

Traffic Death Toll Below Estimate as

32 die on Holiday

The nation's Memorial day traffic toll dropped sharply below predictions. A United Press survey showed 93 traffic deaths during the period when the National Safety Council expected 150. The Memorial day toll ran slightly higher than the non-holiday average of 75 for a similar day. The National Safety Council President Ned H. Pearson said drivers deserve "a pat on the back" for their Memorial day care and courtesy. "It's kept it up over the weekend," he pleaded. The United Press count of fatalities between 6 p.m. Wednesday and midnight last night showed 93 persons killed in traffic, 6 dead in plane wrecks, 32 drownings and 16 deaths in miscellaneous mishaps for a total of 146.

Illinois had the worst traffic record with 11 deaths. Pennsylvania and California came next, each with 10. New York was fourth with 9.

Two spectacular plane crashes boomed the accidental death toll as millions paid homage to the nation's war dead.

In Minneapolis, two navy jets collided during an aerial salute at a cemetery, killing one pilot and injuring 18 persons. A father and his two daughters were killed in a Nebraska plane crash.

Safety experts feared the death toll would be higher because of the night-out week-end since many workers took off early for a four-day week.

They said more than 400 persons may be killed in traffic before Sunday.

Death Zones To Be Formed In Cuban War

HAVANA, May 31 (AP)—President Fulbright Batista today took over the military campaign against the rebels. There were indications he would set up "death zones" in the southeastern Cuban to stem rebel infiltration.

Army general headquarters discussed a new general operations command, headed by Batista, had been set up to stamp out the rebels in Oriente province. Major Francisco Tabernilla also said Cuban army reinforcements already were being rushed into the region.

Tabernilla said the plan of operation by the new military "brigade" is designed to force the rebels to stand and fight. He said the strategy will be carried out in a "progressive" manner and indicated it may be necessary to evacuate families from the troubled area.

Observers said the evacuation probably would be the first step in setting up so-called "death zones" after the evacuation of the civilians, any troops probably would be ordered to shoot to kill persons found in the cleared areas, they said.

Tabernilla continued his description of the "military" strategy enunciated to a statement that the government had decided on "crusade" operations of the rebel forces, while taking into consideration the problems of civilians residing in the battle area.

There were indications that the new plan of action already may have begun. The government newspaper "Prensa" reported naval warships shelled rebel positions in the neighborhood of Cienfuegos, 26 miles west of Santiago. The newspaper said Cuban airplanes also strafed the insurgent forces.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., May 31 (AP)—California's senate went on a spending spree yesterday just after Gov. Goodwin Knight wanted that he would veto any special appropriations that threatened a state deficit.

In assembly-line order, the senate approved 26 special appropriations exceeding \$4 million dollars.

Gov. Knight issued his warning as he signed California's record \$1,914,742,760 state budget.

Drivers Hold Lines Against Traffic-Death

CHICAGO, May 31 (AP)—The nation's motorists continued to hold the line against traffic fatalities despite the upward consumption of highway miles, the National Safety Council reported today.

The council reported that for the fifth month in a row, deaths have been the same or fewer than the same month a year earlier. In April, 1947, 2,200 persons lost their lives in traffic accidents, approximately the same figure as in April, 1956.

Motorist figures for the first two months of this year showed an 8 per cent increase while traffic deaths dropped 3 per cent. Figures for March and April are not yet available, the council said.

The first four months of 1957 showed a 3 per cent decrease in traffic deaths. The total of 12,550 was 210 less for the corresponding period last year.

Massachusetts decreased its traffic deaths 35 per cent during the first four months of 1957. Idaho 28 per cent, and Nebraska 25 per cent.

The top three cities with populations of more than 200,000 which decreased their death tolls during the same period were Norfolk, Va., 100 per cent; Richmond, Va., 58 per cent; and Fort Worth, Tex., 53 per cent.

Norfolk, Va., Jacksonville, Fla., and Spokane, Wash., held on to their perfect records for the entire period.

In cities of over one million population, the ratio of traffic deaths per 10,000 registered vehicles was 2.6 for Detroit, Mich., 2.9 for Chicago, Ill., and 3.4 for Los Angeles, Calif.

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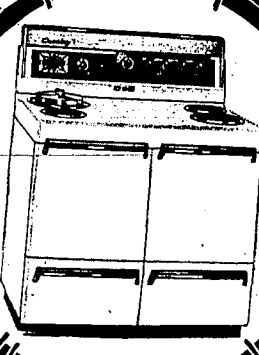
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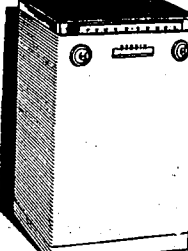
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New Move Is Made to Heal Farmer's Split

WASHINGTON, May 31 (AP)—A new move is being made by some farm leaders to heal a sharp split in Congress over future government farm policies.

It is being sponsored by the National Milk Producers Federation and a dozen or so other organizations concerned with individual farm commodities, such as poultry, hogs, wheat, rice, other grains and fruits, vegetables, soybeans and some other crops.

Moved for Leadership

This group is moving to take over leadership from the general farm organizations—such as the American Farm Bureau federation, the National Grange and the National Farmers Union—because those organizations are bitterly divided on farm matters.

This division among the general organizations has been a major factor in the farm legislation has been meeting with little success.

The Farm Bureau favors lower price supports and fewer government controls. The Grange calls for price price for commodities used at home and a lower one for products sold abroad.

The Farmers Union wants supports and farm income guarantees higher than presently provided.

Plan Meetings

The smaller individual commodity organizations plans to hold a big meeting here in August for consideration of specific programs for each commodity.

Leaders of these units hope they will be able to reach a broad agreement on programs for presentation to Congress next year.

Some leaders said they believed it would be possible to develop programs under which each phase of agriculture would finance its own production, market, price-support, marketing and research arrangements.

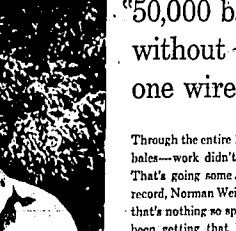

European Allies of U. S. Are Ending China Trade Barrier

LONDON, May 31 (U-A) — America's allies in Europe are breaking through the China trade barrier, led by Britain, France, Norway and Denmark are not far behind.

British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd announced yesterday in the House of Commons that Britain was repealing restriction against trade with the United States and the United Kingdom.

The other European nations—and Japan—were looking away at the time, without the assurance there is much trading to be done.

They are retaining the ban of shipment of "strategic" goods to the communist Chinese—items which could help the Chinese war machine. But they have pressed for elimination of more than 400 items from the embargo which was clamped down, chiefly due to pressure from the United States, at the height of the Korean war in 1951.

At a meeting in Paris this week, representatives of 15 western nations worked for an agreement to bring the embargo for China into line with that for Russia. It has been possible to ship goods to the Soviet bloc in Europe which could not be sent to China. But some of the banned items went on to China via eastern Europe.

The United States has not announced any plans to relax its own strict embargo, but the nations of western Europe have urged the United States with an accomplished fact—they intend to try to step up trade with Beijing regardless of the American position.

Britain is locked in a fierce struggle with Japan and western Germany for world markets. The British economic position is more precarious since 1945, and the British argue that it is in the interest of the western alliance to have a financially strong Britain.

J. S. Soldier Is Given New Murder Trial

TOKYO, May 31 (AP)—The Japanese government has asked that the American serviceman now sentenced to death in a Japanese court given a new trial. It was disclosed today.

The Seoul procurator's office asked that the hanging sentence be reversed by the Seoul district court on March 20 for Pvt. Cyril L. C. Boone, 24, of Clatskanie, Ore., and his Japanese sweetheart were too young because of the "barbarity of the crime."

The procurator had demanded a sentence for Boone and Shigetaka, his 20-year-old sweetheart, charges of murder, robbery and rape. The court bypassed the recommendation and passed the death sentence because of the "barbarity of the crime."

The defense appealed to the Emperor's court for a new trial and the procurator's office agreed that the case should be reopened. The case for a new trial came at a time when Japanese and American soldiers were being exchanged.

A U.S. military judge, Army Specialist 3/O William B. Boone, Jr., of La Grange, Ill., is the center of an international controversy over whether he should be tried in a Japanese court or by U.S. army martial law for the accidental killing of Mrs. Naka Sakai, 42, a U.S. military nurse.

Boone was given until today by the military district court to name a lawyer, but reliable informants say he would not name a defense counsel until the United States and Japan decide which will try him.

There was no such dispute in the case of Boone. The Negro soldier was charged off duty at the time he shot his sweetheart and blooded a Japanese woman to death, then fled to her house to conceal the crime.

Boone, an army deserter, already under life sentence imposed by court martial board at the time the death sentence was passed. The court martial board at the time was headed by Col. Edward K. Hanks, 31, of Hawaii.

The Seoul procurator's office said there should be "reconsideration" of some of the points raised in Boone's defense counsel. That they were at an age given to "impetuous action" when the crime was committed, that their mental condition at the time was akin to "menstrual illness" and that Boone had a history of mental illness in his family.



New Well Will Be Drilled at Payette

PAYETTE, May 31 (AP)—Groco, a payette oil company, today announced plans for drilling an exploratory well at the Charles Johnson property east of here on highway 52 in a search for natural gas or oil.

The well would be the 15th to be drilled in the Payette area. Groco said that they were almost certain that there was gas or oil deposits in the earth near Payette, but so far the drilling has been without results.

Veteran Climbers Find Dead Soldier

ELIPROCK, N.M., May 31 (AP)—A group of veteran mountain climbers yesterday removed the body of a 25-year-old Seattle, Wash. soldier killed in a 500-foot fall on historic Eliprock mountain Wednesday.

Authorities said the body of Bernard E. Topp had been removed from a ledge on the 3,700-foot sandstone pinnacle, located on the Idaho Indian reservation, and taken to a funeral home at Farmington, N.M.

A coroner's inquest held at the scene ruled the death accidental.

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D. Minn., a member of the foreign relations committee, said, however, that "if the disarmament issue with the communists is being taken seriously, why not the trade issue?"

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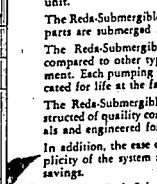

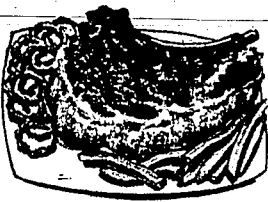

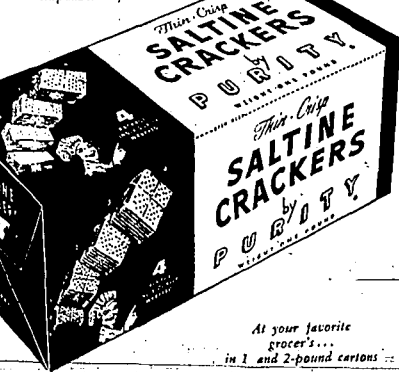
