500-foot tower at Yucca Flat, 25 miles northwest of Las Vegas, Nev., aircraft struck into the radioactive field to photograph the mushroom cloud from 200 miles away. The light was carried in a beam of light from the tower to the camera.

In observation posts flanking the test site were 150 personnel. The test was witnessed by newsmen from all 48 states and 16 by adverse wind conditions, was intended to provide the atomic energy commission with information on radiation measurements, flash effects and fallout.

The entire series, which will continue until Sept. 1, and will include more than 15 shots, is designed "to attain new knowledge important to the defense of the United States and the free world," officials said.

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# Milk Supplies Are Dried Out In Minnesota

**DULUTH, Minn., May 28**—A labor dispute which has virtually cut off milk supplies in this area entered its fifth day today. Another 1,000 California beet sugar workers ended yesterday—even before the expected ratification of a new contract for more overtime and increased wages.

The United Beet Sugar Workers council ordered the men back to work ahead of rallying action of an agreement reached Sunday.

The two year contract gives the workers raises ranging from 2 to 10 cents hourly this year and 10 to 15 cents for the next year. They will get overtime pay after 44 hours weekly during seasonal operation this year and 40 hours weekly next year, but will get 44 hours weekly during the season.

Some persons drove to farms within a 50-mile radius of the twin cities of Duluth and Superior, Wis., to buy milk for their children.

Ration Milk

Grocers, who had been rationing milk at two cars to a customer, ran out of milk yesterday. Mothers, some with babies in their arms, would leave him alone to get milk for fresh milk.

One dairy owner reported that some mothers grew hysterical when waiting. He asked that his name not be revealed so the mothers would leave him alone to get milk for fresh milk.

"My yard is full of cars and the women say they won't leave until they get their milk," he said.

"Dispute, which cut off milk deliveries to homes and groceries, began in the twin cities when milk drivers went on strike for higher wages. They charged the dairy owners with a 'lockout'.

Only one dairy ranch in Duluth and Superior, not involved in the walkout, remained open. Hospitals continued to receive milk supplies.

The city health department assured mothers that dried milk products contained all ingredients needed for babies.

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### U.S. Churches Open Pleas to Get Aid Funds

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Religious leaders began an extraordinary three-day appeal to congress today to spare economic aid to foreign nations from the economy aid.

Protestant, Catholic and Jewish spokesmen were called to a special hearing of the house foreign affairs committee to register the religious support of America's major faiths for continuing, and preferably expanding, this country's help to underdeveloped nations.

Simultaneously the senate foreign relations committee called Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson and Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, to a public hearing on President Eisenhower's overall \$3.65 billion dollar foreign aid request.

First scheduled witness before the house group was the Rev. Dr. Ralph W. Sockman of New York, the "national radio pulpit" preacher whose broadcast sermons have been heard by millions. He appeared as chairman of the Methodist Board of World Peace and a representative of the National Council of Churches.

Sockman was to be followed by Rabbi Abraham J. Friedman, president of the Synagogue Council of America, and the Rev. James L. Vardner of the Catholic Association for International Peace. A dozen other leading churchmen were scheduled to testify during the three days of hearings.

Church officials said it was the first time they could recall that a congressional committee had held a special series of hearings to obtain the testimony of religious leaders on a major public issue.

### 120 Expected to Die in Memorial Holiday Traffic

CHICAGO, May 28.—Death on the highway awaits 120 persons during the 20-hour Memorial Day holiday, according to a forecast today by the National Safety Council.

Council President Ned A. Dearborn said the anticipated toll would be 45 higher than the average of 75 traffic fatalities for a non-holiday Thursday in May. The holiday period is figured from 6 p. m. Wednesday to midnight Thursday.

Dearborn urged holiday drivers to "honor the dead by respecting the living."

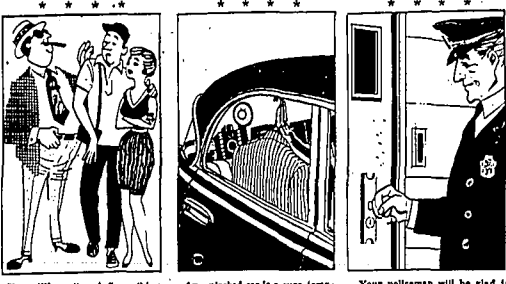

### Chinese Open U. S. Embassy Repair Drive

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—Nationalist Chinese Ambassador Hsiang-shan K. Tung said today he would urge his countrymen in a subscription drive to repair the riot-damaged U. S. embassy at Taipei.

Tung said he donated \$1,000 out of his own pocket.

The ambassador said last night that the mob participating in anti-American rioting on Formosa last week were not organized or connected with the government.

Riots Are Isolated

He said the riots were an "isolated thing" that got out of hand. U. S. officials at Taipei said yesterday that "definitely organized" rioters armed with axes concentrated on smashing their way into the embassy and embassy code room. They said the attack compromised some of the U. S. codes.

Tung said the nationalist Chinese are going to dig out of their own pockets and pay for damages to the embassy.

"Where we will" build a new embassy at no cost to the American taxpayers.

Touches Off Dispute

The rioting was touched off by a dispute over the acquisition by an American commercial of a U. S. soldier who shot and killed a Chinese person.

Tung said one of the reasons for the riots was that Americans applauded the commercial decision. He explained that under Chinese law a person who kills another person, even in self defense, "also carries certain penalties."

### Court Actions To Determine Use of Funds

BOISE, May 28 (AP)—Attorney General Graydon W. Smith said today the legality of using state highway funds to relocate public utility facilities which must be moved because of highway relocation projects would be determined by court action.

The 1937 Idaho legislature passed a law which provided for the cost of moving affected facilities, including power poles and telephone lines, to be considered as part of the cost of the highway project.

When the bill was passed, Gov. Robert E. Smylie advised the state highway board to ascertain the legality of the law in the courts before making any payments to utility companies under its provisions. Smith already had issued an opinion that such payments would be unconstitutional.

The attorney general said either the state or an offending utility company could seek a declaration of judgment in a district court, or a utility could go directly to the state supreme court to seek a writ of mandate ordering payment for relocation of facilities.

The supreme court ruled two years ago that highway funds were dedicated to highway construction, administration and maintenance.

The ruling came in a case in which the legislature attempted to allow the state department of commerce and development to help finance its program.

# New Troubles Facing France In Old Crisis

By United Press

French new trouble in North Africa is complicating the French position in the old crisis.

Relations between France and its former protectorate of Tunisia are becoming more strained.

On Tuesday—last day Premier Laval was forced to resign after losing a confidence vote in the Chamber of Deputies.

France awarded a 15-million year aid program to Tunisia.

It is believed that the French government is sending to Tunisia a large number of troops.

The United States was brought into the North African situation last Thursday.

When the French representatives in Washington of 11 Arab countries made a request to Secretary of State John Foster Dulles that American aid to France be suspended.

This request was based on the allegation that France was guilty of aggression in its campaign against the nationalist rebels in Algeria.

The Algerian rebels are holding out of France's present troubles.

Reluctantly—partly due to United States encouragement of "nationalist" movements all over the world—France granted independence to protectorates of Tunisia and Morocco in 1953.

Algeria, which is the most important of France's African possessions, remained as it had been—a part of France itself politically, with representation in the French parliament.

Open rebellion broke out in Algeria on Nov. 1, 1954. This rebellion continues, France is using nearly 100,000 troops in fighting the rebels.

It is estimated that the campaign will cost France one billion dollars this year.

Morocco borders Algeria on the west. Tunisia borders Algeria on the east. Both Morocco and Tunisia are openly on the side of the Algerian rebels. Also, Tunisia lies between Algeria and Arab Libya.

There is no doubt that the Algerian rebels are getting arms from Libya through Tunisia.

Successive French premiers have vainly sought a solution of the Algerian problem which would give the country a great measure of self-rule but would keep it as a part of France politically.

The French cabinet situation is so tangled that Paris dispatches now say the only solution will be to get Mollat back as premier.

# Pattern of Liquor Laws Over U. S. Is Quite Contradictory

NEW YORK, May 28 (U.P.)—Lucky bartenders are forbidden by law to sell drinks to men who are not supporting their families.

In Michigan the law against free food with liquor is so strict that a waiter cannot even put potato chips, popcorn or popcorn on the bar.

Pennsylvania bars must have enough food, chairs, silver, china, and cooking utensils on hand to convince an inspector that they could serve a meal immediately.

In Indiana cocktail lounges must not be dimly lighted. In South Carolina you should know the time of sunrise and sunset to buy bottled liquor for that when the law says stores open and close.

In most states bars close at 1 a.m. In New York City they stay open until 4 a.m. and in Nevada they go around the clock. Oklahoma and Mississippi are the only two entirely "dry" states in the nation, but in both you can get all you want to drink.

The pattern of liquor laws across the nation is so varied, contradictory, unobserved and often pointless as to defy a comprehensive survey. The United Press took a survey of the 48 states and these are some of the things discovered.

Despite constant "local option" battles, the country is getting "wetter" all the time. Last year some 215 million gallons of spirits were sold, 8 per cent over 1935 and the biggest year in history except 1918 when sales hit 223 million gallons.

Women do not have equality in the barroom in many places. A bill in the Washington legislature this year to let ladies sit at bars was soundly beaten. Rhode Island draws the line between bars and saloons (no food—no women). Chicago prohibits

but they mustn't mix them unless they are married to the owner.

North Dakota, which just started legal drinking in the state, forbids sale of food with liquor but permits an adjoining restaurant as long as the connecting door is no more than four feet wide.

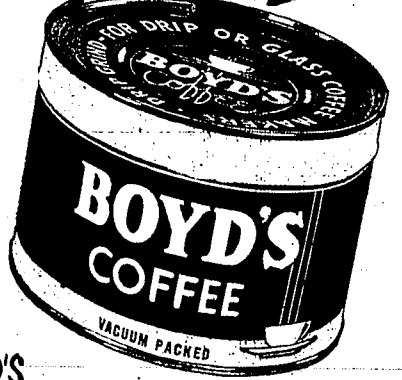
