## MILESTONE FOR BRITAIN

The revolutionary changes Britain has undergone in its military policy are destined to rank as one of the landmarks of the postwar decades.

Beldom if ever in military history has anything so drastic been proposed. By 1962 Britain's 700,000-man army will be almost entirely replaced by the troops of Spain. Along the way, in 1960, the draft will be abolished.

The royal navy, once the protector of peace on the seven seas, will be stripped of all battleships. It will be reorganized under a fast carrier force able to speed to trouble spots.

The RAF fighter command, savior of Britain in 1940, will slowly be scrapped, to be replaced by a guided missile defense system. In the air, the super-bombers and supersonic aircraft generally will be halted, and all energy focused on rockets and missiles, especially with nuclear warheads.

Those are the bold facts. Their significance for Britain, for the United States and for all the West is tremendous.

1. This astonishing switch reflects the impact of nuclear power and electronically guided weapons upon modern warfare and defense. The nation's future is almost entirely to move in the same direction, though perhaps without such sweeping speed.

2. The heavy cuts in conventional defense tell one of the painful facts of Britain's life: no longer has the strength to hold up economically under the weight of a really huge military establishment.

3. In acknowledging this, the British also are conceding openly what they and others have known for some time. They are heavily dependent upon the United States for survival in the struggle with hostile communism. This move casts out all pretense.

4. At the same time it appears to raise a grave question—whether Britain and others can afford to give up their "all-out" weapons will have left any real means at all for fighting small, "conventional" wars which might erupt in minor war spots.

5. By its frank reliance upon America, by its desire to turn to give its military policy a greater American flavor, Britain in this historic change may encourage other West European peoples to follow suit. The result might only be still heavier burdens upon the United States.

Even if no train of events is started through France, West Germany, Italy, the Lowlands and elsewhere, the net effect manifestly is a loss of defensive power in Europe against an aggressive Russia.

Conversely, however, Britain's turn to nuclear arms will mean a vastly heightened retaliatory power which may offset to a substantial degree the losses in conventional manpower and weapons.

Together with America's nuclear arsenal, the total effect could be an increased deterrent against a third world war.

All the meanings of this move cannot possibly be clear so early after the fact. But it is clear that the military structure of the entire western world is never likely to be the same again.

A turning point has been passed.

## VIEWS OF OTHERS

SIMPLE SOLUTION TO FEDERAL SPENDING  
The problem of federal spending, a subject of conversation and publicity since 1930, has received more attention since President Eisenhower's new budget than ever before.

People just don't care for a peace-time budget of \$100 billion. That plus the cost of the President's own cabinet, members and congressional staffs from both parties indicates that almost everybody is against it.

The question, of course, is what can be done about it? One group is pushing for a constitutional amendment to limit the federal government to 10 percent of the national income. Another group is pushing for the complete repeal of the 16th Amendment.

The case of both groups is the same—(1) they hope to limit federal spending by limiting federal income; (2) they hope to limit federal income by limiting federal spending.

However, there is another, easier quicker way of accomplishing the same thing—namely, a reduction of the withholding feature of the income tax. Withholding is a truly painful (for the employee) method of raising billions of dollars for the government. Ask most workers what their pay is, and they will tell you it's \$100.00. Ask them how much they are withholding, and they will tell you it's \$10.00.

If withholding were discontinued, and every person subject to withholding had to dig down into his pocket on April 15 for the \$200-\$500 that he owed in income tax, there would be an immediate reduction of a cut in federal spending. The road would be so long that the Congress and the administration would not dare to ignore it.

Simple as this—just end withholding—Mink's Country News.

POSTOFFICE BLUEPRINTS  
The difficulty in which the postoffice department finds itself is another example of poor management. Postmaster General Summerfield told a house of representatives subcommittee that an extra \$1 million was needed to run his department until the end of the fiscal year on June 30. The subcommittee refused to grant more than \$1 million on the ground that the department had failed to support its spending equally over the four quarters of the year as required by law. # Senator Raps Lacks of Use Of Trust Law

WASHINGTON, April 15—An Antitrust law restricting meat packers haven't been enforced by the agriculture department, says Senator O'Mahoney, D. Wyo., today.

O'Mahoney's statement came in answer to a question asked on Wednesday on a bill that would shift responsibility from the department to the federal antitrust commission.

The Wyoming senator and Senator Watkins, R. Utah, are sponsoring the measure. O'Mahoney will preside at hearings before the senate judiciary antitrust and monopoly subcommittee.

Testimony before the group last year, O'Mahoney said, indicated "complete lack of enforcement of the antitrust provisions of the Packers and Stock Raisers Act by the department of agriculture."

O'Mahoney said there has been no enforcement for a period of 20 years.

"All the provisions of the act which have been enforced have been enforced aggressively," the veteran Democrat said. "We have no doubt that the department is doing its best to protect producers and shippers of livestock."

This bill will permit the department to continue efforts that it has done but, in addition, will breathe life into an area which has been dormant since 1936.

O'Mahoney said the senate recently that many meat packers own and operate other types of business and are thus subject to federal trade commission control over unfair trade practices, because the department is not permitted to take such action.

Watkins said this has caused some food chains and other types of business to buy an interest in meat packing companies "to escape FTC enforcement or unfair trade practices" by their unwilling enterprises.

## Senator Asks More Slashes In USIA Aid

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP)—Sen. Allen J. Ellender charged today that some of the U. S. information agency's programs are "just a waste of funds." He called for even deeper cuts in its budget than voted by the house appropriations committee.

The Louisiana Democrat, a member of the senate appropriations committee, said "I want to go deeper" than the 38 million dollar slash recommended by the house committee.

President Eisenhower asked 144 million dollars for the USIA for the fiscal year starting July 1. The committee voted 110 million dollars, almost 34 million dollars less than it received last year.

Ellender said he would favor a cut to about 88 million dollars to 90 million dollars, approximately what the agency was given two years ago. "Even that may be too much," he told the United Press.

Rep. John J. Rooney, D. N. Y., head of the house subcommittee which made the original recommendation for a 38 million dollar cut in USIA funds, told President Eisenhower in a letter yesterday he does not think taxpayers have gotten their money's worth from the propaganda agency.

Replying to a letter Eisenhower wrote committee members April 8 in a futile effort to save off the 38 per cent cut, Rooney said the agency's efforts during the Hungarian uprising last fall were "almost a complete failure."

The committee made public April 12 the day it cut the USIA budget. A letter from the President urging against any reduction in the agency's funds, the letter dated April 9 said the funds were necessary because the Soviet Union is spending "vastly greater" amounts on propaganda abroad.

The house is scheduled to begin action tomorrow on the appropriations bill carrying funds for the state and justice departments and the information agency.

## U. S. Aid Bill On Orchards Set by Solon

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP)—Sen. Frank Church, D. Ida., said today he was co-sponsoring a bill which would authorize federal financial assistance for farmers whose orchards are damaged by natural disasters such as a destructive frost.

He said similar legislation had been introduced in the house by Rep. Al Ullman, D. Ore.

Church said the legislation was needed to protect orchardists from economic hardships resulting from such disasters as the freeze of November, 1955, when fruit trees were damaged in Oregon and Idaho.

He pointed out that Idaho's harvest of apples, cherries, peaches, plums and prunes in 1955 was worth almost six million dollars.

"With this sort of an investment orchards . . . we can little afford to let our people and economy suffer because of natural disasters," the Idaho senator explained.

The Church bill would authorize the secretary of agriculture to make emergency loans to help orchard operators in regions where are designated disaster areas because of frost, hurricane, drought, disease or other natural damage.
