States Spend Larger Funds During 1956

WASHINGTON, May 6—The 48 states spent 468 million dollars more than they did in 1955, according to a report issued today by the federal bureau of economic analysis. In a survey of the 12 months ending last June 30, the bureau said the states took in \$12,350,000,000 and spent \$13,810,000,000, both record amounts. Revenues were up 1.8 percent from the previous 12 months and expenditures were up 9.8 percent.

The bureau found the states spent more on education last year than for any other function. This spending totaled \$5,000,000,000, an increase of 12.1 percent over fiscal 1955.

School Spending
Running a close second to school spending by the states were expenditures for highways. These totaled \$3,331,000,000, an increase of 11.2 percent over the previous year.

Spending for public welfare rose slightly last year to a total of \$2,672,000,000. Expenditures for health and hospitals rose 9.5 percent to \$1,602,000,000.

All but 247 million of the total state debt was of long-term nature. More than 70 percent of the \$21,121,000,000 state borrowing last year was by seven states—California, Connecticut, Illinois, Louisiana, Massachusetts, New York and Ohio.

Record Rise
The census bureau found that taxes provided \$13,375,000,000, or about 75 percent of all state revenue. This was a record rise of \$1,778,000,000 or 15.3 percent over tax revenue in fiscal 1955.

In the tax category, individual income taxes imposed by 31 states rose about 25 percent between 1955 and 1956 to a record high of \$1,274,000,000. Corporate income taxes rose about 20 percent to \$890 million dollars.

The largest revenue source for states was general sales and gross receipts taxes, which provided \$3,729,000,000. This category supplied the states with 23 percent of their total tax yield even though it was imposed by only 31 states.

Sales Tax
The second-ranking source of state revenue was the sales tax on motor vehicles, which produced \$2,897,000,000. Sales taxes on liquor totaled \$468 million dollars, a 16 percent increase over fiscal 1955.

In this respect, the census bureau reported that the 16 states which operate their liquor stores made a net profit of 124 million dollars.

Tobacco tax receipts revealed the downward trend of two years ago. States received \$122 million in fiscal 1956 to a record high of \$15 million dollars. Motor vehicle license fees produced \$1,298,000,000, or 9.7 percent from 1955.

The census bureau found that state unemployment compensation systems came out with a profit last year. Revenues totaled \$1,000,000,000 and benefit payments amounted to \$1,277,000,000.

Leftists Grabs Three Seats in Syrian Voting

DAMASCUS, Syria, May 6—Left-wing government candidates won three parliamentary by-elections in voting Saturday and Sunday, secured by charges at the polls and by great animosity on part of the voters.

Right-wing groups protested against alleged unfair voting practices and intimidation at the polls by government candidates even before the voting was over.

World Watchers
Although the results will have little effect on Syria's 143-member parliament, the world was "watching" for an indication whether Syria would continue its move toward the left.

In the key election, handsome left-wing lawyer Rifaat El Khatib, backed by the "national grouping" which included the government, parties and the Communists, defeated his extreme right-wing opponent Sirhan Mustafa Mustafa, 51-49, by a vote of 18,741 to 18,232.

Leader
Sirhan is the leader of the fanatical Muslim Brotherhood in Syria and Jordan. He has attacked both American policies and "Godless Communism."

In another crucial test at Hama, non-party leftist Kamel El Khatib, also backed by the government parties and the Communists, defeated the Damascus newspaper publisher and El Tellouli, who was once secretary to President Shukri El Kuwaili.

Unofficial reports said El Khatib polled 18,231 votes to Tellouli's 18,435.

His Backing
In the third important by-election, Sayyah Abou Asali, with the backing of the national grouping, defeated right-wing candidate Sulim Huseini by a vote of 3,671 to 1,597.

The fourth by-election centered on tribal issues in the wild Jebel Druze country. No results were reported from there.

The pro-government "Syrian forces" organized throughout the campaign in Damascus. They cruised the streets in fleets of American cars and their election posters outnumbered those of the rightists by two to one.

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Border Fight Is Called Off In Agreement

MANAGUA, May 6.—Nicaragua and Honduras have agreed to call off their border war, pending an international ruling on the century-old dispute that touched it off, it was announced today.

President Luis Borge said Nicaragua is willing to observe the cease-fire. Honduras does so, however, that any "new aggression" by Honduras "will mean total war."

The cease-fire was announced by the fact-finding board that came here from Washington to investigate the conflict. The two central American nations have agreed to stop fighting at least until the board has submitted its report to the organization of American states.

The statement gives the fact-finders, representing the United States, Mexico, Honduras and Panama, four days to work out plans for a settlement of the border dispute.

The cease-fire became effective in both countries when Borge and the fact-finders signed the agreement here last night. The board will fly to Tegucigalpa for formal signing ceremonies today and then return here to continue its work.

The border on troop movements halted a Nicaraguan column which was headed for Yaguajay, 30 miles inside the Nicaraguan border, to retaliate for a reported Honduran attack on the parlor.

The disputed area is a 12-mile strip of the "maquillo" coast whose ownership has been in question ever since Nicaragua and Honduras won their independence from Spain.

The fact-finding board, headed by the United States, Mexico, Honduras and Panama, is expected to submit its report to the organization of American states.
