



Bakery Union To Be Probed By Committee

WASHINGTON, May 29 (AP)—The House labor committee will make a probe of the Bakery Workers Union Thursday in an effort to determine whether two top officers misused union funds.

Chairman John L. McClellan, D.-Ark., said the public hearings in the House will be the first of a series of public testimony by three alleged witnesses in connection with the affairs of the Bakery Workers Union.

The three witnesses, who were subpoenaed last week, are: Dave Beck, Joe Joseph McElroy, a brother of Beck, and Treasurer Accountant Fred Verschuere, Jr., who is believed to have kept Beck's books.

Beck, who announced Saturday that he would not seek re-election, invoked the fifth amendment more than 20 times recently in the face of committee charges that he had misused more than \$22,000 of Treasury funds and misused his power to line his pocket.

McClellan told reporters after a closed strategy meeting of his committee yesterday that 9 to 12 witnesses have been subpoenaed for three days of hearings on the Bakery Workers.

Though he would not identify them, the witnesses were expected to include:

Second Bomb Test Delayed 24 Hours

LAS VEGAS, Nev., May 29 (AP)—Atomic energy commission scientists today called off the second blast in the 20-shot series of A-bomb tests.

The test of the second "midget" nuclear device was postponed 24 hours after a weather evaluation meeting. The next weather session was scheduled for this afternoon.

After a delay of nearly two weeks, the A-bomb test yesterday set off the initial explosion in the United States' most extensive series of nuclear tests.

The device, packing a weight of 10,000 tons of TNT, was set off atop a 360-foot tower. A double-headed neutron cloud boiled up to 3,500 feet and moved slowly northwest over virtually uninhabited territory.

Divorce Attacked In Graham Talks

NEW YORK, May 29 (AP)—Billy Graham last night preached a hard-hitting sermon on the third commandment, in which he said divorce and marital infidelity are "grivous sins of taking the name of the Lord thy God in vain."

The third commandment is not only a prescription against swearing, the 33-year-old Baptist minister said, but also against divorce, "stealing on your wife," "glorifying the body," "hypocrisy and double standards."

He told a Madison Square Garden crowd of 17,500 in the second of a series of sermons on the commandments that "God is an unchanging God. We may have changed over the years socially, politically and morally, but God's standards have not changed."

Air Agreement

THE HAGUE, Holland, May 29 (AP)—Both houses of parliament have approved the Dutch-American air agreement concluded in Washington last month. It was announced today.

The upper house ratified the accord unanimously yesterday. The lower house approved it earlier this month. The agreement provides for new KLM Royal Dutch Airlines air routes from Amsterdam to Houston, Tex., and from Curaçao, Dutch Antilles, to New York.

President of ISC Happy on Ruling

POCAHELLO, May 29 (AP)—Idaho State college President Carl McIntosh said today he was relieved to hear that the Idaho attorney general's office had ruled the ISC education department could share normal school endowment earnings.

He said the opinion seemed to leave a basis for restoration of the funds which had been cut from the ISC appropriation by an earlier attorney general's ruling.

Assistant Attorney General Elbert Olson said Monday a bill passed by the 1957 legislature to provide distribution of earnings accruing in the old Southern Idaho College of Education to the ISC education department was legal.

In an earlier opinion he had said it would be illegal to transfer \$100,000 from the ISC endowment earnings to ISC for general education purposes because the Idaho admissions act specifically provided that the funds could be used only for normal school functions.

The two rulings were on two separate legislative bills.

McIntosh said the ruling this week would give Idaho State college the money it needed for operation of its education department.

LONDON, May 29 (AP)—A pot of paint fouled up Big Ben last night. Latecomers to the world's largest clock in vain for the midnight nine o'clock chimes usually broadcast by the British Broadcasting corporation.

The famous old clock in the tower atop parliament building stopped at 8:40 p.m. Then it got all moved up. At four minutes past 10 Big Ben chimed the hour of 10. At six minutes past it chimed the quarter hour. One minute later it sounded 10 again.

Said Laborite Lord Hale: "I can well understand the preoccupations of Big Ben, who has presided over three deliberations through all the years. If in three circumstances Big Ben has been preoccupied for 10 minutes from performing his normal duties, I am not astonished."

The ministry of works, which oversees Big Ben, must retain an administrator to fire the clock.

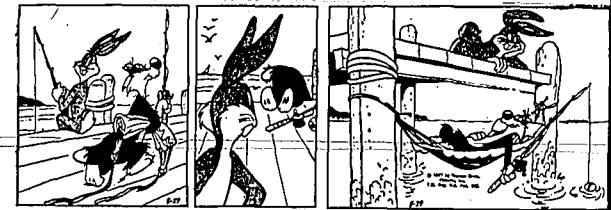

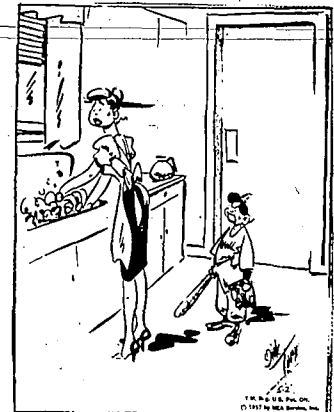
