New Tornado Warning Issued in Missouri Tuesday Toll Reaches 51

A new tornado alert went out for parts of Missouri today where two days of violent weather have killed at least 51, injured nearly 300 and caused property damage in the millions.

The latest outbreak of tornado activity killed 24 persons and injured more than 70 others yesterday in southeastern Missouri. Six were killed at Fremont, 7 perished in the Desloge area and one died at Van Buren.

The killer winds, whirling around on both sides of the Mississippi river south of St. Louis, struck less than 24 hours after the season's deadliest tornado does killed 37 persons and injured some 200 others in the Kansas City suburban areas Monday evening.

The Kansas City weather bureau issued a new warning for a possible "tornado or two" today in east and central Missouri, extreme south-west Missouri, extreme southern Kansas, extreme western Arkansas and extreme north central Texas.

Four men convicted of spying for Israel were hanged in the public square of four cities of Jordan today.

They were the first to be executed since King Hussein put down a leftist-inspired rebellion against his regime and imposed martial law more than a month ago.

Those hanged today were executed on wooden gallows erected in the square of Amman, Habis, Habbon and Tulkarm. The latter three are all in areas west of the Jordan River throughout of Jordan.

Meanwhile, Hussein's regime has continued its roundup of those who plotted against him during the recent crisis. Several hundred demonstrators and suspected rebels were arrested, but it was believed few of them would be hanged.

British Official Tells Bomb Aims

LONDON, May 22 (U. P.)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan said today Britain would "never" make a H-bomb because it "virtually certain that it would be used."

He said he was about to throw away those nuclear weapons before the nations can agree to limit their use.

Macmillan said he would, if it were necessary, be willing to throw away the world's best defense against the H-bomb.

Macmillan expressed his views in a speech before 1200 persons at a Conservative party women's conference in the Royal Albert Hall. It was the first major policy speech since Britain successfully tested its bomb in the Pacific May 11.

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—The White House today entered the dispute over whether the United States or Japan should try an American soldier for the slaying of a Japanese woman.

Informal sources said a high-level decision could be expected soon.

The case has become a newspaper sensation in Japan where some elements demand the right to try Major Charles H. White.

White, 31, was captured by the Japanese in 1945. They contended that American refusal to turn White over to Japanese courts violated the U. S.-Japanese status of forces agreement and infringed on Japan's sovereignty.

Concerned State department officials are concerned because the affair has caused a worsening of Japanese-American relations on the eve of a visit to the United States by Japanese Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida.

Propaganda

TOKYO, May 22 (AP)—Rumors and propaganda today tried to whip up anti-American sentiment among Japanese in the wake of the slaying of a Japanese woman by an American soldier.

Propaganda broadcasts from both communist countries are charged in almost identical words that it was "nothing unusual" for American soldiers to shoot and kill natives of foreign countries.

The 31-year-old enlisted man is charged with having killed Mrs. Naka Sabai last January by firing an empty cartridge case from a grenade launcher while standing a machine gun post at Camp West in Japan. The missile struck the woman in the back.

White was reported to have been trying to warn shell scavengers away from the area.

The Japanese claim they have the right to try him on criminal charges under the status of forces agreement.

The defense department at first agreed and then changed its mind. Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson last week ordered White retained in American military custody pending a "review" of the situation.

"Ike" Backers Are Planning Campaign Aid

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—The politically off-beat organization known as Citizens-for-Eisenhower is busy in the bank and plans to spend a lot of it in next year's congressional campaign.

C-for-E was set up in 1953 with two objectives. It reached both: (1) to raise money from sources which regular Republican organizations could not tap and (2) to rally voters who might not respond to regular Republican campaign efforts.

The organizers and operators of Citizens-for-Eisenhower largely were amateurs and still are. They are likely to perform in next year's campaign, however, like professional.

The events of 1954 will prove, of course, whether C-for-E campaigning is on the professional or the amateur beam. On the amateur beam, the organization might use its funds in an effort to defeat some of the congressional Republicans who have been opposing the President.

Up for Re-election

The United Press was informed that Citizens-for-Eisenhower would not be so engaged in 1954. Three notable Republican senators who often have given Eisenhower the back of their hands will be up for re-election next year.

Sen. John W. Bricker, (O.), William E. Jenner, (Ind.) and George W. Malone, (Nev.) These men are conservatives who spun new party labels such as the modern Republicanism with which the President seeks to re-charter his party.

As of now, however, it is not likely that Citizens-for-Eisenhower money and efforts will be used against these senators or against any Republican candidates next year.

The organization's purpose, instead, is to devote its funds and efforts solely to the election of Republicans more closely associated with the White House program. It will be an all-out, big money effort from which candidates such as Bricker or Jenner, for example, would benefit indirectly.

Free Party Fund

Every dollar contributed by C-for-E to the election of an Eisenhower Republican candidate would free regular party funds to help any or all other Republican candidates. A man familiar with Citizens-for-Eisenhower political thinking summed it up this way:

"We are not going to be against anybody—against any Republican, that is. We don't mind."

Doctor States Some Anxiety Good for Life

CHICAGO, May 22 (AP)—A noted psychiatrist says some anxiety is a necessity, and doctors who prescribe "happy pills" for his relief are "treating their patients a disservice."

Dr. Roy J. Grinker, of Michael Reese hospital, criticized the indiscriminate use of tranquilizing drugs at a panel session on the subject of anxiety. Grinker said, "It is rather an age of defense against anxiety."

Grinker, who heads the Institute for Psychiatric and Psychoanalytic Research and tranquilizers treat only the symptoms of emotional illness.

Grinker said mild, usually regarded as a tranquilizer, is held by many authorities to be a sedative. Two other doctors, James O. Miller and Donald O. Marquis of the University of Michigan, said tests on 50 students at the university indicate that mildness does not interfere with mechanical skills, such as driving a car.

NEW YORK, May 22 (U.P.)—Vic Wertz admitted today that he still feels the paralyzing effects of polio but the man who made it back farther than most make it forward still plans on "at least two more years of baseball."
