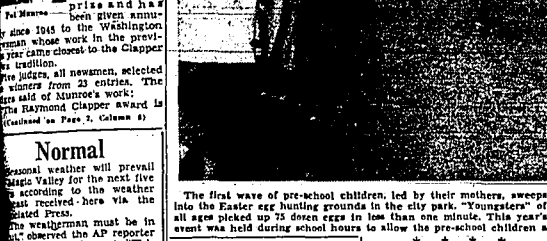

## After Girl Gets Her Diamond; Pawnbroker Is Best "Friend"

NEW YORK, April 17 (AP) — If a diamond is a girl's best friend, a pawnbroker's best friend is that same girl—after she gets the diamond.

"Sixty per cent of our clients are women," said Lou Modell, who is known as "the pawnbroker's pawnbroker" and operates the nation's largest pawnshop, "Why? Because women are notorious for being able to bring a trifle of money—accidentally or on purpose—Many rich women—even those with an income of \$50,000 or more a year—will hock a piece of jewelry for \$20,000, then take the \$20,000 and go out and buy another piece of jewelry with it."

Divorcees borrow most often on their jewelry. Then wealthy wives. Widows come last. "Career women aren't such regular clients because they usually are good businesswomen. Also, if they need money in a hurry."

The next morning she pawned the letter opener for \$300 to bail herself out of jail, he remarked. If they didn't have to pay it themselves, pawnbrokers would be highly in favor of the federal income tax. Right now their windows are full of diamonds pawned so clients could keep from going into hock with Uncle Sam.

"Our busiest season is around income tax time," said Lou, who will advance a hard-pressed executive up to \$10,000 in cash in five minutes—if the exec can put up enough diamonds for collateral.

He explained many executives prefer to deal with pawnbrokers rather than banks because the transaction is so confidential—and fast.

The public has many misconceptions about that friendly fellow behind the counter in the store with the three-ball sign.

Many have the idea that a pawnbroker is a blood-sucking shyster fattening at the expense of the poor.

Actually pawnbroking is a dying industry all across the country. For every new pawnbroker who opens a new shop five go out of business. Small-town firms—which can charge a higher rate in many instances and have a lower overhead, are taking much of our trade. We average only about one per cent net return on our investment.

Why should a man open a hock shop when he can make more with less risk by buying stocks and bonds?

"You can't make money on poor people," he said flatly. "They're not profitable."

The best client is the big-salaried guy who is a good lover, and enjoys wine, women and song."

What occupational group most often makes the trek to Modell's own shop?

"Jewelers," said Lou. "They borrow on the jewelry they have so they can buy more jewelry."

# Soldier Goes On Trial for '45 Desertion

POTTSVILLE, Pa., April 17 (AP)—A Chicago-born Brooklyn soldier who became a French war hero during an 11-year military career may have today forfeited his status as a hero for deserting the U. S. army in wartime.

The soldier is Pvt. Vito Bala, 31, of Brooklyn, N. Y. He appeared before a U. S. army general court martial in the second and perhaps the last day of his trial on charges he deserted in Germany in 1945.

He faced a maximum penalty of death for leaving his own 22nd Infantry regiment division. But his own testimony, and records of his military career, showed that he had 11 years of absence were in fact, 11 combat-packed years in India-China and Europe.

The 12-man court heard Bala himself relate the story of a battle in the second and perhaps the last day of his trial on charges he deserted in Germany in 1945.

## Eyewitnesses Tell Story of Sailor Asleep

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, April 17 (AP)—Eyewitnesses to a fatal flight aboard the tanker "Edison" testified here yesterday that one man accused of the murder was "either drunk or asleep" during the crash.

Olaf Jensen was killed aboard the tanker while it was in Kodiak harbor March 17.

Michael B. Jensen, 34, New York, and Gerald J. Jensen, 30, New Orleans, were charged with beating Jensen to death.

Jensen pleaded guilty to second degree murder and Jensen pleaded innocent. Both were indicted for first degree murder by a grand jury last month.

Two eyewitnesses to the fight yesterday told the court at a pre-sentencing hearing for Jensen that Jensen was "either drunk or asleep" in his bunk. They said at no time did he make any motions whatsoever to participate in the brawl.

Describe Brawl  
John Mahoney, Brooklyn, testified that when he entered the fore-cabin to bring Jensen a drink, Jensen and Jensen were "banging each other around" in what he described as "more of a wrestling match than a fight."

Mahoney said he saw Jensen taking his coat apart and taking one of its cross members to beat Jensen. He said Jensen "crumpled" when hit and that Jensen hit Jensen several times after Jensen went down.

Another seaman, Fred Carlson, testified he saw only a small portion of the fight but added that while he was a witness he never saw Jensen rise from his bunk.

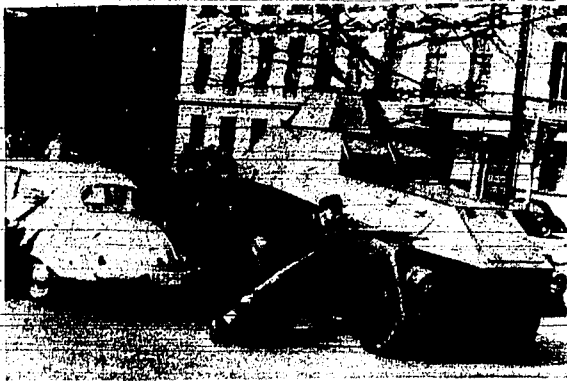

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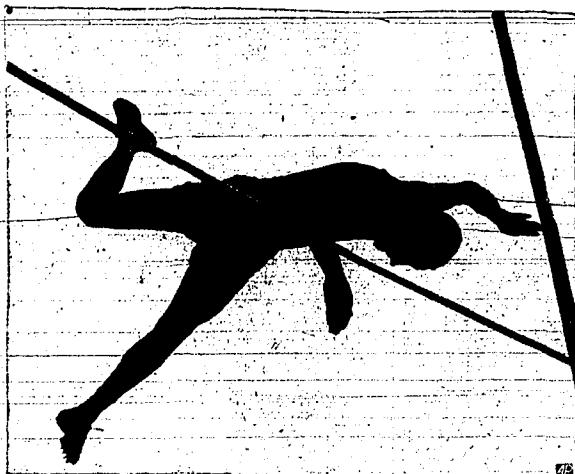

## Guesswork, Coercion Are Charged for Estimate of Shortage of Schoolrooms

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Rep. R. W. Gwinn, R.-N. C., charges that the U. S. office of education used guesswork and coercion to manufacture its estimate that the nation has a shortage of 150,000 schoolrooms.

He said that personnel of the agency was "shocked to learn that this kind of data was to be used in a request for federal appropriations."

Representative Gwinn is a member of the house education subcommittee considering legislation for federal aid of school construction.

Coinciding with Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Marion B. Folsom's appearance before the subcommittee is an attempt to justify the 150,000 figure, Representative Gwinn said. "If there was even a case of a bun's ruin involving billions by a professional group, this is it."

"He said the only support for the figure was the office of education's circular No. 400, which was 'practically all estimates or guesses, generally by some clerk or assistant' in some state agency."

Referring to a questionnaire which the office of education sent out to obtain its figures, Representative Gwinn said that several states did not answer at all so "the office states all in even nice round figures."

"If it (the agency) did not like the answer that came back from the person who filled the questionnaire in . . . it would return it to the state revision."

"The U. S. office of education complained to one state about its failure to answer the questionnaire to the satisfaction of the department of health, education and welfare. It threatened the state of refusal by saying: 'The U. S. office of education does not want to make an official complaint regarding the inadequacy of data supplied by your state . . .'"

"In several instances the figures were very considerably raised. Old estimates were stricken out and new estimates put in as a result of the U. S. office of education telephoning or writing a state. After that, increases were written in. That made up a substantial part of the 150,000 schoolroom needs."

Representative Gwinn said in only seven states did the superintendent or assistant superintendent of education sign the questionnaire; that "Mr. Folsom has made no survey, conducted no study on the ground to get his 150,000 figure." He said that "not a man went into the field from Washington to visit a single school district out of the 51,000 he (Folsom) now pretends to speak for."

"In no case," Representative Gwinn said, was any information obtain-

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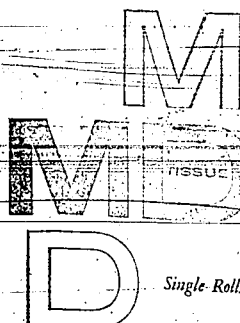
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
