## Old Standbys Are Featured For 'Specials'

Children and adults, two classes of shoppers seeking a comparatively inexpensive main dish for their families, will find that the nation's supermarkets and grocery stores this week—May 2—offer a variety of old standbys at low prices. One national chain cut chicken to one cent a pound in the New York area, to the lowest level since 1945. Elsewhere, however, chicken prices were rather irregular. Pork prices were cut 2 to 4 cents a pound in many areas, and a pound of beef also was lower in some areas.

With the advent of better growing weather, more and more vegetables from nearby fields are becoming available in the stores. New green cabbage is rated close to an outstanding buy, along with green peas, green onions and radishes. Asparagus, too, is nearing the peak of its season with the new Jersey crop added to the California variety in the stores for several weeks.

## 'Iron Curtain' Does Not Stop Fleeing Wives

VIENNA, May 2 (AP)—The wives of refugees already in the west are fleeing their lives, and sometimes their children, by trying to flee across the heavily guarded Hungarian border to Austria.

The last "Iron Curtain" barrier of the last war was a minefield in Hungary. Many women are making desperate dashes to freedom. Only a few succeed each year.

One who succeeded in 1948, Maria, a housewife from Budapest, is at this pretty, slim woman in a light gray dress, sitting with her arm around her 12-year-old husband, Lajos, who is a soldier in the Austrian army.

"I tried first to get away in January, but was stopped by the Communist border guards and sent back to Budapest with a rubber stamp in my identity card, saying that I was a would-be escapee."

Now that I would be picked up by the AVO (Secret Police) sooner or later, I decided to try to flee in my identity papers I had obtained.

"Finally I could stand the fear of being arrested no longer. I disguised myself as an old peasant woman and traveled by train to a station near the Austrian border. Each day there were security checks. I tried to hide the money I had."

"When I saw a moon glow over the border, I said, 'I walked on the border.'"

## Exchange Club's Flag Project Gets Under Way at Twin Falls

Called "Operation flags for scholarships," the program is being carried out by the club to provide perpetual fund for supplying scholarships to the "most deserving" graduates from the local high school. The Exchange club has presented the scholarships for the past several years.

The project will require the cooperation of local merchants. The club will provide for storage and erecting of the flags along with liability insurance. The merchant will pay a small annual fee for this service.

James Blake, club president, notes almost all the proceeds, after the initial cost, will go into the scholarship fund as the club members will donate their time.

## Business Has Just Average Spring Sales

NEW YORK, May 2 (U.P.)—April has brought business little more than a shower of hope. There are still good signs that things aren't getting better, since the traditional spring pickup failed to take shape.

Businessmen today mostly look for a continuance of the leveling off period into the summer—thankful that so far it is proving to be so mild. The vast of home—building in Wall street—centers on another traditional pickup date, Labor day.

Statistics reports for the first three months of the year, while better than some expected, show that the number of firms who had increased profits over a year ago barely tops the number who had declined.

**Volume Drops**

In a number of industries the backlog of orders awaiting new capacity operations. But an increasing number of firms report that the volume of new orders is dropping.

Inventory cutting continued to be a major business practice in April, with the end still not definitely sighted.

The number of firms who are shortening their work weeks and tightening employee rolls continues to increase. In spite of these wage scales, therefore, total income from paychecks hasn't gained in April as was first hoped.

**Most Disappointing**

Most disappointing, perhaps, has been the failure of two outstanding spots to lead to new sales. Home building and new car sales didn't take their traditional spring in April.

Construction men see small change of home building equalling last year's mark. They anticipate mostly of tight money, although lending groups think the demand is off for other reasons—partly because shortages are mostly things of the past, partly because building costs are so high.

Auto makers, who have had, after a long period of quiet, a pickup in sales now, have about written off the spring pickup as a factor in their earnings. For the second year in a row that old tradition has been observed in the breach.

**Sales go right along at a respectable pace, but the urge to buy a new car hasn't blossomed with the weather this April.**

Most steel companies have reported increased earnings for this year, thanks both to good demand and higher prices.

But the oil industry, the aircraft makers, the electrical equipment and business machine makers have been having a little trouble of their own.

April has been kind to stock brokers, too. Trading volume has been up.

Investors report their spirits trade slightly ahead of a year ago, with higher prices accounting for most of the gain.

**Nearly Complete Animal Skeleton Believed Ancient**

COEUR D'ALENE, May 2 (U.P.)—The nearly complete skeleton of an animal that presumably roamed north Idaho about 1,000 years ago was discovered here.

The well-preserved skeleton was unearthed by T. T. Ward while he was digging an extension to the basement of his house.

Frank Bruna, biology instructor at the North Idaho junior college, said the animal had been buried in lake shore and in a post-glacial period. Only hooves and horns of some mammals were missing.

The skeleton probably was that of an animal similar to a caribou and would have weighed about 600 pounds.

The discovery was the second in a series in the last few weeks of bones being uncovered in north Idaho. A contractor unearthed what may be the remains of a prehistoric mastodon near Kamiah April 20.

## 200,000 Signatures, \$32,400 Are Right to Work Vote Goal

**BOISE, May 2 (AP)**—The Idaho right-to-work committee has set a goal of 200,000 signatures and a budget of \$32,400 to carry on the campaign. The action was taken here during a meeting of about 60 persons representing agriculture, contractors and industry.

A right-to-work measure was sponsored in the last legislature by the committee which would have outlawed the closed-shop or union shop in Idaho. It passed the house the first time in history such a measure managed to get by even one legislative chamber in Idaho.

During the meeting here the com-

mittee, which may change its name at a later date, adopted resolutions providing:

Petitions to be circulated in each county of the state with a goal of 200,000 signatures. A total of 20,000 signatures—10 per cent of the vote cast for governor in 1954—would be needed to get a right-to-work measure on the ballot.

Money to be raised by association of companies, circular letters to individuals, poster cards and committee membership cards at \$1 each.

A speakers' bureau in each county to provide speakers for lecture circuits—free of charge to labor union and other organizations.

Division of the state into 11 districts—four counties to a district—with each district to be headed by a supervisor.

## Soviet Russia Appears to Be Softening Disarmament Idea

**By United Press**

Soviet Russia seems to be gradually softening its attitude toward a satisfactory disarmament inspection system.

It has now offered a plan under which large areas of the United States, eastern Europe and the Soviet Union would be open to aerial survey.

Agreement on such a system of inspection is a necessary first step toward any disarmament treaty, as it requires mutual confidence.

Russia's new offer, made at the United Nations disarmament conference in London, can hardly be called "heartened."

But almost all of western Russia, including Alaska, and most of the United States west of the Mississippi river, and most of western Europe.

They would fly over most of Communist eastern Europe, a very small part of western Russia and a large part of Siberia.

On paper, the Russian proposal calls for the opening up of an equal area of Soviet and American territory, including Alaska, and most of allied western Europe.

containing the greater part of Soviet war industries, would remain closed territories.

This proposal in its present form, is obviously unsatisfactory.

Its first importance, however, lies in the fact that little by little the Soviet government seems to be coming around to admitting the necessity for an efficient system of inspection.

That is a big concession for the Russian Communist leaders to make. Russia always has been one of the most secretive countries in the world. That was true even under the czars.

In their reluctance to opening up their territory for inspection, Soviet leaders are not only trying to conceal their war potential.

Also, inspection planes, with their remarkable penetrating photographic equipment, would be able to spot weaknesses as well as strengths in Russia's industrial facilities.

Allied optimism has been growing since the U. N. disarmament committee, on which the United States, China, Great Britain, France and Russia are represented, started its current meeting March 18.

Authoritative informants at the London meeting are now warning against too much optimism. Such warnings are justified in view of Russia's record of evasion on the inspection issue.

But the Russian attitude does seem to be softening.

One reason, as has been pointed out, undoubtedly is the growing alarm of the Soviet government over the threat presented to it by allied bases in Europe, North Africa and Asia.

Atlantic bases—bases from which nuclear missiles as well as nuclear bomb-carrying planes could attack the Soviet Union—have been built.

The Soviet alarm can hardly have

been lessened by the firm way in which its threats to allied countries of dire retaliation have been rejected.

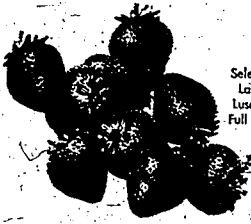

# Nixon Talked Most During '56 Campaign, Said Less on Taxes

WASHINGTON, May 2 (U.S. News)—Nixon talked more in the 1956 presidential campaign than Vice President Nixon had previously said, according to a study by the House of Representatives.

At one point early in the campaign he explained why when he said:

"In a political campaign it is tempting to tell the American people that we can get rid of the draft, cut our defense, find a cut rate way to meet our international obligations, but American security must come before any political ambition."

This was at a time when President Eisenhower's administration, pretty confident of winning, was preparing the second session budget of almost 72 billion dollars which he offered congress this year.

Thus Nixon paved the way for what he told the U. S. Chamber of Commerce without running the risk of having campaign strategy thrown back at him, when he defended Eisenhower's budget as not only necessary but sound.

A recasting of Nixon's campaign speeches shows he said practically no time on economics—except to tell people they never had it so good—and spent most of his time building up Eisenhower in the "father image" of a good and wise man.

If Nixon looks consistent in not promising reduced spending; some of his other campaign statements can be wrapped around his neck. But, since he was a politician, he told people they never had it so good.

In urging voters to reject Eisenhower and give Republicans control of congress, Nixon said: "Our is a teamwork organization from top to bottom. The President must simply have people on his team who are working with and for him."

One day after Nixon defended Eisenhower's budget before the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, the Republican leader in the senate, William F. Knowland of California, addressed the same businessmen's organization.

# Police Renew Their Search For Death Car

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2 (U.S. News)—Another San Francisco man lost his life today to a hit-run driver.

### Idaho's Polio Is Lowest for Last 10 Years

**BOISE, May 2 (U.P.)**—The state health department noted with pleasure today that the first four months of this year showed the lowest number of polio cases in Idaho for any similar period since 1947.

W. W. Benson, director of the health department, said only 27 cases of polio had been reported in the first four months of 1957. One was reported in February and the other in April.

Lowest in 1948

Lowest count during the last 10 years was in 1948, when the state had a total of 11 cases in May 1 and 12 for the entire year, Benson said.

Last year at this time, 11 cases had been reported to the health department. In 1955 there had been 21 cases up to May 1.

Benson said the largest number of polio cases reported during the first four months of any of the last 10 years was in 1950 when 26 had been reported by May 21.

110 Cases in 1949

Worst year on record was 1949 when there were 510 cases during the year.

In 1947 and 1952 there were 353 cases each year and during the same year of 1955 the count was 354 for the 13-month period.

During 1956 the total was 110.


W. W. Kietz, director of the health department's epidemiology and statistics section, said he thinks the drop in polio cases is largely responsible for the low number of cases this year.

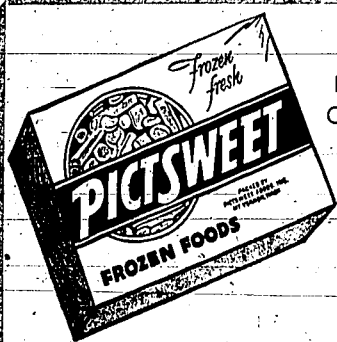
