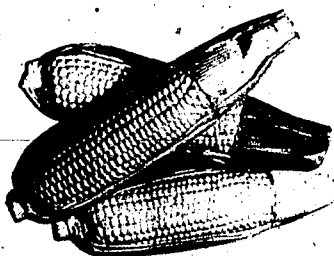

U.S. Presumes 450 American Soldiers Dead

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—State and defense department officials said today that they now presume 450 American prisoners of the Korean war were accounted for by the Chinese communists, are dead.

They said, however, that they would continue diplomatic efforts to make the communists account for the men because there is a "possibility" that some may be alive.

"There isn't any evidence that any of them is alive," said Assistant Secretary of State Walker Robertson.

Stephen B. Jackson, deputy assistant secretary of defense, agreed the defense department has said, has no "further positive information or intelligence from any source that such is the case."

"We are in the extremely difficult position of not being able to tell all honestly, to hold out much hope," Jackson said, "while at the same time we cannot, in good conscience, foreclose the possibility that some may still be alive."

Robertson and Jackson testified before a house foreign affairs subcommittee. With them was U. Alexis Johnson, U. S. ambassador to Czechoslovakia and chief U. S. negotiator in the Geneva prisoner talks with the Chinese communists.

Johnson said he has held meetings with the communists on "numerous occasions" brought up the question of the unaccounted-for prisoners.

"Their answer has consistently been that they have no prisoners of ours," Johnson said. "They say we have told you about all the prisoners we have held. We have no others."

Postal Official To Make Issue For More Aids

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield conferred today with new threats of a massive outpouring of postal services unless it meets his demands for more funds.

Summerfield said that if congress does not provide 140 million dollars in additional funds "we'll probably have to close hundreds of post offices and send postal workers home."

But the postal chief said that far from accepting such a cut, his department is now planning to increase more than just to maintain present services.

Summerfield said yesterday on a television program that he would request the sum "in a few days."

He stated at the time the cuts were made that he would have to curtail postal services July 1 unless the reductions were restored and another 70 million to 90 million dollars appropriated.

Not Enough Money
Even if congress restored the 38 million dollars, he said, it was not enough for the postal service in 1957.

Summerfield said that he would have to curtail postal services July 1 unless the reductions were restored and another 70 million to 90 million dollars appropriated.

He blamed the need for extra appropriation on the growth of the nation's economy and increase in the use of mail.

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Court Named In Japan for Soldier Trial

TOKYO, May 27 (AP)—A Japanese district court today named three judges for the manslaughter trial of U. S. Army Specialist 3rd Grade William S. Givard of Ottawa, Ill. In a move that showed Japanese determination to override any American opposition to a Japanese trial.

At the same time the U. S. Embassy refused to help Joseph B. Blier of La Grange, Ill., an American civilian who appealed for "immediate action" from U. S. military authorities.

The story is holding him prisoner on charges of killing two Japanese civilians and Blier demanded a trial by a Japanese court.

The embassy said an investigation showed Blier still was under jurisdiction of the army and that "no question of asylum arises."

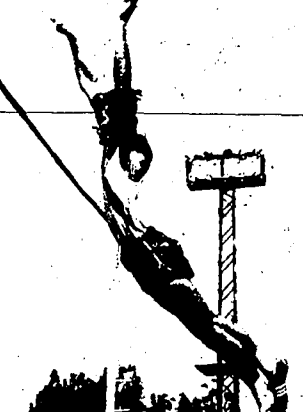

U. S. Families Are Asked to Repair Break

NEW YORK, May 27.—Evangelist Billy Graham implored American husbands and wives last night to turn to God in an effort to repair a breakdown of American family life.

Speaking before a capacity crowd of 18,000 persons at Madison Square Garden, Graham said there was "something desperately and tragically wrong with the American home" which he characterized as the "basic unit of civilized society."

Using marriage as his theme, the 38-year-old Evangelist deplored the nation's divorce rate, which he said had "orphans" some 750,000 children in America last year.

If marriage is to be successful, Graham said, "there must be a spirit of give and take... because marriage is a permanent relation ship."

Advice offered by Graham:

To wives: "When your husband comes home, greet him with a kiss and a smile... be attractive, if you don't mean you have to be pretty, but every woman can be beautiful! Give your love to Christ and he'll give you beauty."

"Keep up with your husband intellectually... keep your house clean... keep down household expenses and don't gossip... don't nag and complain."

To husbands: "Help your wife stay young. Here is the hardest job—hold prayer and Bible-reading sessions in the home."

Graham, describing the home as the "heart of America," called on parents to maintain discipline but without resorting to "a stick." He also urged that parents spend more time with their children.

One young evangelist gave three prerequisites for a happy marriage: physical attraction, mental affinity and spiritual oneness.

Marriage, he said, is "God planned, God-arranged and God-ordained, and not to be trifled with."

"There is no provision in the Bible for trial marriage," he said. "They are meant for ever."

Graham said the man must be the head of the house, but that the responsibility for a successful marriage rested with both the husband and wife.

Following his sermon last night, 841 persons made "decisions for Christ," bringing to 720 the number that has stepped forward at Graham's urging since his New York crusade opened May 14. So far, more than 300,000 persons have attended the sermons.

Secret Plant to Build New Fuel

Secret New Industry Has Potential of Rivaling Oil for Production of Fuels

MUSKOGEE, Okla., (AP)—A secret new industry has just moved out of its diaper stage with the potential of becoming as important as America's petroleum industry.

A 25 million dollar plant which the Callegary Chemical company is starting here for the U.S. navy lifts the security lid on a vast, military-industrial project whose birth and infancy have been kept secret for more than eight years.

This plant will produce a revolutionary high-energy fuel with the trade name of HICAL. It's made from ordinary California desert variety "Tartary Mule Team Root."

Actually, HICAL is just the first of a wide range of so-called "exotic fuels" which, it is now revealed, have been brought to the production stage. Other high energy fuels being developed by the air force from a variety of substances, including powdered, liquefied, light metals, might be just as far along in development.

Military interest in exotic fuels is the great boost in performance they give planes and missiles. The first commercial use will come in jet airplanes. It's possible these fuels could be used in turbine-powered automobiles and trucks.

At the present stage of development HICAL does not hold much promise for use in conventional automobiles.

Secrecy prohibits revealing the full growth of this infant industry. Investment figures go into many millions.

Plants which will produce other types of exotic fuels will soon be sprouting up all over the U.S.

Another plant, costing 25 million dollars, to produce boron-base fuel is being built by the Olin-Matheson Chemical company at Niagara Falls, N.Y.

"Several plants and testing facilities for research which will use these fuels have been built. More are planned."

One of the goals is to develop engines in use conventional and exotic fuels interchangeably.

Public fascination with rocket-propelled missiles is one reason why the exotic fuels have been overlooked. But the experts claim these fuels will have a bigger and more significant military role long before missiles make the combat airplanes obsolete.

It has been reported that the great promise which exotic fuels hold for powering the "chemical bomber" has led defense officials to lose interest in their nuclear plane projects.

Rear Adm. C. B. Cooper, assistant chief of the bureau of aeronautics

the length of time they can sustain operations against the enemy. Exotic fuels will also permit a greater number of solid missiles to be stored in submarines.

HICAL is a combination of boron, carbon and hydrogen. The special blend of these elements locks by hydrogen—a gas that burns with a greater heat of combustion per pound than any other pure material—in a liquid form, clear amber in color. In this state it is easy to handle and transport and can be burned with greater safety.

Boron, it has been found, is the most efficient carrier of hydrogen, is light in weight and also burns carbon. It is a combustible and serves as a stabilizer for safer, more controllable use. It's only slightly more difficult to handle than gasoline.

Specific properties of HICAL and details of the manufacturing plant are a secret.

Muskogee was selected as the site for the first production of HICAL because it has a labor surplus, plenty of water from the huge artificial lake in the area, natural gas and electricity and good transportation facilities.

Callegary Chemical company is a subsidiary of the Mine Safety Appliances company of Pittsburgh, Pa. It was created more than eight years ago to develop HICAL. Navy code name for the project has been "Zin."

SPEED LIMIT INCREASED

SHOSHONE, May 27.—The Union Pacific railroad was granted a speed increase through the city limits here by the city council at a special session recently. The speed permitted by new ordinance is 25 miles an hour. Previous rate was 20 miles an hour.

If HICAL gains widespread use, as is expected, there is estimated to be more than a 20 years' supply in California. Since the development of HICAL the borax firms have begun open-pit mining to meet the great demand.

Base Housing Sales Ending

MOUNTAIN HOME, May 27.—A private firm all but completed selling for \$15,000 each some 400 housing units from Mountain Home air force base that originally cost the government in the neighborhood of \$40,000, according to best estimates.

The fully-equipped, 450-sq.-yard units were built on the base in 1925 to house officers and enlisted men of the military air transport service which controlled the base before it became a strategic air command bomber port.

Base officials said the units were built as a public housing administration project and had to be sold when the law authorizing their construction and use expired recently. Efforts to keep the units on the base through an extension of the authority failed, according to officials, and the units were sold to the highest private bidder as provided in the old PWA law.

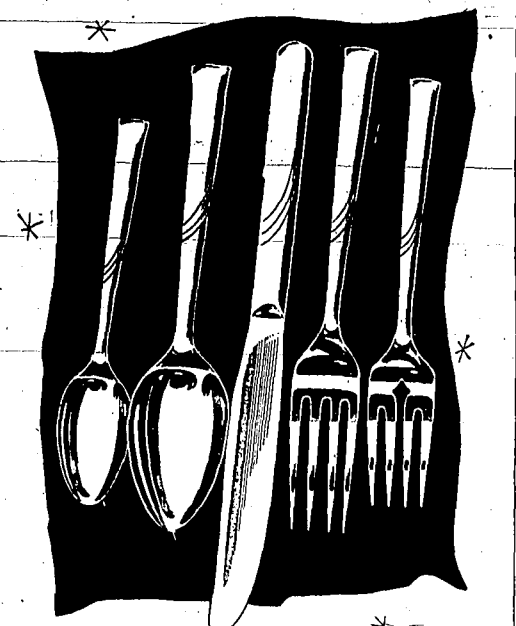

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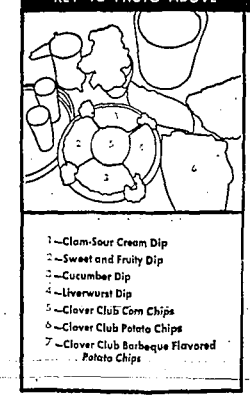
