WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—Projects in Utah and Idaho are included in construction work planned by the Federal Highway Administration to cost a total of \$1,561,358,000.

The department is asking Congress today for authority to spend the amount.

The new construction bill is \$500,000,000 less than the total asked for the current fiscal year and is \$31,228,000 below the amount voted by Congress.

Projects are included in every state except Wyoming.

Just over half of the total asked for the air force. Nearly one-fifth of the total dollar amount is for unidentified projects in "various locations" and one-sixth of the request is for classified work at home and abroad.

Construction projects are planned for military construction projects with \$153,400,000.

Idaho is shown for one project, \$2,022,000 at the Mountain-House Air Force Base.

The total proposed for Utah is \$217,000. Of this the army's Dugway proving ground would get \$45,000 and the air force would have the remainder. Hill air force base is allotted \$1,911,000 and the Wendover air force base \$323,200.

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# Firm Reports It Will Favor Two Projects

SPokane, May 1 (AP)—It would be a "disastrous decision in responsible management of resources" if federal projects were abandoned in favor of a big new power dam on the Snake river, the Pacific Northwest Power company said today.

The company's report, submitted last week to the federal power commission, PNP said the legal and engineering staff of the company had "fallen into monumental error" in recommending construction of the big dam, and that the staff's "inaccuracies, inconsistencies and unfair emphasis on the dam were prejudicial and improper."

Recommendations  
The PNP staff had recommended denial of a license to the combine of four private companies in favor of the two projects.

Attorneys for PNP claimed the dam would be "disastrous" and "would delay development of flood control storage as well as failure to meet needs for power in the area, making stream power cost exceeding 35 million dollars.

The rebuttal brief claimed Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley could be built now but PNP could not because of delay of operation of the dam and wildlife groups.

Blocks Salmon River  
It would block the Salmon river and "destroy 30 per cent of the entire Columbia river salmon resource." The company claimed its two projects would fully develop the Snake river between Hells canyon and Imnaha river and would provide all the flood control trouble in that stretch. "It is therefore in the same and in all ways a fully comprehensible development," the brief said.

# Power Output Is To Be Increased At Palisade Dam

BOISE, May 1 (AP)—A new generator to be installed by May 15 will double the power output of Palisade dam in eastern Idaho, regional reclamation director Harold T. Nelson said today.

The dam is located on the south fork of the Snake river. Power it generates is being used primarily on the Minidoka North Side pumping division project near Rupert.

Nelson said the generator will add 7,500 kilowatts to the dam's output, which it goes "on the line" alongside the dam's generator installed in February.

# Nicaraguan Move Cooling Squabble

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, May 1 (AP)—The Nicaraguan-Honduran border dispute appeared to be cooling today when word that Nicaragua's army chief had cancelled a chain of exercises and withdrawn orders to post troops on the frontier.

The chief of state, Anastasio Somoza, Jr., said he took the step because of "Honduran aggression to take her complaint to the Organization of Central American States."

Honduras charged last week that 60 Nicaraguan soldiers moved into a town at the edge of the newly created frontier province of Occidental. "Duke, Nicaragua" conferred the town, Mocoman, was in Nicaraguan territory.



It had become evident several weeks ago that the letitia in Jordan were being challenged by the pro-western Arab and political leaders loyal to him.

The fight broke into the open when pro-Soviet Premier Sulaiman Nabulsi tried to enter into diplomatic relations with Russia. A crisis developed.

Hussein dismissed Nabulsi. Nabulsi organized riots in Amman, the capital, and other cities. The pro-Russian Egyptian and Syrian governments encouraged Nabulsi.

At a critical time, President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles announced that they regarded the independence and integrity of Jordan as vital.

Next day the President sent the United States sixth fleet, based on the Mediterranean, to the Middle East.

The first action was taken in the first application of the new "Eisenhower doctrine" on the ground that Jordan was threatened by the forces of international Communism.

It was then made known to King Hussein that the United States was ready to give him 10 million dollars in financial aid.

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# War Hero Killed In Crash of Jets



## Chamber of Commerce Pleads For Slashes in 'Ike's' Budget

By JOHN S. COLEMAN,  
Chairman of the Board, U. S.  
Chamber of Commerce

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Within the next 90 days the congress of the United States will face one of the most important and soul-searching jobs which any congress has faced in the history of the United States. It will be asked to reduce the federal budget to a reasonable spending level which can be borne by the American people and our economy without serious impairment to both.

The national chamber has been tremendously concerned with this problem. We have urged consistently that it be cut. We have not asked that this be done foolishly or haphazardly, but that it be done by effective constructive reductions.

These can be made by applying the principles of sound public finance and our traditional principles of balanced government—and—balanced budget.

We see several significant dangers to the economy, the American people and to our system of government if this budget proposal is not substantially curtailed. First, of course, it precludes any tax relief, and thus continues a war-level burden upon individuals.

This in turn tends to tie up capital which could be used to increase our productive capacity, to produce more jobs, to produce more income for individuals, to give each person an opportunity to better develop his potentialities and in general to create a higher standard of living for this nation.

I am not impressed by the superficial statements which are constantly being made that the budget has so many programs fixed by law, and thus fixed costs, that it cannot be reduced.

The budget gives the President and congress an opportunity each year to make a complete survey of all existing programs to determine whether they are essential, to determine whether they should be carried on at the present level, and to act accordingly.

It is completely within the President's prerogative to take the leadership and recommend elimination of such programs as he deems undesirable, unnecessary or unwise.

Congress also can do many things to help get the budget down to a workable level. Although programs are authorized by law, it does not follow that appropriations must be made each year to carry out these programs if the federal burden is too great.

There are many projects and programs which are either not funded to the limit authorized by law or are funded at all under our present system. To eliminate them is simply the application of common sense to current conditions and a recognition of what the nation can afford.

Businessmen must continue their leadership in the fight for budget reductions. But they also must look at the other side of the coin and encourage people to solve their local, state and national problems at home. They must exercise self-restraint in their own spending.

American officials claim to see signs Moscow is afraid Egypt and Syria may go too far. Hence, a Syrian troop withdrawal could be interpreted as a sign Syria no longer feels it can count on Moscow support in event of a showdown with Israel.

During the early days of the recent crisis in Jordan, both Egypt and Syria engaged in some tough talk creating possible intervention. Officials said this may have given Moscow some pause about arming Syria and Syria into action that might bring a big war.

**Withdraw Troops**

Syria, Saudi Arabia and Iraq sent troops into Jordan last fall to help guard against a possible Israeli invasion at the time of the attack on Egypt. Iraqi troops later were withdrawn.

Between 1950 and 1953 Syrian troops are reported still in Jordan. They are near the important Ma'in airfield which was built by the British royal air force.

During the recent emergency there were reports King Hussein of Jordan gave the Syrian troops 48 hours to get out of his country. This was denied.

**Positive Indications**

But diplomatic informants said reports received here indicate the Syrians will be pulling out soon for good reasons. For one thing, Israel has made it clear he wants no foreign dabbling in his country. There is evidence he believes Syria and Egypt, backed by international communism, sought to overthrow his regime.

American officials would welcome the departure of Syrian troops from Jordan. This government is doing everything it can to shore up Hussein's regime. The king's request for financial aid was met by \$10 million dollars. The U. S. sixth fleet was headed to the eastern Mediterranean as a "deterrent" to the Syrians.

Negroes will be given full use of the Miami Springs public golf course unless the city of Miami starts action within 10 days to overrule an integration order by federal Judge Emmet G. Clegg.

Chief last night confirmed that he had ruled the present policy of permitting Negroes on the course on Monday to be unconstitutional and ordered the integration effective May 10.

"It's like anything else," Clegg commented. "You just can't distinguish between taxpayers—there can't be any discrimination at all. Whether some of us like it or not, that's the way it is."

**Weighty Role**  
Miami officials have seriously considered evading such an order by selling the golf course to the city of Miami Springs, which has no Negro residents.

The board is empowered to assign pupils to particular schools on various grounds without

race. The Alabama state court of appeals yesterday denied the appeal of the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., Montgomery integration leader, of his conviction and \$500 fine for violating a state anti-boycott law.

The Alabama court denied the appeal on grounds that King failed to file it within 60 days following his conviction on March 27, 1956, as the law required.

King now has 15 days in which to appeal to the Alabama supreme court.

At Birmingham, Ala., meanwhile, the 67th general assembly of the Southern Presbyterian church has adopted a more active role by members toward bringing about public school integration in the South.

**Enraged**  
In Chicago, fellow clergymen helped the Rev. David S. Pison move to a new parsonage yesterday when he was evicted from his apartment because of allowing Negroes to attend his church.

While two policemen stood guard professional movers and children from other churches on Chicago's south side moved Pison's furniture to a brick bungalow near the Truman park field house where his congregation worships.

Meanwhile, the Louisiana housing commission informed four-rated lightweight boxer Ralph Dupas he must produce a birth certificate before he can fight a white opponent in New Orleans again. Dupas, recently accused of being a Negro, said he does not have a birth certificate needed to prove he is white.
