130,000 Miles of Highway Lost in Fund Diversions

BOSTON, May 9.—The Automobile legal association estimates that 130,000 miles of new highways could have been built with highway funds diverted to other purposes in the United States since 1934.

Approximately four billion dollars, originally earmarked for highway projects, has been diverted for such purposes as mosquito control, water propagation, unemployment relief, and the like, the ALA said.

In this manner, the year 1956 alone saw this country lose \$130 million of new highways, the ALA charged. "New Jersey, all by itself, lost 140,000 miles last year by diverting highway funds."

The Oklahoma Turnpike, the New York Thruway and the Florida Sunshine State Parkway—all toll facilities—could have been financed with highway funds which those states diverted, said the ALA.

"Twenty-seven states have amended their constitutions to specify that highway-use taxes must be spent for highway purposes only. But the other 21 states have no anti-diversion amendments."

These states are Rhode Island, Connecticut, Vermont, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Florida, Mississippi, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Utah, Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana and New Mexico.

"In fairness to a few of these states—Connecticut for example—it is to the credit of the state legislatures that the highway fund has been used for its intended purpose," said the ALA.

Canadian Air Drifts South With Shower

Cool Canadian air drifted south into north-central states Thursday, according to weathermen, and showers and thunderstorms for men meeting woodland fire in Wisconsin and Michigan.

No relief was in sight, however, for the critical New England area where two major forest fires raged out of control in Massachusetts.

Another hot, gusty day was predicted for the area, and authorities said "we expect all hell to break loose when the stiff winds return."

State of Emergency
Gov. F. Parker declared a state of emergency in Massachusetts because of the worst forest fire outbreak in 10 years. Other states, where smaller fires were burning, closed woodlands to the public and suspended fishing season.

Fire broke out constantly in the tinder-dry New England area, and authorities feared many more were the work of arsonists.

Firefighters hoped showers would ease the drought situation of northern Wisconsin and the upper Michigan peninsula somewhat, and help stop the woodland flames. Three major fires destroyed some 4,000 acres of timberland in the area.

Shower and thunderstorms snarled along the line of cooler air advancing southward as it clashed with warm air from the south. Reported a rainfall of 1.58 inches.

Widely scattered showers and thunderstorms—some severe—were reported from Louisiana and Texas into southern Kansas. A storm dumped 1.27 inches of rain at Atlanta, and tornado clouds were spotted west of the city.

Manassas, the lead fire worked its way through drainage ditches and covered parts of the city with 11 feet of water. It was unable to break through makeshift levees.

Officials, however, feared a sustained crest might soften and collapse the levees.

House Solons Vote to Slash Schools Fund

WASHINGTON, May 9 (U.P.)—The house education committee voted overwhelmingly yesterday to slash half a billion dollars from the school construction bill, in hopes of getting the program through an economy-minded congress.

The committee voted 23-3 to authorize federal outlays of 134 million dollars during the next five years, instead of the two billion originally called for by the Democratic-sponsored measure.

A final committee vote on the entire bill was scheduled for today.

Yesterday's action also was a bid to win complete support for the measure from President Eisenhower, who had originally called for \$1,300,000,000 in construction aid.

Representative Matlack, D. Mont., called it "an attempt to get a bipartisan bill that would compromise what the president wanted."

Eisenhower has made it clear he wants congress to give him a school aid bill this year, but he might have balked at a two-billion-dollar price tag.

In the present form, the measure would authorize the federal government to give the states 300 million dollars in aid in each of the next five years.

Death Claims Famed Singer At Age of 64

STAMFORD, Conn., May 9 (U.P.)—Enrico Pina, who became a Broadway mainstay of the middle-aged singer of "South Pacific" after a quarter century of international opera fame, died in his sleep today at the age of 64.

Death came to the handsome, sixty-four-year-old Pina at his home here, where he and his wife and children were at his bedside.

Died in Sleep
His physician, Dr. David H. Fogel, said Pina had suffered a heart attack and "passed quietly in his sleep."

The doctor said death followed a stroke suffered April 30, after which Pina "gradually went down."

Wins Acclaim
From there he went on to win acclaim in opera houses on both sides of the Atlantic.

His romantic lead as the pliant, playing opposite Mary Martin in the musical comedy "South Pacific," which opened in 1949, made him a symbol of mature sex appeal to women from lobby-seaters to grandmothers.

And at the same time he gave inspiration to older aging fellows whose hearts were still warm. "Some Enchanted Evening" became a theme song.

Two Heart Attacks
Pina had suffered two heart attacks. One was at Varina, Italy, on Aug. 8, 1934, which kept him in an Italian hospital for a short time.

The second came at his home here last Dec. 3. He was in critical condition for about three weeks then at Greenwich, Conn., hospital.

In addition to the doctor, those at Pina's bedside when he died were his wife, the former Doris Leach, their two daughters, Gloria, 28, and Gloria, 6, and their son, Peter, 12.

Also at the bedside were his wife's parents, Dr. and Mrs. William H. Leach, of West Stamford, and two brothers-in-law.

Mother, Two Children Drown When Flash Flood Hits Denver

DENVER, Colo., May 9 (U.P.)—A mother and two small boys, one an infant and the other 2 or 3 years old, were drowned by a flash flood that hit a low-lying section of suburban Denver today.

The three deaths were confirmed by the Aurora, Colo., fire department, but no identities were immediately available.

William H. Hawkins, a deputy fire chief, said he and his men recovered the bodies of a young woman and two small boys.

More than 3 1/2 inches of rain had fallen in the Denver area in the last 24 hours, according to the precipitation amount to 2.2 inches had fallen at 7:30 a.m.

Wide spread water damage was also reported in the mountain areas immediately to the west of Denver.

Telephone and power lines were out of order in Clifton and Co. Creek creeks. Bridges were also reported washed away—one near Fort Logan on a county road.

The Jefferson county sheriff's office at Clifton, Colo., said it was not yet clear how many people were killed. It was reported that four around one of the construction projects.

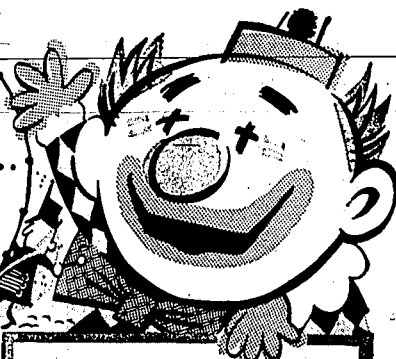

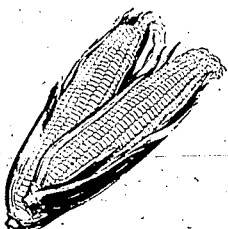

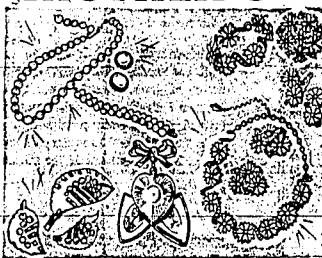

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Italian Feud Sets Records In Confusion

By Catted Press
Italy's leaders seem likely to set a new record for complete political confusion.
President Antonio Segni has refused after months of pleading which have not only his own political position but every Italian Democratic party but every political faction.
The feud has been conducted only between the various parties but inside the individual parties.
And President Giovanni Gronchi, a Christian Democrat, is a good friend of his own.
At the moment, it seems unlikely that anybody can form a stable government before the next national assembly election is held. It may be necessary to advance the date of the election now scheduled for June 1958.
Fused Negotiation
Fused negotiation was forced upon the President of the Republic by the fact that the Christian Democrat party, pulled out of the coalition government on the grounds the government was no longer strong enough to carry out promised land reform and other programs.
The reason appeared to be the President's leadership of his own party was threatened.
Ordered to the United States, Italy's policies including its role in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, the proposed merger of the right and left wings of the Socialist party and the extent to which President Gronchi is entitled to act as a policy maker.
President Gronchi took office 22 months ago as leader of a coalition government which included the Christian Democrat party, the Socialists, the Liberals and the Republicans with four, including the opposition were the Communist party with 143 seats and the Socialist party with 73.
Gronchi started cooking last year for the Socialists. Communist Party's Minister of Agriculture, Giuseppe Saragat, rocked the Communist world by his repudiation of the policies of Josef Stalin. The two factions had split because Saragat was a fellow traveler with Communism. To date, the severe negotiations have not, neither.

Disunion
Disunion broke out in the Communist Christian Democratic party, a coalition arose because of a decision of Foreign Minister Oscar Merloni, who is a liberal.
Since his election 10 years ago, Merloni has sought to establish a power in politics, leaving the president of Italy to act as a non-party official. These duties make him little more than a figurehead.
In March, Gronchi wrote a letter to President Eisenhower, sharply criticizing some American foreign policy. President Eisenhower refused to send the letter. That acted to cause the present crisis.
It looks now as if whether the present premier will be an unhappy man.

Dworshak Slates Cobalt-Measure

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—Senator Dworshak, R., Idaho, introduced a bill to provide relief for producers of cobalt, a "strategic metal" indispensable in construction of jet engines.
His bill, introduced yesterday, would exempt the production of cobalt in the United States from the "strategic materials" program which is designed to supply industry and the armed forces with strategic materials.
The bill would provide for long-term contracts until June 1963, to be at least \$12.5 a pound for cobalt from domestic mines.

British Agree With Germans For Aid Plans

BONN, Germany, May 2 (U.P.)—Great Britain and West Germany declared in a joint statement today that the North Atlantic allies must retain "an adequate shield of land, sea and air forces to protect the territory of all their member states."

They announced that West German Defense Minister Franz Josef Strauss will visit London shortly to discuss defense questions of mutual interest.

Two Days of Talks

The announcement was made in a communique ending two days of "summit" talks here between British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

The talks ranged over a wide field of defense, disarmament, European unity problems and German reunification. They brought to a close an agreement between the two countries but the communique said "the heads of state were in full agreement on the main aims of their policies."

Flies Back

Macmillan flies back to London this afternoon after a brief visit to Bonn. He will arrive at Heathrow airport at 10:30 p.m.

Macmillan told a news conference here today that the talks were "very fruitful, highly trained forces on the continent and there would be no sudden change in the alliance strategy."

"I told the chancellor that the clear line was to be gradual and cautious and that we do not intend to leave the gap unfilled," he said. "Our effective strength will be kept at a very high level."

Statistics Show Increased Total Of Idaho Illness

BOISE, May 2 (U.P.)—The Idaho public health department today released statistics which showed the incidence of scarlet fever, measles and diphtheria increased sharply in Idaho this year over last year.

The incidence of scarlet fever had nearly doubled, measles cases were up more than 150 per cent and the number of flu cases had increased by nearly 50 per cent.

Dr. Kayo Okada, acting epidemiologist with the health department, said the scarlet fever increase was "not alarming" because the cases were concentrated in any one area and there was no indication of an epidemic.

Scarlet fever, measles and diphtheria are all highly contagious diseases which can be prevented by vaccination.

Trucking Firm Is Handed Stiff Fine

LOS ANGELES, May 2 (U.P.)—A Los Angeles trucking firm has been ordered to pay the largest fine ever assessed against a transportation company for violation of local laws.

Municipal Judge Mark Brander yesterday fined the Eley Trucking Express company, which maintains headquarters at Portland and an office here, \$200 for a single violation.

The fine was assessed after a hearing on March 20 when a diesel truck, owned by Eley, was found to be in violation of a city ordinance which prohibits the use of diesel engines in the city.

Prince Undergoes Throat Operation

LONDON, May 2 (U.P.)—Prince Charles undertook his first major operation—removal of his tonsils and adenoids—in a specially built operating room at Buckingham Palace today.

Two renowned surgeons, an anesthesiologist and four nurses took part in the operation on the eight-year-old prince, while Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh waited nearby.

A medical bulletin afterward said Charles' condition was "very satisfactory." But he will have to spend at least a week in bed recuperating, palace sources said.

65-Ton Hunk Of Soil Helps For Research

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 2 (U.P.)—A 65-ton chunk of soil resting on a giant scale is telling agricultural research scientists a great deal about what happens to water after it falls to earth.

This block of land, six feet wide and 14 feet long, is 1/500 of an acre. The hunky monolith is known as a "soil core" and is being used by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to study the way water moves through the soil and how crops use it.

The lysimeter, established more than 10 years ago by the soil conservation service, appears to be just a plot of earth bordered on all sides by narrow, ground-level concrete walls. But the walls go down eight feet into the ground. Earth beneath the block has been cut away to make room for highly sensitive scales and other measuring equipment, with plenty of space for technicians to take readings.

The soil in the block is undisturbed except for the cutting around and beneath it. Its surface is level with the surrounding field. Agricultural research scientists say information from the lysimeter is representative of the entire field, on which crops are grown in a typical four-year rotation.

The weight of the huge chunk of soil is recorded automatically every 10 minutes, year in and year out. The lightest dew or the heaviest rainfall is measured.

The scale aids the collecting containers measure water runoff and the water that has been absorbed into the soil. They also measure water which drains beneath the soil. Also measured by subsurface is the loss of water from the ground and plants by evaporation and transpiration.

80 Per Cent of Homes Gloomy

CINCINNATI, May 2 (U.P.)—The American Home Lighting Institute said today that four out of five Americans are living in a dreary gloom only a few candles removed from the light provided by the cavernous "fire."

The institute said recent surveys conducted showed 80 per cent of the nation's homes have only 100 light fixtures while minimum good home lighting standards call for at least 25.

The institute said every living room should have at least one ceiling fixture, and that a distance should be provided for the dining room above the table. There should also be a ceiling fixture in each bedroom and preferable in the kitchen, and the report said.

Hallways and even closets should be well lighted for safety and convenience, as well as the garage, attic and basement.

"It is needless for Americans to go on living in the dark when many fixtures are now providing luxuries for every type of lighting need," spokesmen said.

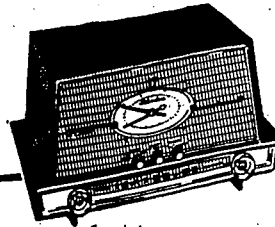

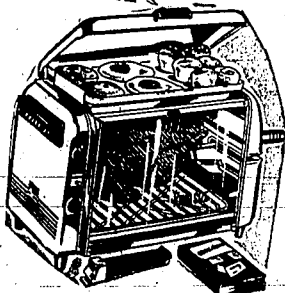

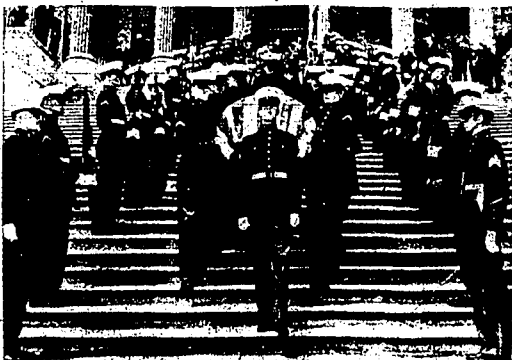

Inmates Have Rugged Night After 'Break'

HELMARCK, N. D., May 9.—Rebels, who rioted at North Dakota state penitentiary, spent a cold and hungry night in a cellblock with broken windows.

The 200 inmates tried to sleep on empty stomachs when the morning tumbled downward near the first point as a cold front passed over.

None of the prisoners had eaten since breakfast Tuesday shortly before a riot broke out in the prison. The riot erupted into a four-hour riot that finally was subdued by a flying wedge of guards with guns blazing.

Coming Around

"There are signs the prisoners are coming around," Warden O. J. Nygaard said. "We are not rushing things."

The warden planned to hold the defiant prisoners shivering in their cold, damp cells without meals until they indicate willingness to return to their prison jobs quietly.

Nygaard, however, said he didn't expect the prisoners to submit to prison routines and twice factory work today.

"There are a lot of preliminaries to go through first," he said.

No criticism of Nygaard's tactics was reported. North Dakota Gov. John Davis, expressing complete confidence in Nygaard, said the warden has been given a "free hand" in dealing with the rebellion.

Last Charges

A reporter talked with five convicted leaders during the height of the riot through the barred window of the administration building. They charged guards stole money and valuables from their cells and that one guard taunted them with stories about their wives and sweethearts. They blamed this same guard for setting off the twice factory riot. Old blocks were still littered with ripped mattresses, overturned trash cans, broken window glass and other debris scattered during the demonstration.

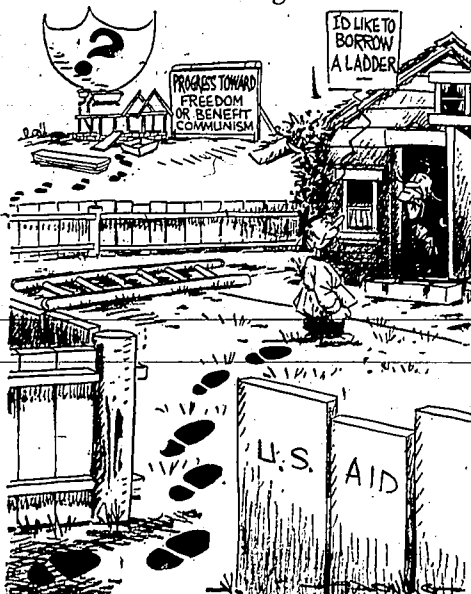
