Storming Stream Forces Texans to Flee Their Homes

WACO, Tex., April 23 (AP)—Hundreds of persons fled their homes in this central Texas city today as officials feared that as many as 6,000 residents may have to evacuate their dwellings within a few hours. Fed by torrential rains, the Brazos river which flows through the city's eastern side was rising a foot every 15 minutes. Authorities said there was a possibility it may flood out the entire eastern side of Waco. Civilian and military authorities met in an emergency session to plan the evacuation of the city. It should be necessary, it was feared, for the river may start spilling out of its banks by 3 p.m.

Waco was the worst-hit city in a central Texas area in which defense and disaster relief headquarters in Austin issued warnings. The city's mayor, J. C. McCallum, said that as the rains continued, the situation was becoming more serious. The weather bureau in Austin said that the river was rising at a rate of one foot every 15 minutes. 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

She said that during the 100 days he held her in the cellar, he sometimes took her up to his house as she could clean up. The cellar had a bed and a stove and two chairs, she said. She cooked for both of them on the stove.

Indonesian President Guides Self Into Difficult Position

President Sukarno of Indonesia has maneuvered himself into the most difficult position he has faced in his 12 years as his country's leader.

He has decided that Indonesia must become a "guided democracy," as he calls it, instead of a federal republic.

But it looks more and more as if the "guided democracy" will become a dictatorship.

The chief question seems to be whether Sukarno himself will be the dictator.

Ever since Indonesia under "brother" Sukarno's leadership won its independence from the Netherlands, it has been torn by revolts and political bickering.

In his first step toward his guided democracy, Sukarno recently formed a 25-member emergency cabinet.

Officially it is called an extraordinary cabinet. This means that, though it is supposed to be a coalition ministry, the various political parties are not represented in it in relation to their strength in parliament.

Sukarno's action in forming the cabinet is being criticized widely by both political parties and the army.

The army, which always has been interested in politics, seems to be becoming an increasingly big factor in the nation's situation.

Sukarno at present wields virtual dictatorial power under a state of martial law.

But to exert that power, Sukarno needs the army. And there are indications in dispatches from Jakarta, the capital, that unless Sukarno gets control of the situation soon, the army may step in and proclaim a dictatorship of its own.

It was disclosed two weeks ago that the army had started to impose a censorship. Since then it has temporarily suspended the chief Indonesian news agency and two leading Jakarta newspapers for publishing news of which it disapproved.

Sukarno demanded in a speech last Thursday that the army stay out of politics. But the army seems to have no disposition to do so.

Sukarno's big handicap is that his republic of Indonesia is an island. It has 82 million people, spread through thousands of islands which stretch for 2,500 miles from the Indian ocean to the Pacific.

Indonesia is supposed to be a federal republic, in which the chief islands correspond to the American states. Actually, the republic always has been ruled by and for the benefit of Java, the main island.

Another of Sukarno's handicaps is that he doesn't seem to know where he wants to head his "guided democracy." He is a fellow "neutralist" with Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru of India, and in that capacity looks with a friendly eye toward Soviet Russia, Red China and his own Communists. He also, he says, would welcome a visit by President Eisenhower.

Living Costs Rise Sharply In S. F. Area

SAN FRANCISCO, April 23 (U.P.)—The cost of living reached an all-time high in San Francisco and Los Angeles during March, despite a slight decrease in the cost of food in major Pacific coast cities.

The U. S. department of labor's report of the all-items index in March for the San Francisco area was 122.3 (1947=100), an increase of 0.8 per cent over December and 4.7 per cent over the index of March of last year.

The December-March quarter rise was the seventh consecutive quarterly increase, starting with June, 1946, since then prices have climbed about 4 per cent.

The only major category not to increase was food, which actually decreased 0.1 per cent lower.

In Los Angeles, food prices were down 2.3 per cent, but the all-items index was an all-time high of 120.4, an increase of only 0.1 per cent.

Food prices dropped 0.3 per cent in Seattle, cancelling out an increase of about the same amount in February. Even so, prices in mid-March were more than 4 per cent higher than at the same time a year ago and only about 1 per cent below the all-time high in January, 1952.

In Portland, food prices dropped about 0.2 per cent, while prices for housing in January and February and bringing prices back to about the same level as last August, but food prices were still more than 4 per cent higher than they were in March of last year.

Church Asks \$100,000 for River Studies

WASHINGTON, April 23—Sen. Frank Church, D. Idaho, today asked the senate committee on appropriations to consider favorably \$100,000 for a continuation of water studies of the upper Snake river in Idaho and Wyoming.

Church said the investigations would be carried out by the corps of engineers in the coming year, and would look into the development of flood control, irrigation and hydroelectric power.

"From my discussions with officials of the water users associations and flood control districts in south-eastern Idaho, I know there is great interest in, and support for, the type of planning which will go forward if budgeted funds are made available," the senator added.

"I have been much impressed with the arguments advanced on behalf of such development. It would contribute materially to the solution of the flood control problem in the upper Snake river valley. At the same time it would facilitate the beneficial use of the upstream flood waters for new irrigation projects and for power development," he said.

"I believe these studies, when completed, may provide us with a feasible solution for controlling the perennial floods on the Teton and Henry's forks, as well as on the Heise-Roberts stretch of the Snake river."

Missiles Are Hitting Still Secret Rates

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—Air Force research rockets have reached new and still secret speeds well above 8,000 miles an hour in simulating the performance of long-range ballistic missiles.

Authorities guardedly gave details of the rocket flights today in disclosing that the United States has arrived at the "really critical period" of development in its multi-billion dollar ballistic missile program.

Near Pay-off Stage—The first 1,500-mile intermediate range ballistic missile (IRBM) is expected to undergo a number of "successful launches" from the air force base, Fla., this year under present plans. It is considered the "flight test phase."

The Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) is "entering into the flight test phase" and should undergo launches this year although probably not to the full 6,000-mile range. Its ultimate speed will be 15,000 to 16,000 miles an hour and it will climb 300 to 400 miles above the earth in stratospheric between continents.

"Successful launches" will not mean combat units suddenly will begin to arrive with ballistic missiles. They will mean, authorities said, that the barriers the unknowns there are no longer fundamental engineering problems to be solved.

Probes Task—The task is to put together the complicated rocket motors, tanks or air frames, control and guidance systems, and weapons. The probes comes that make up the dread vehicles.

The second flights with research rockets were made to provide data on the problems atomic weapons-carrying rockets will face when they reach the earth's atmosphere. Authorities said they had gone further than any other "instrumented" rocket yet fired. Their instruments return data to ground stations.

Big Blazes Costly In North America

BOSTON, April 23 (AP)—Big fires in the United States and Canada in 1956 caused an estimated \$330,156,000 loss—the worst in history.

The two countries reported 430 large fires last year with individual loss of at least \$250,000. And 98 of them caused one million dollars or more damage.

Industrial fire losses topped the unprecedented fire destruction. More than 100 large loss industrial fires were reported and 14 large loss church fires equalled the total number over the preceding three years.

More than 400 persons perished during large loss blazes, 333 the result of aircraft fires. The previous year's total from big fires was 266.

The largest structural fire in 1956 occurred in Brooklyn where the damage was estimated at \$7,600,000.

Doctor Warns Country Again About X-Rays

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—New warnings have been sounded against unchecked use of X-rays for treatment and diagnosis.

They were voiced by Dr. H. Bent-Glass, a pediatrician who said peacetime uses of radiation may be doing more hereditary harm to man than has been supposed.

At the same time Glass said radioactive fallout from nuclear weapons tests is a "significant" danger from the standpoint of genetic damage to mankind.

Glass, of Johns Hopkins University, told the National Academy of Sciences yesterday that new estimates indicate human beings are getting more X-radiation than was believed as recently as last June.

He also said currently recommended safe radiation limits may have to be sharply reduced if some new speculations on genetic damage rates are borne out by investigation.

Science has established that radiation—whether from cosmic rays, radioactive minerals, atomic bombs or X-rays—damages the hereditary material of germ cells or genes and that the damage is passed on from generation to generation.

The amount of genetic damage depends on the amount of radiation accumulated over the years. The resulting handicaps bred into the race may be so slight as to be imperceptible or so severe as to cripple or kill.

The race has adjusted to, or at least "learned to live with," background radiation. Bad genes tend to "breed out," good ones to survive. That worst of the geneticists is the radiation man has added to his normal burden.
