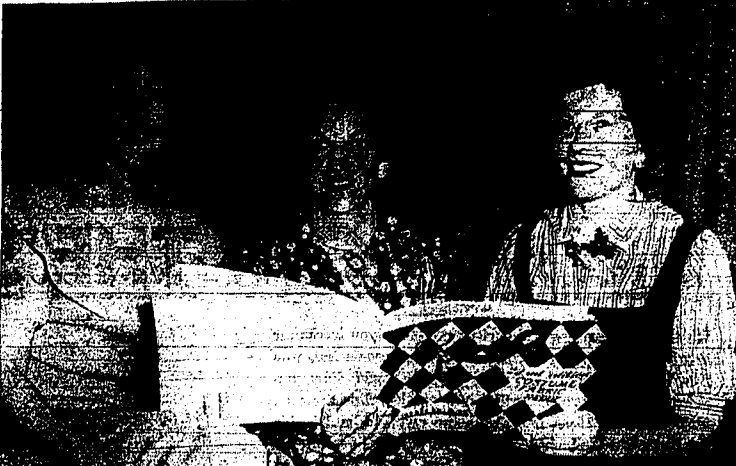

Cold Weather Hitting Easter Sales for U.S.

NEW YORK, April 12 (AP)—"Who wants to buy an Easter outfit when the weather is so cold?" is the question being asked by retailers. The griping from a worried Detroit merchant sums up pretty much what retailers feel near the windup of this Easter shopping season.

A national Associated Press survey shows these trends:

Easter sales—blitzed by a combination of blizzards, tornadoes and floods—have been disappointing so far.

"The weather," says Chairman Earl Puckett of the chain Allied Stores corporation, "has knocked Easter prospects into a cocked hat."

Along with the weather handicaps—merchants have come up with a new breed of consumer. This consumer is cagey. Sure, he has money, and he spends it too. But he wants low value for what he pays. And he drives a hard bargain.

In Detroit, for example, his first choice for an Easter outfit is likely to be that old favorite, the two-piece suit.

There are bright signs too. One is the booming teenage market. Teenagers there are still eight shopping days left. That could mean an 11th-hour buying spree that would beat last year's Easter sales. This year is a par with last year's record volume.

Other trends reported by retailers: Despite more cautious buying habits, Easter shoppers give no indication of having been scared by depression. "Sales continued" over time in manufacturing centers has reduced the amount of ready cash in shoppers' pockets but these customers are making greater use of charge accounts. Prices of Easter merchandise show little change from year ago, although wool and worsted apparel items may be a shade higher.

Construction For Homes Is At Low Point

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—Homebuilding continued its slump last month, dropping to the lowest rate since 1949.

"New figures, reported by the labor department yesterday, brought a statement from the National Association of Homebuilders that the federal reserve board's tight money policies have 'kept the homebuilding industry teetering in the brink of disaster.'"

"This economic brinkmanship is a dangerous game that the country no longer can afford to play," said a statement by George A. Goodyear, president of the association. The homebuilders group is pressing Congress for easier mortgage credit.

The labor department said last month's housing starts totaled 82,000 units for a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 88,000. This compared with 118,000 starts last year and the record 1,329,899 units actually built in 1948.

The number of housing starts last month was not only the lowest March total since 1948 but it also marked the annual and first quarter rates to the lowest since that year. First quarter housing starts this year total 218,000.

Gains from February to March, which are normal in the spring season, were reported from 10 regions. The February-March increase amounted to 25 per cent.

Of the annual and first quarter in March, 15,500 were privately financed dwellings and 7,000 were publicly financed under a military housing program authorized by Congress.

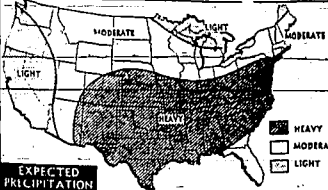

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Race Problem Hits Northern Areas of U. S.

CHICAGO, April 12 (U. S. News)—Here in the nation's second largest city, a 17-year-old Negro boy was recently shot to death by white youths who said they were "out to get a Negro."

In Boston a Negro who defended a white girl friend against three white youths was arrested. Five white men were arrested.

In New York the huge Negro population is mainly concentrated in Harlem and many school districts are segregated so that Negro children are kept away from white. These incidents and problems are by no means confined to the south. The difference—and it's a big one—is that the south has a policy of integration whereas the north has a policy of segregation.

... In New York more and more Negroes have left the south in search of brighter opportunities and better living conditions. By bus, train and jalopy they stream into Chicago at the rate of 2,000 a day. Today two persons out of 10 are Negro. They make up 11 per cent of the population.

In a similar way, like the 50 to 85 per cent Negro population of some southern communities, some very real social, economic and civil rights problems.

Edwin C. Berry, director of the Chicago Urban League, said recently that the "black belt" as segregated as those in "Tulsa" and "Georgia." New York has made great steps in integration of theaters, parks, playgrounds and churches but segregation in private housing projects is commonplace.

Although Cleveland, with an 80 per cent Negro population in 10 years ago, has made great steps in integration, an estimated 90 per cent of the Negroes are grouped in one central area.

Detroit is a leader in equalizing job opportunities and today the motor, city uses only job fitness as a measuring rod for hiring personnel in department stores and in clerical, secretarial and engineering work.

Negroes in northern cities still dominate the so-called service trades—porters, waiters, drivers—as well as in the south, but there is growing opportunity. The Chicago Urban League found that Negro chances for choice employment are going better, not because of discrimination but for lack of training.

Arnold Walker of the Cleveland Urban League says a number of times there do not admit Negroes to keep them in less responsible jobs. New York has laws against discrimination in employment but many businesses have a private policy against hiring Negroes.

One significant thing is that public and social agencies in the North put their best foot forward on the long term, emphasizing what is being done to improve relations but still such as Chicago and New York reason take the dangerous situation of Negro and white gangs with a high crime and homicide rate.

Both Cleveland and New York are at the head of the parade.

Concerns List Price Cuts on Coffee Brand

NEW YORK, April 12 (U. S. News)—Three large food corporations yesterday announced a reduction in coffee prices ranging from two to four cents a pound.

The Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea company slashed prices on its three leading selling-line papers: packed, Red Circle, Boker and Eight o'clock brands.

General Foods corporation cut its regular ground grocery pack coffee four cents a pound.

Grand Union company followed suit with a price drop of two cents per pound on its own brand coffee. The company also announced reductions of four cents a pound in Maxwell House, Banta and Savarin coffee effective immediately.

General Foods has reduced the price of Maxwell House coffee by three cents a pound and weeks ago a price cut of the price cut reflected a recent drop in the cost of green coffee beans and was being passed along to the consumer.

The move reduces the price of A 66 P. Red Circle coffee by two cents to 50 cents a pound, Boker by two cents to 52 cents a pound and Eight o'clock by four cents to 58 cents a pound.

TOKYO, April 12 (U. S. News)—Russian nuclear bomb tests have charged the air over Tokyo with about 150 times the normal amount of radioactive contamination, Japan's central meteorological agency said today.

The agency said it detected 1,540 geiger counts per minute from air measured April 8-10. Average count for air measured in the month of March was 22 counts, the agency said. Britain and the United States reported detecting evidence of Russian blasts on April 3, 5 and 10.
